Lone Star Gas seeks rate increase

Lone Star Gas Co. manager Bud Burch has filed an application for a rate increase which would raise the average residential customer's monthly bill in Iowa Park about \$3.04 in the winter and \$3.04 in the summer.

Based on Lone Star's rate application, a residential customer who uses an average of eight thousand cubic feet of gas a month paid \$24.34 for gas service in the winter. Under the requested rate, that same customer would pay \$27.38.

Commercial gas customers' rates would also increase under the requested rate schedule.

"Our customers are accustomed to dependable natural gas service," says Burch. "This rate increase is

necessary to continue a high performance level and for other necessary expenses, such as maintaining and improving the local pipeline distribution system, which are vital to dependable service."

Lone Star's last rate increase in Iowa Park became effective September of 1979.

"Since that time, every business, including Lone Star, has experienced increased operating expenses," says

Burch. "And, of course, unlike other businesses that can raise their prices as expenses go up, we must apply to the city council for a rate increase. No one likes rising prices, but any business must earn enough money to meet operating expenses and still achieve a reasonable profit. Even though our expenses have gone up, Lone Star still has one of the lowest average operating costs per customer when compared to any of the other major gas utilities in Texas."

Public hearing set Monday on block grant application

A public hearing on the city's preapplication for a block grant will be part of Monday's council meeting, according to the agenda provided by Steve Morath, city administrator.

Federal grant money will be sought by the city to construct a second fire truck storage building in the south side of the city. A need for a sub station has been discussed, due to the number and length of trains passing through the city.

Two resolutions will be considered at the meeting, which is to begin at 7 p.m. in council chambers.

One is to authorize purchase of property at 902 W. Highway, and the

other concerns a demolition contract with Gilmore Inc.

An ordinance will be considered which, if approved, would amend membership qualifications for the city's electrical board.

Glenn Sampley has requested to appear before the council concerning water rates for a tract of land he farms on the southeast edge of town.

Aldermen will also be asked to approve a proposed name for a soccer practice field which has been developed on the east side of Lake Gordon.

