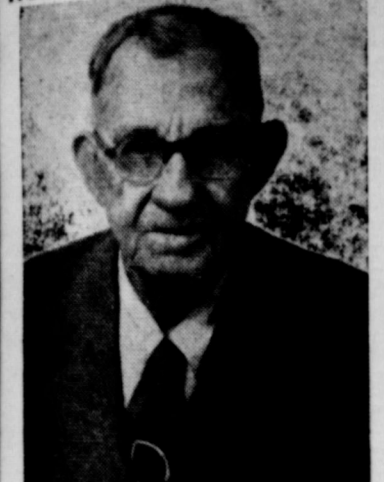


**School Man To Retire Next August**



At the February meeting of the O'Donnell School trustees, T. J. Vandell, long time school secretary, resigned, effective August 31st.

Mr. Vandell began work Nov. 5th, 1941 as secretary for both the City of O'Donnell and the School District. In 1949 the two offices were divided and Mr. Vandell continued as school secretary. By next August he will have served 20 years at the post. At the time he retires he will be 79 and he said he and his wife were going to catch up on visiting the grandchildren.

The Vandells moved here Jan. 7th, 1924 from Knox County and Tom Vandell's box car of household goods arrived coupled to the car of the late Mack Haymes. In 1927 Tom was elected County Commissioner of Pettus, Lynn County serving two terms. From then on until '41 he farmed and was in grain business three years. There is probably no one in the area who knows ownership of area land better than Tom. His mind is a living time map. Those of us who have worked with Tom both in city and school work know him to be a man of rare dedication to duty and very cooperation.

Other business included the extension of Supt. Criner's, Coach Blair's and Mr. Reed's contract by one year each. Contracts of principals were not due this year. At the March meeting contracts of faculty will be considered. Kicked around in informal discussion was the topic of physical improvement of the school plant. Usually formal consideration of this comes in the May meeting.

Other services made possible by such local drives is a summer camp near Waxahachie, and O'Donnell sends two boys each year to this camp. Home and hospital for unwed mothers at San Antonio, men's social service centers at Dallas, Ft. Worth and San Antonio, Evangelical Home for girls at Dallas, Ft. Worth, San Antonio and Houston, alcoholics rehabilitation center at Houston, the Disaster Service, Prisoners parole service and Welfare council service. **SCHOOL HAS GOOD INSPECTION REPORT FROM EDUCATIONAL AGENCY**

The Texas Education Agency has standards which all schools must meet and periodically an accrediting team visits each school to make sure that they are meeting these standards. This is the reason for our recent visit by the accrediting team. All schools are visited every few years by an accreditation team. This procedure is normal and is a good system of maintaining quality schools in Texas.

The rating system used by the visiting team is—

1. For minor deficiencies a school is advised.
2. For considerable deficiencies a school is warned.
3. For extreme cases of not meeting standards, accreditation may be removed.

The report of the accreditation team visit to the O'Donnell Public Schools has been received from the Texas Education Agency. The general rating of our school was good. However, we were advised of some deficiencies, also that we were in most instances meeting the requirements of the Agency although a few items of the team felt should be strengthened in our school system.

Most of the items of advisement we can correct with ease and one or two will be a little more difficult but we can and will correct them. Supt. John Criner said,

For instance we were advised that our buildings were not adequate in all respects — second floor of the Jr. Hi Building and the Negro School were buildings mentioned by the team. A great turnover of instructional personnel was also one of the more difficult items. The minor items of improvement were library facilities, P. E. program in elementary schools, science and health program in elementary school, creative art program and in-service program were the areas of advisement which we feel can be corrected fairly easily. Much of the difficulty mentioned above can be eliminated by better building facilities and less teacher turnover.

It is felt that this is a good report and that the team visit will help strengthen our school even more. Mr. Criner added,

**A MAN WITHOUT A COUNTRY**

In the past a person could lose his citizenship largely because he wanted to; later late one could lose it against his will by "expatriation."

