Q-My husband, a World War 11 veteran died recently of complications from injuries received in service, and I wish to make application for death compensation payments. Will my present income have any bearing on my eligibility?

A-No. So long as you are otherwise eligible, you will receive death compensation payments reguardless of your income. It is death pension payments, based on deaths not due to service, where income limitations

Q-I have listed my mother as ben- Floyd Jackson. and have designated that sne receive the proceeds in a lump sum. Would she have the right to change to some other method of payment if she desired?

A-Yes. She may change the method of GI insurance payments from lump sum to any of several installment plans available.

Q—Is a peacetime veteran who is blind in both eyes eligible for spec-ial aid from VA, even though his blindness is not service-connected? A-Yes. If the peacetime veteran is entitled to compensation for any service-connected disability, though not necessarily for his blindness, he may receive special aid such as approved electronic and mechanical equipment, as well as a seeing eye

Q-Now that it is legally possible to convert my Korean GI term insurance to a permanent plan. I intend to do so. But what about some of the other advantages of perman-ent plan GI insurance? Will I be able to borrow on it?

V. A. Quiz

Q—About a year ago I told VA to hold the dividends on my GI insur-ance to my credit. If I don't pay the quarterly premium due next mon-th, will the V A deduct it from those dividend credits?

A-No. VA is not permitted to with-draw a quarterly premium from your dividend credit without your written consent. The VA, however, will withdraw monthly premiums to keep your insurance from lapsing

Q—I receive a pension from VA, and last year I sold a plot of ground I owned and bought another. I made a small profit on the sale. Must I report it, in reporting 1958 income for VA pension purposes?

A-Yes. The law says that your net profit on the transaction must be reported, which would be the profit you realized after deducting all expenses incident to the sale.

A—The law permitting holders of Korean conflict term policies with the initials "RS" before the policy number to convert to one of VA's permanent plans goes into effect January 1, 1959.

Q—The VA recently liberalized its regulations affecting veterans whose schooling had been interrupted. and permitted re - entry on training in many cases. Does any-thing in this liberalization apply to a student expelled for misconduct?