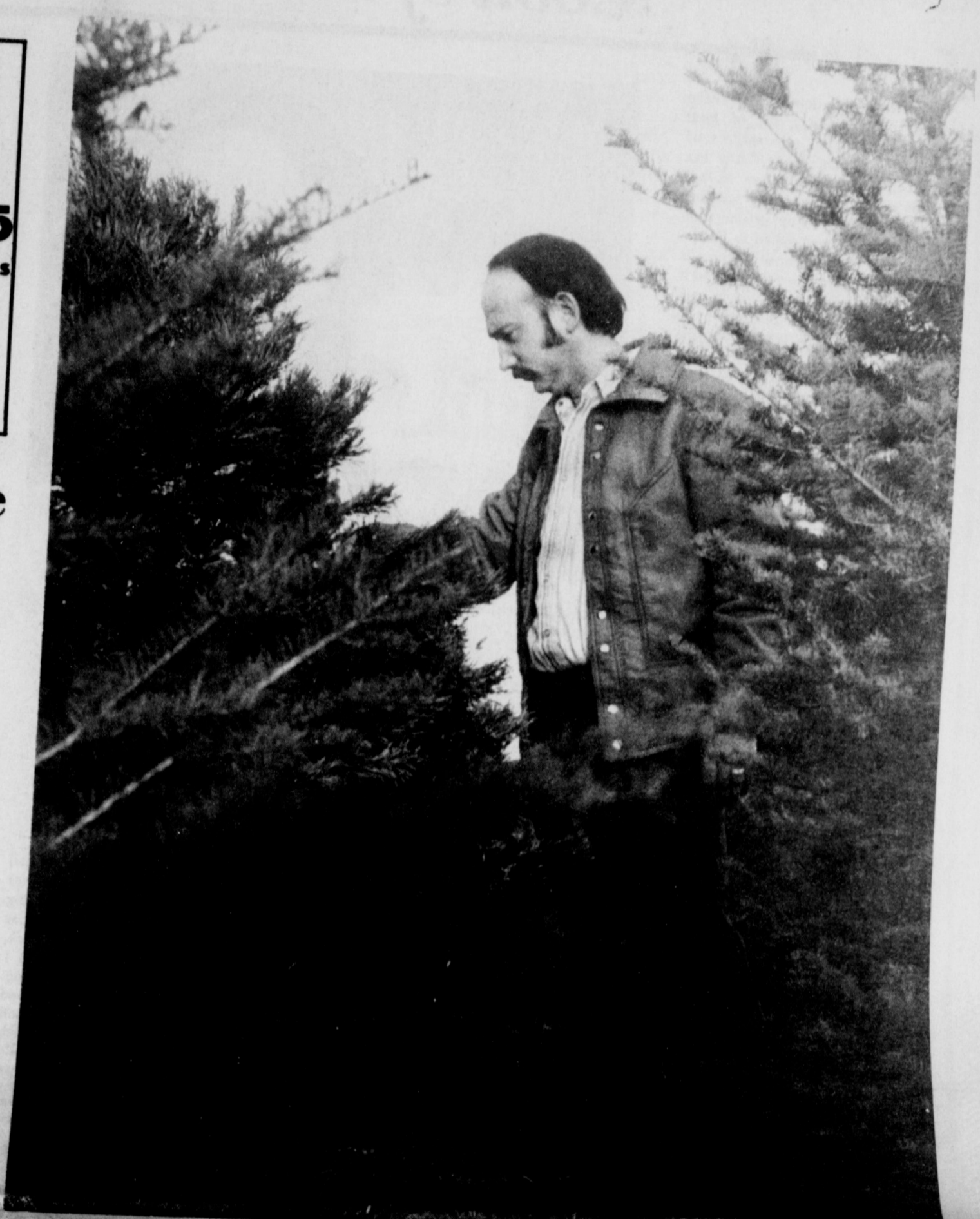
The council will also review the 1979-80 audit report.

Sales tax increase even with inflation

While Iowa Park has pretty well kept up with inflation, showing a 16 percent increase in sales tax receipts, neighboring Holliday has charged a massive 90 percent increase over 1979.

Figures from the state comptroller's office indicate Iowa Park has received \$83,101 for the first 11 months of this year and \$71,241 was reported for the same period in 1979.

Holliday, on the other hand, has increased from \$39,806 through November of 1979 to \$75,988 so far this year.

Adult vocational classes are offered

Iowa Park schools will be offering six community adult courses beginning in January, ranging in length from two hours to a full semester.

But they're vocational, not academic, courses. And they could be the beginning of a wide range of similar courses, depending on the response to the initial offerings.

The courses will include small gasoline engines, furniture finishing and refinishing, engine tune-up and emission controls, communications with children, spray painting techniques, and office skills and procedures.

Selected by a seven-member faculty advisory committee, the initial courses will all be taught by members of the local school's vocational faculty.

Federally funded, the only costs to those who enroll are for items which will be used.

"I hope I have some good response for the courses," explained Richard Davis, who explained the program

Tuesday at the Noon Lions Club. He said about any course topic the public might want could be provided, if adequate interest is indicated.

The local school is offering skills improvement courses that are normally offered by junior colleges and universities in other communities.

Small gasoline engines will be instructed by George Brandt, vocational agriculture instructor. To begin Jan. 19, the six sessions will last through Feb. 23 with two-hour classes between 7 and 9 Monday evenings. Fee will be \$10, which includes a manual on most small engines.

The class will be limited to 14 students. Basic terms, theories and history of two and four stroke engines will be covered and study will be held on cylinder heads, parts of a piston and function, rings, crankshaft, camshaft, valves, fuel, ignition and cooling systems, preventive maintenance and trouble shooting.