Before 1940 the courts said: "No persons can by their own act, without the government's consent, put off their allegiance, and become aliens."

In 1870 the U. S. and Great Britain agreed that naturalization in the one nation meant loss of citizenship in the other. Soon afterwards, courts also held that a citizen could give up U. S. citizenship at will, and the next question was when it could be taken away.

Under a 1907 federal law, certain acts could mean expatriation: one's swearing allegiance to a foreign nation; a woman's marrying an alien, a naturalized citizen living abroad for a certain number years.

In 1940, later amended in 1952, the U. S. broadened the laws to cover new acts that could deprive one of his citizenship.

1. By willing foreign military service. One citizen in Japan before World War II was drafted in the Japanese army. After the war, he tried to take away his citizenship, but the court said no: The citizen must have served willingly; if he were forced into Japanese service, no one could take away his citizenship.
2. By voting in a foreign election. One U. S. citizen voted in a Mexican election (as Mexican law permitted). The U. S. took away his citizenship.

Why?

By voting a citizen may encourage conduct against the U. S. interests.

By treason or desertion in war time. But in one such case the Supreme Court found expatriation so severe as to be "cruel and unusual" punishment in violation of the Constitution.

4. There are other acts which endanger one's citizenship such as leaving the country to evade military service in time of national emergency.

A comprehensive report on T.B. control in Texas was distributed this week as Gov. Price Daniel's coordinating committee on tuberculosis took another step toward meeting the governor's instructions to "launch a frontal attack against this disease."

The report is factual, no frills report marks the first time in history that information on TB control activities of seven statewide agencies has been compiled into a single volume.

"Despite advances made in recent years against tuberculosis as a killer of Texans, the disease must still be regarded as a major menace from the point of view of its disabling effect on the patient, its disrupting influence on the family, and its costly interval of treatment," the governor wrote in a foreward to the report.

State Health Commissioner J. E. Peavy said the report was "designed to meet an obvious need for information concerning tuberculosis control services available from the seven agencies most intimately involved. Dr. Peavy is chairman of the coordinatng committee."

Contributors to the report were the Texas TB Association, Texas Medical Ass'n, State Department of Health, Board for Hospitals and Special Schools, Department of Public Welfare, Veterans Administration, and the Texas Educational Agency.

Copies of the publication have gone to city and county health officers, county judges, county medical society components, T B hospitals, welfare workers, and others.

The report contains such diverse information as the location of 92 local TB associations, control functions performed by the State Health Department's sections on laboratories, preventive medicine and special health services, and the location of 35 public TB clinics.

**THIS WEEK IN AUSTIN**

Which would the people of Texas prefer? A general sales tax or a payroll tax?

One way to find out has been suggested by the Texas Press Association: Let the people vote on the tax preference in the upcoming Senate election.

Governor Daniel's preference of the payroll tax has certainly sparked new hopes and efforts of advocates of the general sales tax.

Supporters of the sales tax see in the payroll proposal a chance to insist that only the general sales tax is sure of bringing in money of the quantity needed, and they use this as the occasion to argue that the sales tax would bring new money into the state by reaching out-of-state visitors.

And now they are submitting another argument which will be tried out when committees start hearing on the tax bills.

The theory is that opposition can be built to the payroll levy because it hits the salary and wage-earner directly; and, the argument is being formulated that a general sales tax would take less money out of the employed person's pocket than would the payroll levy.

ONE sales tax advocate has been quoted as saying:

"We know from the bill itself that a person earning \$5,000 a year would face \$25 deducts in the payroll tax. The sales tax plan would exempt food and medicine, at least, and probably clothing items below some minimum amount."

"Our preliminary figures suggest that the same employee would not pay over \$1 a month in the general sales tax that is on items not already under selective sales taxes. If that proves out, then he would be taxed only about half as much under the sales tax as he would be under the payroll levy."

