## Aldermen reject block grant; pass new sewer rate formula

The city council Monday night turned down a proposal to seek money from a federal block grant program, approved purchase of two vehicles, changed the formula for setting sewer rates, and then spent an hour and 20 minutes in an executive session.

Aldermen declined to discuss the portion of the meeting which was closed to the public, other than explaining it was held under the topic of "personnel," but a called meeting was scheduled for the following evening when the same topic was to be discussed.

A motion by George Hammonds on a resolution to seek a block grant from the Department of Housing and Urban Development died for lack of a second.

City Administrator Steve Morath had explained that the funds, if approved, could be used for a number of things, mostly in the south part of town. He said it possibly could be used to build a sub station for the fire department and housing rehabilitation for those in need.

After a few moments of silence after Hammonds offered the motion, Lita Watson, mayor pro tem, said it "apparently dies for lack of a second." Council members changed the formula used for setting sewer rates, to begin in April.

Under the new formula, the average water consumption will be measured during the months of January, February and March of each year, and on that basis, the year's sewer rate will be established.

The formula used in the past has been to tie the sewer rate onto the amount of water purchased for the same month. Alderman Bud Adams argued that this penalized those who watered their yards and gardens, sending none of the water down the sewer drain.

Base rate for residences will be \$4 per month, and an additional 30 cents per thousand for water purchased above 2,000 gallons; commercial, base of \$3.25, 30 cents per thousand between 2,000 and 10,000 gallons, and 15 cents per thousand over 10,000 gallons; churches, \$3 base, \$4.50 per month if more than 10,000 gallons water purchased; schools, \$18 per month, unlimited water purchased.

### VEHICLE PURCHASES

Shaw Motor Co. was the low bidder for a three-quarter ton pickup and the city accepted the bid of \$6,888. Bates-Barrios was low bidder for a one-ton chassis, \$7,091. Three bids were submitted on each of the vehicles.

The council rejected a bid of \$4,200 for demolition of the old sewer plant, after Morath said he felt the cost was greater than it should be.

Aldermen approved a waiver for front setback restrictions at 103 W. Emerald, where homes are already in violation of the regulations on a dedicated 100-foot-wide street. Members would not, however, establish a blanket policy for the future in such cases, explaining each case should be considered on its own merits.

### TAX OFFICE BUDGET

"It's unfortunate that such a good idea should turn out to be such an awful thing," commented Alderman Watson, during a discussion of the cost of funding the new county tax appraisal district.

Based on taxes levied, the city of Iowa Park will pay \$10,969 toward the district's budget of \$605,975, while the local school district's cost will be \$28,059.

But the problem was, which prompted Alderman Watson's com-

ment, that the cost of the taxing program would not cut any present costs to the city, and in fact would be above and beyond the present costs.

The city paid the school district \$16,600 to assess and collect taxes for the present year. Unless the city takes over the work of collecting the taxes once more, which would require hiring of at least one more person in the office, the cost next year will increase, aldermen were told.

Anticipated cost of the county tax appraisal office after the initial year, when more people are hired, will climb from \$606,036 to \$959,740 the following year.

The council heard a proposal from Charles Whittingstall, police chief, to create a new position in the department, but no change in pay scale.

Whittingstall told aldermen that organization could be improved if three officials could be named in the department. He proposed to keep the post of chief and sergeant, and add captain.

Aldermen said they would consider it at their next regular meeting, but expressed no objections.

The previous year's audit should be ready for council consideration and action at the next regular meeting, also, Morath said.

## Two thefts are reported

Two burglaries and a break-in were reported during the past weekend to Iowa Park police.

Some \$1,250 worth of items were reportedly taken between 4 p.m. Friday and 2:30 p.m. Saturday from 406 W. Clara. Danny Joe Haynes said someone entered his home through a window and carried off two 356 mag. pistols with two boxes of shells, a 22 cal. rifle, radio scanner and gold wedding band.

Sometime between Friday and Monday, a lock at a storage building on West Highway was allegedly pried off from the door and a 10 HP Johnson outboard motor and riding lawn mower removed.

