YOU ARE WHAT YOU SHOULDN'T HAVE EATEN

Recently I read that if people would simply change their eating habits, the patient load of hospitals would be sharply reduced and some hospitals would have to close.

That seems to me an encouraging remark. I had assumed, as others may have, that hospitals and doctors' offices were jammed wall-to-wall with ailing folk, either because of a population boom or because the buildings had shrunk. Now we know that there are a lot of sick people—and better yet—that they don't have to be sick.

Changing one's diet is not so simple as it sounds. Take for instance Super-Eater. Perhaps he is lonely or bored, can't think of anything else to do with his hands, is following Mama's admonition to clean his plate, or is just plain hungry all the time. What more pleasant way can he use his idle time than snacking? How can he turn down that second helping of potatoes? And let's not forget the starving children in China. A habit is a habit, and they're all hard to overcome.

Speaking of habits, we must remember Mr. E. X. Smoker, who merely traded one sin for another, and instead of reaching for the filthy weed, he grabs a handful of anything that even LOOKS edible. High blood pressure will still be his undoing, but now it's because he's overweight. (Take heart. Some doctors say that additional pounds will come when one quits smoking, even if his food consumption doesn't increase a tiny crumb, because of changes in the body's metabolism.)

Last, we have Clara Cholesterol who is on a diet of almost purely grease and sugar. This is the person who wants her main course deep fried and her dessert buried in whipped cream. Mention a hot fudge sundae and she breaks out in a gallop for the nearest ice cream shop. Promise her anything, but give her good!

Some people are legitimately overweight because of a malfunction in the carburetor. Others are on a special doctor-directed diet which tends to keep weight up, such as the bland but starchy ulcer diet with a pure cream chaser.

However, most of us will confess, if only to ourselves, that we fall into the majority class of overfed, undernourished creatures in need of a postgraduate course in sane, controlled eating habits. If someone would just tell us which foods are actually good for us, which ones contain no harmful chemicals, and which doctor's opinion of a balanced diet is accurate, we might be tempted to reform.

Unfortunately, many beneficial foods are bad enough to look at, much less swallow. And what with prices as they are, we might as well enjoy what we buy. Besides, we all have to go sometime . . . so pass the cookies, please, and make mine a double!

NOTICE TO THE CITIZENS OF IOWA PARK, TEXAS

When the first revenue sharing check came to Iowa Park a news item appeared in the paper about this check.

In a short time another item appeared in the paper asking the citizens if they had ideas about where and how the money could be spent to write a letter to City Hall and make their desires known, and the City RECEIVED NOT ONE LETTER.

The need for improving the Police Department, having a place for the City Council to meet, having a place for the Corporation Court to meet, an annexation to the present building for a City Hall and to include in this plan an overnight facility for law violation offenders was also planned.

At the regular meeting of the City Council on the Monday evening of November 27, the Council by a motion of Mr. Arch Hughes, and a second to the motion by Mr. Bill Gilmore, directed the Mayor and the City Secretary to work out a rough sketch of what improvements were desired in way of a new City Hall and to secure the service of an architect to draw up floor plans for the improvements. These things have been done and the City should have something in the next two or three days about what the improvements and cost will be for this facility.

PUBLIC NOTICE

In going around over the City of Iowa Park, the Mayor has noted that 40 to 50 per cent of the residents are in violation of City Ordinance No. 182-A, which requires that the trash receptacles should be in a rack of some type or secured to a metal post with hooks on it and that the lids of the cans fit and keep the trash in the cans. When the cans are not secured to some rack or iron post with hooks on it, dogs and young children will overturn the cans and scatter all the trash and papers over the alley and street where the cans are.

If you do not have a means of fastening your trash cans, you have two weeks from the date of this publication to comply. After this date violations will be noted and citations will be given to violators subjecting them to a possible fine.

Charles Roby Not Listed as Viet Prisoner

Since March 3, 1967, Col. Charles Roby of Iowa Park has been listed as Missing in Action. There has been no record of his death, so his family cling to their hope that he is still alive.

Mrs. J. C. Roby of Iowa Park is his mother. His wife Martha and daughters Carol Ann 19 and Lisa 15 are living at Fort Walton Beach, Fla.

Recently 95 names of those missing in action were released who never before had been mentioned. Seven men known to be Prisoners of War were not on the POW list, said Mrs. Roby one day this week.

Charles Roby's plane was shot down over North Vietnam on his second mission in that conflict. He had flown 100 missions in the Korean war.

Charles has a sister Mrs. Quentin Roberts at Lander, Wyo.; and two brothers: Lt. Col. (ret.) Harold Roby residing in San Antonio and Lt. Col James Roby at Austin.

