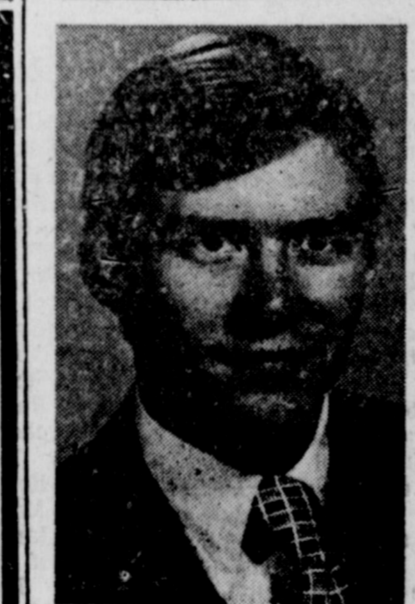
Baby Shower

Bird Lore

Many of you have told me that the Cardinal or Redbird is your favorite. I really believe it is mine also.

The Cardinal is that flash of red you see with crest, big conical bill and black face. The female is brown, always has some patches of red and a very conspicuous red bill.

Cardinals are fond of sunflower seeds and come readily to window sills and feeders where they are offered, often being the first birds to arrive in the morning and the last to leave at night.

The baby Cardinals cannot digest seeds until they are several weeks old. Fortunately the father is a skilled dietitian by instinct. At first he feeds the babies caterpillars and grasshoppers. Shortly afterwards he adds fruit to the menu. Only after the babies reach the proper age does their very parent feed them seeds.

If the female of your happy Cardinal disappears and you see the male caring for the family, don't fret. Mama hasn't met with disaster, but has turned the chores over to Father Cardinal while she incubates a second clutch of eggs.

We hear and read many stories about the Redbird. Last year while visiting my Mother in Abilene, I saw a Cardinal feeding a young cowbird as his very own. I'm sure most of you are familiar with the Brown-headed Cowbird that lay their eggs in other birds' nests.

The Cardinal is one of the most familiar birds of the Southern states. They are likely to be attracted to residential areas planted with fruit-bearing shrubs or trees.

The next time you hear a clear whistle like "Cheer, cheer, cheer" and see a flash of red you will be able to identify it as the Cardinal.

City Council

Checking the progress toward completion of the water system improvements project occupied a major place on the agenda of the City Council meeting Monday evening. No further delays are foreseen in laying the pipeline, and pipe is being delivered to the construction site at the Wichita Falls end of the work.

Every place the line crosses a road the opening will be made by boring, and there will be no interference with traffic. At present boring is being done at the Seymour highway crossing.

Payment was made to Riewe and Wischmeyer for engineering service to date on the following contracts:

A. Transmission line from Wichita Falls to here: \$27,655.73
B. Water distribution lines in the city, \$9,586.73
C. Includes cost of ground storage tank which will have 500,000 gallon capacity, and the pumping station, \$12,932.41
D. Elevated storage tank on Johnson road, \$88,217.06

Total engineering fees for the complete job will be approximately \$77,000.

Residential taps were allowed on the lands belonging to Pastuszek, George, Smith and Falnes.

Ordinances for rezoning the following places for light industry passed the second reading: Nos. 115 and 116, location of James Auto Repair and what was formerly the Sunrail Laundry; and part of Block D, Texas addition, for a Dairy Queen business with parking space for 50 or more cars.

Frank H. Donovan, father of Mrs. Wynell Calhoun of Iowa Park, died Friday in Chillicothe after a long illness.
