O, TANNENBAUM!

Ah, ah, ah . . . You just did a no-no. You burned your Christmas trees again, didn't you? Uh-huh. The last time I heard of a community's proposed tree burning, two teen-aged boys took the mayor to court for breaking an antipollution ordinance-and won. Not a twig was scorched.

Now I hate to be tacky with you, truly I do, but such shenanigans must cease. I mean it was bad enough to cut down the trees in the first place, knowing they would be thrown away, but then to use them to pollute the air . . . well that doesn't make any kind of sense.

So once again, guys, here's a little refresher course in conservation. In the first place, living plants including trees help cleanse the air by collecting particles of dust and other junk on their greenery. Second, they generate oxygen. Third, it takes about half of St. Mark's United Methodist Dave Styles, Larry Pond, Miss a human lifetime to grow a decent sized evergreen. And fourth, ceremony Friday evening uniting the earth' resources are finite.

Let me tell you what to do with vour Christmas trees:

- 1. If you have a fireplace and insist on burning, at least you could uee it for heat or give it to someone who could use such
- 2. Strip off the needles to put in a compost heap or around ourdoor plants. They make great mulch and help neutralize alkaline
- 3. Cut off whole branches, needles and all, and make small leantos over outdoor plants that need protection from the cold.
- 4. Leave the stand on, cut off branches to within 3 or 4 inches of the runk, paint or shellac the whole thing and use it for a coat-
- 5. If you have a green thumb, poke the branches into the ground or into potting soil with good drainage. They have been known to take root and grow.

So don't make me fuss at you again. I'm getting tired of it and would hate to have a dumb old tree come between me and my friends. Do your thing. Spread the good word. And may all your Christmases be green!





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
