## Odd Fellows to Have Home on Baldrige Street

Dirt was broken Tuesday for the construction of a two-story building on Baldrige street adjoining the Masonic Hall. The building will have a 25-foot front and will extend back 60 feet.

The lower floor will be occupied by a store and the upper story by the newly organized Odd Fellows' Lodge. The building is being constructed by the City Building Company, of which J. W. Gates is the promotor.

Mr. Christopher will soon start the construction of brick building on property. It is not known what character of business will be conducted in the building when completed. ## Minton Awarded Tredway Mail Contract

Charles Minton was awarded the contract for carrying the mail on the newly established route to Tredway and return. He will make his first trip out with the mail on the 16th. The mail will leave O'Donnell on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays, returning the same day, the entire distance covering 37.03 miles.

This new route will prove a great convenience to more than 100 families living along the route and it is expected that it will soon be made a daily route.

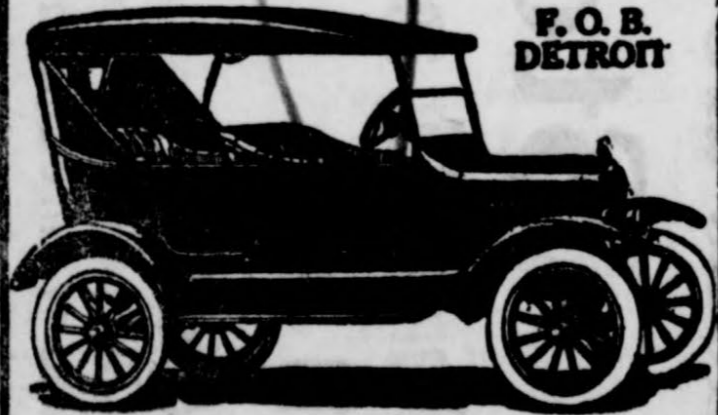
