A NEW LOOK AT THE WAR

Hoan—pronounced like Juan—is my friend. The fact that our paths crossed in summer school isn't so strange except that not only is she Vietnamese but North VN. Her father had been a government dignitary until the Communist takeover, when the whole family moved south to Saigo.

Hoan's husband, also originally from the north, was a captain in the South Vietnamese air force. He had been sent to several US bases for fighter pilot training, so Hoan attended nearby colleges working on a chemistry degree.

She wasn't the typical peasant refugee shown in tv news reports. Anything but that. In the short time I knew Hoan, I discovered that hers was a wealthy family and that a former president of South Vietnam had attended her wedding. She showed me the photographs.

No, Hoan was no peasant, nor was she old. But she looked old and tired. She spoke of her family in Saigon and of how they had learned to sleep through bursts of rockets. She said that food was expensive—\$6 for a chicken, that people were starving, that they had grown up hating the French, and now the Communists, and that one day she hoped to work for an American oil company in Saigon.

When her husband returned to take over leadership of a fighter squadron, he had insisted that Hoan remain in America. He had said that if conditions got really bad he could escape in a plane, but if she were there neither would have a chance of reaching safety.

Hoan hated the war. Her friends were hungry, her family was separated, and with every mission, her husband fired on the land and at people he had once loved. I'll never forget the look on her face when she said, "I wish—we all wish—for one big bomb to fall. Even if we all were killed, at least the war would end. We are so tired." Hoan knew that one big bomb would not end that war or any other, but saying it seemed to help.

I saw her only once after that. She waited desperately to go home despite the dangers there, and I'm sure she did return.

Thanks to a chance meeting, I have had a personal interest in Vietnam for almost five years now. Hoan, wherever you are, I hope peace will come soon—for all of us.

## Andersons Host Meeting for the Handicapped

A small but important meeting was held in Iowa Park last Friday. The gathering was in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Homer Anderson, 304 W. Washington.

It was important especially to handicapped persons in general and to the blind in particular.

The blind and visually impaired have banded together as many of their number as possible to form an organization called Beacon Lights. Members want to help themselves and others whenever and wherever the needs arise.

Also interested in this purpose are some other organizations. And some of these were represented in Friday evening's meeting. Ken Meiske of Austin, facilities specialist with the State Commission for the Blind, headed the list. He was here to see and discuss what can be done to broaden, strengthen and unite all efforts to help solve the problems of visually limited persons in the Wichita Falls area.

Also present were three members of the Wichita Falls branch of the State Commission for the Blind: C. A. King, counselor; George West, home teacher; and Con'e Cotten, who works with visually handicapped children.

And Richard Webber, director of Opportunity Workshop in Wichita Falls, represented his clientele.

Problems of the handicapped are enormous and progress is slow. Of all the points under consideration, one seemed to be outstanding: This is that the community be made aware of the situation and to get behind it and help to do something.

The people who are visually limited may seem to be a small minority but the problems are not small to the Beacon Lights. Representing this group were the steering committee and the information and publicity committee. Jim Reich of Wichita Falls is president. He has two other steering committee members: LeRoy Blackburn and Isaac Gardner, both of Wichita Falls. Information and publicity members are Lola Anderson, Jewel Reich, Jess Bristler, Archie Tomlinson.

Meiske, along with King, West, Webber and Miss Cotten, gave assurance they will do everything possible to help the cause.

One of the ways that Beacon Lights members are trying to help themselves establish a treasury, it will not only help buy light bulbs, it will help buy light bulbs if a member asks you to financially for you to purchase some, and it will make it known that someone cares and wants to help Beacon Lights help themselves. ## Bank Adopts Squadron

Pres. Cleo A. Nipper has completed the plan he has long contemplated to bring Iowa Park and Sheppard AFB into close business and social relations. This planning bore fruit Monday when the State National Bank became sponsors of the 3753rd Student Squadron of the Base.

Introduced by Col. Floyd Taylor (ret.), founder of the adoption program which has been active in Wichita Falls for many years, Capt. David Coryell, squadron commander, officially allowed his unit to accept adoption by the Iowa Park.

Taylor said this was the 49th such adoption and the first by a firm or organization outside of Wichita Falls.

