Adjustment Of Cotton Price Is Expected Soon

Texas AAA Director Announces Terms of Farmer Compliance

College Station.—Cotton produced in 1937, but not before 1938, will be eligible for a flat payment rate of 36 cents a bushel of a Federal appropriation of \$130,000,000 on the basis of the amount of cotton actually produced on the acreage eligible under the act passed by Congress in 1937 for speeding up cotton price adjustment payments, according to word received from the AAA office at College Station, Texas, today. Registrations of Autos Below Showing Of Previous Month

Austin.—New automobile registrations during June were moderately below those of May and sharply under those of June last year, according to the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research. Reports from fifteen representative Texas counties show total sales of 3,464 cars, a decline of 4.9 per cent from June last year. During the first six months sales aggregated 35,534 cars, a decline of 32.9 per cent from the corresponding period a year ago. Nearly one-third of the 9,000 odd cars in Greater Berlin, Germany, have duplicate names, Bismark and Wilhelmstrasse each occurring more than twenty-five times.

Fall hosiery will again be copper tones. Shades have been set by the National Color Card Association and mills will concentrate on six or more tones. One Dallas manufacturer for the fall which is called color-of-the-month. Each month a new color-of-the-month will be selected from the colors listed below or from colors which may be added to the line and it will be offered with a definite tie-in with the popular colors in fall and winter footwear and ready-to-wear. The colors-of-the-month for August and September will be Snappy and Savvy, respectively.

Snappy is a gleaming light copper suggested for wear with copper or rust tones, reddish browns, greens, navy or black. Savvy, a winstone with a copper cast, for wear with wine, purple and plum shades. Spicy, a golden tan, for golden browns, greens, vibrant sports clothes and navy and black. Swagger, a burnt tan keyed with copper in beiges, tans, and navy, navy, blue, and lively blues, gold, amber and black. Shadow, a rosey beige, toned for purple, sapphire blues, rose tones, bluish greens and black. Sherry, a deep burnished beige, important for browns, dark greens and black.

Symphony, a neutral taupe recommended for general wear... important with vintage shades, neutral browns, navy, grayed blues and black.

Sparkle, a golden iridescent for browns, blues, greens and black. Saucy, a rosy copper, ensemble with brick shades, marine blue, black and burnt earth shades.

 Q. How can I remove rust
 stains from the kitchen sink?
 A. Pour a few drops of vine-
 gar on the stains; leave there for
 about fifteen minutes; and then
 scour the sink in usual manner.

 with olive oil before retiring.

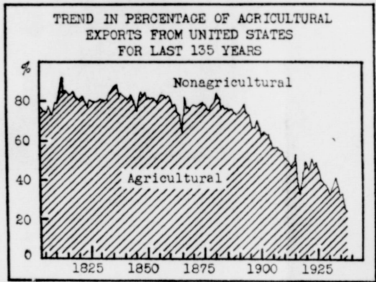

Agriculture Makes Wide Gains In Century

"A century ago agricultural products normally accounted for out of every five dollars' worth of exports that the United States sent to foreign countries," states W. E. Morgan, economist of the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service.

"Last year, however, only one dollar's worth of agricultural products was exported for every three dollars' worth of non-agricultural commodities.

"This situation did not come about overnight—it is the kind of thing one would normally expect in a country that started out as a producer of raw materials and then developed into an important manufacturing nation.

"The importance of agricultural products in our foreign trade has declined steadily for over a half a century, Morgan explained. After the Civil War American manufacturers began to export large amounts of their goods. This was possible because many of our industries are efficient enough to produce commodities cheaper than they can be made elsewhere, in spite of the fact that the prices paid here for many raw materials, such as steel and aluminum, are unduly high because this material is tariff protected.

"The increasing scarcity of industrial products in the dollar value of our exports is important to American farmers because the total amount of money that foreigners are able to spend here is held down by mandates imposed by many foreign governments. The tariff policy of our own government has aggravated the situation. Declining exports make it doubly hard on farmers," Morgan pointed out.

"To put it another way, farmers have more money than they need to buy foreign goods," Morgan pointed out.

Japan's Conquest Of China Imperils U. S. Cotton Market

Charlottesville, Va.—Dr. Ch'ao Ting Chi, member of the editorial board of the magazine Amerasia, said today that Japanese conquest of China will mean complete elimination of Japan as a consumer of United States cotton.