Sometime Thursday night, the garage door at a home at 128 James Drive was broken open. Dennis Campbell, who reported the incident, said nothing was apparently missing, but \$300 in damages was inflicted during the break-in.

## Christmas parade one week away

The curtain for the fourth annual Wichita County Christmas Parade through downtown Iowa Park is about to be raised.

Plans for the Dec. 6 event, which has proved so popular among local and area residents and organizations since it was originated, are about completed.

But there is still room for more participants in the parade, according to Tommy and Carla Key, project chairman.

Those participating in the parade will be competing for cash and plaque awards. One area of voting will be done by the viewers and the other by a panel of judges.

The winner of the "People's Choice" award will receive \$100 in cash and a plaque.

First place in the judges' awards will receive \$100 and a plaque; second place \$50 and plaque; third place \$25 and plaque.

To begin at noon, the parade will be formed west of the Park West

Shopping Center, and take the route of Bank Street to Yosemite, to Park Street and then down Cash and dismiss at the junior high school campus.

Numerous organizations from Sheppard AFB, Burkburnett, Wichita Falls and other communities have said they would be here.

Santa Claus will also be in the parade. In fact, he will be the featured performer.

Immediately after the parade Santa will be in his hut between Iowa Park Florists and Settle Drug until 3 p.m. Then, the following two Saturdays, he will be in his hut at the same location between 10 a.m. and noon.

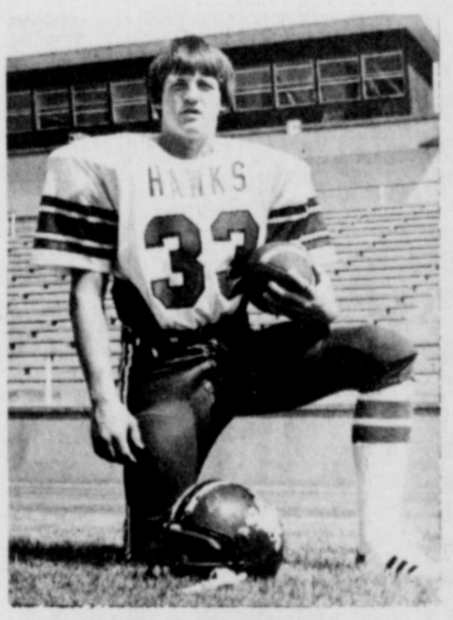
The MuleSkinners will be serving chili at their "Barn" next to Jim's Market on Cash Street.

Besides all the parading groups, there will be live entertainment before and after the parade, provided by a bluegrass band, the "Top of Texas Band". That group will begin at 11 a.m., pause for the parade, and

Just across the street from the Chamber office will be the official

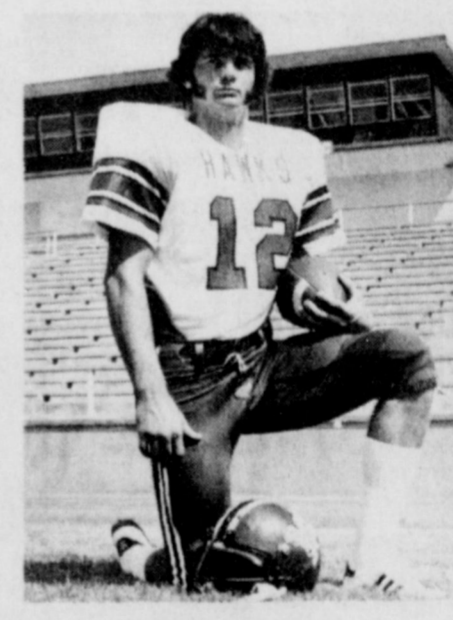
judges' reviewing stand, which will be occupied by majors and chamber officers of surrounding communities, as well as officials from Sheppard and Iowa Park.

## Four Hawks first team All-District

Four Iowa Park Hawks were named to the 3-AAAA All-District football team for 1980, two on offense and two on defense.

In addition, five made the second team and two were honorable mention.