Students will do work on their own

small engines during three of the sessions.

Instructing the furniture finishing and refinishing course will be Carey Roberts, home economics instructor. Between \$15 and \$20 worth of supplies will be needed for the six-session course which is to be held

from 7-9 p.m. Tuesdays, starting Jan. 20.

The class will be limited to the first 14.

To be covered in the course will be stripping old finish and stain, sanding, bleaching wood, touch ups, making stains, final finish and

applications.

Engine tune-up and emission controls class will be limited to the first 12 enrollees. To be held from 7-9 p.m. Tuesdays and Thursdays, the four-session class will begin Jan. 20. Robert Sumner, auto mechanics instructor, will teach the course. A fee of \$5 will be charged.

Topics which will be covered include introduction to the parts of a basic ignition system and their function; introduction to electronic ignition systems; fuel systems and emission controls; and students working on vehicles.

One course is entitled "Kids about to drive you up the wall... what can you do? Join a study group for parents and others who want better communication with children" will be instructed by Cindy Mannas, another home economics instructor.

The course will be limited to 14 students. It will begin Jan. 20, and meet 7-9 p.m. every Tuesday for nine sessions.

Course topics will be understanding children's behavior and misbehavior; understanding how children use emotions to involve parents and the "good" parent; encouragement; communication: listening; communication: exploring alternatives and expressing your ideas and feelings to children; developing responsibility; decision-making for parents; the family meeting; developing self-confidence and problem-solving skills.

Wendell Allen will instruct auto body spray painting techniques in eight, two-hour sessions on Tuesdays and Thursdays beginning Jan. 20. A \$15 fee includes consumable materials.

Instruction will include surface preparation: sanding and priming; and spray painting: selection of paint, thinning or mixing of paint, and spray painting procedures.

Most lengthy of all six courses will

Chamber directors vote dues increase

Board of directors of the Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce voted to raise the dues for membership for the coming year.

At the directors' regular monthly meeting Monday, they were told that income had not matched expenses for the year, and the first increase in dues in four years was approved.

Faced with a deficit, directors authorized President Helen Rich to take out a loan to fund the final month of the year.

Directors were told that the Chamber had \$148 in the bank, but \$692 was needed through December. Though \$309 is still on the books in unpaid dues, directors felt a loan up

to \$500 was necessary to complete the year.

Minimum dues for businesses were raised from \$84 annually to \$100, and individual minimum dues from \$15 to \$20. Several businesses and individuals pay higher dues than the minimum, but are voluntary.

Mrs. Rich named Allen Gilstrap, Tommy Key and Linda Merrick to the budget committee to prepare the coming year's budget.

In other business, Key reported on the annual Christmas parade; a new statistics booklet on Iowa Park was revealed; and a letter written to Pres. Carter, informing him of today's 100th birthday of Mrs. W.F. George was read.

Arrest clears home burglary

A home burglary case three weeks earlier was broken here Monday afternoon, when a young Wichita Falls man was arrested.

A microwave oven was reported stolen by Donna Davis at 706 E. Park. Neighbors reported to police having seen a young man in a van enter the home and carry the oven out.

The woman called police shortly before 4 p.m. Monday, saying the same van was in her neighborhood, and that a neighbor was following it.

Sgt. Kurt Cullum found the van and driver parked at Wall and Pecan.

When Sgt. Cullum said he was investigating the oven theft, Scott David Aaron admitted taking it, according to Cullum's report.

Aaron, a Wichita Falls resident who admitted also that he was on probation from another burglary charge, was taken before Justice of the Peace Virgil Hill where he was

charged with burglary and remanded to Wichita County jail under \$1,500 bond.

Aaron was reportedly released after making bond soon after having been turned over to the county jail.

The stolen oven was recovered and yesterday returned to Mrs. Davis.

