A LITTLE HERT MAY SAVE

The paradox that a "little hurt"" can prevent a lot of sickness was discobered by silentists about a hundred years ago. An English country dottor named Edward Jenner took a little serum from a cowpox pustule on the arm of a milkmaid and scrutched it with a lancet into the arm of a neighbor boy. A smallpox like sors appeared on his arm and he had other mild smallpox like symptoms.

smallpox like symptoms. Teday, thanks to Dr. Janner, we we can have a similiar immunizat-ion and avoid the disfiguring and killing epidemics which once swept

Europe. Several years inter in France Louis Pasteur made a startling dis-covery one moraing. The discovery— a re-inoculation of some chickens with chicken cholers — set the wheels turning in Pasteur's creative mind.

mind. "I've found a way to make a beast a little sick — inject some microbes into a chicken so thus it gets the disease but only a little of it — and when it gets better — it can resist the disease. We can apply this to other diseases in man: we can save lives." These may have been some of the thoughts running thru Pastaeur's mind. thru Pastaeur's mind,

been some of the thoughts running thru Pastaeur's mind. Pasteur also explored and exper-imented until he found a way to prottect man from the dread rables thru a series of inccluations. Today we use about the same method to keep a man bitten by a rabid anim-al from developing the disease. Another advance in immunelogy was made in 1923 when a toxin was developed to save hundreds of bab ies each year frof gasping death of diphtheria. In the last 10 to 15 years we have read and watched the drama of polio vaccine unfold. Frinical play eres in that drama were Dr. Jonas Salk of the U. of Pittsburg and Dr. Albert Sabin of University of Cinci nuatti

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
