LOANS ON COTTON URGED FARMERS

"No farmer has to take too low a price for his cotton this year," R A Kahlich, chairman of the County Production and Marketing Administration, said at Tahoka. "We'll have a good crop coming to market this fall," he explained, "but the carry over stocks are small and demand is near the highest on record. With Government loan available to protect the price and 'feed' the crop to market as needed, farmers will have only themselves to blame if they flood the market with their 1951 crop."

National loan rates average 30.46 cents per pound for Middling 7-8 inch cotton and 31.76 cents for 15-16 inch. With a loan, the producer not only assures himself of at least that much income but he helps strengthen the market and protect prices. If the market price advances, the producer can repay his loan, sell his cotton above the loan value or else his cotton will be pooled and he will receive a part of any profits resulting from his sale by the Commodity Credit Corporation. For the 1948 crop, such profits amounted to \$67 million or an average of about \$17.50 a bale. Since the loan is non recourse, the producer has no obligation to make good on any loss the Government might incur from a decline in the market price.

"The cotton loan can help a lot," Mr Kahlich said, "and it's only common sense for a farmer to protect his investment with a loan in years when a large crop could upset the market. Each farmer must be the judge on placing his cotton under loan but he should consider carefully the advantages of the loan program. Information about the cotton loan program may be obtained at the local county P M A office at Tahoka or Lamesa."

School System Gets Off To A Good Start

The O'Donnell schools opened Monday with a general assembly of grade students and their parents held in the auditorium. Mrs Paul Gooch introduced the new superintendent, John Morris and he in turn introduced the grade school faculty. There is only one change in grade school faculty: Mrs Judie Tyree resigned and Mrs Bill Gravitt is substitute teacher for a section of the 7th grade. The group sang several songs led by Mr. Morris assisted at the piano by Mrs Oma Lee Doss.

Since the grade school has two sections for each grade, drawings were made for section placement on an impartial basis. "This indicates a great degree of interest in your school. With help and cooperation of all interested parties, we will look forward to a fine school year for 'O'Donnell Public School'." Mr. Morris added.

The bale weighed 475 pounds and was picked from a field which was open only in spots. This compares with the first bale last year on Aug. 2th by Bart Anderson. Cotton will generally be late. There will be some ginning in two weeks but it is thought the peak run of ginning will not be before mid October. As usual the first bale is on display at the bank corner and will be auctioned off Saturday afternoon at 3 p. m. at the bank corner. At that time a premium given by local merchants will be presented Mr. Gilliam.

Select some luxurious creams and lotions for a little splurging will pay off in glamour, and that's what you'll want with the new styles which are so elegant and romantic.

You'll need a good supply of cleansing cream, refreshing skin lotion, make-up base in one of the peach-colored Fall shades, night cream and a box of handy cotton squares for easy application.

When you choose lipstick, rouge and powder, keep in mind that you'll soon be wearing entirely different colors than during the hot months. There will be textured wools, tweeds and darker shades. With bright accents like red destined for popularity this Fall, you'll have to choose lipsticks that don't clash with clothing, especially those which have red.

If you've been active in sports during the summer, your figure is undoubtedly in better shape than at the beginning of the season. If,

however, the hot weather has made a turtle of you, and you've enjoyed too many caloric cool beverages sipped on the lawn or spent the time on picnics, then trimming is in order. Use a sensible diet to reduce calories and start on exercises that will remove padding. If you don't, Fall's full skirts won't look right.

Don't Waiver from Routine For Improving Skin

To eliminate that taut, sun-baked look, set a well-planned beauty schedule that fits your needs as well as your time. An around-the-clock routine is not necessary. In fact, one that's simple will be much easier to carry out, as it's the daily care followed for several weeks or months that gives you results.

In the first few weeks of the routine, it may be a good idea to avoid rubbing the skin briskly with

Don't forget to include pre-bedtime care in your beauty program. Each night before retiring, remove stale make-up and dirt by applying cleansing cream to throat, neck and face. Wipe away with soft cotton squares. Stimulate circulation by splashing face with warm, then cold water.

soap and water. Sun may have made it tender, and the skin is bound to be dry.

