WANTED: ONE PRESIDENT

Imagine for a moment that you are a member of the board of directors of a very large organization. Not only do you receive no salary for your service, you pay an annual fee for your distinguished post.

The time has come to hire an executive and some administrative assistants, and you want the best personnel available because your company has many subsidiaries involved in such enterprises as space research, the aircraft industry, education, agriculture, medicine, law, defense, transportation and world trade.

The person in charge will have to deal with many large-scale problems—inflation, deficit spending, pollution, disease, poverty, hunger, unemployment, labor demands, strikes, prejudice, corruption and threats from competitors.

The job is one of great responsibility, power and dignity. It will involve not only exhausting hours of paperwork in the office but also extensive travel, public speaking, interviews, conferences with visitors, consultations with assistants, hiring and firing employees, and an elaborate social life.

You want the best because you believe your organization not only requires the best but deserves it. You have faith in the entire operation and know that even with all its problems and weaknesses, it is second to none. You are aware that if it should fail, your competition will engulf the many small organizations now struggling for survival.

And so you run ads in major newspapers and magazines, on television and radio:

Wanted: One President. Must be 35 or older, a natural born citizen of the United States and a resident for at least 14 years. Salary \$200,000. Expenses paid. Completely furnished residence with household staff and servants, airplanes and crew, cabin cruisers and crew, custom built limousine with chauffeur, bodyguards, weekend retreat. Varied duties, no experience necessary. Term of office 4-8 years.

Then you have second thoughts about the ad. It makes the job sound very attractive, perhaps too easy to get. There will be too many applicants who fit those simple requirements and who will want only the power and the glamorous benefits.

Think. Do we administer a qualifying test? No, that comes after the hiring. How about college records? No, college is not required. Should we check with previous employers? That wouldn't help much, considering that this job is unlike any other in the world.

The applicants that come in, give the applicants that come in, give each one a fair chance at the job, then narrow the field to the two or three best prospects, those who are most seriously about wanting the job, reasonably well qualified, and best liked by the board.

From them we can vote on the one who seems the best choice. Of course there's no assurance that we'll elect the right one, but this is a democracy, after all; the will of the majority must prevail. We'll just have to take that chance and trust the winner to do what's right.

started Wednesday with an official ribbon cutting by Chamber of Commerce members and attended by many White's officials.

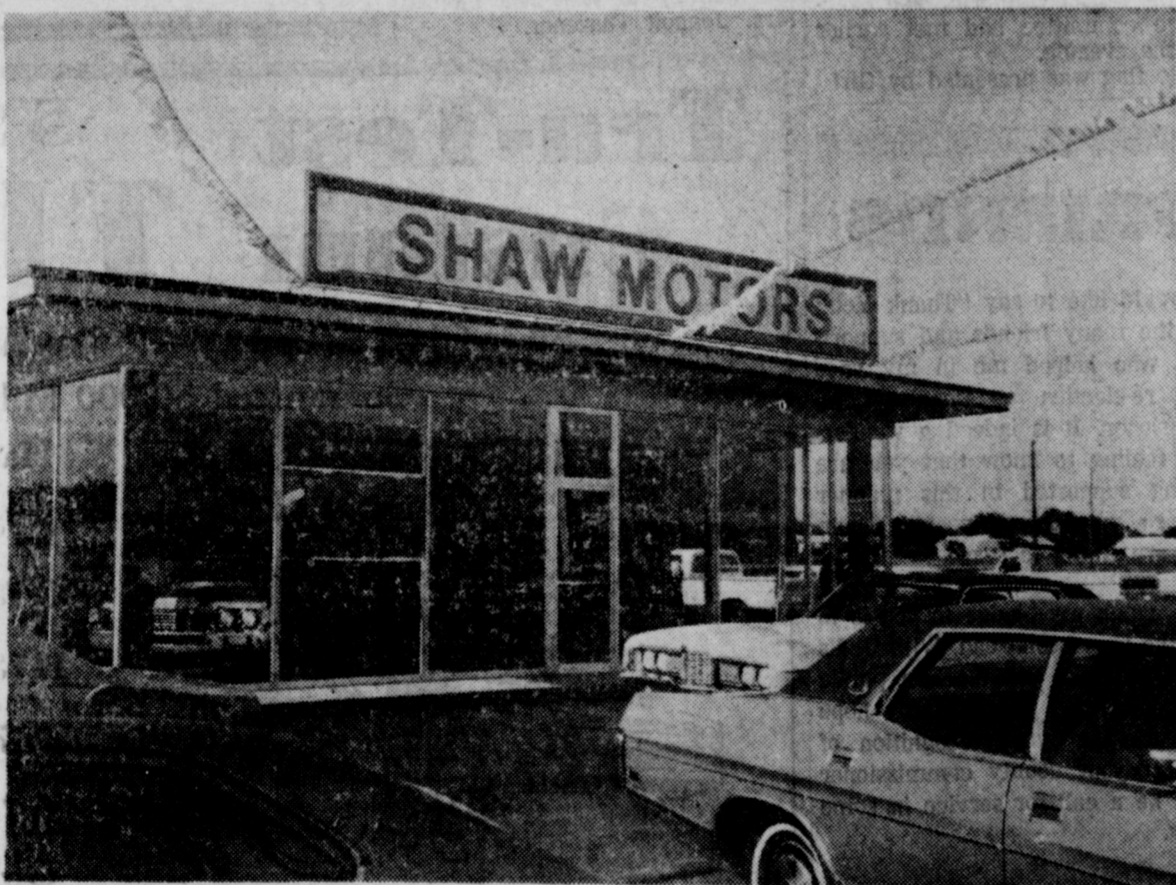
Here to help with their celebration will be Miss Wichita Falls—known locally as Beverly Klunker.

