FHA Offices Will
Be Consolidated

Always use your return address on everything that you mail. It is a requirement when mailing a package to have your return address on the package.

It also takes very little time to place the ZIP Code number on the address as well as your own ZIP Code number (79351) in your return address.

Time is growing short to send overseas air parcels and mail for it to reach its destination by Christmas. This should be from Dec. 1 to Dec 10.

Poll Tax is
Issue in Court

Fate of Texas' 63-year-old poll tax as a voting requirement rests in the hands of a three-judge federal court. They heard four hours of arguments in Austin last week in an historic case to abolish the levy.

Judges announced that no immediate ruling would be made. They advised Texans who want to be eligible to vote next year to pay the \$1.75 fee before the January 31 deadline.

In frequent questions during the arguments, the judges indicated concern over several complex legal points.

Circuit Judge John R. Brown repeatedly speculated on the court's earlier position in assessing an apparently unsupported congressional finding in the 1965 voting rights act, that the Texas levy discriminates against Negroes.

Survivors include his wife, Ethel; one son, J. V. Burdett Jr. of Lamesa; four brothers, George and Bob, both of O'Donnell, and Ralph and Tobe, both of Lubbock; and two grandchildren.

NITROGEN TESTS
GRAIN SORGHUMS

A new series of off-station soil fertility tests conducted by Texas A&M University scientists should show if there are grain sorghum yield differences between fall or spring applications of nitrogen.

Test plots will be in Deaf Smith and Farmer Counties and on the Southwestern Great Plains Research Center, at Bushland. Each plot will receive three different rates of nitrogen applications and each rate will be applied at five different times.

The three rates are 80, 120 and 160 pound of nitrogen per acre.

The scientists will be comparing the yield differences of applying the nitrogen before shredding, after plowing, after listing, after irrigation and in an early side dress. They also hope to learn how fall applications affect decomposition of crop residue.

Personnel at the Bushland Center and at the South Plains Research and Extension Center, near Lubbock, will conduct the study in cooperation with county agents and local farmers.

Harvey Walker, of the South Plains Center, says if there are insignificant yield differences between fall and spring applications, more nitrogen applications could be made in the fall. This would ease the spring rush for both farmers and fertilizer dealers.

The South Plains Research and Extension Center has been conducting off-station fertility tests for 12 years. This year they had plots in 20 locations representing every major soil type in the area.

"How do we go about reviewing the basis for a congressional finding?" Brown wondered aloud. "Or does the case come to us as though Congress had not made these findings? This is a very unusual point of law."

Texas Attorney General Waggoner Carr maintained that Congress had made its finding "without so much as a scintilla of evidence." He pointed out that U. S. Attorney General Nicholas Katzenbach himself had testified before a Senate committee that he had no complaints of voter discrimination in this state. Katzenbach later filed the suit under terms of the voting rights act.

U. S. Justice Department Attorney Stephen J. Pollak, acknowledging that there is no overt refusal to give Texas Negroes voting rights, argued that due to basically inferior education, income of Negroes is lower and the tax, therefore, falls heavier on them.

One judge wondered, perhaps hopefully, if the U. S. Supreme Court might rule on some of the questions submitted in an earlier Virginia case before federal judges in Texas have to hand down their decision.

Hearing here was the first of four cases brought by the Justice department, under congressional direction, to challenge poll tax validity head-on. Others will be held in Mississippi on December 10, Alabama on December 20, and Virginia on January 17.
