Passing away Monday at Midland was a retired local Baptist minister who had devoted 55 years to preaching. Rev. William Lafayette Henderson who retired from preaching last year, died while visiting at the home of a daughter, Mrs. H. M. Shade at age of 82 at 3:15 a. m. Monday.

Interest Shown In Local Egg Project

Thursday night some 40 or so farmers met at the school ag. building for a round-table discussion on the commercial production of caged eggs. Discussed by several agricultural authorities were the marketing and production of the eggs. The Plains Egg Producers, Inc. of Littlefield will buy and pick up in O'Donnell area all caged eggs of producers wishing to sell. At the end of the business year, profits of the association will be divided among the producers based on the farmer's sale of eggs to the marketing group. The association was represented at the meeting by A. C. (Art) Chesser, one of the larger producers in the Littlefield area.

Glen Clark, local paymaster dealer, said that if a broiler producer wished to convert to the egg project that he could clear from \$800 to \$1000 for 16 weeks' time growing chicks for stocking local houses in the egg project. The grower will furnish the house, his equipment, his labor and pay utilities.

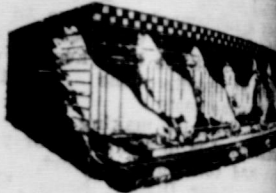

Oil Bank Explained

Requirements for participation in the 1956 Acreage Reserve Program under the "Soil Bank Act", Law 540, were announced by Secretary of Agriculture Benson. The Lynn County Conservation and Conservation Commission will administer the program and will announce when the program is available for signature in the county office. At the time the office will have full information on the terms and conditions of the program.

Under the 1956 Acreage Reserve Program farmers are eligible to take in connection with cotton, wheat, or other crops, by not planting or by plowing within an established allotment for winter wheat and certify that this was because of adverse weather conditions.

The acreage designated for the reserve must (1) be representative of the land used for crop, and (2) not be grazed, for hay or cropped for the entire calendar year. Noxious weeds must be controlled on the reserved acreage.

Minimum and maximum acreages for wheat which may be reserved in the acreage reserve have been established as follows (where the allotment is less than the specified acreage minimum or maximum, the total allotment shall be considered as the minimum or the maximum):

Wheat, the maximum is the allotment or 10 acres. The minimum is the larger of 10 percent of the allotment or 5 acres.

For cotton, the maximum is the allotment or 10 acres. The minimum is the larger of 10 percent of the allotment or 5 acres.

The payment which a farmer may receive for participating in the acreage reserve will be determined by multiplying a base unit rate by a yield factor. The national average for 1956 crops are — cotton, 12 cents per lb, wheat \$1.20 bu.

The payments will be determined by Lynn County as follows —

For destruction due to natural

causes or for plowing or otherwise physically incorporating the cotton crop into the soil, the payment will be based on the smaller of an appraised yield for the field or the normal yield for the farm but will NOT BE LESS than \$6 per acre.

Provisions of the Conservation Reserve part of the Soil Bank will be announced as soon as practical. Under this part of the program, a farmer will be able to earn two types of payment — an annual payment to help compensate for income which he would have received if the reserved land had been in crop, and a payment representing a percentage of the cost of establishing conservation practices on such land. The same acreage on a farm may not be included under both the acreage reserve and the conservation Reserve parts of the Soil Bank.
