The bell originally was used the steamer Reliance to sound the hours and to herald the approach of the little vessel into the harbor. It was the summer of 1856 that the Reliance glided into the port of Indianola, then a thriving city on the Gulf coast of Texas. night, fire broke out aboard

ship and it was destroyed, the bell going down with the charred hulk Lutherans of Indianola obtained permission from the ship's owners to try to salvage the bell, which was done, and it was placed in the steeple of the Lutheran Church.

In 1864 Three Union gunboats bomboarded Indianola and captured the city. Supplies were seized and soldiers climbed into the belry and tossed the bell to the round. Then it was carried to the beach to be shipped north to be into bullets.





COAL: The 'Payoff'

The "payoff" in the recent coal strike settlement was coming more quickly than was usually the case in the settling of these disputes. The cost to the consumer of John L. Lewis' power over the operators and his union was to be felt very

ANNOUNCEMENT came in the form of a statement by spokesman for the soft coal industry that there is now in preparation a 10 to 40 cents a ton increase on the price of coal.

When the United Mine Workers long strike against the industry was settled recently, operators forecast a rise in prices.

However, discussion of the price hike indicated there would be no blanket increase. Rather, the boost would vary according to the financial situation and contract commitments of individual firms. One official was quoted as say-

"If it (the increase) only amounts to 10 cents a ton, the retailer shoud be able to absorb it. But if it goes any higher, it will affect

the price of coal to the consumer.' It seems logical that the retailer could assume an added cost of 10 cents a ton-but the question was: Would he? Except for competition, which would hardly be forthcoming in the way of a price fight, the retailer could pass on any coal price hike to the consumer.

Figures lending themselves to many artifices, the gentleman issuing that statement, Rep. Roy O. Woodruff of Mich an figured it out this way:

A PRIVATE CITIZEN to match the standard of living now enjoyed by the President would need an income of three to three and a half million dollars a year.

Mr. Truman has take-home pay of \$110,000 a year out of his salary, \$50,000 of which is tax-free.

He has 42 facilities for travel, including 35 automobiles, airplanes, his own yacht, the Williamsburg, a private Pullman car and "vacation retreats" in Key West, Fla., and Maryland.

He has an estimated stall of 665 persons at an annual cost of \$1,-491,540. He has a travel allowance of \$33,000 to \$40,000.

Then Representative Woodruff listed the costs of the yacht, the President's personal plane, his private railroad car, a destroyer escort for the yacht, secret service and White House guards, White House salary costs for a staff of

THEN said Representative Wood-"By comparison, President Roosevelt in 1945 had a staff of 53 costing only \$256.431 and President Hoover's staff totaled 37 at a salary bill of \$127,200. Present White House salary costs, he said,

amount to \$998,254 annually. That was an impressive list of conveniences and privileges and special help, certainly; rivaling in many instances the best that an Indian Potentate could boast. Yet, democracy comes high, and there was little likelihood that a resume of what the presidency costs the people would raise the blood pressure of many American tax-

ELECTIONS: Certainty & Doubt

A graphic contrast between choices by electorates in Communist and other countries was provided in the Russian and Belgian elections. In Russia, there was no choice.

Premier Stalin was the Number 1 candidate of the Soviets, and he had no opposition. As head of the Communist ticket, he was shooting for as nearly 100 per cent of the vote as possible-with no "No" votes to come.

Stalin and associates campaigned on a pledge of following a policy of peace. The Russians elected a new parliament of 1,302 members.


IN BELGIUM the situation was quite different. The issue was: THAT'S NOT SURPRISING for Should King Leopold III be returned to the throne? Fifty-seven per cent of the voters said he should, a fact which must have been comforting to Leopold, inasmuch as he had to abdicate unless he rea lack of proper security efforts on ceived 55 per cent of the vote.

However, the victory at the polls didn't mean Leopold was back on the throne. Parliament would have the last word, as the election was only advisory-being designed to show parliament how the people felt about Leopold. The election was tumultuous, with rioting and fighting marking the balloting.

LEOPOLD had drawn the ill will of millions of Belgians because of his capitulation to the Germans in World War II, although his supporters pointed out there was little else he could have done.

The crux of the election was some 151,000 invalidated ballots. If these were counted, the result would give Leopold only 54 per cent of the votes and he would have to act on his pledge of abdication if he failed to receive the 55 per cent he had mentioned.

Grants Not New

AS LONG AGO as 1785 while the nation was operating under the articles of confederation, the continental congress made the first grants-in-aid subsidies. They consisted of large areas of public lands for use by public schools and universities. Since that time, every succeeding congress has increased the grants-in-aid program until this past year, fiscal 1949 ending June 30 last, total federal grants in-aid to the several states and to individuals and local government on 46 program totalled \$5,493.710,-

The grants-in-aid to states and local governments proper amounted to \$1,854,789,515 while the subsidies to individuals in federal aid payments amounted to \$3,638,921,-248. These figures were obtained from the treasury department by Congressional Quarterly, a nonpartisan Washington reporting agency.

Even these figures do not include all the payments which are daily going out from the federal government to the states. For instance the figure does not include payments under the farm price support program, funds which are spent for flood control, navigation and reclamation, military posts, navy yards, air force fields and the regular civilian federal offices and their huge payrolls located in the various states.

