3 Local Folks Killed in Car Crash Near Here

A grinding Sunday morning car crash killed three people from O'Donnell south of Lamesa. Killed were Clyde Meeker, 39, who lived east of town and Mr. and Mrs. Esteban here pulling cotton. Investigating officers gave the following report of what apparently was a head-on collision in the southern corner of Dawson County.

Meeker had been working in Big Spring during the past week and apparently was en route home alone to see his wife and children. The Gutierrez family, driving a 1941 sedan, was going south to Kerrville, their home.

The accident occurred on a straight section of US 87, approximately two miles north of the Martin County line. Neither car was attempting to pass and no eye witnesses could be located by highway patrolmen.

The Meeker car, a late model four door, was left on its wheels but was turned crosswise in the highway after the collision in the east lane of the two-lane highway. The Gutierrez car was pushed to the east side of the road but not as far as the borrow ditch.

National Magazine Tells Of Local Broiler Industry

The "fastest chicken business there is" bids fair to put one South Plains farming community on the road to new prosperity, according to Louise C. Allen in the December issue of The Progressive Farmer. Mrs. Allen refers to the broiler business now in full swing in the O'Donnell area.

Estimates place the number of brooder houses at around 50, each holding 4,000 chicks at one time.

It's hard for the average farmer to hold his own against professionals in the brooder market, says Mrs. Allen. Large buyers, and the producers who supply them have to know a source will be regular. That's why the produce houses in Lubbock and other South Plains towns for years have been shipping in most of their broilers. It has meant loss from weight shrinkage, dehydration that reduce meat quality, extra trouble and expense, says the author.

By making broiler growing a community project, farmers around O'Donnell, have found the answer. It is a pay-as-you-sell agreement on the feed and the chicks, and FHA-guaranteed loans for the bank that finances the houses. The owners have five years in which to pay back these loans.

"Within a year we hope to have 100 broiler houses here," says E. J. Smith of the First National Bank of O'Donnell. "We have a market of 100,000 broilers a week to work toward," Smith told Mrs. Allen.

Joe Eaker Says It Works Mr. and Mrs. Joe Eaker, who live east of O'Donnell, received the first shipment of 4,000 chicks on June 29. The day-old birds cost them 15 cents each, brought 27 cents a pound, for a total profit of \$864.50 in eight weeks, Mrs. Eaker says. In addition they were paid a premium for being the first in the business.

They now have two 24 X 160-foot houses, each costing around \$2,900 plus \$759 for equipment. They have 120 tube feeders which are refilled twice daily, 32 fountains, 16 electric lights and 8 brooder lights to a house. They also have 3 butane emergency lights in case the electricity fails. A radio in each building keeps chickens accustomed to outside noise so that they do not frighten easily. The \$80 worth of sugar cane litter on the brooder house floor will be utilized for fertilizer in the fields later. It is changed with each new batch of chicks.

The winter months may make a difference in results but they expect to raise the brooders off the floor a little, close the sides of the corrugated tin buildings and make no other changes. The Eaker's marketed 3,992 of their first 4,000 and Mrs. Eaker calls it a year round business with quick turnover.

"We can market a lot more than they can produce," Bill Snell of the Clary Poultry and Egg Company told Mr. Allen. "This is just beginning to develop. Heretofore, 80 per cent of our broilers have been shipped by truck from Arkansas, some from South Texas, and a few from Missouri. The weight shrinkage from Arkansas is almost prohibitive. We have to fatten them back again for 48 hours before we dress them."

"Of course those raisers are professional. Our local growers have a lot to learn about keeping down costs and understanding market demands, but we've got a different type of chicken here," said Snell in the article. "This broad-breasted Vantress breed dresses out much better," he added.

The market covers a 300-mile radius to the south, north and west of Lubbock, including Sante Fe, New Mexico; Odessa, Pecos, and El Paso; and as far east as Crosbyton. One buyer, representing a large grocery chain, placed a standing order for "all the chickens of that type you can get." As the improved quality of the locally grown, broad-breasted broilers gets noised about, says the author, such buyers are expected to be more and more frequent.

O'Donnell, it now appears, is "on the road to new prosperity."

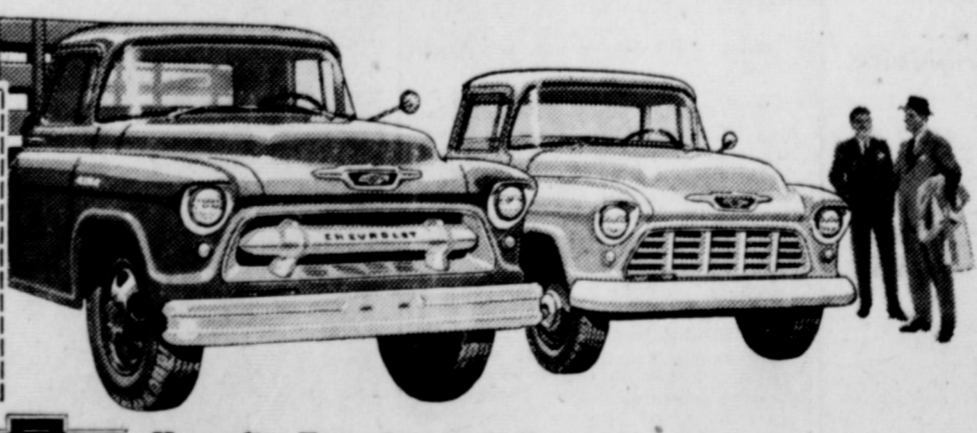

Presence of Molecules Explains Expansion

SCHENECTADY, N.Y. — Why does heat make things expand?

Matter is made of molecules which are in constant motion, and the higher the temperature, the faster they move. If you have a volume of gas in a rubber balloon, the pressure of these molecules against the rubber is balanced by its pull. Warming the gas makes the molecules move faster, so they push harder against the rubber. It yields a little, and the gas expands.

With cooling, their motion is slowed, they exert less pressure, and the volume of gas gets smaller. Something similar occurs in a liquid, and also in a solid, although the molecules are held more tightly together. The amount which a solid expands for the same rise in temperature is considerably less than with a gas or liquid.

Vegetables Spark Lazy Appetites With Their Appeal

Corn-Pepper Bake (Serves 6)

- 6 large green peppers
- 4 slices bacon
- 1 egg
- 1 tablespoon butter
- 2 tablespoons finely diced onion
- 2 tablespoons flour
- 1 teaspoon sugar (optional)
- 1½ teaspoons salt
- 1½ cups milk, scalded
- 2 cups cooked corn
- ¼ cup soft bread crumbs

Wash peppers, cut a slice from the side of each and remove seeds and fibrous parts. Cover with boiling water and simmer 5 minutes. Meanwhile cook bacon, drain and dice. Beat egg slightly. Melt butter, add onion and cook until tender. Add flour, sugar, seasonings and blend. Add milk and cook