Six students and about 10 permanent personnel of SAFB took dinner Monday at Jean's Restaurant. Gen. Robt. L. Petit, commanding general of the Training Command at Sheppard, accompanied representatives of the 53d squadron. The students identified themselves and told their places of original residence. They ran from all over the East coast to the West extremes of the continent.

Nipper assured the fellows they always will find a welcome in our town.

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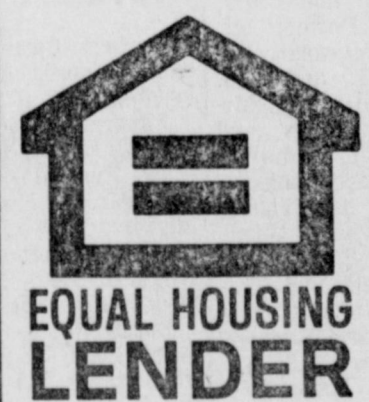

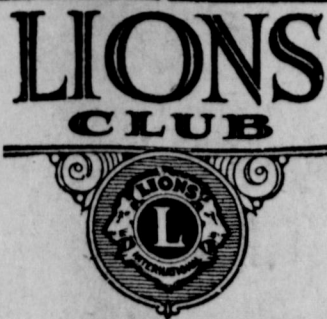
Iowa Park Garden club has contacted the state highway department requesting permission to assist them in a beautification project.

**June 2-3 Third annual All-Girl Rodeo, Kaufman.** In 1971 this event drew an even 100 contestants.

**June 2-10 The 150th Anniversary celebration of the founding of Fort Bend County, Rosenberg/Richmond.** The observance commemorates the establishment, in 1822, of a dozen of Stephen F. Austin's original colony. Parades, festivals, tours of historical homes and sites, the wearing of 1820's-period clothes, and religious heritage observances are included in the activities. A historical pageant, involving 400-500 costumed players, will highlight the event.

**June 9-10 Folk Fete, Cameron.** Eight ethnic groups participate with music, dancing and foods of their native countries. This year, a fiddlers contest, domino tournament, beauty contest and arts and crafts exhibits are among

the activities.

**June 10-11 First World Championship Slingshot Matches, Carrizo Springs.** Junior and senior divisions with trophies awarded to division champions and runner-ups. Shoot-out between junior and senior winners determines world championship. Slingshot stocks, or "Y's," may be of any material, but official ammunition (furnished) must be used in the contest. Contestant entry fee is \$2, spectator admission \$1. Preliminaries Saturday afternoon, finals Sunday afternoon.

**June 10-17, Texas Water Safari, San Marcos to Seadrift.** The world's richest canoe race (\$4,400 cash) and the world's toughest canoe race (413 miles of paddling with no help enroute) will observe its 10th anniversary. Last year 27 teams entered and five finished. Many more are expected this year from all over the United States and Canada, both amateur and professional canoe racers. Highlights include the start of the race in San Marcos' City Park, 9:30 a.m. June 10, and the end-of-the-race festival in San Marcos the following Saturday. The festival features canoe jousting, turtle chasing, frog jumping and other aquatic sports. Spectators can follow the race through Luling, Gonzales, Cuero and Victoria to its conclusion in Seadrift.

## Bird Lore

Over the weekend my family and I visited in Oklahoma and took the Talimena Scenic Drive from Talihina to Mena, Ark., in the Ouachita National Forest. The road is located on the ridge of Winding Stair and Rich Mountain.

There are miles of some of the most beautiful scenic mountains in the world from approximately 2,000 feet. I did not have a checklist of birds in that area but know there must be many. The Indigo Bunting, a small finch, rich blue all over, was the one that excited me most. Although this bird is quite common there, I never had seen it before.

The Eastern Bluebird is also seen often, and I saw a pair claiming a nesting site in an abandoned woodpecker cavity. This blue-backed bird with red breast is a permanent resident of Wichita county, although it isn't seen around our city homes. It prefers farmlands and open country with scattering trees.

Another bird that I saw on a small pond was the little Blue Heron. This long-legged wading bird has a slate-blue body with a dark maroon neck and slender dark legs. This bird's favorite meal is crawfish and he has no problem finding them in the area.

