STATE HEALTH DEPT. FILMS ARE AVAILABLE

Austin. - Public school teachers throughout Texas face more teaching problems today than ever before. High on the list of reasons for the situation are the difficulties involved in presenting instruction on whole subjects or portions of subjects which cannot properly be taught using normal classroom methods.

Many of the state's teachers - particularly cancellors and health and physical education teachers - have found the solution to this problem at the film library of the Texas State Department of Health in Austin. The library, with its 1600 films which are listed under 600 different titles, is said to be one of the most extensive in the Southwest. It contains films with viewing times ranging from 4 to 57 minutes covering all phases of personal and community health. Most of the films were produced commercially but 20 of them were written and produced for specific Texas application.

All films are aimed at a single purpose: teaching good health practices. In addition to providing Texas school teachers with films for classroom aids, the library makes films available to religious and fraternal organizations and to civic groups.

RURAL CARRIER EXAM SET

An examination for Rural Carrier for the post office at O'Donnell will be open for acceptance of application until Feb. 27th, the Civil Service Commission announced today. Applicants must take a written test for this position. They must have resided within the delivery of the office for one year immediately preceding the closing date of the examination. In addition they must have reached their 18th birthday on the closing date for acceptance of applications. There is no maximum age limit. However persons who have passed the age of 70 may be considered only for temporary renewable appointments of one year. More information may be had at the local post office.

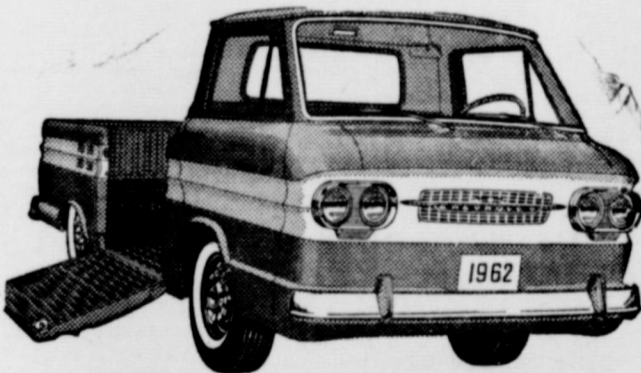

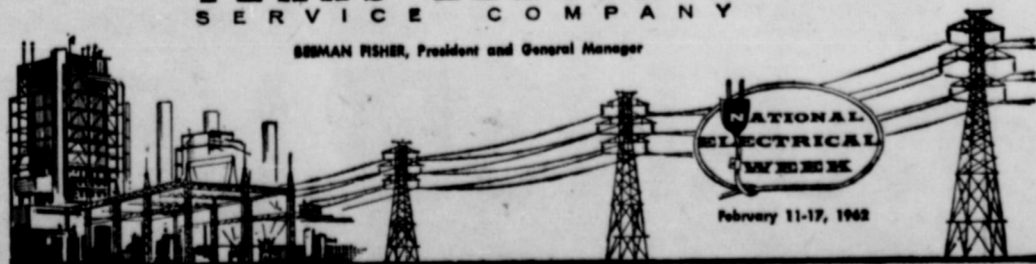

Did you have some ornamental plants damaged by the recent cold weather? If you did, do not be too hasty about pruning them, advises Harland Smith, extension plant pathologist.
