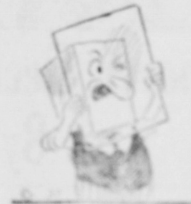

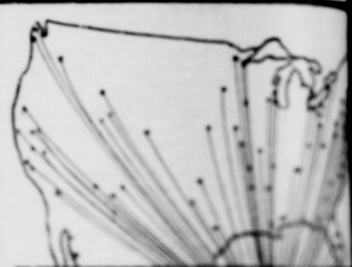

"LA GUERRE EST FINI"

"The War is over!" "Can any of us hear those words without a re-miniscent thrill, an echo of the delirium of relief and joy which swept our land like a tidal wave ten years ago? That breathless hour on that November morning ten years ago, when whistles began to blow, bells were rung and in France the mighty cry "La guerre est fini!" swept across the channel to England and across the ocean to America.

But how many of us who can remember that mad riot of rejoicing have any idea of the moment when took place the momentous event which released all that pandemonium of rejoicing! To how many of us does the name of the little railroad station of Rehandes in the forest of compeigne mean anything more than just another French town? Yet it was here that the Armistice was signed on Thursday evening, November 7, 1918 the train bearing General Foch and his staff drew up opposite some old gun sldings. Early Friday morning the German delegates arrived and were received by Gen. Foch. After deliberating and discussing the terms of peace, the Germans asked to be allowed to wire their government. Owing to the fact that they had not brought any cipher and that the peace terms would thus be made public, General Foch refused to allow wireless messages, so one of their number was dispatched to German headquarters at Spa. After hours of delay, a message was received to continue the peace treaty.

At 2:00 a. m. November 11, the delegates on both sides assembled for a final conference. At 5:15 a. m. all the delegates signed the momentous document. Orders were immediately issued all over the world for hostilities to cease on land, water and in the air, at 11 a. m. Two minutes before eleven o'clock the last shell shrieked over No Man's Land. Hostilities ended with a tremendous crash of American Cannon. Thus ended the most important historical event of all time.

**A NEW RECORD IN HIGHWAY BUILDING**

(From the Wilson Pointer)  
The United States this year is spending a record sum for highways. The 12-month total will reach \$1,360,026,000.

This is 21 per cent more than last year and five per cent more than in 1926, when the former high mark was established.

The movement toward building good roads is a product of this century. The perfection of the automobile, the growth of industry and the social and business necessity of improved transportation arteries all contributed to the result.

America in a few brief years has developed the finest highway system in the world, and every year is witnessing still greater progress.

Highways and prosperity move together. Every dollar spent in good roads building is a dollar that is a sound, dividend-returning investment. It has been said that Rome was only as great as her highways and the same is again true of any modern nation today.

**GROWTH OF GAS INDUSTRY**

During the span of a single lifetime the amount of gas being used in the United States has increased 400 per cent. The industry, which in the past sold 90 per cent of its product for lighting, has changed to the extent that it now sells 92 per cent for heating.

Use of natural and manufactured gas in 1927 increased eight per cent over 1926 and amounted to the record total of 1,854,000,000 cubic feet. A total of 700,000 new users was added in 1927, bringing the number of customers to 15,434,000 and the estimated population served by the gas industry to more than 73,000,000.

The manufactured gas industry last year paid \$40,000,000 in taxes, which was an increase of about 26 per cent since 1923, and represented more than 9.5 per cent of its operating revenues.

**DID YOU EVER STOP TO THINK**

By Edson R. Walte, Shawnee, Okla. T. O. Hackle, publisher of the Cadillac (Mich.) Evening News, says: THAT chain stores are here to stay and local retail merchants must adopt modern merchandising methods rather than sit back crying about business going to the stores with gaudy, yet attractive fronts.

First, merchants must have attractive fronts.

Store and display windows must be well lighted.

Merchandise must be attractively displayed.

Merchandise must be arranged regularly.

Stores must have sales people—not just clerks.

Both merchant and clerks must know the merchandise they sell.

Merchants should not buy unknown brands. Note chain store advertising.

Service is the one big weapon that the Home Town Merchant has, and which the chain stores would give a great deal to possess.

Prospective customers will not know what the home town merchants have to offer in new merchandise if they let their lights shine under a bushel. In other words—advertise!

**PLANT TREES**

(From the Wilson Pointer)  
Make your arrangements now to plant trees and shrubs this winter. Nothing adds so much to a home as trees and shrubbery and it marks a home owner with esteem and worth of confidence. The expense is comparatively small and if the trees are cared for in the right manner will return the investment many fold.

In buying your nursery stock be sure that you are getting something that is adapted to this climate. Don't let some smoothed tongued salesman talk you in to buying something of which you know nothing about. Deal with a reputable firm and not with a fly by night concern that is after the dollar and nothing more. There are instances on record where these salesman sold their wares and after two or three years it was found that the trees were not the kind, but the salesman was no where to be found or the firm had gone out of business altogether.

Again we say don't be influenced by this kind, ask him to give you a rating of his firm and when you are in doubt, this paper will be glad to get any information for you that you might wish.

Some Nurserymen make a practice of sending out disease infested trees and you should be sure that you are not getting this kind when buying. There is quite a bit of work attached to raising these trees to maturity and one does not care to go

to this trouble and expense for two or three years to have them die of disease.  
There are any number of reputable dealers in the state, deal with them and let the others pass by.

Let us say again to some trees this winter only beautify your place they will pay for themselves in the added value on your property.