Try to restore the natural oils to the skin with gentle care and supplement the skin's own oil with creams and lotions. A well-lubricated skin is essential for good looks as well as a proper base for make-up.

In the morning, smooth on a cleansing cream, paying special attention to the areas around the nose and mouth. Deep cleansing here is most essential as the oil glands are particularly active. Always stroke the cream upwards, as downward motions have a tendency to draw the lines downward.

Wipe the face, after creaming, with soft cotton squares. To remove the cream residue and prepare the complexion for make-up, saturate a cotton square with refreshing skin lotion and wipe thoroughly over the whole area which was creamed.

Next, dampen a cotton square with cold water and squeeze out the



and stimulate the circulation.

excess moisture. Add a few drops of make-up base and apply not only to the face, but also the neck and throat. This will smooth out the skin

and serves as a protective foundation for make-up as well as giving a natural look.

Use Make-up to Give Smooth, Natural Look

A foundation for powder and rouge is very much essential, especially if you have any flaky patches caused by peeling. The foundation smooths the skin as well as makes it possible for powder to adhere.

Don't forget the eyelids when you put on the foundation. Unless they are covered, they cannot blend with the complexion.

Powder and rouge should not be rubbed into the skin. Any hard scrubbing action may damage the skin as well as harm facial muscles and glands. Pat both rouge and powder with gentle motions. After applying, use a soft complexion brush to do away with any excess, especially at the hairline and the eyebrows. You want to achieve a smooth look, rather than a powdered look.

During the day, when make-up has to be refreshed, it's not wise to put another layer of powder on top of the one applied in the morning. Take a little time and a bit of cream and give yourself a quick cleaning, and start on a fresh face. The make-up will look better, stay longer and you'll avoid a face that looks like a mask.

Pre-Bedtime Care Does Wonders

Restore your beauty even while you sleep. It goes without saying that daytime make-up must all be removed if the skin is to be kept clear. Stale make-up and grit left

on the skin for overnight can do nothing but harm for they clog the pores and give rise to blackheads.

Apply a thin layer of a penetrating cleansing cream over the face neck and throat using those upward outward motions that are so relaxing and circulation stimulating.

Let this remain for a few minutes so that all the dirt can be removed from the pores. If you like, apply it before bathing or showering so the cream has a chance to do its work. Then wipe gently away.

While you're on a facial beauty program, look to your hands, ankles, knees and elbows, too. If sun exposure has left these dry, a thin layer of cream put on before retiring will work wonders.

Keep Yourself Fit With Exercises

Everyone needs some exercise to keep the body normal, trim and limber. If you've been active in sports during the summer, and will be less so from now on, you'll need a few simple exercises to keep yourself feeling at peak condition.

Those who have been relatively inactive during the summer for one reason or another will probably look at themselves with horror in new clothes because they sag or bulge or slouch. A few minutes a day of exercise, done faithfully every day, not just spasmodically, can do an amazing amount for the figure in just a few weeks.

Do simple exercises because you can easily fall into the routine of them and thus make them a part of your keeping fit program. You can build them up to 15 minutes a day, if you like, but at any rate do start now.

Secret of Security Is Revealed

SUPPOSE we drop that word "security?"

In the sense that it is used today there is no such thing, and we would all be happier not thinking about it and not worrying about it.

In the long-ago days when I was facing a rather formidable world, we never used the word "security." We didn't know that there was such a word. We certainly didn't suspect that there was such a thing.

There were six of us in family, the eldest was not quite 21. We had been raised in a comfortable, old-fashioned family fashion, we knew nothing of the city in which we suddenly had to make a living. We never, in nine years of good hard fighting and working for food and shelter, had five cents in the bank. There was nobody in sight to help us and we never were helped.

But as we knew nothing of security, we went along with great confidence and a great deal of happiness. Often the end of the week found us without a cent, but usually there were nourishing, if unpretentious, meals in the house, and lots of books, and the long beaches of the Pacific to walk along and picnic on—and in a state of shocking "insecurity we managed magnificent-ly."

Lean Weeks

How we did it I haven't the faintest idea. I imagine that statistics of those days wouldn't be believed today. There were lean weeks but there were fat ones, too. Everything we had in the way of writing paper, candy, clothes, books, food, was common property, and when better days began the sharing went on, and does to this day.

