Four acres being added

IOWA PARK, WICHITA COUNTY, TEXAS, 76367

The city council Monday night took initial action to annex four additional acres to the city limits, approved financing to prevent disruption of water service and once more adjourned without taking any action on a proposed gas rate increase and applications for cable television service.

The tract of land is owned by two different individuals, two acres each, and is located between the Foley Addition and West Magnolia. First readings were held

for annexation of land owned by T.C. Foley and Leo Wright. There were no dissenting votes on either proposal.

Five water taps, on Westridge, Wall, Service Road, Colorado and First Street, are included in the water improvement project which could have caused problems

for homeowners, had the council not approved a \$1,200 expenditure.

An engineer explained to the council that tapping the old lines now serving those areas would not only cause homes served by the lines to be without water for at least a day, but possibly would create other problems, the least of which would be distasteful water for a period of

Special valves which will allow the lines to be tapped without disruption of service were approved by the council.

Apparently no shut'off valves were installed when the lines were laid, according to conversation during the meeting. Three other areas of planned taps to have valves and there will be no problem when the taps

are made, it was said.

To tap the five lines without the special equipment would have caused the water department to shut off service to all homes on the lines for the better part of a full day. Also, four wore expressed that the day. Also, fears were expressed that the settlement which has accumulated in the older lines would be broken loose and flow with the water for several days. And additional fears were that the decrease in pressure might possibly cause some of the lines to break, and require more expensive

replacement. Aldermen took no action on the proposed 10 per cent increase in gas rates for Iowa Park by Lone Star Gas Company, explaining they wanted to study a report from the Texas League of Municipalities and also watch what action the city of Wichita Falls was going to take on a similar increase.

A second application for a franchise to serve Iowa Park with a cable television system was announced at the meeting. TV Cable of North Texas submitted the application and was represented by Ben Campbell, who has been in the city on several other occasions when CATV was discussed.

Also present was Marvin Athans, owner of a proposed system which made application for a non-exclusive franchise here several months ago.

Mayor Gordon Clark expressed his

opinion on the applications when he said, 'I'd still like to learn more about this

YOUR BIBLE **QUESTIONS** AND **ANSWERS**

QUESTION: Is the church of Christ different from denominations and if so why?

And lastly, the union of all Christians based upon the Bible (John 17: 20-23) Believing that the seed of the kingdom is the word of God (Matthew 13:19) it is the firm belief of members of the churches of Christ, that if that same seed is planted today, in the hearts of honest men and women, not only will it save them (Mark 16:15,16), but it will cause the Lord to add them to His church, (Acts 2:47) and they will not be a member of any denomination but of the church that you read



The proposed ordinance was submitted by Athans to the council earlier this year, before Mayor Clark took office. It was re-written to specifications of the previous administration by City Attorney O.N. New-

Campbell urged the council to take action as soon as possible, because of the long delay created by government tape before service could ever be started. In his letter of application, he said construction on the system would begin in eight months, and proposed a deposit or performance bond be provided as a show of

Resignation from the Planning and Zoning Commission by Dean Miller was received and approved by the council. Miller stated in his letter that his continued night college courses would not permit him the time required to serve.

Aldermen voted to shut off immediately reimbursement to the developers of Garden Valley Addition which has been paid since July of 1961. Under the agreement, the city would reimburse the developers \$1.50 per meter annually for having installed sewer and water service to the development.

City secretary George Trammell told the council it was his opinion the pay-ments should have ended July, 1971. The

ments should have ended July, 1971. The council voted to "cease and desist from any more payments."

Approximately 6,000 feet additional new street paving is planned for this summer in the city, street commissioner Arch Hughes told the council. The project will cover various parts of the town, he said.

Aldermen voted to purchase an engine for the water department pickup at a price.

for the water department pickup at a price of \$349. The overhauled engine has a oneyear or 24,000-mile warranty. City employees will install it.

Aldermen stated during the meeting they wanted the Parental Responsibility ordinance (102) strictly enforced. Under the ordinance, which is printed in this issue of the Leader, parents are responsible for the unlawful actions of their child-


ble for the unlawful actions of their children who have not yet reached the age of 18.

