Library, train speed get council's action

The Iowa Park city council Monday night provided initial funds toward construction of a library building, increased speeds for trains to pass through the community, and approved an architectural firm for remodeling of the city hall.

But only the vote on the railroad speed passed unanimously.

The audience was crowded with members and supporters of the library board, whose spokesperson was Mrs. W.A. George. During the public hearing held for budgeting of the federal revenue sharing money, she asked that the city provide \$5,000 for architect fees to draft plans for the new library.

Mrs. George explained that her group has plans to build the new library just west of the present facility, which has for several years been located in the old school home economics building.

The architect's plans would be used to solicit grants from various foundations for a portion of the construction costs. Charlie Lee, who heads the grant soliciting committee, said a strong local support, financially, goes a long way in the decision making of foundations.

Robert Wilcox showed an exterior drawing of the proposed structure, explaining it would be 7,000 square feet. He noted it would be 1,000 larger than Burk Burnett's, and would not require enlargement for many years in the future.

Afton Pike pointed out that Iowa Park's library contains 10,048 volumes, less than those reported by libraries in Electra, Nocona, Seymour, Quanah and Henrietta. But in order to grow, the new building was a necessity.

Alderman Bill Gilmore wanted to donate \$40,000 which was budgeted for renovation of the city hall to the library, and he was supported by Bud Thompson.

But when the votes were counted, Gilmore and Thompson were opposed by Bud Adams, George Hammonds and Lita Watson, who explained they were not against the library, but were providing the money which had been requested.

The \$5,000 is to come from \$7,316 unallocated money left in the revenue sharing budget.

Burlington Railroad district superintendent Jimmy Lewis appeared before the council, at the city's request, to answer questions about his firm's need to increase train speeds through the city and problems incurred by slower speeds.

An ordinance proposing to increase speeds from 12 miles per hour to 23 was amended to permit 30 mile per hour through town. Lewis explained the 23 MPH maximum was not only difficult to maintain but hazardous to the rail bed because of rocking cars. Slightly higher speeds present no

problems, he said.

Aldermen admitted they were anxious to increase train speeds through town to cut short waiting lines of vehicles at crossings.

Council members approved April 4 for the election date. Terms of Gilmore, Hammonds and Adams will expire this spring. Adams announced he would not seek re-election this year.

Aldermen postponed action on a proposed housing addition just west of Bradford Elementary, explaining they wanted more study of the proposed plat and how it related to existing development in the area.

A proposal by Mayor Johnny Crawford to name Harper Perkins Architects of Wichita Falls to draw plans for renovation of the city hall was approved, but on a vote of three approving, one against (Gilmore) and one abstaining (Adams).

Crawford reminded aldermen of many discussions over the past years to renovate the city hall in three phases. The first is to take in the old fire station; the second, to remodel the existing area; and the third, to improve the outside, provide offstreet parking and a drive-through window.

Business burglary reported Saturday

Trustees OK Bradford gym

wanted to be as close as possible for their decision.

Bids for construction will be in two phases. The first phase, to be opened Feb. 26, will be for the pre-cast concrete portion of the structure and its erection. To be opened Mar. 10 will be bids for general contractor for work other than erection.

Trustees decided during the meeting to have Daugherty alter the plans to permit skylights in the roof.

They said the need for lights to be on throughout each school day would be eliminated with the natural light which would be allowed.

Daugherty estimated cost of the building would be \$36.98 per square foot for the 3,552-foot building. "I've cut out everything we could possibly cut, even exterior lights," he told trustees. The original estimate, with everything which had been wanted, was \$253,000.

Though space is allotted in the building for a music room and dressing room facilities, they will not be put in the first bid. The structure will have four walls, plumbing stubbed in, two doors, lighting and heating.

April 4 was set for the school trustee election. Precinct 32 poll will be at Kidwell Elementary; Bradford will be the voting poll for precincts 33, 42 and 60; Valley View for precincts 34, 35, 59 and Archer County precinct 9.

Given one-year contracts for the 1981-82 school year were all principals and key personnel.

