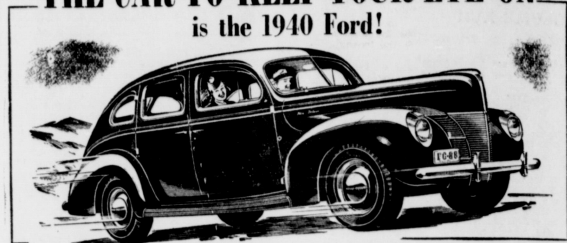

Confession To Slaying Of Officer Given

FORT WORTH, Dec. 4.—State police reported that Rafael Camacho of Ranger, who committed suicide today in the Westford jail, left a note admitting that he killed W. J. O'Leary, assistant Big Spring police chief, last week.

Comacho, 21, admitted that he shot O'Leary, 42, near a residential

grocery store in Big Spring last Tuesday, the state police said. The youth, charged with numerous thefts, hanged himself today in the Westford jail.

Comacho also left a map purporting to show where he disposed of his automatic pistol in Lake Sweetwater. Captain John Reed left for Sweetwater immediately with a magnetic instrument with which he hopes to retrieve the pis-

tol. Camacho's fingerprints will be compared with those of O'Leary's slayer.

There were no witnesses to the O'Leary shooting, although a man living nearby thought he heard the police official arguing with a "drunken negro woman." Once the story advanced was that O'Leary was killed when he surprised a burglar at a grocery store.

MR. GREENWOOD UNDERGOES EMERGENCY OPERATION

Mr. Clark Greenwood, who underwent an emergency operation last Saturday for the removal of a ruptured appendix, is reported doing as well as could be expected.

Peritonitis had already set up, surgeons said, but unless unforeseen complications arise, he is expected to recover without trouble. He is in a Lubbock hospital.

Pension Checks To Get Small Boost

AUSTIN, Dec. 4.—Compared with November, slightly fewer old age pensioners will receive slightly larger pensions in December, the state public welfare department announced today.

Checks averaging \$8.75 and aggregating approximately \$1,060,000 will be mailed to 121,341 persons about the middle of this month after federal matching money has been received.

The average payment will be 14 cents larger than that of the previous month while the number receiving it will be 306 smaller.

This average, while far below the top among the states as well as the average for the states, still is not the national low. In August according to the welfare department, California paid the top of \$32.44, and Arkansas the low of \$5.98. The national average payment was \$19.43.

The decrease in the number of

pension recipients was due to reinvestigations, which are being made continuously in accordance with federal social security requirements and to deaths.

To Make Loan Payment

In addition to the pension payments, the state, through its treasury department, on December 10 will make another payment of \$200,000 on a bank loan totalling \$3,300,000 incurred more than a year ago in an old age assistance financial fight.

This payment will bring to \$538,000 the total repaid. On October 10, the treasury paid back \$138,000; on November 10 \$200,000. As a result of the payments ordered by the legislature, at its general session, pensions were slashed more than \$6 in October. The debt will be wiped out with the scheduled final payment next September, 10.

Wants Russian Ambassador Recalled

PALO ALTO, Calif., Dec. 2.—Withdrawal of the United States ambassador to Russia because of Russia's invasion of Finland was advocated today by former President Herbert Hoover in a statement issued at his home here.

"Why all of this tenderness toward Russia?" Mr. Hoover asked. "Our government offers its good offices to prevent the attack on Finland. The administration very properly protested against the bombing of Finnish women and children. We do not even get civil replies. Moreover, has Russia kept her agreement with the United States not to engage within the United States in propaganda to destroy our government?"

"Mr. Roosevelt gave recognition to the communist government by treaty and the exchange of ambassadors. That gave them standing as a decent member of the family of nations.

"We long since had withdrawn our ambassador to the Nazi government of Germany and we even raised our tariff 25 per cent on German goods. Is the assault on the freedom of Finland, and the dead women and children in their streets any less a shock to us than the Nazi barbarities? We should as was done in Germany, leave a routine official to represent us in Moscow and withdraw the dignity of our ambassador."