1972 was a big year for sports, politics and Dr. Clark

Though there weren't many earthshaking items of news to come out of Iowa Park during the past year, a search of the Leader stores indicated there was no lack of activities.

Probably the story, or series of stories, which captured most interest was the filming of Iowa Park's proud Hawk football team, to be used in a documentary movie about Texas high school football.

Sports fans will long remember 1972 as the year Iowa Park defeated touted Brownwood, and Gordon Wood.

Political buffs will never know for sure which way Iowa Park voters will lean in the future. Having always been a Democratic Party town, local voters jumped on the other side of the ballot this year to help re-elect Pres. Richard Nixon.

It was an exceptionally big year for one of the best-known Iowa Park residents. too. Dr. Gordon G. Clark first retired after 50 years practice here, was named Citizen of the Year, and then was elected mayor.

For these, and other highlights of the year 1972, the Leader glances back into its files:

JANUARY

Dr. Gordon G. Clark announced his retirement from medical practice, ending a career in Iowa Park which spanned 50 years. The popular physician was recognized by the Chamber of Commerce as the "Outstanding Citizen of the Year, and the Past 49 Years." Construction of the new White's Auto Store was begun. Holliday school trustees named Louis P. Hodge as the district's new tax assessor and collector, replacing retiring W.F. Curlee. The Iowa Park Hawk basketball team played its first competitive game in the new high school building's gymnasium in

which fans were able to view the play from newly-installed folding bleachers. Cong. Bob Price, Republican from Pampa, paid his first visit to Iowa Park and announced he would win the Nov. general election against Graham Purcell (and he did). Mike O'Donnell, high school junior, was named to the All-State Choir. The city council named the park and lake in northeast Iowa Park "Oscar Park." after Mrs. Gordon Clark, and "Gordon Lake." after Dr. Clark.

FEBRUARY The new 1972 telephone directories

published by Southwestern Bell Telephone Company featured on its cover the newly-constructed high school building: first time ever a local scene adorned the book's cover here. Bids totaling \$954,477 were let for a major water improvement project here, which included a pipeline from Wichita Falls, ground storage and overhead storage units, and lines connecting them in the city. Two new businesses, Curls for Girls and Holliday Water Meter Repair Shop, were opened in Holliday. School trustees extended the contracts of all key personnel. A near overflow crowd attended the annual Chamber of Commerce banquet, which featured keynote speaker Bill Haves of Amarillo. Iowa Park's Judy Solomon was crowned Midwestern University homecoming queen. Head Coach Tommy Watkins announced he had accepted a similar position at Andrews and would take assistants Jerry McWilliams and Ernie Reusch with him. The board named Grady Graves to succeed Watkins. Iowa Park and Holliday city councils approved a six per cent rate hike requested by Texas

request by Marvin Athans. The Hawk basketball team completed its best season in several years, with a 15-15 record, and 4-10 in District 4-AAA play (their first in AAA). Don Yeager, IPHS senior, was named a Finalist in the National Merit Scholarship testing, highest ever for a local student. "Town and Country Conservation News," a quarterly newsletter published by the Wichita SWC District. was named first plact in national competition. Maj. Gen. Robert L. Petit was named new commander of Sheppard Technical Training Center, succeeding Maj. Gen. Jerry D. Page.

MARCH

Ten sticks of dynamite were found discarded in Gordon Lake by a fisherman. David Laurence was named to the All-District 4-AAA basketball team. Approximately 95 per cent of drugs stolen from the Iowa Park Animal Clinic were recovered after having been thrown in Gordon Lake. Polly's Pets and Gift Shop was officially opened in Iowa Park. The Iowa Park High School A Cappella Choir earned the Sweepstakes Award, and 10 soloists earned Division I ratings. Tommy Watkins was named coach of the North All-Star team for the annual Texas High School Coaches Association classic to be played in Houston. Larry Clapp's entry in the Science Fair held at Midwestern University received the Sweepstakes Award, highest ever for a local student. Hundreds of area residents turned out at the Valley View school cafeteria for a dinner benefitting Donny Holmes. Wayne House became the first to receive the

Electric Service Company, Iowa Park also Epsilon Eta Chapter's of Epsilon Sigma approved a cable television franchise Alpha "Zeus Award." Varsity baseball made its return to Iowa Park High School after several years absence.

