ON TEXAS FARMS

In the interest of beauty, simplicity and ease of cleaning, 115 home demonstration club women in Calhoun county have removed all the old calendars, artificial flowers and plaster of paris animas from their bedrooms. Two hundred and sixty-nine pieces of furniture have been refinished; 34 women have made or started hooked rugs and 20 mats have been made or started.

Also 178 dresses and 28 other garments have been made by the 110 foundation patterns which have been provided by these Calhoun county home demonstration club women. Fifty-two of these club women have "new deal" clothes closets. That is they have closets with rods allowing dresses to hang clear of the floor, shelf space, hat racks and shoe racks. And food to the impressive total of 26,439 containers is already stored on their pantry shelves. Fruits, juices, tomatoes, and vegetables have been put up in quantities to insure vitamins and variety in the winter's diet.

With the help of her mother and sister, Miss Thelma Green, farm food supply demonstrator for the Independence home demonstration club in Montgomery county, has filled 2,000 containers of food including 45 varieties for their family of 12. She has added 100 feet of new shelving to the food storage space. In addition to her home duties she has supervised one of the relief canning plants where several thousand cans have been filled with food this year.

Old Age Pensions Cost Runs High

"Old-age pensions could cost Texas taxpayers as much as \$56,073,402 yearly if each of the 283,199 people 65 years of age and over received the full \$15 monthly allotment provided for in the recent constitutional amendment," State Auditor Orville S. Carpenter said today.

At the request of Governor Alfred Carpenter and R. B. Anderson, State Tax Commissioner, prepared the report "Costs and General Plan for Old Age Pensions". Upon the Governor's suggestion it was mailed to members of the legislature September 10th.

"Experience of other states has shown that they have attempted at first to take care of only those actually in need of assistance. Requirements of applicants have been with a view of eliminating those who, although of eligible age, did not actually need assistance. In this way other states have greatly reduced the costs from the amount necessary to pay all persons of the required age had been included," Carpenter said. "As there are 41,787 persons 65 years of age and over on the Texas Relief rolls, this apparently is the minimum number to qualify for old age pensions. At \$15 a month and with 10 per cent administrative costs added, this would be \$8,273,826 per year," Carpenter explained.

Carpenter believed the figure 62,933 more nearly represented the actual number who probably would receive old age pensions in Texas. He determined this figure by considering the experience of other states. If 62,933 people in Texas 65 years of age and over were to receive the full \$15 a month, the yearly cost to the taxpayer would be \$12,460,734, Carpenter calculated. In this he included 10 per cent administrative costs. "The Federal Government, if the funds are available, will provide an amount equal to that spent by the State plus 5 per cent for expenses. This depends upon approval of the Texas plan by the Social Security Board in Washington. The Texas legislature will formulate a plan for distribution, and it will decide whether or not the full \$15 maximum will be used," Carpenter concluded.

RECEIVE MORE DETAILS OF BROTHER'S INJURY

Quoting the Los Angeles Examiner of Sunday, September 8, we give a brief account of the tragedy in which G. A. Dameron, brother of Mrs. T. R. Tunc was seriously injured:

"Living torches, their bodies blanketed with inflammable turpentine, oil and paraffin, two hero members of the Los Angeles fire department suffered possibly fatal burns while fighting a spectacular blaze in the plant of the Mission Painted Fabric Co. early this morning. The injured firemen are Capt. Lawrence Krumsiek and hoseman George Dameron. Both men suffered second and third degree burns on the entire body. Both victims are in a Los Angeles hospital.

"The death-defying heroism of the two men stood out inspiring as they ignored danger to themselves, rushed into the flaming factory structure bearing fire-fighting chemicals. A crowd of thousands, drawn to the scene by the terrific blast, watched them disappear within. At that moment a second crashing explosion was heard and the two men, their bodies seething sheets of flame, were hurled 30 feet into the street. Two spectators tore their own coats off and wrapped the bodies of the hero firemen in an effort to snuff out the flames. So fierce was the heat that the metal helmets of the firemen were reduced almost instantly to molten and shapeless masses, and their uniforms were literally burned from their bodies."

Heart Disease Ranks First As Killer

Austin, Sept. 18.—"Heart disease ranks first in the list of killers today. During the past thirty years it has been steadily increasing. Few people ever associate impairment of this vital organ with diseased mouth."

conditions. Yet in a very real manner the health of the heart and its consequent ability to do its work properly can be definitely affected by an unhealthy mouth," states Dr. John W. Brown, State Health Officer.

"While, of course, there are many other causes for heart impairments than diseased teeth, gums or tonsils, there certainly is every good reason to establish and maintain daily and periodical prophylactic measures so far as the mouth is concerned. Not to do so is merely adding another menace to the heart already beset with disease potentials that seem to be a part of present-day life.

"If the individual will assume his responsibility by consuming a nourishing diet, keeping his mouth clean through daily brushing, and have a regular inspection by his dentist and physician, undoubtedly a fair proportion of heart disease, not to mention many minor ailments, could be eliminated that have their origin in diseased mouth conditions.

"Unlike public health control measures, dental supervision is a highly personal matter. There is no legislation covering the situation, nor is there any enforcement officer to keep one in line. Therefore, common sense and reasonable concern for one's heart should prompt interest in teeth, mouth and throat.

"As an authority tersely puts it, 'Keep your heart out of your mouth and your mouth germs out of your heart.'"