HERMAN COFFEE CAKE

2 cups Herman
2 cups flour
1 1/2 tps. cinnamon
1 tsp. nutmeg
1 tsp. ginger
1/2 cup oil
1 cup raisins
1/2 tsp. baking soda
1/2 tsp. baking powder
1/4 tsp. salt
1 cup sugar
2 eggs
1 cup chopped nuts
1 cup brown sugar
1 tsp flour
1 tsp. cinnamon
1/4 cup melted oleo or butter

1/2 cup warm water
1 tsp. sugar
1/2 cup lukewarm water
3 cups flour
1/2 tsp. salt
2 cups Herman

FILLING:
1 stick oleo, melted
1 cup sugar
3 tps. cinnamon
Handful of raisins or nuts (optional)

Dissolve yeast in the warm water with 1 tsp. sugar. Mix in remaining ingredients and knead well. Roll out into an oblong piece 1/4" thick. Combine 1 stick melted oleo with 1 cup sugar and 3 tps. cinnamon. Spread over rolled out dough. Spread with raisins or nuts, if desired. Roll up lengthwise as for jelly roll. Pinch edges together. Cut with sharp knife into slices about 1 inch thick. Place cut side up about 1 inch apart in a greased shallow baking dish. Cover with clean towel. Let rise in warm place until doubled in bulk (about 45 minutes). Bake in 350 degree oven for 30 minutes.

ICING, if desired
1/2 cup sifted confectioner's sugar
2 tps. milk
1/8 tsp. vanilla extract
Combine and beat until smooth.

Combine all ingredients in a small saucepan and bring to a boil. Immediately, poke holes in top of cake with fork and pour glaze over cake.

HERMAN CINNAMON ROLLS

1 pkg. yeast

HAM AND MACARONI CASSEROLE

2 cups cooked elbow macaroni
1 lb. cooked ham, cubed

1-4 oz. can sliced mushrooms, drained
1/4 cup sliced pimento-stuffed olives
1/2 cup chopped onion
2 cups sour cream
3 Tbsps. prepared mustard
2-3 tps. caraway seed
1/2 tsp. Worcestershire sauce
1/8 tsp. pepper
1/2 cup shredded Cheddar cheese

Combine macaroni, ham, mushrooms, olives and onions in a large bowl. Combine sour cream, mustard, caraway seed, Worcestershire sauce and pepper, mixing well. Add ham mixture, mix well. Spoon into a 2-quart casserole; top with cheese. Bake at 350 degrees for 30-40 minutes. Yield: 6 servings.

CRANBERRY EGGNOG

3 eggs, separated
1 1/2 cups cranberry juice cocktail
1 cup milk
1 tsp. vanilla
1/4 cup sugar

Beat egg yolks until thick and lemon-colored in a large bowl. Stir in cranberry juice, milk and vanilla; reserve. Beat egg whites in small bowl until foamy-white and double in volume. Beat in sugar, a Tbsp. at a time, until meringue forms soft peaks. Fold egg whites into cranberry-milk mixture until no streaks of whites remain. Pour into tall glasses and serve chilled.

POOR BOY CAKE

1 cup seedless raisins
1 1/2 cups water
1/4 cup shortening

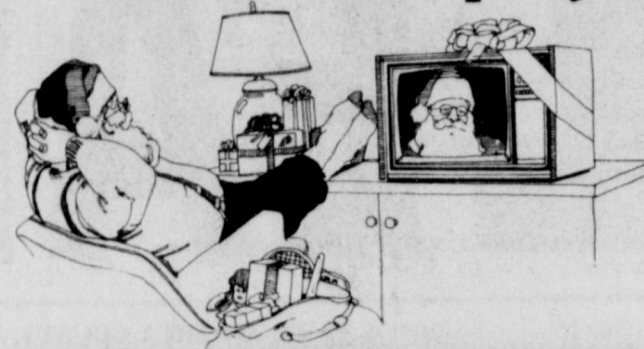
Cook over low heat about 15 minutes. Cool

Sift together: 1 tsp. soda, 1 cup sugar, 2 cups flour, 1 tsp. cinnamon, 1 tsp. nutmeg, 1/2 tsp. salt. Add to cooled liquid.