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Wichita-Archer-Clay Baptists Set Youth Conference in W.F.

The 1972 statewide missions thrust projected by the 1.9-million member Baptist General Convention of Texas will be felt locally when the churches of Wichita-Archer-Clay Baptist Association come together Tuesday night, May 16, for their Missions-Stewardship-Youth Conference.

The session will begin at 7:00 p.m. in Highland Heights church in Wichita Falls. One of more than 100 similar meetings being held in Texas, the conference will feature leaders from the Missions and Stewardship divisions of the state convention and state leadership who are involved with the various mission programs of the BGC.

The meeting will include a session to acquaint church leaders with the challenge of biblical stewardship and the resources available for designing a program of stewardship development.

"There is a bold challenge for growth in Christian giving which is equal to the new potential challenge for growth in Christian giving which is equal to the new potential made possible by prosperity," said Dr. Cecil Ray, director of the Stewardship Division of BGC of Texas.

"Greatness in giving is the keynote and such greatness in giving is necessary if Baptists are to be equal to their mission task in the '70's," Ray added.

The meeting will also include a conference on missions and personal involvement in mission ministries. Purpose is the acquaint churches with mission projects and the available resources for doing their work. "During 1972, Texas Baptists will be giving priority attention to churches in crisis, metropolitan center and to youth.

"The opportunity of today's church centers in its ability to demonstrate love for people. The message of the church is heard best when the church is involved in ministering to the needs of the people in the community."

An added thrust of the conference will be a Youth Rally which will confront young people with the biblical concept of stewardship and missions designed to motivate their personal commitment and involvement.

The Rev. Mr. Kenneth Flowers of Iowa Park First church is the moderator of Wichita-Archer-Clay Baptist association.

Formal Installation Set for New Minister at I.P. Christian Church

An installation service for the Rev. Mr. Keith D. Pierce, minister of Iowa Park Christian church, will be conducted there on Sunday, May 14, at 3:00 p.m.

Mr. Pierce began his ministry here Feb. 1, coming from Odessa. The family which includes his wife Sallie; and daughter Vicki, 15, a freshman in IPHS, reside at 509 West Texas.

Born in St. Francis, Kans., Keith has an A.B. degree from McPherson (Kans.) college and a B.D. from Phillips university, Enid, Okla.

Former pastorates include Wellington, Kans., El Paso and Odessa, where he was associate minister of the First Christian church in each city; and as minister of Los Altos Christian church at Albuquerque, N.M.

