Along about the middle of 1961 the Texas Department of the American Legion in Austin, arbitrarily sent the Eugene Bell Post of Baird, a quota of 40 for the 1961 membership drive to be reached by January 1, 1962. Since that time, the local post has raised its goal twice, the last was 120. Up to the last week in December 113 members had been signed. During the last week, more were signed up, and on December 30th, 3 more were added to the roll for a total of 123.

C. H. Lunsford, Post Commander, said that he is very pleased that this goal was reached before the deadline, but wants to emphasize that membership have not stopped just because January 1st is past. The month of January has been set for the address reporting period. All aliens in the United States, with few exceptions must report their addresses to the Government during the period.

Mr. Holland said that form with which to make the report will be available to all post offices and offices of the Immigration and Naturalization Service during the month of January.

He urges all aliens to comply with the reporting requirement, as willful failure to do so may lead to serious consequences.

Records Essential To Taxpayers

Taxpayers who kept good financial records last year should have no trouble preparing their 1961 federal income tax return, Arthur E. Fogle Jr., Administrative Officer of the Abilene office of Internal Revenue Service, stressed today.

Complete records are especially important, the IRS representative said, to taxpayers who elect to itemize deductions in filing.

Accurate expense records are especially essential if a taxpayer's return is selected for audit. All records should be retained for as long as they may become material in the administration of any internal revenue law.

Another advantage, he declared, is that taxpayers with good records can complete and mail their federal tax returns as soon as they receive their W-2 withholding tax certificates, thus eliminating last-minute searches for such papers as the April 16 filing deadline draws near.

New Year's Resolutions: Keep Records

Back in pioneer times our forefathers found they could keep track of the family history pretty well with a few notations on the flyleaf of the family Bible. But life's not quite that simple any more. Great-grandpa wasn't covered by social security or workmen's compensation. He didn't have a bank account or safe deposit box, a car and a dozen home appliances being bought on time payment, or a half-dozen insurance policies.

We have taxes great-grandpa never heard of and wouldn't have believed if he had. And had you asked him for a certificate to prove his birth, he'd have thought you'd taken leave of your senses.

The point of this is that the average American today has a good many important papers to keep track of. There are birth certificates, receipts, copies of tax returns, sales contracts, and a host of other papers. With a little tidy record-keeping, you can make life easier for yourself and your family when you are gone.

So, why not make a New Year's Resolution to follow these suggestions:

1. Get a heavily bound notebook folder or file folder as a central collecting point for all the records of your affairs.
 2. Put your especially important papers in your safe deposit box, but make a list of those papers and a brief summary of their contents to put in your home file.
 3. Get for your files copies of birth certificates for all members of the family, and add them to the file. Add your marriage license or at least a statement as to when and where you were married and by whom.
 4. Insert your will or a copy of it. If your will is kept elsewhere, include a note telling where it may be found.
 5. During the year, put into the file your income tax withholding statements and receipts for expenditures which may be deductible. Then keep a copy of each year's tax return in the file.
 6. Make a list of all the stocks and bonds you own and where they are.
 7. List all the places you have lived and worked and the names of persons there who you know. Include the schools you have attended and the dates you left or were graduated.
 8. If you may have benefits coming under a profit-sharing plan where you work, make a note of that too.
 9. If you're in doubt about whether an item should be included, put it in.
- This takes time initially, but it will save you both time and worry in the long run.

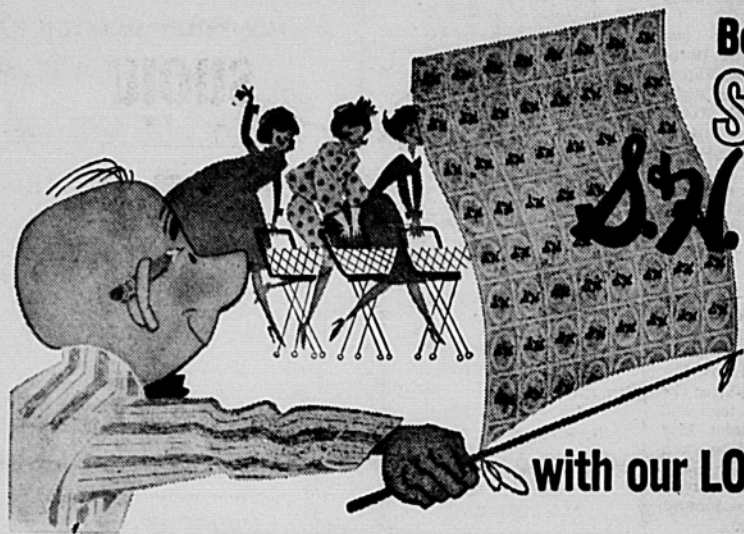
