ATTENTION VOTERS:
 Before you vote for Constable, are you aware just what the job consists of? In trying to determine if there was any reason another man should have the job, we investigated and learned the following facts:

There is no clear-cut line between the responsibilities of the Constable and those of the other law enforcement agencies. In a small community which does not have a hired police department, the Constable would be the main law officer, in co-operation with the Sheriff's Department. However, in a town such as ours, where a police department exists, there could be much friction if the Constable chose to disregard the authority of that department, or that of the Sheriff's Department. Therefore the Constable is expected to be available when needed, but not in command. His main duties consist of delivering subpoenas, citations, etc and handling evictions and other minor, but unpleasant tasks.

He is not in a position to single-handedly wipe out crime, and any attempt to do so would be an infringement on the other law officers' duties. The salary is small and the hours are irregular.

With these things in mind, we have tried to honestly compare the past record of Henry Jones with the promises of Bill Sargent.

Mr. Sargent says if he is elected he will clean up our youth problems. He has implied that Mr. Jones is responsible for all the ills in our community. At the same time, he says he will cooperate with the other law officers. Yet he is openly antagonistic toward the Sheriff's department, and co-operation there is unlikely. Co-operation with the city police would prevent his assuming the role of one-man crusader.

Henry Jones has accepted the limitations of his authority in full co-operation, and still has been ready and willing to assist when needed. He has been a servant of the people in the truest sense.

Mr. Jones has no other employment. The salary he receives as Constable is his livelihood. Yet, from this salary he has always tithed, to the First Baptist Church, where he is a faithful member.

We have difficulty understanding why Bill Sargent has gone to

such lengths to gain the office when he is employed in a job which already pays him twice the salary of Constable. It is understood that he would continue in this job, leaving the office of Constable to his "spare time." We wonder if he is seeking the prestige of a badge and gun. If so, that is the wrong reason to seek office.

We find it distasteful that Mr. Sargent has offered a part of his salary to youth organizations as a reward for voting for him. It occurs to us that, though the amount may seem large, when spread over a period of four years, it would be no more than Mr. Jones' title. It's up to the individual to decide which is more worthy.

Mr. Sargent claims five years experience as a peace officer. Actually, he held a courtesy card from the Sheriff's Department those five years, and that is the extent of his experience.

Mr. Sargent tried to persuade Ed Henson to back him following Ed's defeat in the primary. When he failed, he publicly assailed Mr. Henson for backing Mr. Jones and asking his supporters to do so.

All things considered, we can see no reason for trading the older, dedicated experience of Henry Jones for the promises of Bill Sargent.

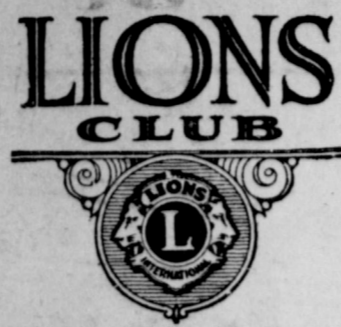
TO THE VOTERS:

Mack C. Fuqua, superintendent of the Texas A & M Vegetable Research Station at Munday, was the program when Noon Lions met Tuesday at Jean's Restaurant for lunch. Introduced by Virgil Woodfin, Fuqua showed slides of the vegetables being tested at Munday, where the station has been completed recently.

Mr. Fuqua pointed out that the function of the station is to assist producers all of the surrounding area, not just around Munday. He is interested in discovering just what marketable vegetables can be grown and harvested in North Texas.

He pointed out a few items of value already discovered by his group of 6 researchers and 18 staff employees:

Carrots planted in mid-summer can be grown and over-wintered in the ground with no spoilage from low temperatures.

Cabbage can be produced to be gathered from May through January.

Broccoli can be grown to be harvested from September until the end of the year.

Sweet corn can be a good commercial crop.

Test plots pictured by Fuqua included southern peas, green beans, cucumbers, cantaloups, watermelons, squash, cauliflower, kohlrabi, cabbage, beets, turnips, onions, and many fruits.

Of course the quality of irrigation water will be of great importance in finding the suitable vegetables for any area. And the type of soil is equally important.

War Dead Honored

John Maples, minister of the church of Christ, gave the meditation Sunday afternoon at the annual memorial service in Highland cemetery. "Memorials" was the theme of his talk. He stated that there are many kinds of memorials mentioned in the Bible, but he made special mention of the Passover Lamb as the one typical of love and sacrifice.

"The Spirit of 1776 as embodied in the quotation 'Give me liberty or give me death' is one of the memorials to our country; and the Gettysburg address commemorating the valor of those who died for our country was another.