Guest speaker for the occasion will be Dr. Kenneth L. Teegarden, executive minister of the Disciples of Christ in Texas, from Ft. Worth.

Prior to coming to his present position July 1, 1969, Teegarden was assistant to the general minister and president of Disciples of Christ. His main assignment was as administrative secretary of the Commission on Brotherhood Restructure. He has held other important positions in the church, presently serving on numerous Board of Christian church organizations. He is also a delegate to the General Assembly of the National Council of Churches in the U.S.A.

For seven years Teegarden was executive minister of the Arkansas Christian churches. He served as president of the Arkansas Council of Churches and helped bring into existence the Greater Little Rock Conference on Religion and Race.

Teegarden has held pastorates in Fort Smith, Ark., Vernon and Texas City.

Born in Cushing, Okla., he has B.A. and M.A. degrees from Phillips university and B.D. from TCU, Ft. Worth. In 1963 he received the honorary D.D. degree from Phillips university.

Kenneth and his wife Wanda have two sons David and Kirk.

Other men who will participate in the service will be the Rev. Mr. Don Youngblood of Iowa Park United Methodist church and

president of the Ministerial Alliance; the Rev. Mr. David Stout of Burkburnett Christian church and president of District 19 Disciples of Christ in Texas; Dr. Eugene W. Brice of First Christian church of Wichita Falls and president-elect of Disciples of Christ in Texas.

Rollin Roberts is chairman of the general board, and Rollins Woodall is chairman of the pulpit committee of Iowa Park Christian church.

A reception honoring the Pierce family and special guest will be held in Fellowship Hall following the service.

School Board Your

For more than five hours Tuesday evening, members of Iowa Park school board deliberated trying to decide the best solutions to the many issues confronting the district. Present were T. C. Berry, Hoyt Watson, Delbert Catlin, Pete Koonce, Stanley Williamson, C. E. Myers, Robert Wilcox; and school personnel Faris Nowell, Harold Cowley, Bill Steger.

Listening in were Mrs. M. L. Hines and Bob Hamilton.

May 23 was set for opening of bids on the fieldhouse to be constructed as soon as possible. It is to be a 60x100 foot building in the middle of the space west of the goal posts at the stadium.

It was voted to give cafeteria employees a 10% raise in salary beginning Sept. 1, the first in more than two years. Supervisors will receive \$247.50 a month and others, \$1.75 an hour.

It seems now that all Valley View pupils in first through the fourth grades will come to Iowa Park and all fifth and sixth grade students will attend classes at Valley View.

A roto-rooter priced at \$695.85 was ordered from Hornsby Heavy Hardware of Wichita Falls.

\$255 was allowed to buy materials for painting and repairing pens and barns at the agriculture department school project.

Other measures passed after study provided that:

The board release the \$7000 bond pledged for security on the school funds held by State National Bank.

SAFB be offered the opportunity to bring 60 people to be our guests at each home regular season football game during the fall.

Cheerleaders be allowed to sell advertising in football programs to pay their tuition to cheerleader school.

Frank Guyette's Iowa Park Air Conditioning and Heating Co. bid for air conditioning maintenance be accepted.

Armored Roofing Co. bid of \$1,963 for repairing roof at Kidwell be accepted.

M. D. McDaniel be hired to replace steam pipe repairs at the Junior High at an estimated cost of \$1,621, using galvanized pipe and traps.

Little League baseball be given a 10-foot section of the south bleachers at Junior High to be moved to Burnett Park; and that a representative from the school board meet with the City Council at its May 22 session regarding the opening of a street.

Quite some time was spent in considering request of the choir and hand classes that a partition be made in the band-music practice hall so both groups could rehearse at the same time. As it now is, even though there is room for both, it is disturbing. The board voted to investigate cost and feasibility of such a project. It would of necessity be a sound-proof partition.

It was decided that transfer students from City View pay the same tuition as is paid for transfer to Wichita Falls system.

Carpets at Valley View and some at high school need cleaning and it was revealed that an industrial cleaning machine is very expensive. Other methods are to be considered.

