pective turkey producer is to buy poults from hatcheries that have a reputation for producing healthy poults. As it may be impossible for a single grower to know the poult source, cooperative effort may be helpful in investigating the breeder and hatcher.

Proper housing and proper use of brooding equipment are essential to health of the poults. Basis of sanitary procedures is to prevent healthy individuals from coming in contact with the infectious agents of disease. All weak-looking poults should be kept separate from the healthy fowls and strict sanitary practices must be maintained during the brooding period.



Neglected Farm Forest Termed Valuable Asset

The farm woodland is paying off. That long neglected group of trees that stands on the back "forty" and which once was eyed with a resent ful attitude because it occupied land that could far better be devoted to grazing, now becomes a definite and valuable asset.

It is one that can be quickly converted into cash. To the owner has come the realization that the farm will produce something more than grain, root crops, pasture or dairy products. Trees also are a crop, and a paying crop, even on the poorer types of soil where intensive agriculture is an impossibility.

Barn Cleaners



Barn cleaners should have all mechanical parts, of simple design, yet sturdy and easy to con-trol. It is possible to thoroughly clean the average dairy barn by use of mechanical barn cleaners. A clean barn is the first requisite for clean and healthy cows. Installation of a mechanical cleaner, such as illustrated above, will do away with much of the drudgery of this farm operation.

Insects Launch Early Attack on Vegetables

With the first reasonably warm days, insects will make their advent. These will be the green worm and lice on cabbage and the Colorado beetles and black fleabeetles on po-

The cabbage green worm comes shortly in the wake of the familiar white-and-yellow "butterflies" that go bobbing about, dropping eggs as they touch the leaves of the cabbage. This chewing insect is killed by poison; not one of the arsenates, however, but the safe insecticide, rotenone. The best way is dusting, with a strength of three-fourths of 1 per cent of rotenone, as most prepared dusts have. The first application should be made when the "butterflies" first come, then re-peated once or twice ten days apart.

Beetle Is Voracious **Enemy of Potatoes Dusting or Spraying** Will Control Menace

Ranking as the most serious threat to the grower of potatoes and other vegetables is the Colorado potato beetle, which is prevalent throughout many areas of the country.

The beetle is yellowish in color, stout bodied, about two-fifths of an inch in length and with wing covers bearing 10 longitudinal stripes. The larva or "slug" is soft - bodied,



about three - fifths of an inch in length. Late June when the potato plants begin to appear ground, the beetles

attack the foliage and lay their orange-colored eggs on the under side of the leaves.

The eggs hatch in a few days into voracious larvae which, after feed-ing for about 10 days leave the plants and enter the soil to complete their development. They emerge as sdult beetles by the latter part of July. A second brood is produced in August and adults of this generation winter in the soil. Both the larvae and adults are severe defoliators of the plants.

To rid the potatoes, tomatoes, egg plants, peppers, ground cherries and cabbage plants of the Colorado potato beetle, dust or spray with paris green, calcium arsenate or cryolite. Hand picking of the beetles and crushing of the egg masses is effective if done often.

One of the chief qualities of those whom you like and admire is a

quality known as tact.

Chances are that in your lifetime you've known very few men and women who were completely tactful. But haven't you known scores and scores who were not?

You know the kind I mean-men and women who always are saying untactful things that make you unhappy, that fill you with doubts about yourself, that give you moments when you wonder whether there is such a thing as a kindly person in the world.

Tact is without doubt the essence of charm, graciousness and of gentleness. But do you know what it is?

It's merely the perception of what to do or say under delicate or difficult circumstances. That's a definition of tact. But tact is much more than a definition really.

Tact is really a way of life. You can't be tactful unless you are thinking about other people, about what they like, about their rights and feelings more than you think about your own.

The real value of tact in your life is that it relieves tension and glosses over situations that might endange: friendships or cause you to lose self respect in the eyes of other persons If you have tact, you balance botl sides and never willfully offend an other person. '

At the risk of appearing untactful let me tell you that no one ever is born with tact, but everyone who ever had it acquired it. And you can acquire it just as easily and just as surely as anyone else can Do you want to know how?

