## \$1,000,000 Bike Rides Planned

An invitation was issued this week by Mrs. Jim Dyer to "get involved" in the ESA Million-Dollar Bike Ride for the St. Jude Children's research hospital. She also announced that the local bike trip will be held on Wednesday, June 21.

Participants will leave the City Library at 8:00 a.m. and go to Valley View elementary school—and back to the Library, with check points at Burnett Park at the Wichita river.

The ride is part of a nationwide event being sponsored by Epsilon Sigma Alpha, women's international service organization, to secure funds for the research institution founded by entertainer Danny Thomas.

Louis' Jewelry has donated a watch to be given to the rider who has the most money pledged and collected for the hospital. The watch is on display in their window.

St. Jude's, which celebrates its 10th anniversary this year, is best known for its significant advances in the treatment of childhood leukemia.

Volunteers are asked to ride at least part of the 22-mile route and to solicit sponsorship of community citizens who are willing to pledge a contribution for each mile covered by the volunteer.

The Million-Dollar Bike Ride will involve some 70,000 riders in more than 500 communities.

A coast-to-coast caravan of riders will be given a farewell party on June 30 on national television with Marlo Thomas, star of "That Girl," leading the way.

They will leave Washington on July 3 and travel westward, stopping in as many cities as possible to add local bike-ride returns to a growing fund. The national trip will end on the West Coast where a check for the total amount will be presented to Danny.

"We hope young and old will join in this great project. This is



an opportunity for everyone to get involved in helping to build a better world. Children being treated at St. Jude really need our help," said Mrs. Donald Lucy, co-chairman and local ESA "Danny Girl."

Pledge cards can be picked up at Settle Drug, Junior High building or Texas Electric office on Thursday or Friday.

The hospital was founded by Danny Thomas in Memphis to fulfill a pledge to St. Jude Thaddeus patron saint of the hopeless—a pledge made in 1937. At that time Thomas was an unemployed entertainer. In desperation he pledged to build a meaningful shrine to St. Jude if ever he found his place in life.

Danny appealed to the youth of America to help him raise money to build the hospital, and now it

depends on young people to support this research institution in which pediatricians and biological scientists seek cures for diseases of children.

The hospital recently announced it has achieved a 15% cure rate for children afflicted with acute lymphocytic leukemia. Research is being conducted into the areas of childhood cancer, muscle disorders, endocrine problems and nutrition.

Patients are admitted to St. Jude upon referral of the family physician, regardless of race or creed; and there is no charge for treatment, and in fact, no payment for treatment will be accepted.

**Bird Lore**

"Birding" is great in the Wichita Mountain Wildlife Refuge and surrounding lakes. Marion Cleveland, Erna Kibbler and myself arrived in Lawton at daybreak Saturday morning and joined the Lawton-Ft. Sill Bird club on a very exciting field trip.

Total number of species sighted were 35 with each of our group adding four or more new ones to our life list. Some interesting ones were the blue-gray gnatcatcher, black and white warbler, redbellied woodpecker, indigo bunting, eastern bluebird, Carolina chickadee, tufted titmouse, Mississippi kite, great blue heron, red eyed vireo, painted bunting, eastern phoebe, Carolina wren, rufous crowned sparrow, and a ruby throated hummingbird.

I believe the birds that excited me most, although I have seen them a number of times, was a pair of blue grosbeaks. The purplish-blue of the male was so beautiful as he flitted from one weedstalk to another.

This organization meets the 2nd Saturday of each month for field trips somewhere in Comanche county—to the Ft. Sill reservation, the Wichita Mountain Wildlife Refuge, area lakes or perhaps to a ranch in the south part of the county.

These birdwatchers have many interests. They not only watch birds but stop to identify flowers, lizards, bugs and the like.

Meetings are held the 4th Tuesday of each month in the Civic Room of Security Bank building.

Club members also take part in the breeding bird survey conducted in late spring by the U. S. Department of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife, Patuxent Research Station and in the annual Christmas bird count sponsored by the National Audubon Society.

Mrs. Louis C. McGee is president of the 30-member club, and Jack Killey was our very capable guide. We gained much knowledge about the birds and made many new friends.

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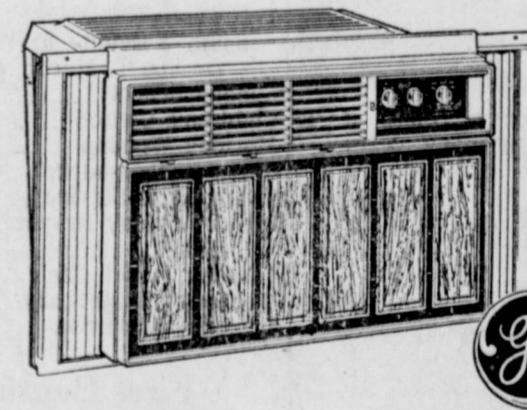


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