The effect of these so-called hard times was curious. It taught me that utter and complete insecurity is not half as fearful a thing as it

sounds, and, once experiencing it, one never can fear it again. There is always something one can do; there are always possible changes and makeshifts and plans and experiments, and all of them are immensely stimulating.

So that real security, by one of life's most ridiculous paradoxes, is insecurity.

"What we feared was for the children," writes Agnes Fairfield, whose splendid letter from Johnston set me thinking about this line. "Lew and I didn't care about ourselves. We'd both been nicely raised in the American way. I mean a small-town 8-room house, trees, car, high school, and hopes for college. But Lew had only two years business school, and I went into kindergarten work, and held a job for four years. But we wanted better things for our children, fine clothes, associates, amusements, and when our plans went smash we felt keenly for them, and indeed they did for themselves. They were then Deary, 14, Junior, 12, and

Marylou, 6. Bad ages to make children feel the pinch of poverty.

"It was then that I wrote to you," this letter goes on, "and you told me to begin to look down, instead of up. To live more and more simply, rather than to continually expand. To endure the children's consternation then, for the sake of the children's future."

"Well, we did. In fact, we had to. We moved to a rather lonely and shabby place, we started growing vegetables, selling eggs, we did everything. My stricken husband became convalescent, slowly, slowly, and we can walk around his little farm now. We've not had one moment's money worry since we moved, and that's six years ago. We've no money left over, but we have the 'makings,' and we have three children of whom we can really be proud.

"They rose to this crisis in a way that makes my eyes fill when I think of it. Their father never heard one single word of complaint. And as we began to see that on the slimmest of margins we really could make it, the exhilaration of being so low that you couldn't go any lower began to inspire us all."

Mexico City Is Losing Altitude

Cortez Built Capital On Underground Lake

YEAR BY YEAR Mexico City is losing altitude.

Standing high and cool in a great mountain-rimmed basin where Aztec priests once sacrificed human victims to the gods of war, this ancient-modern city of palaces and turbulent memories is slowly sinking into an underground lake bed.

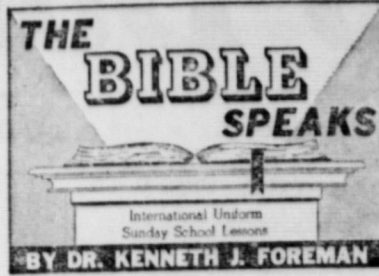
Thousands of artesian wells pierce the thin crust of solid earth on which the Mexican capital "floats." Beneath is a slippery mush of volcanic ash and water. As the water is pumped up, the soft surface earth goes down. Thus, say engineers, are Mexicans drinking up their own foundations.

While the city sinks—it dropped 14½ inches in the last eight months—some heavy buildings settle even faster. The massive Palace of Fine Arts has sagged some 15 feet below its original level. Yet other structures seem to grow taller. Set on deep pillars, they hold their level while surroundings sag.

The capital now faces a plumbing crisis. Unless emergency measures are taken soon, warned the municipal engineer recently, the main drainage system will reverse its flow.

This was Tenochtitlan, golden capital of the Aztec Empire, its temples and castles rising on canal-divided islands and linked to the mainland by three masonry causeways.

Cortez conquered and razed Tenochtitlan. From its remains he built a new city, imperial seat of New Spain. Near a temple founded with more than 100,000 skulls, he erected a church from the stones of the Aztec shrines. And as Mexico City pushed outward in the centuries that followed, it grew on filled land, covering the lake and converting it into a subterranean pool of lava clay.

Why Is the Church?

Lesson for September 9, 1951

WHAT use is the church? What difference would it make if it were disbanded?

A woman bought a vacuum cleaner on trial, but after using it a

while she decided it wasn't any better than an old-fashioned carpet-sweeper and she sent for the man to take it away. When he came around, he discovered that she really did not know how to use the thing. All the attachments were

still in the box; she had never found out what they were good for and so she never realized how useful a "vac" can be.

It is something like that with the church. It has many uses which are seldom discovered.

Tell the Church

THE main and most important feature of the church is that it is a fellowship. This should be far more, far deeper, than a mere label.