Farm Bureau will begin drive for members soon

Feb. 5-9 has been proclaimed Farm Bureau Week in Wichita county by Judge Calvin Ashley. The county FB will have a spring membership enrollment drive as a part of the statewide effort to exceed last year's total of 136,943 member families. Wichita county FB ended 1972 with 925 members.

Norman Roberts of Burkburnett is president and Carl Moeller of Electra is membership chairman.

Roberts said this week, "We producers need a stronger organization to help solve problems in marketing, agricultural public relations, taxation, and other matters affecting our net incomes."

Text of the proclamation issued by Judge Ashley reads:

"Agriculture is vital to the economy of Wichita county, our state and the nation. A large percentage of our citizens are dependent directly or indirectly upon agriculture for their livelihood. All of our people benefit from the productive efficiency of modern agriculture.

"Farmers and ranchers have learned to promote their industry through organization. Four out of five agricultural producers in this nation belonging to a general farm organization are members of the Farm Bureau. It is an independent, non-partisan, non-governmental voluntary organization of families united for the purpose of analyzing their problems and formulating solutions to those problems.

"Therefore, I, Calvin Ashley, county judge of Wichita county, do hereby designate Feb. 5-9 as Farm Bureau Week in Wichita county, and urge our citizens to give due recognition to this observance honoring the Wichita County Farm Bureau."

Postmaster T. E. Gilbreath has announced that the Department of Defense has adopted a new policy concerning personal mail addressed to military personnel at Vietnam military post offices only. The post office numbers are listed

Post offices have discontinued accepting second-class mail, third-class mail and surface parcels addressed to those APO numbers. Only letter mail will move beyond San Francisco.

Personal letter mail to the Vietnam addresses must be mailed prior to March 1. This rule also applies to FPO 96626 except that letter mail will be accepted until further notice to FPO 96626.

In celebration of the 100th anniversary of establishment of the National Parks System, members of the 23 Study Club took a tour by way of slides and challenging information narrated by four members who had "been there," at the program in the home of Mrs. C. E. Birk, Thursday afternoon of last week. Mrs. Homer Blalock was co-hostess.
Mrs. T. M. Thaxton stated there are 237 national parks in the USA. The first, Yellowstone, was established in 1872. Mrs. Sam Hill gave detailed description of this largest of the parks and showed pictures of the features to be found there.
Mrs. Delbert Todd described Yosemite, established in 1890, where there are 700 miles of trails amid jagged peaks and rolling meadows, with a waterfall beginning 2,425 feet above the floor below.
Big Bend, with its mountains, canyons, 350 kinds of birds, desert areas, flowers and trees became an intriguing vacation spot as pictured by Mrs. D. O. James.
The Everglades of Florida, designated as a national park in 1947 and third largest, is the only tropical area in the system. With slides illustrating its features, Mrs. E. F. Soell gave a life-like presentation of the water birds giving for food; of the alligators in swamps and rivers; of bald eagles in their habitat; and of the mangrove trees and walking forests.
Mrs. Thaxton said the most serious threat to our parks is the automobile. In order to eliminate the careless motorist and preserve the natural beauties of the land, plans are being formulated to provide mass transportation to the interior of the parks and tours in that manner to the wilderness areas. And there will be visitors' centers with road and lodging.

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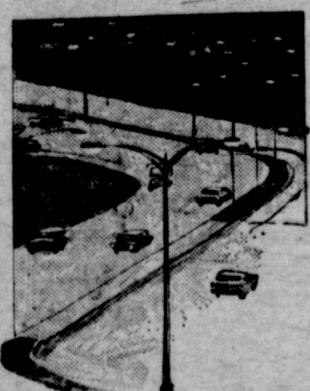

WOMEN on Wheels

Plymouth's Liz Stimley
In the Driver's Seat
Steer and Stop Without Power

Failure of power brakes or power steering can scare the wits out of the driver—if he doesn't know what to expect.

The thing to remember is that the car can still be steered and stopped without the power assists. It will take more physical effort, but it can be done.



Every driver should know what it feels like to handle his car when power steering or brakes are inoperative for some reason. So try it for yourself.

While the car is stopped locate the ignition "off" position. Get on a wide, deserted road or a big, empty parking lot and while driving at moderate speed put the transmission in neutral and shut off the engine by turning the ignition key to the "off" position. Be sure you do not turn the key to the "lock" position.

You'll find it much harder to turn the wheel, but you can still steer. Next, tap the brake pedal several times to deplete the power system reserve, and then bear down on the brake pedal. It will take effort, but you can stop.

Both power systems may be restored by re-starting the engine.

It is not likely that you'll have a power braking or steering failure, but if you try the experiment above you'll know what it feels like and realize you can still handle your car.