I've already hinted at that earlier yourself. And that's the advice am going to give you now.

Think of that other person, try to see his viewpoint, try to see what his likes and dislikes are. Ask yourself what you would do if your respective roles were reversed. And then when you express yourself either by word or action, express yourself in wasel-fishness in the way you think he would like you to



GOP Farm Program Doubtful

ALTHOUGH the Republican steering committee in congress is demanding enactment of a long-range agriculture program before the election so that they may go to the farmers with a program of their own, there is considerable question as to whether the program can be pushed through this session.

On the senate side, Sen. George D. Aiken (Rep., Vt.), off the record, is willing to make modifications in his bill to please everyone in an effort to get it through the upper house by the middle of May.

In the house, however, the inside story is that the agricultural committee headed by Rep. Clifford Hope (Rep., Kas.), is shot through with jealousies and is pulling at cross-purposes due largely to the inter-committee fight over repeal of the margarine taxes and the further fact that Speaker Martin is sending some agricultural measures to the committee on banking and currency, by-passing the agricultural committee. The house banking and currency committee is headed by Rep. Jesse P. Wolcott (Rep., Mich.).

One indication that Congressman Hope may have little assurance of passing a new agricultural program was his introduction of a measure extending provisions of the Steagall act for another year but reducing drastically the percentage of some price supports on basic crops, particularly on cotton. Cotton is reduced from 921/2 to 90 per cent of parity, which is said to be a slap at southern and midwest cotton and soybean congressmen for overriding the committee and forcing the margarine tax repeal out on the floor of the house by petition after the agricultural committee had decided to bottle up all margarine repeal bills.

Concensus here is that the margarine advocates will win their fight in the house against the butter industry, backed by the Milk Producers federation, the Butter institute and the National Creameries association. Outcome in the senate is in doubt. Meanwhile there is talk of a compromise, with butter giving in on the color issue and with margarine advocates agreeing to sell margarine only in cylindrical packages.

Fee of Communism

Apropos the proposed anti-Communist legislation advanced by the house un-American activities committee, one of the early advocates of outlawing the Communist party in this country has stepped into the limelight. He is square-jawed, deepvoiced, affable Harry K. Sheppard of California who introduced measures for this purpose as early as 1941 and

again in 1947. Congressman Sheppard is one of those rare representatives in congress who seldom takes the floor. seldom is heard from publicly, but because of his 12 years in the house and membership on the powerful appropriations committee wields tremendous influence behind the

His reports for four years as chairman of the subcommittee on naval appropriations predicted the Communist aggression in Europe and Asia where he traveled extensively for the committee.

"Russia must be stopped," says, and he hopes the Marshall plan will do it.

"If it fails," he says, "in its purpose to stop Russia and to bring peace to the world then we will have justified this country in applying its full military power to preserve our form of government and way of living. And this is not a job only for government officials but is the job of every man and woman in the nation.

In the opinion of this reporter, backed up by events here and throughout the country, the President's warning before the American Society of Newspaper Editors that his 10-point anti-inflation program was more necessary now than when he first advocated it last November, is timely. The strain on the price structure by tax reduction, foreign aid and increased military expenditures appears to justify the President's premise. The fact remains, however, that the President's program, sound though it may be in principle, stands little chance in this congress for it would entail a peacetime economic regimentation which congress has no intention of considering.

Strike Settlement The scheme hatched up by Speaker

Joe Martin, Sen. Styles Bridges and John L. Lewis to settle the coal strike is backfiring. The inside story is that Lewis hatched up his own scheme, met privately with Bridges in advance, talked terms and agreed. Then Lewis gave out his cut and dried plan to Speaker Martin who appeared in the role of peacemaker. They called in Bridges, who already had the plan, and he came up with the agreement.