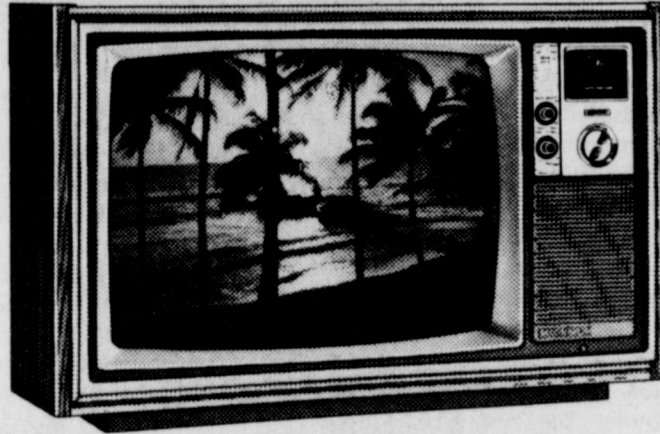

An Open Letter to the Editor

Sir:

We wish to respond to your "As I See It..." editorial of Dec. 11, 1980, and point out two glaring errors on your part and to set the record straight as to the reason why both Hawk Bands did not participate in the Wichita County Christmas Parade on Dec. 6, 1980.

Mr. Hamilton, we are fully aware of responsibilities to the towns people of Iowa Park and have always tried to meet these responsibilities to the best of our ability. Be assured that both Bands would have been at the parade if it would have been possible. What we are preparing to say is not offered as an excuse or apology—just facts!!

First, we must correct your statement that both "units have shunned" this parade in the past. The Hawk Jr. High and Sr. High Band have marched the 1st, 2nd, and 3rd Christmas Parades and done it in very cold weather and the 1st year even dodging horse leavings in the street.

Second, in the last three paragraphs of your editorial you implied that the Hawk Band Directors had "some personal thing" to do that day, going fishing or holding down a second job to help make ends meet! Nothing could be farther from the truth. When we do get free time, it is spent with our families since they see so little of us as it is.

We were responsible for getting 13 High School Band Members in Graham for the 4A-5A All-District Band Clinic and Concert on that day. Among those 13 were both Drum Majors, all of the 1st Trumpet section (the instruments with the melody 99 percent of the time in marching Band music), and three key members of the percussion section (without whom it would be nearly impossible to march or play in a parade. A band without these key people could barely function and would compare to sending the offense of the football team out on the field without the quarterback, fullback, tailback, and center. The past three years this clinic and concert has been held in Iowa Park on days that conflicted with the parade, but we have managed to march anyway. This year it was impossible to be in two places at the same time. (Graham and Iowa Park).

The Jr. High Band was not at the parade because 29 of the 71 members were unable to be there. Most were involved in a 7th and 8th grade girls basketball tournament in Vernon and it was not until late Friday night that their schedule for Saturday would be known to us. Other students were scattered doing things like moving or twirling contests. Among these people were the Drum Major, half the 1st Trumpet Section, and two key members of the Percussion Section. As you must know our Jr. High Band is extremely young this year (48 of 71 are 7th graders) and it would have been extremely difficult to march with those key people missing.

So, Mr. Hamilton, your insinuation of laziness and sloth on the part of the Band Directors doesn't hold water. If you had bothered to check with us, or Tommy Key (Parade Organizer), you would have been able to print "the Rest of the Story". Yes, people have asked us why we were not there, and when we tell them, their reply has been "we understand, but we missed you. We certainly hope you can make it next year." We hope so, too!

We have received an apology from Mr. Key for things he said which may have misled and caused hard feelings among others around town and we believe that you, Mr. Hamilton, owe our students, Band Parents, and ourselves an apology also. Your article was in extremely poor taste and an excellent example of POOR Journalism.