A supporting argument is that Texas people would pay the whole bill under the governor's plan, and the tourists and visitors from out-of-state would get a free ride, except for the gasoline taxes they already are subject to.

Even though the administration and a great number of the legislators are pledged against the general sales tax, it is a firm guess that the first and strongest supporters of a popular vote on the choice of new taxes will be sales tax advocates. They believe they could bolster their position at the polls. They feel that any substantial popular approval, even far short of majority preference, would be more in favor of a general sales tax.

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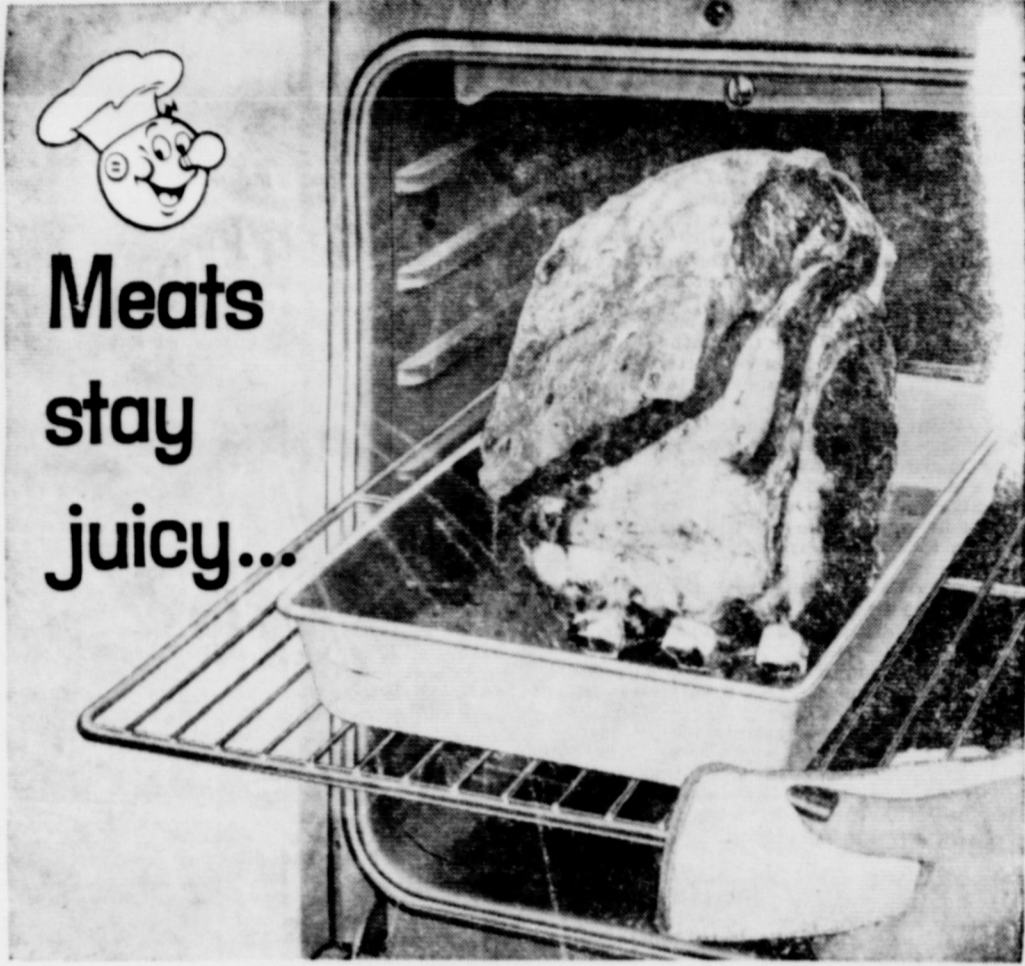