One rarely-used function of the church was suggested by Jesus. In a quarrel, he said, the first thing to do is to settle it between yourselves. If that will not do, then take a few people with you and see if a small group can reach agreement. If not then "tell the church."

Probably the average congregation today, as a whole, would be a poor judge of quarrels. But suppose some church tried the experiment of forming a kind of consultation-group, made up of the wisest and most Christian persons in it; and suppose members of the church who had differences which would ordinarily be taken into court, were encouraged to consult those counselors for help—wouldn't some quarrels, that now reach the courts, never get that far?

Common Treasury

SOME weeks ago it was suggested here that in some communities the church sees to it that no member of the church goes without a job. It is also a fact that in some congregations either a committee of the officers, or the minister, is entrusted with a fund, sometimes called the Deacon's Fund and sometimes the Emergency Fund, to be used in taking care of real financial emergencies, for the benefit of the members.

Sometimes it is used as a revolving loan fund, sometimes as outright gifts. No detailed accounting is made, because it is important that no publicity be given to the needy cases; hence those who administer the funds have to be persons who can be fully trusted.

The "needy cases" may not be charity cases in the usual sense. The point is that a church can be a fellowship so close that a person in physical or financial need would think of it as a source of help just as quickly as he would think of his own family. It is his family.

Making Love Real

THE fact is, if there had not been real fellowship in the church all these centuries, it would not have lasted as it has. No outfit can run on and on for centuries if all it does is to provide jobs for a few holdovers.

No, there has been real family fellowship in the church. It does not always come out in official actions of church boards, but the thing is there. Preachers talk about love, and Sunday school lessons mention it. But this is not all. There are enough persons in the church making love real, (see Moffatt's translation of 1 John 3:18), to more than justify the church's existence.

A poor woman who was in the grip of the drink habit had a Christian woman friend. This friend said to her, "When you feel the craving coming on, even if it's in the middle of the night, call me and I'll come right down and we'll fight it through and pray it through together."

That was what did it. Not the sermons, not the books on temperance, but the fellowship of a woman who would get up in the middle of the night to help her friend through a desperate struggle.

Happy is the person who finds a church where there are people like that. For that is what Christian fellowship is: making the other person's cause and troubles your own.

Crop Conditions Are Reported Good in U.S.

The U.S. department of agriculture reported continued improvement in conditions for crop development during June and early July has resulted in prospects among the most favorable the country has ever known.

The department reported farmers were able to plant crops on the largest aggregate acreage since 1933. Yield prospects are reported virtually as good as the best in recent years. Winter wheat prospects improved, despite adverse harvesting conditions in parts of Oklahoma and Kansas, and spring wheat acreage exceeded planting intentions by nearly a half-million acres.

As a result, an all wheat crop of 1,070 million bushels, 16 million more than on June 1, is now in prospect.

Larger acreage of corn, hay, soybeans and sorghums than intended earlier are growing under mostly favorable conditions. Of the major crops only rice and hay are expected to set new production records, but several others will be of near-record size.



Legumes, Fertilizer Re-Build Worn Field Most Soil Will Produce If Cared for Properly

The teamwork of legumes, grasses and fertilizer made the difference between these two fields in Huntington County, Indiana, points out the middle west soil improvement committee.

The barren field in the upper photo had 6 feet of soil removed at the deepest point for road fill. It had no soil care, no fertilizer. After three years the field is still badly eroded, criss-crossed with gullies 2 to 3 feet deep.

The lower field located on Norman Thompson's farm near Huntington, had 8 feet of soil removed



The above fields are examples of what can be done to build soil even on the most barren, eroded fields. Given proper plant food and plenty of it, plus legume-grass mixture, most soil can be made to produce.

from a hilltop, for road fill. As soon as the soil was carted off, Thompson added heavy applications of fertilizer carrying nitrogen, phosphate and potash. Altogether, he used the equivalent of 600 pounds of plant food per acre—approximately 250 pounds of 3-12-12 and 350 pounds of 0-20-0. No lime was needed, as the subsoil is almost neutral.

Thompson seeded bluegrass and some ladino and red clover. The roots anchored well and soon built up a protective growth that yields good forage. Volunteer white clover has come in to add to the pasture.

