Many farmers in and around Lubbock have begun to show a keen interest in the new social security law as it will affect them in 1955 and later according to John G. Hut ton. District Manager of the Lubboop office of the Social Security

Administration.
'In visits to Lubbock county. representatives of the Lubbock office area having numerous questions and inquiries from self-employed farm operators about what they need to do now and later. what it will mean to them and to their families in the way of future

retirement or survivor monthly benefit checks.' Hutton stated. 'In general.' he reports, selfemployed farm, ranch and cotton gin operators, who earn as much as \$400 net profit in 1955 and in 1956 will become fully insured in April 1956. Those then 65 years of age or older, or survivors if those who die insured after that date will be due monthly checks subject to the retirement or earning test contained in the 1954 Amendments.

Farm employees who are 'pald as much as \$200 by one employer in 1955 or any later calendar year will also begin to earn social security rights. The test of being insured depends on what quarters of coverage. A farm em-ployee gets one such quarter of coverage for each \$100 in taxable wages, up to four in each year. The self-employed person receives his farm quarters of coverage for each year that he reports as much as \$400 in net profit. So one is insured until he has at least 6 quarters of coverage and the require ment rises through the future years to a maximum need for 40 such

"It is the adult's job to prevent childhood accidents," declares Dr. Geo. W. Cox. State Health Officer. As children do not always con-form to the practices that would form to the practices that would assure greatest safety, adults must be made to understand the accident problem of children and be as con-cerned about it as they are about

childhood diseases A notable decrease in infant mortality has been brought about by physicians and public health work during the past quarter century. Despite the efforts of the medical profession to protect the country's future citizens, childhood mortality continues high because of accidentsaccidents that for the most part are preventable.

The accident death rate among children is being reduced only about one third as fast as the rate Preventable for death by disease. accidents are the leadingg cause of death in the age group one to fourteen. Only by the understand-ing and cooperation of adults can the toll of child accident deaths be reduced.

Besides causing deaths, accident are responsible for thousands of school children being injured sufficiently to require the attention of a physician or cause absence from school. Injuries occuring in school buildings account for 26 per cent, going to and from school, 5 per cent, at home 17 and other places