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**THIS WEEK IN AUSTIN**

Among the many bills to be presented at this session are two by the Texas State Bar Association which propose the creation of city and county traffic courts of record. The new courts are necessary, say members of the bar, because of the great increase in court trials of traffic cases resulting from the much-disputed penalty provisions of the automobile rate schedule. One bill would authorize creation of a traffic court of record in each county; and when the plan is adopted by a county, it would provide for the election of the judge. The other bar association bill would empower cities of over 50,000 population to establish these courts of record. It would call on the lawyers residing within a city to "nominate" the judge subject to confirmation by the governing authority of the city. If one selection were turned down, another would be made by the lawyers. Both bills would require the judges to be licensed lawyers. The municipal traffic courts would not displace the existing corporation courts, but would relieve their dockets of traffic matters leaving them to trials on violation of other city ordinances. By making the tribunals courts of record, the process of appeal would be achieved, which is not possible on many of the judgments of present municipal courts. This legislation, and much other also since the passage of new auto insurance penalty schedules, proves the wide effect that new legislation creates. Aside from the fact that the insurance bill has caused great concern among all citizens, its effect on other legislative processes isn't even complete yet. More and more legislators, both in the House and in the Senate, agree that more changes are needed in this auto insurance legislation before it will be to the best interest of all Texans.

**Purple Heart Veteran Deported as Wetback**

SAN ANTONIO—Immigration authorities sent a 21 year-old Purple Heart veteran of Korea back to Mexico as a "wetback" recently. The veteran, Cpl. Alberto Gonzales of Monterrey, Mexico, was sent in an immigration bus to Laredo, Tex., to be put off in Mexico. Immigration Officer W. L. Meulhouse said he had entered the United States on a dead man's birth certificate before he joined the American army three years ago. Wetbacks—named for those who swim the Rio Grande—are illegal entrants.

The G.I. Forum, which works on the problems of Latins in San Antonio, assigned an attorney, Richard Casilas, to the case with instructions to "go all the way to the state department if necessary" to allow Mr. Gonzales to live in the United States.

The immigration office said he was being allowed to leave the country "voluntarily" and predicted he could get a permanent visa from the American consul in Mexico that would allow him to come back in time for the wedding. Mr. Gonzales was discharged from the army at Fort Sam Houston.

He joined the Army Sept. 17, 1948, and enlisted for another three years on the same date last year. Velia Sanchez, 20, his fiance, said he had spent a year in Korea, with headquarters of the Eighth army. "He was wounded in the hip and got a broken ear drum," she said. "He has the Purple Heart, five campaign stars, the United Nations ribbon, the Korean service ribbon and a unit citation."

**Spare Parts for Body Are Available to Man**

NEW YORK—Spare parts for the human body still can't be ordered from a mail-order catalog. Nevertheless, the advance of medicine during the past few years has made available an imposing array of replacements for damaged or ineffective organs. Following the development of the blood bank, first of the spare-part repositories, ingenious surgeons have found ways to maintain banks for eyes, bone, cartilage, arteries and veins. There are now methods for transplanting whole organs from one individual to another, and for constructing replacement organs from tissues taken from the patient's own body. Some man-made spare parts, such as the artificial kidney, are already coming into clinical use, while others, among them the mechanical heart and plastic heart valves, are well along in the ex-