Now Thompson uses the field for night pasture.

Stocks of Feed Grains Relatively High in June

The bureau of agricultural economics reports relatively large stocks of all feed grains in storage in July. Disappearance in the April-June quarter was larger than in most years for corn, but about usual for oats. It was the heaviest on record for barley.

Approximately 1,270 million bushels of corn were in storage as of July 1, 11 per cent less than on July 1, 1950. Oats stocks of 298 million bushels are the largest carry-over of record by a small margin. The off-farm portion of nearly 34 million bushels is largest of record also.

Barley stock of 93 million bushels are a slightly larger carry-over than average, with the off-farm portion of 53 million bushels.

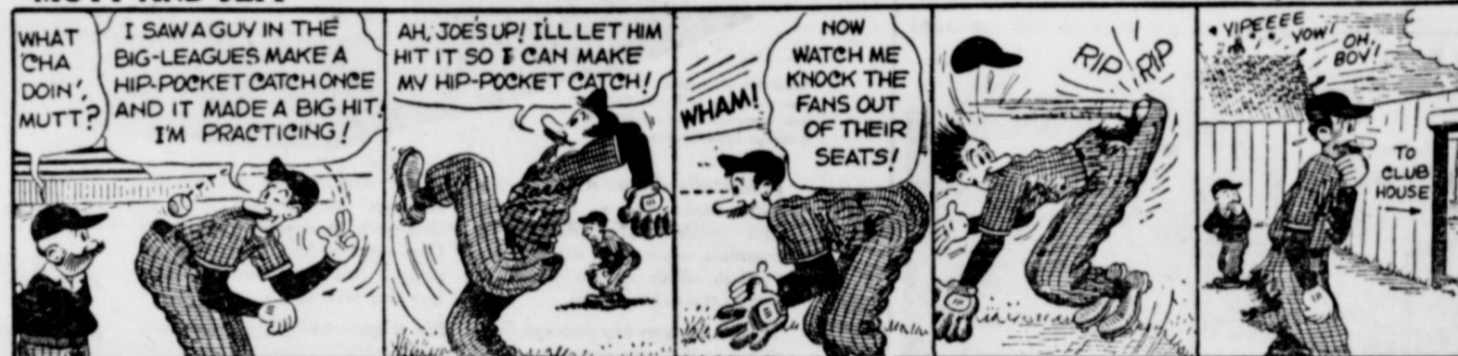

Floors Can Be Repaired or Carpeted Inexpensively

By Ertta Haley

Floors are a real problem, as anyone can tell you who has lived with them. First of all, they don't look nice, no matter how lovingly you care for them. Second, they offer any number of discomforts, such as snagging you while walking, squeaking, and innumerable cleaning problems.

There are many ways to fix old floors which offer problems, and many which cost but little. Much of the work does not have to be professional as long as one is patient and does it carefully.

It should be done to the floors and greatly upon the type of floor and furnishings you have as the purpose of the room in which the floors need attention.

Some floors may just be worn, as such need care which the maker can give to bring them back again. It's surprising what a coat of varnish or a few lovely waxed linoleum can do to an old floor. It may even be that a coat of wax with some polishing will renovate the floor completely.

Old Oak or Soft Floors Accordingly
If you have oak flooring in your home, no matter how old, how battered or how wide the cracks between the boards, try to retain the original type of flooring. It may be necessary to relay part of a very old floor of this type with new

benzene to remove grease. Floors which have been painted before should have the old finish removed with paint remover.

When they have been waxed previously, and you want to paint them, take off old wax with gasoline or steel wool. Denatured alcohol will remove old shellac. These are inflammable materials and should not be used near a flame.

Old painted floors can also be spattered for good effect. The floor is painted green, brown or black, and while the paint is still damp, use red, green or white paint with a stiff whisk broom attached to a long handle. This will give a salt-and-pepper effect.

Floors Beyond Repair Need Linoleum
If the floors are in such bad shape that they cannot be repaired, or if the expense is too great, it is best to use linoleum, especially in halls, bathrooms, children's rooms, game rooms or kitchens. A monotone linoleum can be used as a base for scatter rugs in any of these rooms.

