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Good Prospects for Milk Plant at Lamesa

Plans for the establishment of a milk plant at Lamesa are well under way and are expected to be completed by last of the week. The plant will represent an investment of thousands of dollars and will mean much to Lamesa, Dawson county and this section of the South Plains.

A survey of the country is now being made registering cows and heifers and reports state that approximately 5,000 head have been registered to date. This is considered sufficient to guarantee the establishment of a milk plant at Lamesa. C. L. Tomlinson has been in charge of the survey in the O'Donnell district and states that he has registered five hundred and one thousand head will be registered in this district.

A. Practice "Fire Prevention" the year round!

The week of October 7-13, 1928, is "Fire Prevention Week" and is observed throughout the North American Continent.

Q. What is the object of Fire Prevention Week?

A. One of the main objects of Fire Prevention is to call attention to the vast annual fire loss which might have been prevented, and to emphasize the necessity of safeguarding life and property against future destruction.

Q. What means are employed to accomplish these results?

A. The means vary according to the hazard. This patriotic work of Fire Prevention has a two-fold significance and embraces first—the means of safeguarding existing properties or abolishing causes of fire; and in the second place providing means in new construction whereby fire may be confined to the space in which it originates.

Q. What is the object of the week?

The Lynn County Fair is in full blast as our forms are closed, and it is universally pronounced as one of the best, in so far as agricultural exhibits are concerned, ever held on the South Plains. It is unquestionably the best ever held at Tahoka; and the crowds have been large.

Besides the magnificent general display of farm and garden products, there were ten community exhibits, these were O'Donnell, T-Bar, Joe Bailey, Midway, Edith, Magnolia, New Lynn, Wilson, Dixie, and New Home. These various community exhibits were simply superb.

Most of them were artistically arranged and made a splendid show. Almost every variety of farm and garden products were to be seen in these exhibits. Cotton, sorghum grains, wheat, corn, potatoes, pumpkins, horehays, melons, and numerous varieties of garden vegetables, as fine as any country can produce made up the display. "It is as fine an agricultural exhibit as I have ever seen at the larger fairs," Taylor White said to the News man in discussing the fair.

Several home demonstration clubs also had splendid exhibits of their work, including all kinds of canned goods. There was an exhibit also of school work, of flowers, of curios, etc. A carnival company is on the grounds, furnishing entertainment for young and old alike. The races and the football games are also attracting good crowds.

The school parade at 1:30 Wednesday afternoon was a most attractive feature. Several decorated school floats from various school districts and hundreds of school children were in the line of march, the Tahoka Concert Band leading—Lynn County News.

GAS COMPANY MAY NOT MEET CONTRACT AT BROWNFIELD

Secretary J. E. Shelton of the Chamber of Commerce wired the West Texas Gas Company Monday that the people here as well as merchants who wished to handle gas stoves were very desirous of knowing just what they aimed to do toward complying with their franchise here. About 3 in the afternoon he received a reply, and it in substance was about as follows:

"At this time it appears that we will not be able to comply with our contract with the city of Brownfield." From the above we do not figure that it is not their intention to come here, but that they probably intend to take their good time, as they have up now forfeit if we understand aright, and of course there being no other gas companies in this section, they have no competition.

This has inconvenienced many home holders who have built new homes and providing no flues, expecting gas by the time, much heat was absolutely necessary. We also understand that one firm here now has a car of gas stoves on the track that will be about as much as to them as a rag catch would be to a one-legged man, for the time being anyway, and besides too much money to tie up for a length of time—Brownfield Herald.

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RURAL ROUTE NO. 3 WILL BE EXTENDED

**SECRETARY JARDINE URGES
 RURAL DISTRICTS TO OB-
 SERVE FIRE PREVENTION**

Because 30 per cent or more of the Nation's annual fire loss occurs on farms and in rural districts, Secretary of Agriculture, Jardine today made a special appeal to all rural communities to observe and practice the fundamentals of fire prevention which will be stressed throughout the United States during the week of October 7, designated as Fire Prevention Week by proclamation of the President of the United States.

"President Coolidge's proclamation referred to the interesting fact that cities, towns, and farming communities engaged in a constructive campaign to inculcate sound principles of fire prevention in the minds of thinking inhabitants, are accomplishing highly desirable and satisfactory results, but he aptly urged the need of translating this effort into further remedial action," said the Secretary.