Figures Mount

And despite the hue and cry in congress and out for curtailment of the grant-in-aid program, the figures mount steadily. The Morrill act of 1862 is generally considered to be the Daddy of the grants-inaid program. The act provided for the grant of federally owned land to each state to endow, support and maintain the land grant colleges of agriculture and mechanical arts. Next came the grants for the blind in 1879; next came the agricultural experiment stations in 1887, and in 1888 to provide homes for veterans and in 1890 the act was passed for annual additional grants to the A. & M. colleges.

Next came state marine training schools and in 1914 came the program to establish agricultural extension service and by 1915 the federal grants in aid were costing about five and a half million dollars annually.

During and after World War I, the program took a huge spurt when the congress set up federal aid for construction of highways in 1916, vocational education in 1917, control of venereal disease in 1919 and that year the grants-in-aid climbed to 11.7 million dollars.

of the federal program took shape during the depression years of the 1930's with grants to the states running to more than a billion dollars annually. These included the social security program with provisions for federal aid to the blind, the aged, dependent children, maternal aid, unemployment compensation and later the public health service.

More recently the federal airport program and the grants for hospital construction came along.

The grants-in-aid program has given birth to the anti-adminis-tration charges of "the welfare state" and the 'socialistic state" although the charge also is made that "the Republicans would not dare repeal a single one of these acts."

Most of the federal grants are made on a matching basis with the state or other local subdivision of government putting up an equal or lesser per cent of the money. It is true also that generally speaking the regular grants-in-aid in 11 western states are generally higher percentage-wise than in the rest of the country for the reason that the U.S. government owns about one fourth of the land area in these states and the higher federal contributions are considered to be payments in lieu of taxes which the states would receive from the land if held by private holders.

Totals Listed

Some of the more important federal program totals for fiscal year 1949 are: old age assistance, \$718,-011,000; aid to dependent children, \$189,415,000; unemployment com-pensation and employment service \$140,313,000; aid to highways, \$397,-743,000; airport construction \$30.vocational education, \$26,-145,000; school lunch program \$73, 501,000; agricultural extension, \$29,-961,000; disposal of surplus crops,

But there are a score or more of other smaller programs such as public works advance planning, cripple children, child welfare services, tuberculosis control, mental health, national forest fund, submarginal land program, wildlife restora-tion, mineral leases, migratory bird conservation, flood control lands, public housing grants, research and marketing

Rugged Prophet

Lesson for April 16, 1950

DON'T MAKE the mistake of thinking that the "minor" prophets of the Old Testament were less important than the "majors." The 12 men whose writings end our Old Testament are in no way less important than Isaiah, Jeremiah or Ezekiel. They are called "minor" only because their writings cover fewer pages. First in point of time came Amos.

Ranch-Hand Preacher

A MOS WAS NO city preacher, in fact not a preacher at all. He would not even call himself a prophet. He was a ranch-hand from the back country, more like what we would call a hired hand than a farmer on his

own. He had no prestige, no backing, no social or official position, no money, no high education, no naional reputation, in fact none of things that make "take notice" of

Dr. Foreman strange speaker. He had no lecture bureau, had no luncheon-club, he could not even

hire a hall. But the Lord had spoken to him and he knew it. He was determined that the wealthy people who crowded the temple yard in Bethel should hear him. No doubt the mere sight of the man would attract attention. In his rough working clothes he would look as out-ofplace in that well-polished crowd as a huckleberry in a pan of milk.

As his voice, trained in the wide open spaces, rang out over the crowd, a few people may have laughed at first. But a circle of respectful silence would grow around him. Indeed they liked what he said, at first.

Roll-Call of Doomsday

"FOR three transgressions of Damascus, yea for four . . . I will not turn away the punish-ment thereof," he began. Damas-cus was capital of Syria, for generations their country's bitter and all too successful enemy. So when Amos predicted a crash for Syria, you may imagine the applause would be loud.

Then, one after another, as Amos points his finger east, north, south, the lightning of God's curse is called down on enemy after enemy of the nation of Israel. Fire, hurricane, defeat and disaster are foretold for every one.

Too Close Home

EVERYTHING Amos had said was true, and came true; every nation whose downfall he predicted collapsed just as he said it would. But that was not the main reason he had tramped all the way to Bethel. He had some things to say to the very people before him, something about themselves and their own country. So when he had his audience in the palm of his hand, just as they were gloating the terrible fate of the nations they hated, Amos dropped his bomb on their complacent heads.

"Thus saith the Lord: For three transgressions of IS-RAEL, yea for four, I will not turn away the punishment thereof." The roll-call of doomsday includes every sinful nation. God has no pets, he plays no favorites. His laws are the same for all men. Naturally, Israelites could well believe that God hated the sins of their enemies. But their own? That was a different story.

Amos plunged from being the most popular sidewalk preacher of his day to being the best-hated man in Israel. In fact, because he dared to name the king as sinner number one, he was accused of treason, a capital crime in any country.

"One Man With God Is a Majority"

A MOS WROTE OUT his prophecies at some later time and they have been handed down to us, with all their fire and force, in the book that bears his name. We shall see in later lessons

some of his great messages. What stands out here is this: Truth is sometimes popular, sometimes not, but the living power of truth has nothing to do with the number of people who believe it, or whether it is pleasant, or with the prestige of the man who proclaims it. If it is God's truth, it will live even if the only man who believes it is banished, as Amos was, to the silent wilderness.
