The fact of the matter is that carbon monoxide poisoning is end result of improperly adjusted heaters, leaky vents or none at all, and lack of ventilation in rooms where any kind of fire is burn-

Perhaps the greatest danger lies in the tasteless, orderless, and colorless character of carbon mon-oxide. Unless you have complicat-needed on the nation's farms. ed testing equipment and keep checking about every 15 minutes, there is absolutely no warning of the presents of the gas until symptoms appear.

Even these symptoms are mask A seemginly mild headache, slightly watering eyes or a touch of upset stomach are easily mistaken for a cold; wehn they may really be early sycptoms of carbon monoxide poisoning.

If sleeping in a closed room with a faulty heater burning, death may

come without waking or warning. In fact most carbon monoxide deaths follow thi spattern. Regardless of the heating fuel precautions must be taken, since

carbon monoxide is the result of incompletely burned fue.l Proper venting should be instal led with outlets leading outside the building and carefully checked for leaks. Under all conditions ventilation is a must, if nothing more than a "cracked" window.

### **About Wills**

The death of an interstate person (one who has made no will) may give rise to many problems regarding distribution of his seperate estate. In the preceding column we investigate the manner of dividing the community estate upon the death of a husband or wife. Now we shall see that, where seperate property is involved, a completely differerent set of rules applies in determining heirship and appor-tioning the estate among the rightful claimants

It may be well to recall that the separate estate of a husband or wife includes property owned by either before marriage, and that which is acqured after marriage by gift or interitance. Any other property acquired after marriage is presumed by law to be community property untl the contrary is clear-

Now, here is a general idea a to how your seperate property will be divided if you do not make a will with contrary provisions pror to your death.

If either your husband or wife survives and if, in addition, there are surviving children or descend-ants of previously deceased child-ren, the children and their descendants immediately obtain a full (fee title in two-thirds of the real estate involved. The surviving spouse receives a life interest n the remaning one-third of the real property, whic hpasses o nto the children and their descendants upon the death of the spouse The rule for distributing person-

al property — cash, stocks, bonds furniture, or any other items not constituting real estate — is different. Here the surviving spouse gets full ownership of one-third and the children and their descend nts inherit the balance.
Now suppose your husband or

wfe survives, but there are no sur viving children or their descendants In this case the surviving spouse inherits all of the personal pro-erty involved.

With regard to real estate, the survivor obtains full title to one-half, and the other half is divided between your mother and father if both survive you. If only one of them survives, he or she receives only half of this portion, and the other half (or one-fourth of the entire real estate) will be divided a-mong your brothers and sisters (and their descendants) who survive. If there are no surviving brothers and sisters and their descendants, then the one surviving parent inherits the full one-half.

Rural mail carriers from the O' Donnell post office will leave some livestock survey cards along the routes beginning November 16th. "Information reported on these cards is used to set the yearly inven-tory of livestock and poultry on Tex-as farms." Postmaster Hal Singleton explained. In distributing the cards. rural carriers pick boxes at random along their routes. "This means that not every box will get a card", Mr Singleton said. "For this reason, it is important for everyone who gets a card to return it filled out so that USDA can get a true sample of the State's livestock holdings."

A national marketing quota of 15,562,000 bales and a national acréage allotment of 18,398,424 acres have been proclaimed by Secretary of Agriculture Benson for the naton's 1961 crop of upland cotton. Both are increases over those for 1960. December 13 was also set as the date for the referendum on 1961 upland cottton marketing quotas. More details will be announced later by the USDA.