"This appeal can not be too strongly stressed," said the Secretary, "because the annual loss of life and property in the rural districts is far greater than would prevail if concerted and continuous activity were directed against the hazard. Last year fires on farms and in rural districts took a toll of 3,500 lives and caused approximately \$150,000,000 damage to property, more than 30 per cent of the \$475,000,000 loss charged against fire in the entire United States. Although there has been a substantial improvement in reducing the number of dollars lost per \$100 insured, statistics indicate that farm barns and rural dwellings are appearing in the lists of larger losses more frequently than heretofore."

Spontaneous ignition of hay and other agricultural products, lightning defective chimneys and flues, careless use of matches and smoking, combustible roofs, careless use and storage of gasoline and kerosene, and faulty wiring installations and improper use of electrical appliances, are the seven principal causes of farm fires and constitute a hazard which must be coped with in an energetic and effective manner. Through its work on farm fire prevention and protection the department stands ready to be of every possible ser-

vice in this important field, said Secretary Jardine.

Farm fire losses, he concluded, are a direct challenge to everyone interested in the conservation of the Nation's wealth and resources, and it behooves every individual concerned to do his utmost, not only during Fire Prevention Week, but throughout the entire year in reducing this fire waste. The unstinting co-operation of the rural population in this worthwhile movement is necessary and strongly urged.

Thereupon the following election order was adopted.

It appearing that the City of O'Donnell has outstanding an unpaid warrant indebtedness, consisting of valid and legally binding obligations against said City, in the amounts and in the description hereinafter more fully set out, to wit:

City of O'Donnell Funding Warrants, dated January 10, 1928, numbered 1 to 20 inclusive, of the denomination of \$300 each, bearing interest at the rate of 6 per cent per annum, and maturing serially, numbers 5 to 20 of which are still outstanding, aggregating \$8,000.00.

City of O'Donnell Waterworks Ex-rants, dated January 10, 1928, numbered 1 to 4 inclusive, of the denomination of \$1,000 each, bearing interest at the rate of 6 per cent per annum, and maturing serially, aggregating \$4,000.00.

City of O'Donnell Drainage, Improvement Warrants, dated March 1st, 1926, numbered 2 to 5 inclusive, of the denomination of \$1,000.00 each, bearing interest at the rate of 6 per cent per annum and maturing serially, aggregating \$4,000.00.

City of O'Donnell aWaterworks Extension Warrants, dated August 16th, 1928, bearing 6 per cent interest, numbered 1 to 12 and maturing serially, aggregating \$12,000.00.

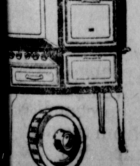

owners of their paving before the day for the vote arrives. These figures are made by competent engineers who have had much experience in engineering for paving as well as actual construction.

With the muddy condition of our streets during the recent rainy weather throughout August, and the bumpy condition all this time, the writer has about reached the conclusion that paved streets, though costing a great deal originally, are cheaper on the tax payer in the long run, but we are not very long on bond issues as a general thing. But if we can see where we have been saved money in maintenance, taxes that are always required on bad dirt streets, we are willing to make some sacrifice in order to get the permanent streets and save the maintenance tax.

No farmer can afford to pay taxes on idle land. Good woods management, therefore, has come to be a matter of economic necessity on those parts of the farm which are in woodlands and are better for tree growing than for cultivated crops.

The first essential in curing pork is to make sure that the carcass is thoroughly cooled. The center of the hams of freshly killed hogs should be chilled to between 34 and 40 degrees within 24 or 48 hours, at which time the carcass is ready to cut up and put in cure.

A good, inexpensive treatment for "dusting" or disintegration of the surface, of indoor concrete floors, which frequently occurs because of poor materials or workmanship, is the application of commercial sodium silicate (water glass). For this purpose the sodium silicate should be diluted, 1 gallon to 4 gallons.

Two glass measuring cups, one for wet and one for dry ingredients, are a great convenience in cake making. A small pan that fits into the top of the teakettle, has many uses. It serves as a double boiler for small quantities of food to be cooked or reheated, and will be found handy for melting shortening.