Lighting system at Junior High is in need of repair or renewal. Only one-seventh of the required amount of light for reading or study without injury to the eyes is possible at present, especially on cloudy days. Electrical contractors are being contacted regarding this problem.

Bill Steger reported 75% participation of the student body in the school lunch program. He also said about 92% of taxes have been collected. He believes in another month or two 95% will have been paid for the year.

It is likely here will have to be a called meeting of the board before the next regular time, to hear reports and bids and make decisions.

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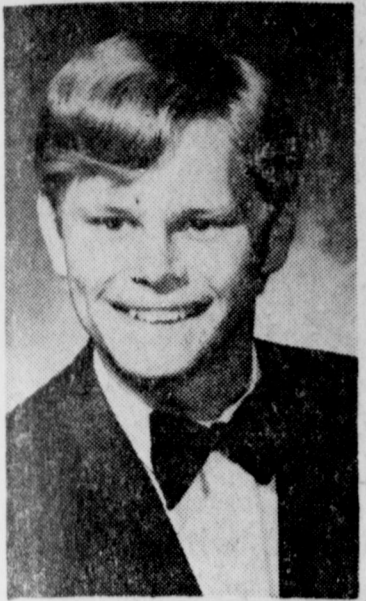

Gas Co. Asks

Raise in Rate

Lone Star Gas Co. has asked the City Council to increase local residential and commercial natural gas rates by approximately 10% to enable the company to earn a reasonable rate of return on the fair value of properties used to serve the public.

The application listed increased cost of buying gas, higher property and equipment costs, increased costs for employee compensation, higher interest rates on borrowed money and increased taxes as primary reasons for the income deficiency.

Mike Schweikhard, manager of the Iowa Park distribution office, stated, "Lone Star has a commitment to compete for supplies of natural gas to keep its reserves in a favorable position. The gas cost adjustment portion of the application will help Lone Star maintain its gas supply position and assure our customers of gas service for the future."

Approval of the application would increase the average residential monthly gas bill by about 76 cents.

Lone Star serves more than 1900 meters in Iowa Park.

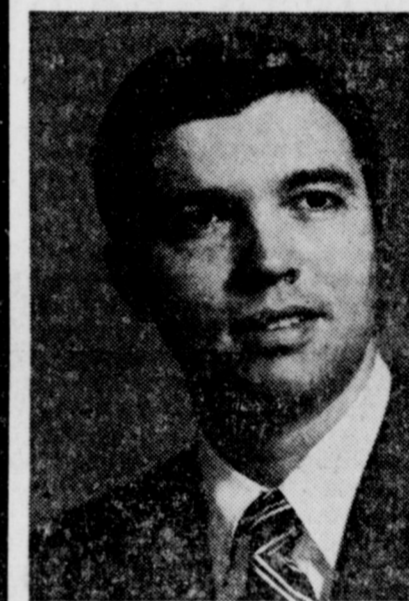

Bird Lore

"Of all the birds in the world, if you could have only one, which would you choose?" a birding friend asked. "You know it would have to be the mockingbird," she continued, and thus summed up the emotions many Americans feel for the mockingbird.

The mocker hardly needs description since it is so well known. Briefly, it is a 10-inch gray and white bird, with the white confined to the wings and tail. The underparts are a duller tattle-tale grayish white. Its eye is yellow. The bill is dark.

The mockingbird, the catbird, and the brown thrasher, the reddish brown bird many of you have asked me about, are known as our mimic thrushes. The brown thrasher is often miscalled a brown thrush, probably because it resembles a thrush, being heavily streaked on the breast. The title probably comes from the bird's habit of thrashing its tail as it runs along the ground.

The catbird is not a resident of this area although I have seen an occasional one. It is slate-gray with a black cap and chestnut color under the tail. The catbird came by its name because of its catlike "Meow" calls. All are long tailed and all three are excellent musicians.

The mockingbird is so popular that he has been chosen the official bird of five states, including Texas. This talented singer is capable of imitating nearly any bird's song plus various other sounds. In fact he is such a persistent singer that he sometimes proves himself unpopular when he sings at midnight and disturbs one's sleep.

As for me, I can take it and cannot imagine being without this beautiful bird.