On the first offensive unit were Jim Smith and split end Robert Hastings. First defensive platoon choices included Curtis Martin and Roger Hamilton. Martin was in the secondary and Hamilton a linebacker.

Second team offensive selections included Troy Linticum, back, and tackle Tim Blackwell.

On the second defensive team were Robin Combs and Toby Smith, ends, and Mike Ray, downman.

Center Kent Fehr was honorable mention offense and Kevin Thompson honorable mention defense downman.

Twenty-five players were named to the first and second offensive teams and 22 on the defensive platoons. Seven juniors were listed on offense and only three on defense.

A large number of relatives and friends assembled in the candle-illuminated church for the ceremony officiated by Rev. The altar decorations were spotlighted with a central brass arch laced with baby's breath and accented with pink silk bows. Additional decorative interest was provided by sunburst arrangements of pink and burgundy carnations intermingled with baby's breath raised by brass stands at outer extremities of the nuptial area.

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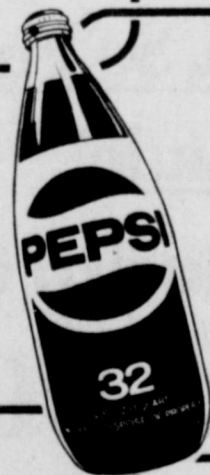


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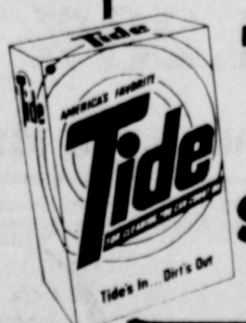

## Holliday has drug store

The opening of Holliday Drug in Holliday recently by Cecil and Sarah Hamady not only gives local residents their first local prescription service in over a decade, but signals a steady increase in the growth of Holliday businesses.

Since 1968, when W.E. "Bill" Stegall auctioned his business off after 45 years service, residents in Holliday have traveled to Wichita Falls, Archer City and Iowa Park for their prescription needs.

Though Hamady has no licensed pharmacist at this time, the retired air force technical writer has an agreement with Bob Jones Pharmacy in Wichita Falls to fill the prescriptions. Hamady will provide the service of getting the prescription filled, and in some cases, delivered to the customer's doorstep.

"If the customer is unable to leave his home for health reasons or bad weather, I will deliver the order to him personally," said Hamady.

Hamady and his wife, Sarah, have resided in Holliday since March but have lived in the immediate area for several years. He was a technical writer for 25 years in the air force, and set up a small aircraft corporation in Arlington after his retirement. Hamady was appointed municipal court judge in July by the Holliday city council.

Holliday Drug is located at 114 Olive next to the post office, in the building formerly occupied by TESCO.

Besides offering prescription service, Holliday Drug offers gifts, cosmetics, and "any other items you might find in today's drug store," according to Mrs. Hamady.

"The new drug store will be good for the citizens of Holliday if they take advantage of the services provided," said Stegall in a telephone interview from his home in Holliday.

The addition of a new business in Holliday ups the number of new businesses opening the the past year to three. Holliday Flower Scenter, now located in White's Home and Auto, and The Love Shop are the other additions to the local business district.

## Deadline Monday for pecan show

Deadline for entering the county pecan show is Monday. The show is scheduled for Dec. 5-6 at Sikes Senter Mall. Entries can be left at the Iowa Park Experiment Station, K&K Grain Company, Electra; Berend Brothers, Burkburnett; or the county Extension office, Wichita Falls.

An entry consists of 40 nuts placed in a paper sack bearing the owner's name, address, and variety if known. The experts at the show will identify the variety of those not known by the owner.

Selection is important to having a good entry. Pecans should be selected which are uniform in size and shape, have a natural color, free of black spots or scars left by insects, and free of defects. Eliminate any of the pecans which have unusual shape, pecans with cracked seams, remove all husk from the pecans, omit prematurely harvested pecans evident by light color shells, or any nuts with signs of insect damage.

