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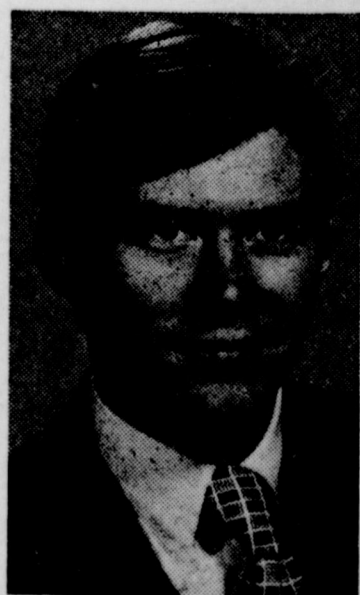

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Bird Lore

by Lafayette Stankewitz

It's purple martin time and a number of mature birds have already returned. They have been in our area since Feb. 19 and have begun to build nests.

Their nests consist of twigs, straw, and are lined with leaves. They are usually flat and are protected in front of the entrance by a wall of mud. It is quite easy to tell the difference between the martin nest and the English sparrow's since the sparrow's is large and bulky.

Tear out the sparrow nests once a week, for the martins don't seem to mind, even if you have to lower the box.

As for the starling, I don't think he will build in an aluminum house, and chances are he won't build in your wooden house if it is painted white or aluminum color inside. Also you might try tacking or gluing a piece of aluminum on the wall opposite the entrance.

Martins do not drink from bird baths, but will fly a long distance for water from a lake or pond. They fly low over the water and drink on the wing.

Keep a supply of broken eggshells above the ground on a flat surface. Martins feed on the wing and seldom come to the ground. They eat the eggshells up to the fingernail size and even feed them to their young.

If you have a new house and as yet do not have a pair of martins, don't despair because the young birds—year old—have not arrived and may come as late as in May.

Martins are a beneficial species and need our help, but let's not forget that other song birds are valuable and interesting too. Why not put out a bird bath this year so they will have an abundant supply of fresh water!

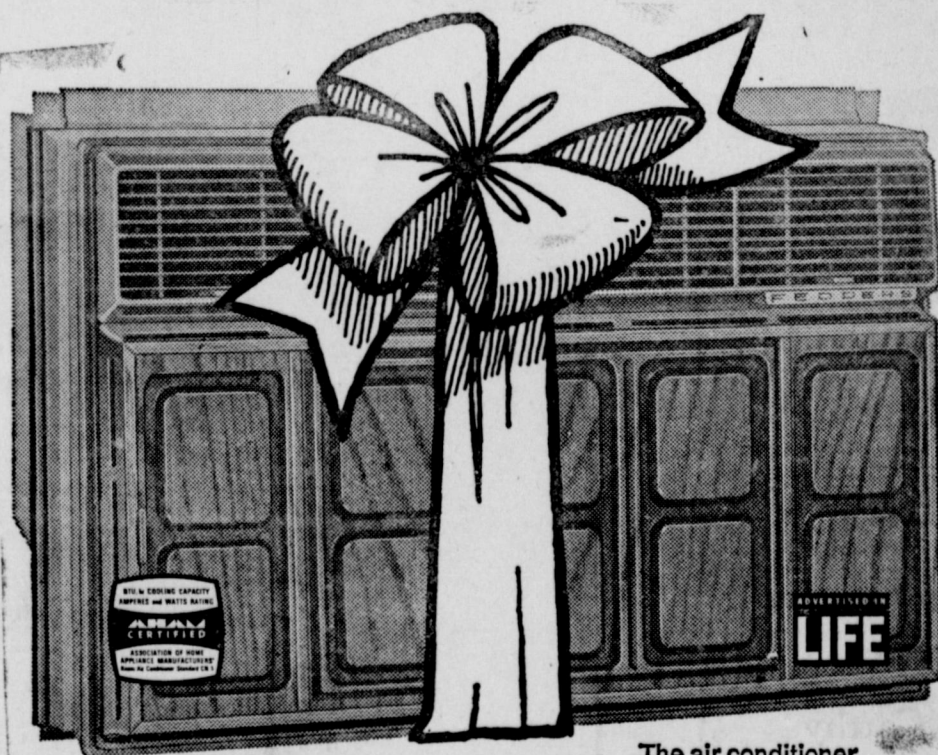