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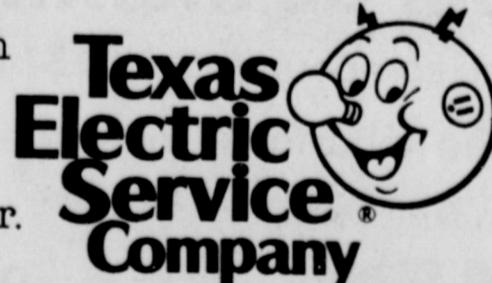
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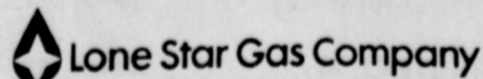

JUNIOR VARSITY WINS

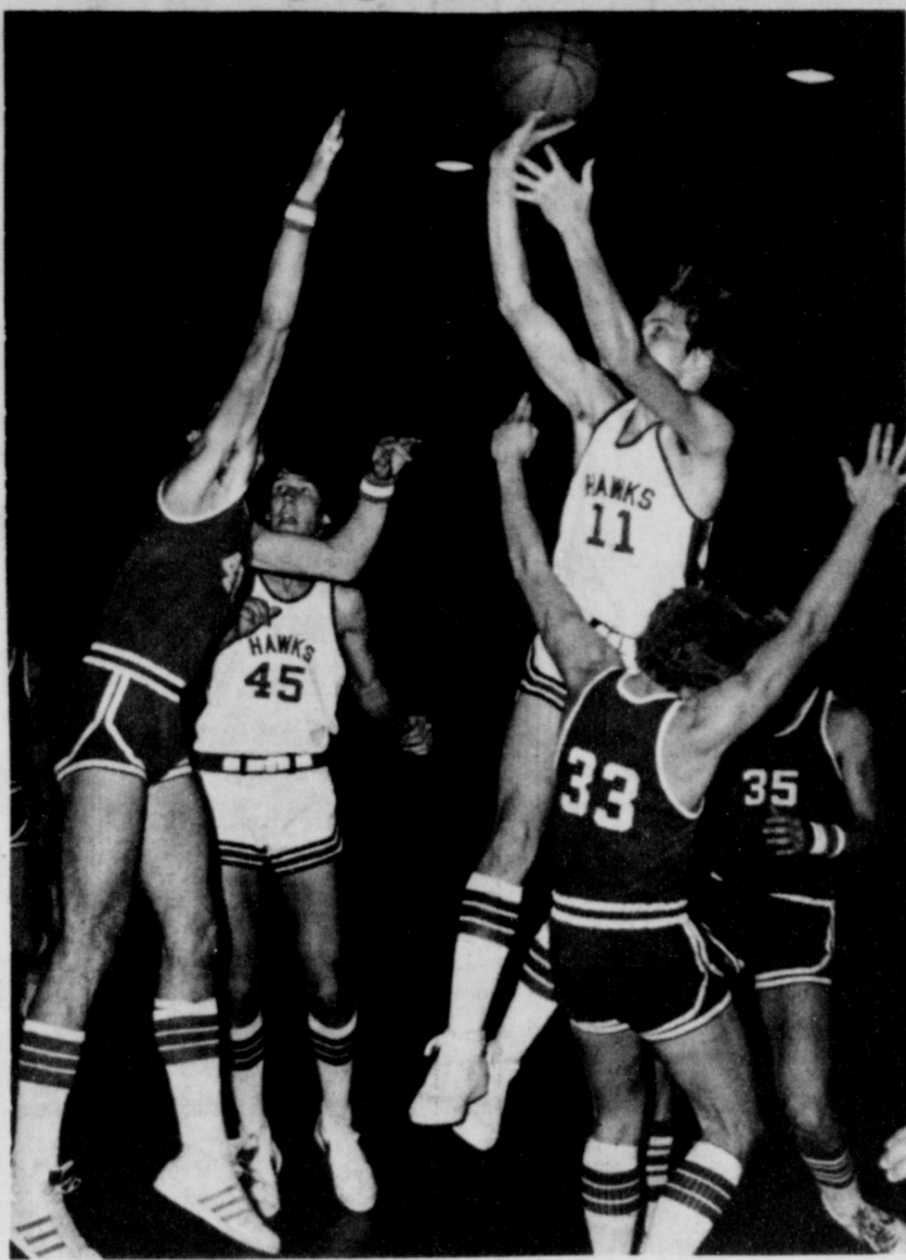

Therefore, in reciprocation let us provide for their needs when they become dependent. It is certainly one of the ugliest sins in the world for children who have the ability to care for aged parents to leave them to the mercy of charity.

It has been said that youth is the age of preparation; maturity is the time of production; and old age is the time of rest. This being true, we should rejoice to see those of old age enjoy a change of pace from the busier days of life. The decrease of

capacity, the increase of infirmity, the prospect of the end, often oppress the aging with gloom and tempt him to sadden others with the shadow of his own distress. Even though we respect and admire the hoary head, we especially venerate the gray head of the righteous, Solomon said, "The hoary head is a crown of glory, if it be found in the way of righteousness" Prov. 16:31. How sad it is to see a person approach the sunset of life who looks back down through the years and says, "I have no pleasure in them." For his wasted life he has nothing worth while to recall. To him life is but an unworthy dream.

But how wonderful to see an aged Christian come to the sunset hour calm and unafraid, to meet the last great call without fear, poised and triumphant. How beautiful. How glorious. When strength is failing and the shadows of eventide are falling thick and fast, and the unknown future is before him, he can know that he has the favor of God to delight and sustain him if he has walked in the paths of righteousness. As Browning expressed it, "Grow old along with me! The best is yet to be. . ."

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City gives employees Christmas bonuses

Christmas bonuses were given to all city employees, and one employee's salary was increased during Holliday city council's regular meeting Monday night.