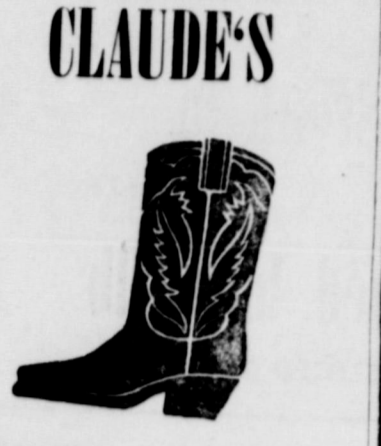

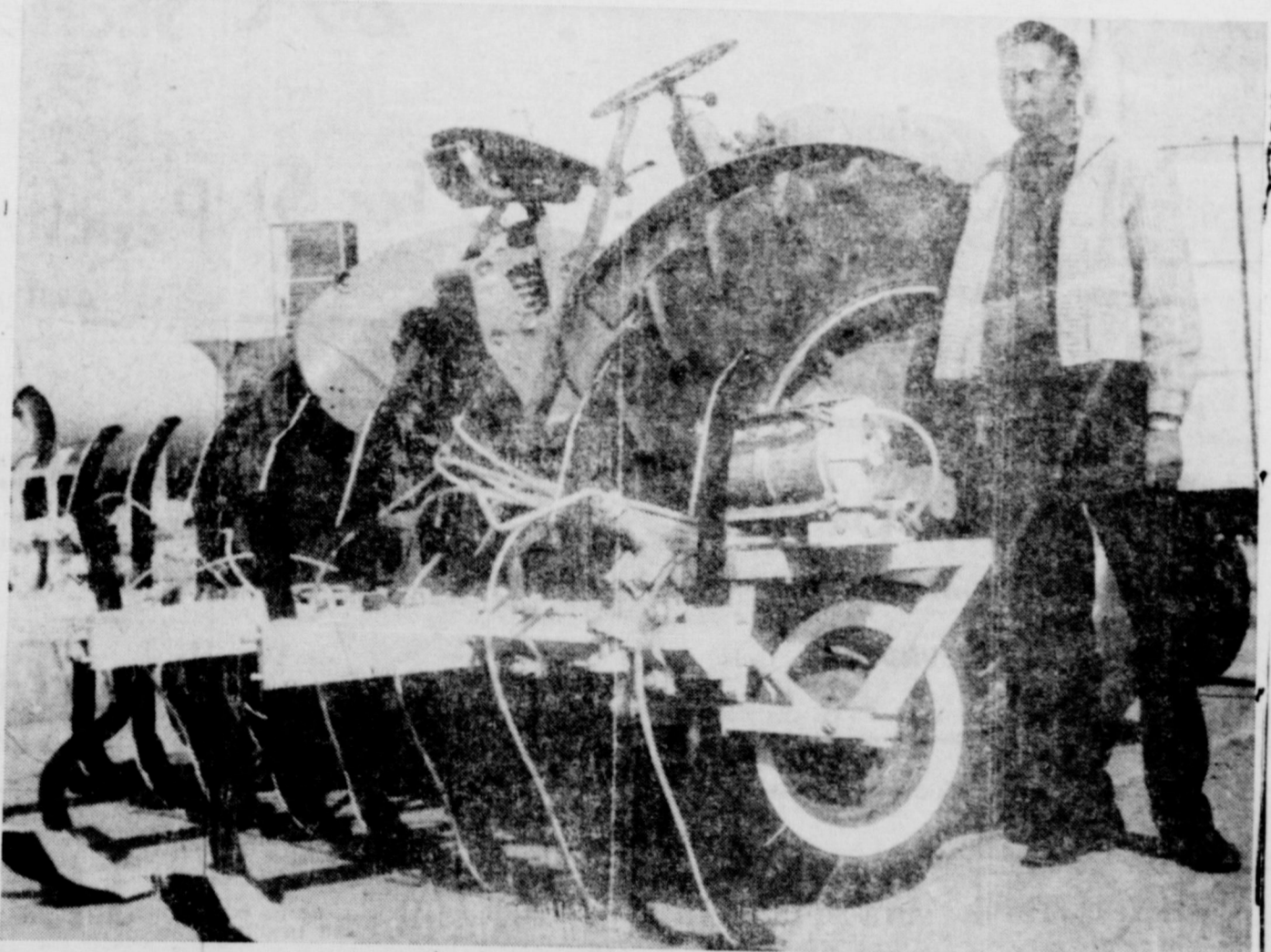