Easy Floor Cleaning



Milady can stay as crisp and clean as her chintz apron while doing a grubby chore like mopping if she uses this new sponge mop which has a self-wringing attachment. The mop will absorb up to twenty times its own weight in water.

Linoleum will wear longer if it is kept waxed, whether it is of the inlaid type or printed type. Self-polishing waxes are good because they do not have to be shined.

For the linoleum floor in the kitchen, sweep daily with a soft broom and wipe spilled foods as quickly as possible. For weekly or semi-weekly cleaning, use a damp mop wrung out very dry. When the linoleum needs more cleaning, use a mop wrung out in mild soap suds. All strong powders should be avoided, as should coarse brushes.

It's not wise to flood the linoleum covering with water, as this may injure the covering. Rinse and dry thoroughly and quickly. When dry, apply a new coat of liquid or self-polishing wax.

Tideland Oil

A NUMBER of humorists in the capital have suggested it might be a good idea for the federal government to chain down Washington's monument and other national shrines since the house voted 265 to 109 to give the oil-rich tidelands to the states of California, Texas and Louisiana. They contend there is no telling what the present unpredictable congress will give away next.

Aside from the humorous aspects of the question and the editorial comment in numerous newspapers, the long dispute between the federal government and the states in question over the ownership of this valuable property may be nearing an end.

The measure has powerful support in the senate and it appears likely that the house bill or some other measure, will be reported out for action. This is the answer of the interested states to the supreme court ruling that submerged lands off-shore are subject to federal control. They carried their fight to the congress and may succeed in getting the court's ruling circumvented.

Truman Veto Expected

There is one big stumbling block in the path of the states, however. President Truman has vigorously opposed return of the tidelands to the states. He previously vetoed a measure similar to the one passed by the house. Administration leaders have predicted he will use the veto again if the senate approves the measure.

Settlement Necessary

A final settlement of the question, as soon as possible, is of the utmost importance to the nation. With the country's near east oil supplies cut off, at least for the moment, adequate oil reserves for the army, navy and air force is essential to defense.

In the long years the dispute has been waged between the states and the federal government, oil has been produced in the tidelands, but the industry has not developed the area's full capacity.

The oil industry is reluctant, and with justification, of conducting exploratory operations until they know with what governmental units they must deal. They could become involved in an unending legal tangle that could prove expensive.

The ownership question has been in dispute almost from the time oil was discovered off the coast of California. A congressional investigation of the matter was conducted in 1937 and 1939 and in 1945 the justice department took legal action against Louisiana and Texas, which also was successful.

Food Price Picture

The bureau of agricultural economics released an interesting item of news for the home town housewife recently. The bureau predicted plentiful supplies probably will keep food prices from going much higher this year.

Retail food prices increased

12 per cent during the past 12 months. For the year 1951 they will be approximately 10 per cent higher than in 1950.

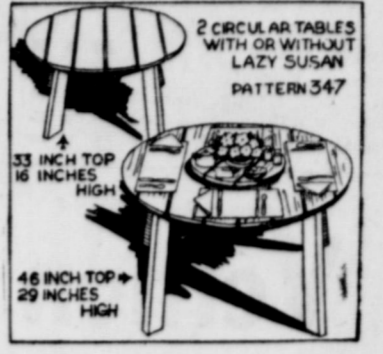
Farm Machinery

A recent survey of farm-belt retail stores revealed that farmers have slowed down their rush to buy farm machinery. Much of the reason is due to tightened credit controls and uncertainty over the future. On some items of farm machinery, sales were reported down as much as 50 per cent from July one year ago. Machinery sales have been amounting to \$2 billion yearly in the past three years.

Soviet Peace Bid

Nikolai Shvernik, technically the chief of state of the Soviet Union, sent a five-power peace pact to President Truman, calling for peace through disarmament and a ban on the manufacture of atomic weapons. Administration officials reported there was nothing new in the Soviet proposal. It carried the old themes so often rejected by the U.S. and is considered merely a propaganda maneuver for the Soviet in its fight against the west.

Are You Another Straight Crook?

'Non-Criminal' Crime Is Big Moral Problem

MANY "GOOD" AMERICANS have long since entered the vast shadowland of "non-criminal criminality."