Councilmen dealt with several issues during a short period, which included giving a \$50 Christmas bonus to each city employee, a \$100 bonus to city attorney James Cook for unselfish service over the past two years, and increasing policeman Larry Spencer's salary \$50, to \$950 per month.

After hearing a report from mayor Tom Hall concerning the current water deposit rates, councilmen voted to double the current required deposit of \$20 to \$40.

The water deposit is deducted on the customer's final bill, if the customer has kept his payments current.

According to Hall, the city has lost revenue in the past, when a customer would run up a \$35 water bill, then leave town with the city \$15 in the hole.

In other business, councilmen accepted a bid to install a manhole and sewer line, heard a report by civil defense director Melvin Bills concerning the installation of three CD sirens, tabled discussion in naming an official "hometown

newspaper", and instructed Spencer to refurbish his first aid supplies.

Council accepted a bid from Garcias Backhoe Service for the installation of a manhole and lid, and a 600-foot sewer line. The lone bid submitted was for \$2,650, with all materials and labor furnished.

Grove Electric, which was awarded the bid to install the city's three new civil defense sirens, has not been contacted since the council's actions, and, therefore, hasn't begun work yet, according to Bills.

Aldermen instructed Cook to draw up contracts as soon as possible, in order for Grove Electric to begin work.

In addition, Hall was instructed to contact City National Bank regarding a \$20,000 loan to pay for the sirens.

Leader reporter Kevin Hamilton asked the council to reconsider action taken earlier in the year in naming an official "hometown newspaper" for

the publication of legal notices. Hamilton asked the council to consider the Leader as the city's official newspaper effective Jan. 1.

The Archer County News, on a motion proposed by alderman Jim Virdell in the council's June meeting, was named the official newspaper until Dec. 31.