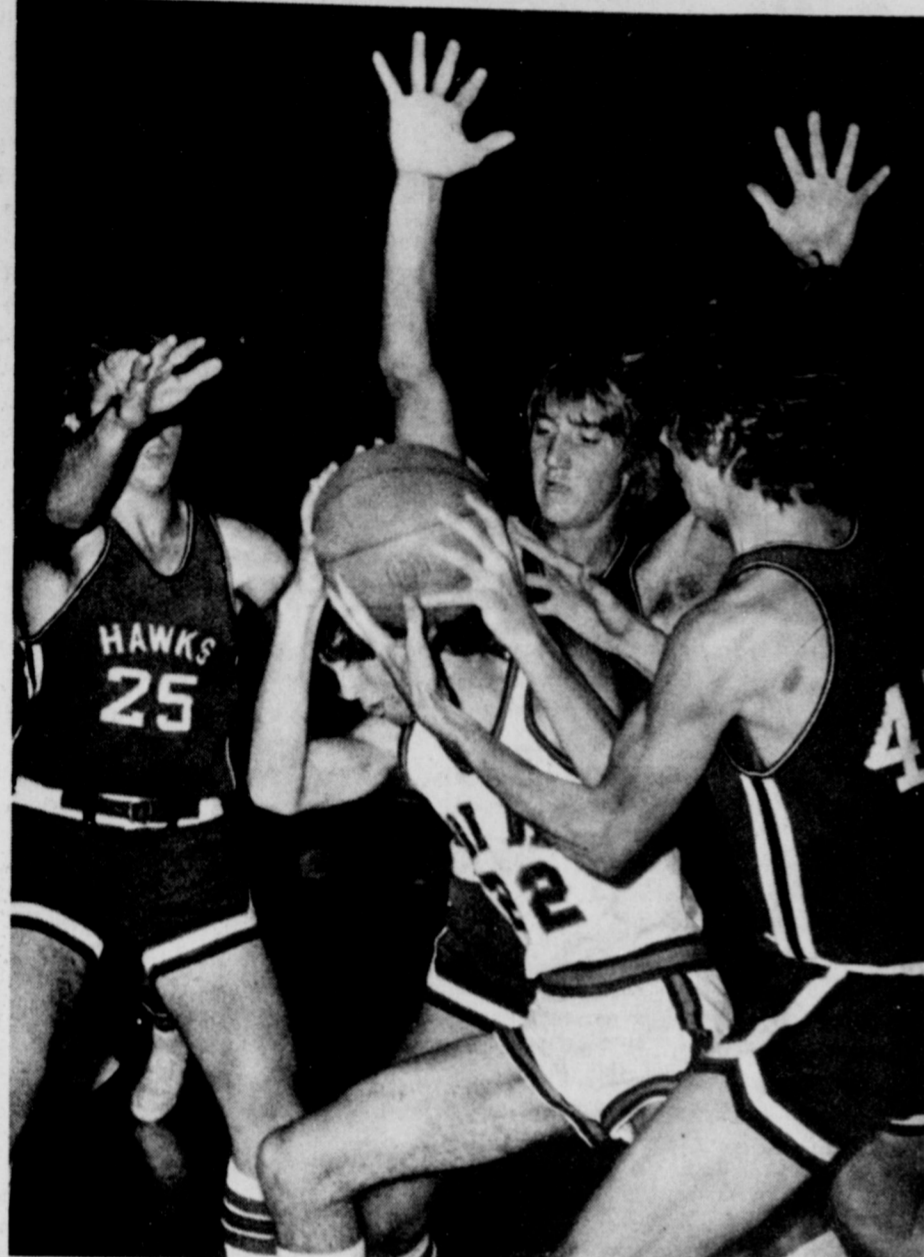
Jill Watts, seeing her first action of the season, led the Hawkettes in scoring with 11 points.

Dayna and her family have been members of the Wichita County Mounted Patrol since 1974.

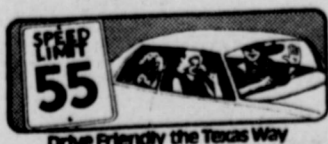