In Coronet, author Peter Nelson scores the growing tendency for "easy money" and the "something for nothing" attitude which, he says, is ripping our moral fabric to shreds.

As examples of the "non-criminal criminality" which is on the increase, he cites the examples of "padding" the expense account, the parking ticket fixer, the citizen who gets the chance to make his insurance company pay for some repairs on his house and earns a few dollars to boot.

"Although the crime bill in America for frauds, burglaries, embezzlements and similar crimes runs to \$7,000,000,000 annually," Nelson writes, "there can be no doubt that petty swindles are astronomically higher."

Nelson's article quotes the complaints of a warehouse supervisor who revealed that his men annually take home thousands of dollars in valuable tools, clothing and merchandise. "They'd quit if I told them they were stealing," said the supervisor, "From who?" they'd ask me. All they know is that they work for some big mysterious corporation—and it's no money out of anybody's pocket."

The proprietor of an expensive eastern restaurant complained that his well-to-do customers take home silverware and dishes. His employees appropriate slabs of bacon, pounds of butter, expensive cuts of steaks and other foods. "Once I put detectives at the doors," he said, "but they threatened to boycott the place. 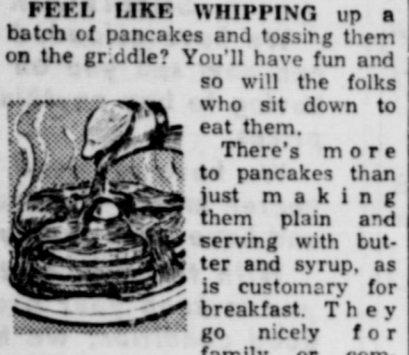

Variety Pancakes Make Main Dish or Dessert For Lunch or Supper



FEEL LIKE WHIPPING up a batch of pancakes and tossing them on the griddle? You'll have fun and so will the folks who sit down to eat them.

There's more to pancakes than just making them plain and serving with butter and syrup, as is customary for breakfast. They go nicely for family or company lunches or suppers when they're dressed a bit with foods to make them richer for the heavier meals.

Here are pancakes which are sprinkled with shredded cheese after baking. Try them with creamed mushrooms and a mound of asparagus:

***Luncheon Pancakes with Creamed Mushrooms (Serves 6)**

Creamed Mushrooms:
 1/2 pound fresh mushrooms
 1/4 cup butter
 1/4 cup flour
 2 cups milk
 Salt to taste

Clean and slice mushrooms. Melt butter in skillet, add mushrooms and cook covered, stirring occasionally, until mushrooms are tender, about 5 minutes. Add flour and stir until blended. Add milk and stir constantly until sauce boils and thickens.

Add salt and place over boiling water until ready to use.

Pancakes:
 3 cups all-purpose flour
 1 teaspoon salt
 4 teaspoons baking powder
 4 eggs
 2 1/2 cups milk
 1/2 cup melted butter
 2 cups shredded cheese

Sift flour, measure; sift with salt and baking powder. Beat eggs thoroughly in large mixing bowl; add milk and melted butter. Add dry ingredients all at once and beat until batter is smooth. Bake on a lightly greased griddle, allowing about 1/4 cup batter for each cake. Bake until golden brown on one side; turn and brown on the other side. Turn only once. Arrange hot cakes on cookie sheet in stacks of three, with cheese sprinkled between them and keep hot in a warm oven. When ready to serve, top with a pat of butter and serve with hot creamed mushrooms.

Corn Cakes (Makes 24 cakes)

2 cups flour
 1 teaspoon salt
 1 1/2 teaspoons sugar
 3 teaspoons baking powder
 2 eggs, well beaten
 1 1/2 cups rich milk
 3 tablespoons butter, melted
 1 cup drained kernel corn, corn, cooked or canned

Sift flour, measure, then sift with salt, sugar and baking powder. Combine eggs and milk; add to dry ingredients and beat only until smooth. Stir in melted butter and corn. Bake on greased griddle until golden brown on both sides, turning only once.

IF YOU MAKE your own soup

Stacks of rich pancakes topped with butter pats, floating in a cream sauce with mushrooms make a nutritious, simple to prepare main dish for luncheon or supper. Additional protein is provided by sprinkling shredded cheese on the pancakes.