APRIL In city election, Arch Hughes and

incumbents L.W. Teel and Herman Mahler defeated a field of eight candidates for three city council seats. Dr. Gordon Clark defeated Pearl Brooks in his candidacy for mayor. Pete Koonce and Delbert Catlin were elected to the school board, in which seven candidates had filed. Sandra Skinner won two first places in the NBTA Texas State Championship Twirling Festival held in Lubbock. H.G. "Whitey" Harrison was successful in his write-in campaign for mayor of Holliday. defeating incumbent Fred Daume Jr.: alderman incumbents Joe Martin, Louis Hodge and J.M. Darr were re-elected. Holliday school trustee incumbents Kenneth Williams and Joe Miller were re-elected. Iowa Park began taking water from both its lakes for the first time since 1971. Two young Iowa Park men were arrested near Wichita Falls on charges of marijuana possession and a local housewife was arrested and charged with theft of prescription drugs from local homes. Beverly Klinkerman, 18, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Marvin Klinkerman, was named Miss Wichita Falls, winning over 14 other contestants. Holliday Eagles defeated defending state champion Crowell for the District 8-A track championship. Stanley Williamson, local rancher, was re-elected president of the American Paint Horse Association. Karen Watson and Don Yeager received the Outstanding Teenage Girl and Boy

awards, sponsored by the 23 Study Club. Tim Hunter and Bud Singleton were awarded the Star Chapter Farmer and Star Greenhand awards at the annual banquet of the Future Farmers of America. Trena Siddle was a first place winner at the state V.I.C.A. contests in Dallas, representing the first-year Cosmetology Department.

MAY


A young Iowa Park couple was arrested in the city's first dangerous drug raid. New head coach Grady Graves announced the hiring of two assistants, Barney Oliver and Bobby Butler. Formal openings of newly-constructed White Auto Store and Shaw Motor Company were held. Lone Star Gas requested a 10 per cent rate increase. School trustees announced its plans to bus both the fifth and sixth grade students to the Valley View campus the coming fall term. Rev. Keith Pierce was installed new minister of the First Christian Church. The Iowa Park Hawk baseball team captured the District 4-AAA championship in a playoff with Weatherford, and thus became the first champions since the school was moved into AAA classification. Richard Blair, IPHS senior, received his appointment to West Point Military Academy. Sandra Skinner received the Hawk Band John Philip Sousa Award. Susan Miller and Barry Lucy were named Iowa Park Junior High salutatorian and valedictorian. Patricia Ann Roberts was named IPHS valedictorian and Don Yeager salutatorian. Honor graduates at Holliday High were Johnnie Debler, valedictorian, and Judy Ray, salutatorian. Don Yeager kept alive Iowa Park's tradition of a state UIL

winner by taking first in prose reading. Four acres of land were annexed to the city. Four teachers announced retirement from Iowa Park schools: J.R. Stogsdill, Mrs. H.C. Eddins, Mrs. M.J. McDonald and Juanita Garrison, At Holliday, Mrs. Garland Holt retired after 14 years in the school cafeteria.

JUNE

The Iowa Park school trustees accepted a bid of \$20,484 by T.A. Litteken of Wichita Falls to construct a football field house. Holliday High graduated 27 seniors. The State National Bank adopted the 3753rd Student Squadron from Sheppard AFB, and thus became the first firm outside Wichita Falls to do so. Resignations of 12 school staff members were accepted by the school board. The IPHS Class of '62 held its reunion. Sixty-eight local and out-of-town exstudents of Iowa Park schools through 1928 attended a reunion. Iowa Park lost its post mark, used to cancel stamps on letters. Six youths, ranging from 9 to 13, were arrested in one week for shoplifting. Rev. Hershel Lindsey was named new pastor of the Kamay Baptist Church. A brief hail storm cut a narrow swath through Iowa Park, causing an estimated \$50,000 in roof damage. IPHS Class of '67 held its reunion at Sand Beach. Because the city was taking water for drinking from Gordon Lake, city fathers haulted all swimming in that body of water. Janis James was named Overall Winner in the Junior division of the county 4-H dress revue. E.P. Evans, foreman of the Iowa Park Agricultural Experiment Station the past 27 years, retired.