Councilmen tabled discussion of the issue until the January meeting, at which time the Archer County News will present circulation figures for Holliday.

Spencer informed the council his first aid kit, required by law to be kept in the squad car in case of emergencies, was missing several items, and currently was useful only in "setting finger splints".

Councilmen instructed Spencer to restock the kit. In addition, Bills was given the okay on the purchase of an oxygen bottle, to be used in emergency cases in the city.

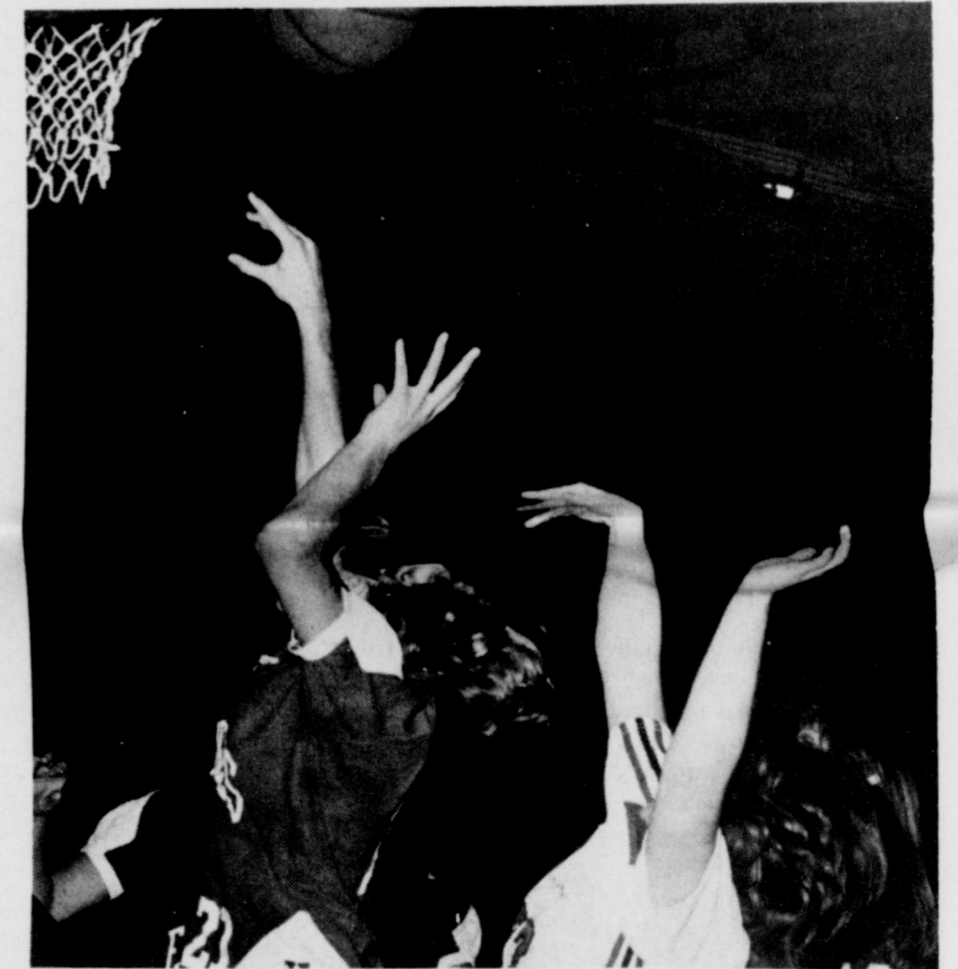



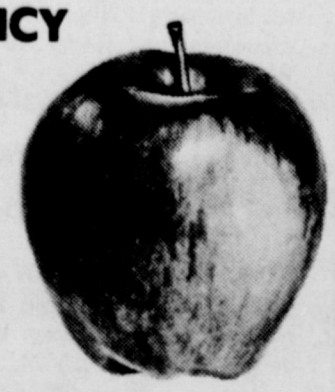