LYNN SAYS:
Don't Let Spoilage Boost Food Costs

A good place for eggs is the vegetable crisper if you have the room. Eggs should be covered as their shells are porous, and therefore evaporate easily.

Store tomatoes, berries, grapes, pears, peaches, apricots and plums right on the refrigerator shelves to allow for free circulation of the cold air. All other fruit should be placed in the crisper container.



Appetite provoking main dish includes corn cakes served with Vienna sausage heated in a saucepan with its own liquids. Serve with jam or syrup, then top off the meal with a fruit salad for a well-rounded supper or luncheon.

from a soup bone, you'll always have a little meat left on the bone. This can be ground and used as a filling for pancakes to be served with the soup, thus giving you a complete main dish that's sure to please.

Filled Pancakes (Serves 6)

1 cup flour
 1/2 teaspoon salt
 1/2 teaspoon baking powder
 1 cup milk
 5 eggs
 1 cup ground meat (from soup bone)
 1 egg yolk
 1 cup minced onion
 2 tablespoons butter

Bread crumbs

Sift flour, measure, then sift together with salt and baking powder. Add milk and 3 eggs, well beaten, and mix to a smooth batter. Bake in thin cakes on a greased skillet. Let cool. Mix meat with egg yolk and 1 egg.

Season with salt and pepper to taste. Sauté onion in butter, add meat mixture and cook 2 minutes. Spread on pancakes and roll tightly. Beat remaining egg. Dip rolled pancakes in egg, then in crumbs and fry in skillet in hot fat until well browned. Serve with bouillon or other thin meat soup.

FRUIT PANCAKES make a tempting and filling dessert when the meal has been light:

Fruit Pancakes (Serves 4)

3 eggs
 6 tablespoons milk
 1 teaspoon flour
 1/4 teaspoon salt
 1 teaspoon sugar
 4 teaspoons butter
 3/4 cup blackberry jam
 2 cups sliced pears
 Confectioners' sugar

Beat eggs until foamy; add milk, flour, salt and sugar. Beat well. Melt 1 teaspoon butter in 9-inch skillet, tilting to cover bottom entirely. Pour 1/4 of the egg mixture into hot skillet, covering surface evenly. Cook until firm enough to roll. Slip pancake from skillet onto a clean cloth; spread with jam and pears and roll.

Swedish Pancakes (Serves 6)

3 eggs
 1 cup milk
 1 1/2 cups sifted flour
 1 tablespoon sugar
 1/2 teaspoon salt
 1/2 cup cream
 2 tablespoons melted butter
 2 cups berry sauce
 Confectioners' sugar

Beat eggs until very light. Add half the milk and fold in flour sifted with sugar and salt. Add cream, butter and remaining milk. Bake in large cakes on a hot griddle. Place 2 tablespoons of sauce on each and roll. Sprinkle with confectioners' sugar and serve. To make berry sauce, use canned or cooked berries, sweetened to taste and thickened with a small amount of cornstarch mixed with water.

FIRST AID to the SAILING HOUSE
 by ROGER C. WHITMAN

Question: Several times I have plastered bad parts of rooms and each time, try though I may, cracks appear in the plaster upon drying. I have tried retarding the drying, wetting the lath, but to no avail. Can you help me? Also, please tell me how to mix this plaster and in what proportion?

Answer: If you are not trying to replaster an entire room, merely to patch up some cracks or other bad places, I advise you to get a prepared patching plaster which needs only to be mixed with water to make a paste. This is slower drying than plaster of Paris, which hardens too rapidly to be easily worked. (Glue dissolved in the mixing water will slow the time of hardening; so will vinegar, mixed half and half with the water.) If the patching job has been done correctly and cracks reappear, particularly a round window and door openings, it is possible that structural weakness is the cause. If so, the defect should be located and corrected.

Question: My husband is remodeling the kitchen, using tile-board for the ceiling. The bathroom is directly above. Whenever water is spilled on the floor it leaks down into the kitchen. We have tried caulking around the fixtures, with little success. What can we do about it?

Answer: The bathroom should have a good waterproof floor covering, such as clay tile, asphalt tile or linoleum. Until you do this, you will continue to have leaks.