The Green Heron is the smallest of our herons. It looks quite dark at a distance, almost crow-like, but the back is greenish blue at close range, and the neck is chestnut-brown. The legs are comparatively short, and yellow or orange in color. Though not always seen, he raises a dark, shaggy crest when alarmed. The young have a dark back but the chest and neck are brown and white streaked.

The Great Blue is often mis-called "crane." It stands four feet tall and is the largest heron normally found in Texas. It is blue-gray in color and whiter about the head and neck.

These stork-like wading birds can be seen on our lakes and ponds. The Great Blue is a permanent resident, the Green a summer visitor and the Little Blue a summer resident of Wichita county.

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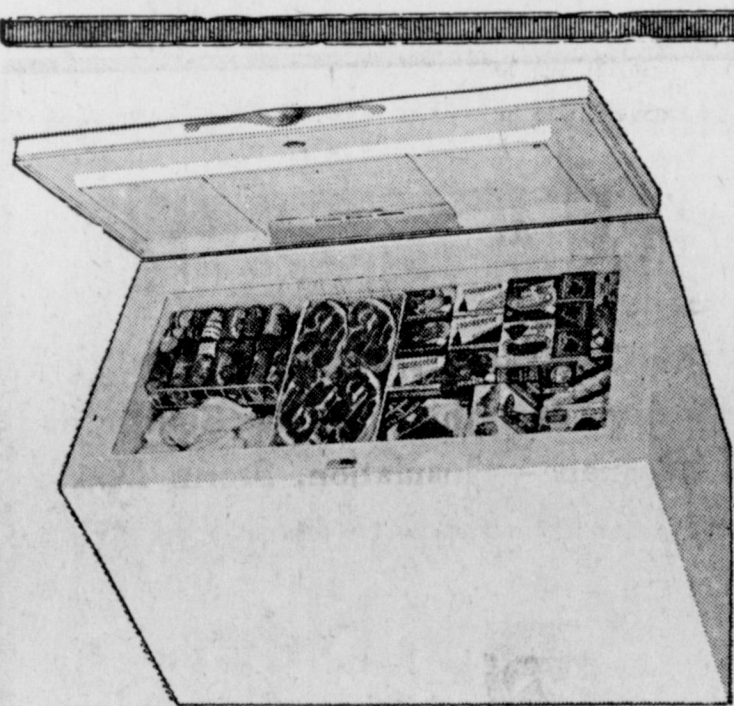

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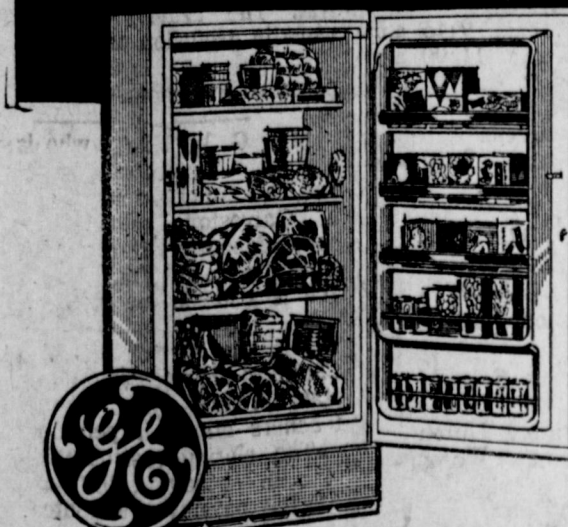
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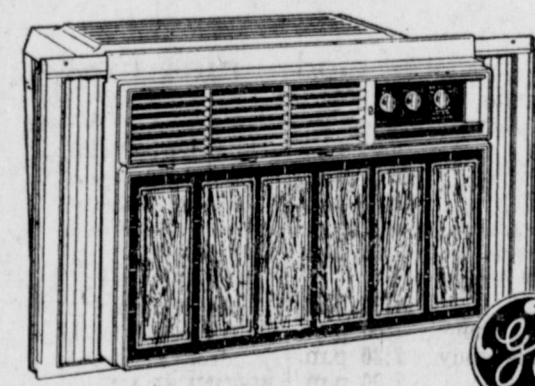