Speaking before the University of Virginia institute of public affairs, Dr. Chi said:

"Japan's plan for the economic exploitation of China include the scheme to convert the grain fields of North China into cotton fields. She figures that if she is able to secure political domination of North China through conquest she will be able to compel Chinese farmers to grow cotton instead of grain, at the risk of food shortage, and compel them to sell the cotton to the Japanese on Japan's terms."

"By this arrangement, Japan expects to be freed from her dependence on American cotton, a source of which Japan cannot dictate."

Which two of these four will qualify for the second heat was the big question puzzling the political experts. They freely admitted the freakish O'Daniel boom has them confused, although the great majority believed O'Daniel was a certainty for the run-off. Thompson and McCraw were battling to a finish for the other place in the run-off with opinion sharply divided as which will be successful Thompson forces, supposedly confident, believed the constructive campaign of their candidate, kept scrupulously clean and without mentioning the other candidates, will bring their man under the wire a winner. McCraw, with slashing attacks on O'Daniel, in which he raised the issues of sectionalism, poll tax payments, and hill-billy music, claimed the race is between himself and O'Daniel. But those opposing him asserted his campaign has collapsed and his sudden switch from wise-cracker to bitter sarcasm is evidence that he

feels he must do something to reform his shattered lines, or go down.
The Attorney General has found O'Daniel a worthy foe in the exchange of repartee, and McCraw's vicious attacks with lit, the apparent damage to his cause. The big surprise of the campaign may be in the question of how much O'Daniel talk will resolve itself into votes Saturday. There is still a possibility that the four man may pull up lame, and find Thompson and McCraw fighting it out for governorship.
ALRED IS JUDGE
More than a year ago, this column gave its readers a detailed forecast that Gov. James V. Allred would be judge of the new South Texas Federal District Court. The prediction was qualified, based upon information from a high Washington source. Later, other Texas newspaper correspondents carried rumors of the event, but weakened, its source repeated, by confirming the original story. Any political commentator writing

from Austin it required to make a good many guesses in a year. Many go wrong, naturally, but to stay in business, the commentator must score more hits than misses. This commentator therefore, takes some pride in the development which this week landed Allred in the judgeship, exactly as forecast in detail.
WILL QUIT ABOUT SEPT. 1
The Governor indicated he will resign after the second primary, immediately after President Roosevelt announced his appointment at Wichita Falls. Soon after his return to Austin, he issued a statement hedging on this, stating to see extent, and saying he wanted to serve as much as possible of his term as Governor out. That hedging statement was in response to pressure from friends of Jerry Mann and Ralph Yarborough, candidates for Attorney General against Lt. Gov. Walter Woodul, who will become Governor when Allred steps down. Smart observers here figured the knowledge that Woodul will be Governor nearly five months will be

worth 25,000 to 50,000 additional votes to Woodul, and probably put him so far ahead in the Attorney General's race that there will be no runoff. Recognizing this, Woodul's opponents put pressure on Allred.
Created court opens its first term on Monday, Sept. 5. Allred is the new Court's first judge. It is a 10 to 1 bet that he will take his seat on the bench when the new court opens for business with a crowded docket.
And Senator Tom Connally will sleep sounder during these next two years, knowing that Jimmie Allred will not oppose him for reelection in 1940.
NOTES
The full name of Gov. Jimmie Allred is "James Burr V. Allred"—and not James Veto Allred, as one newspaper suggested during the last special session—the Governor told reporters this week. His three names came from three uncles, and the "V" doesn't stand for anything, that being the first

name of one of the uncles...
Judge Robert Lee Bohler, chairman of the State Highway Commission, and fearless advocate of what he thinks is right in politics, added impetus to the Thompson campaign this week, when he made a half-hour radio campaign speech for Ernest Thompson, giving the Amarillo his unqualified support...
Successor to Capt. L. G. Phares, deposed chief of the highway patrol, is Captain Fred Hickman, veteran of the patrol service since its organization in 1934. Hickman has had 15 years experience in every phase of law enforcement work, and is popular with county peace officers throughout the State. He came originally from Whitesboro, Grayson County...
The state tax rate probably will not be fixed by the Automatic Tax board, which includes the Governor, Comptroller and Treasurer, until after the elections. Thirty two county assessors failed to file estimates of taxable valuations by the deadline date, July 15, as required by law. The Board probably will meet by July

20, and postpone action. Two of its three members are candidates for reelection, and would not rather levy taxes until after the voters have spoken...
Five million dollars of the new road construction, to keep Texas contractors and their laborers busy during the remainder of this calendar year, will be let by August 1. The Highway Department opened bids on over \$2,000,000 of work this week, and called for bids on another \$3,000,000 for July 30.
