The Golden Wedding of Mr. & Mrs. J. F. Floyd.

The anniversary of the Golden Wedding of Mr. and Mrs. J. F. Floyd was celebrated last night at a magnificent supper given by his eldest son, J. P. Floyd, in the banquet hall of his popular restaurant. Twenty-five spreads were provided, but of course, the scarcity of old folks gave room for several younger ones. Rev. Briney opened with very appropriate remarks, having been pressed into the extemporaneous duty by the failure of Rev. J. M. Burrow being able to meet the engagement.

Being called upon, J. L. Caldwell, read reminescent notes of the life of Mr. and Mrs. Floyd, drawing responses from both, and others present; a general social time followed.

The reporter being unwell and not habituated to keeping late hours retired early in the evening, missed much, doubtless, that would be of interest to the friends of the happy golden-wedding couple.

J. F. Floyd was born in 1825—is 74 years old, and remembers the stars falling in 1833 and tonight the stars are to fall again. Bedford county, Tenn. rejoices in the credit of being his native place, and the good old gentleman remembers when a boy all about the chestnuts, mayapples, pawpaws and 'possums; has always been a democrat; came to Texas in '57 and settled in Parker county, having married previously in Lincoln county, Tenn. to Miss Amarinta Cole; their 50th. or golden wedding they celebrated last night.

Mr. and Mrs. Floyd have had 8 children, 7 of whom are now living, our portly and honored hostess, J. P. Floyd, being the oldest living. Two daughters blessed the union; the living one is Mrs. Elizabeth Walters, now in Coleman county.

Mr. Floyd well remembers hearing James K. Polk speak while a candidate for governor of Tennessee. His early experiences seem primitive to the youth of today. Then, pretty nearly everything of everyday use was made at home, the clothing, hats, shoes, wagons etc. The goose quill pen, no envelopes, no railroads but stage coaches with bugles to announce their weekly arrival; no cotton was grown in Tennessee in those days except for home uses and the seed was picked out with the fingers. He also remembers the high old times at the corn shuckings, eggnogs and ginger stews and pumpkin pies. He soldiered in our late war under Henry McCullough but was never in a battle, being always on detached duty. His father was killed in Tennessee, while at work in his field, by passing straggling federal soldiers, at the age of 67 years. His mother lived to be 70 years of age, his grandfather to 97 years. It is within the bounds of possibility that he, enjoying such uninterrupted good health, in so healthy a country, may live as long. His father was a Whig,

his Grandfather a democrat, from whom he directly inherited his politics.

Our friend has always been first a working man, next a temperate man, though not a teetotaler and next a peaceable man, which accounts for his good health and long life—and he insists that plenty of fresh air in his sleeping room had much to do with it.

Truly we can most heartily congratulate the dear old couple on their long and useful lives, Jack Floyd on his prosperity and ourselves on this excellent repast.
