Watch Water Vacation

One of the most important factors contributing to the well-being of summer vacationists is a safe and healthful water supply. Contaminated water is the annual cause of much sickness and many fatalities. Water from sources not known to be safe should never be used to supply vacation needs.

Dr. Henry A. Holle, State Health Officer, stated this week that most municipal water supplies in Texas are periodically inspected and samples submitted to the State or local public health laboratories for examination.. He advised that it always best, when in doubt, to en-deavor to secure water from a municipal supply.

"Families away from home on picnics, excursions, or vacation trips," Dr. Holle said. "should either ascertain that their water supply is safe or they should make it safe for human consumption Water can be rendered safe by boil ing for 15 minutes or by the add ition of chlorine. A few drops of ordinary chlorine laundry bleach can be added to a gallon of clear water and if the water is allowed to stand for 15 minutes it may be used for drinking."





SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an amendment to Article
IX of the Constitution of the State
of Texas by adding thereto a new
section to be known as Section 4,
by providing that the Legislature may authorize the creation of county-wide Hospital Districts in certain counties if approved by the qualified property taxpaying vot -ers at an election held for that pur pose within such District; prescrib ing the powers of such District; pro viding for the submission of the proposition to the qualified voters of the State of Texas at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November of 1954; prescribing the form of ballot and providing for the necessary proclamation by the Governor and publication of notice.
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGIS LATURE OF THE STATE OF TEX-

Section 1. That Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas be, and the same is hereby amend ed by adding thereto another section, to be designated as Section 4, which shall read as follows:

"Section 4. The Legislature may by law authorize the creation of county-wide Hospital Districts in counties having a population in ex-cess of 190,000, and in Galveston County, with power to issue bonds for the purchase, acquisition, construction, maintenance and operator where the hospital system jointly operated by a county and city within the county, and to provide for the transfer to the countywide Hospital District of the title to any land, building or equipment, jointly or separately owned, and for the assumption by the district of any outstanding bonded indebted ness theretofore issued by any county or city for the establishment of hospitals or hospital facilities; to levy a tax not to exceed seventy five (\$.75) cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation of all

taxable property within such dis-trict provided, however, that such district shall be approved at an election held for that purpose, and that only qualified, property tax-paying voters in such county shall vote therein; provided further, that such Hospital District shall assume full responsibility for providing medical and hospital care to needy inhabitants of the county and there after such county and cities there in shall not levy any other tax for hospital purposes; and provided fur Hours 8 a m to 6 p m dally hospital purposes; and provided fur ther that should such Hospital Dis-Sunday: 9 a m to 11 a m trict construct, maintain, and support a hospital or hospital system, that the same shall never become a charge against the State of Texas, nor shall any direct appropriation ever be made by the Legislature for the construction, maintenance or improvement of the said hospital or hospitals. Should the Legislature enact laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Acts shall not be invalid because of

their anticipatory character."
Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified property taxpaying voters of this State at the General Election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1954, at which election all ballots shall
