# THE HIGHWAY COMMISSION

In the long run, the arrogant and arbitrary tactics of the State High-way Commission may serve to restore to Texas a democratic government of the people, by the people, for the people.

For a long time there has been evident in the state a tendency to drift away from the principles which identify the government of a soverign people. Little by little, popular power has been given into the hands of this oligarchy and that. The autocratic attitude of the Highway Commission represents the height to which that untoward tendency has been carried.

In times past this commission has arbitrarily voted cardinal highways on this side or that of a town which dared to disagree with the commis-sion's way of thinking. In conse-quence dozens of thriving Texas towns have been sentenced to im-mediate decay and eventual exter-wination.

Harris county is the most recent victim of the Highway Commission's displeasure. The people of that county some time ago voted bonds for construction of the Old Spanish Trail, designating the route which that highway should travel. But the commission had other ideas. And now it holds over the neals of Harris County's commissioner's court its absolute power to deny state and federal aid unless a new, commission-designated route is accepted.

The commission forgets that its powers are derived from the people, that it is a servant and not a master. And certainly it lashes a free people with the authority yielded it by the

The time has come for a show-down. It should be desc..ined, once and for all, whether the highway Commission shall continue to play the part of a divinely created oligarchy, or whether it should be made amenable to the will of the people who organized it.

D. A. R.'S TO PRESERVE
HISTORIC TREES

A three-hundred-year-old tree in a church burying ground at Falls
Church, Virginia, has been selected by the Daughters of the American na Revolution as the second living memorial of America's past to be preserved for posterity.

The National Society of the D. A. R. has embarked upon a plan of choosing one historical tree for preservation each year by means of antion-wide referendum through its state chapters. The trees are saved donated by former Congressman L. Dawey, head of the Davey Institute of Tree Surgery.

The tree at Falls Church—a tulip popular with a foliage spread of 7.5 feet—has looked down upon more than three centuries of American history. 

Trinkets and other items wers purchased at a cost of nearly \$290. The total of these titems charged to advertising as this business aman's books was about \$400.
