RED POWER

I'm ashamed of my Indians. When they first took over the Bureau of Indian Affairs offices in Washington, I was pleased that at last they actually got into the building en masse after having been turned away so many times before.

But the willful destruction of property is unforgivable—as much so as the wrongs done to the Indians over the centuries. When people are angry they tend to act without thinking of the consequences, of the harm they do themselves as well as to the object of their anger.

In this case, the papers destroyed may well have held proof of the Indians' grievances, a record of historical events long since forgotten; or even the information which could have led to a speedy resolution of their long-standing complaints.

Those grievances are quite real and important. There are the unfulfilled promises of treaties conveniently overlooked because the subdued tribes no longer presented a security threat. There are treaties broken deliberately or accidentally by those unaware of their existence. And there are those widespread, generalized problems of existence—poverty, hunger, disease, inadequate housing, poor education, no education, and job discrimination.

In addition, funds intended to correct some of those ills have been mishandled, going instead into bureaucratic papershuffling and committee investigations.

Those people, non-Indian mostly, who are employed to work out problems often are ignorant of Indian history, culture or the legal matters involved in settling complex disputes. Some accomplish little more than to play politics with the tribe and its own governmental structures, keeping the people in a constant state of unrest and confusion.

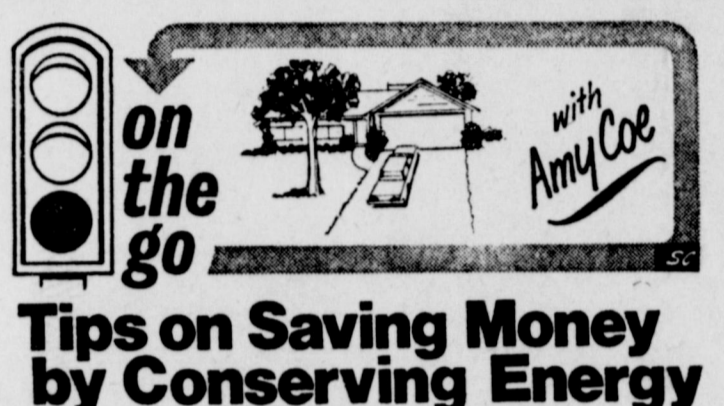
The Indians should have protested years ago, but they were so thoroughly intimidated for so long that until now only the most outspoken among them attempted to be heard. What is welling up and overflowing now is outraged resentment of three centuries of being shoved aside in the name of progress. But to say that their recent destructiveness is justified is much too easy and sentimental.

Those who did the damage deserve punishment. They all—every one of them—deserve to have their grievances heard by some one who will take immediate action.

Those of us who understand should give them our full support. But to the vandals among them, I say: "Cham ameligan chui" (You're acting like an American).

Leo Fletcher Retires with Record of 45 Full Years with Lone Star Gas Co.

Fellow workers with Leo H. Fletcher in the pipeline department of Lone Star Gas Co.'s Iowa Park regional headquarters had a retirement party honoring him on Friday, Jan. 26. Registered as guests were 139 persons. They had made up money gifts for Leo and his wife Inez.

Jan. 31 marked completion of 45 years with the company, all in this general area. During that time he has never missed a pay period.

Fletcher was born and reared at Vernon. He began work with Lone Star Gas in Mountain Park, Okla. His job was to walk the pipe line the 90 miles from that city to Wichita Falls. This was his weekly duty for the following seven years.

During the next thirteen years Leo was a truck driver for Lone Star Gas at Petrolia. In 1952 he was transferred to Iowa Park and for 20 years he has been Pipeline Superintendent here.

Fletcher and his crew have been in charge of the line from Electra to Wichita Falls; Iowa Park to Archer City; Iowa Park to Burk-

Water Board Officers Named

Directors of Wichita County Water Control and Improvement District No. 3 met Tuesday in regular session. A. L. Emils and R. A. McClelland were installed into membership of the board by O. N. Newman, who administered the oath. Their terms will be for two years.

McClelland and Emils replaced Newman and H. Gaines Maness. Oliver served on the board from 1965 through 1972; as president in 1966 and secretary through 1971. Gaines was a member from 1969 through 1972 and was secretary the past year.

Holdover members and the new ones expressed appreciation for the service rendered by Maness and Newman.

Mayor Gordon G. Clark met with the board and asked if the Board would be interested in having the City to collect taxes for the water district. The county tax assessor and collector presently has a contract for this service. A committee representing the City and the Water District will be formed to study the proposal.

Officers elected for 1973 are: Delbert W. Todd, president; Carl Sullivan, vice-president; Floyd Adams, sec-treas. Emils and McClelland, board members

Regular business for the year and plans for needed improvements were discussed. Tax rate for 1973 was set at \$1.10 per \$100 assessed evaluation—the same as in 1972. The board decided this rate is needed to meet payments of bonded indebtedness caused by the \$400,000 outlay on the water line from Wichita Falls to Iowa Park. The taxes also will be used to meet payments on bonds sold for construction of Lakes Buffalo and Iowa Park.

The tax receipts are some \$8,000 less than the amount needed to meet payments for the 1973 calendar year. Sale of water to the City will bring \$30,000. The \$22,000-remainder will be used to maintain and operate water district properties, according to Mr. Todd. He also reported that 96% of assessed taxes were collected in 1972.

The remainder of the meeting was used to acquaint new board members with the history, responsibility, assets, liabilities and maintenance and operation of the Water District.

Meetings open to the public are conducted the last Tuesday of each month in Newman's office. Notice will be given for cancellation of any meeting. In case public interest merits, meetings will be moved to larger quarters.

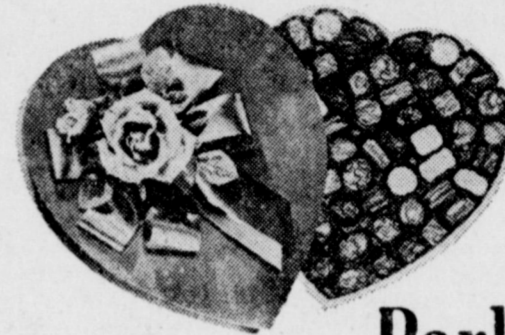