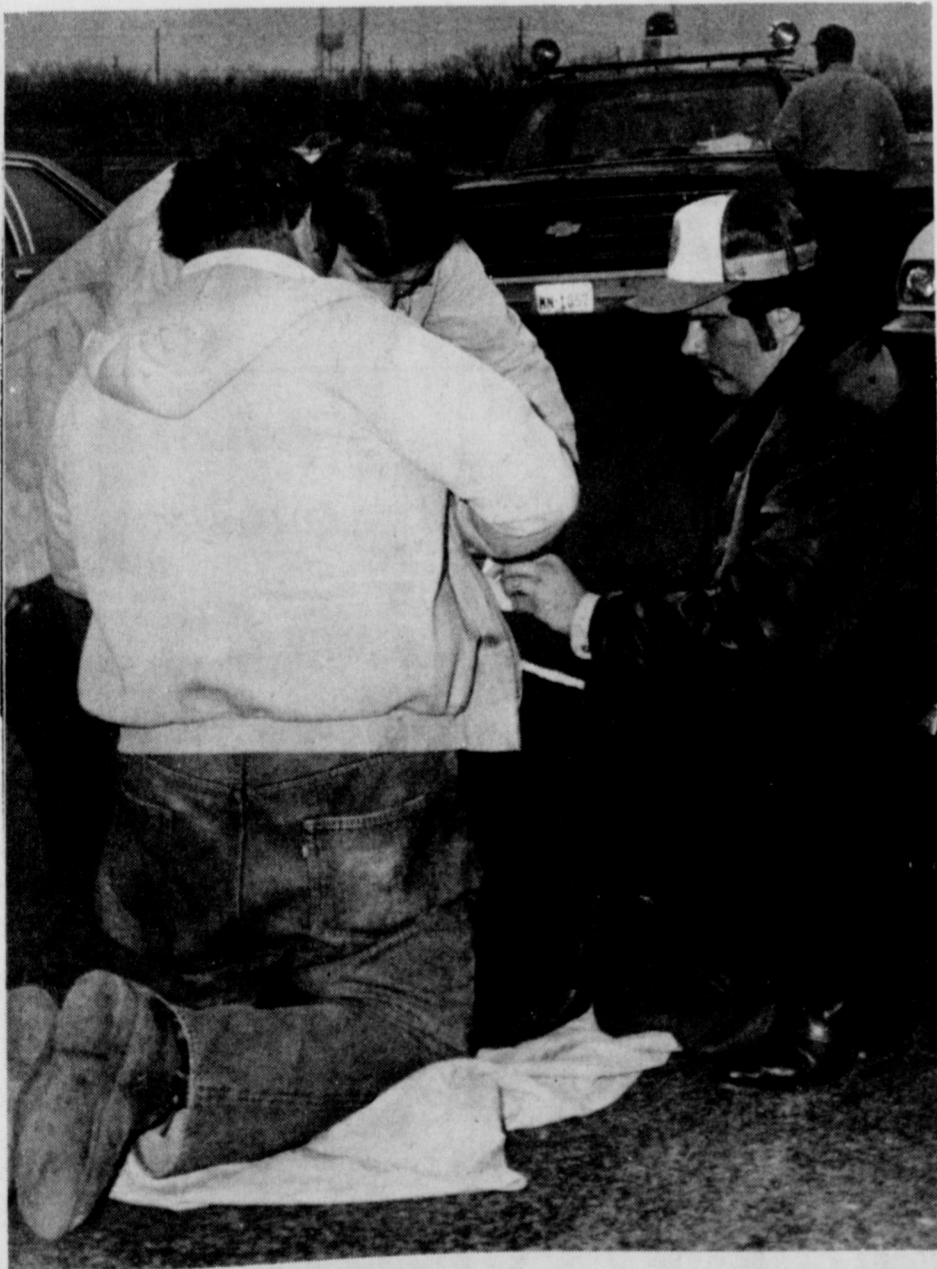
Resignations from Robert Needham, Ethel Jeter and Tommy Watkins were accepted.

Supt. Harold Cowley also told the board he expected to hire another first grade teacher this week to alleviate crowded conditions at Kidwell Elementary.

Because of an influx of new students, Cowley said a sixth teacher for the first grade was necessary, where two rooms now have 28 students and three have 29.

In other business, trustees declined a request from the FFA to hold a second sausage sale; heard a presentation for insurance; and were told by Steger that cafeteria participation continues to average 85 percent of school enrollment, and 94 percent of all school taxes had been collected Jan. 31.

Moisture, cold get attention

There's no question that weather has been on the minds of people this week.

Monday the area received its first appreciable measurement of moisture in more than two months, followed by cold and windy weather Tuesday, and capping things early Wednesday morning with seven degree temperature.

Slightly more than half an inch precipitation was measured Monday at the Experiment Station southeast of town. The .52 measured was the first good moisture since Dec. 8, when 1.93 was recorded.

Monday's moisture, added to the .05 recorded Jan. 31, gives the area a total of .57 of an inch for the calendar year. At this time last year, 1.87 had been listed.

HONEY CHICKEN

1 broiler-fryer chicken, cut in parts
1 tsp. accent flavor enhancer
1 tsp. salt
3/4 tsp. pepper
1/4 cup corn oil
1/2 cup honey
2 Tbsps. soy sauce
Place chicken, skin side up, in large shallow baking pan in single layer. Sprinkle flavor enhancer, salt and pepper on chicken; let stand 10 minutes.

Mix together corn oil, honey and soy sauce and drizzle on chicken. Bake uncovered in 350 degree oven about an hour or until fork can be inserted with ease; baste frequently. Serves 4.

SWEET & SOUR CHICKEN

In small saucepan, combine:
1 Tbsp. cornstarch
1 Tbsp. cold water
Add:
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 cup soy sauce
1 clove garlic minced
1/4 cup vinegar
1/2 tsp. ground ginger
1/4 tsp. black pepper.

Cook and stir over medium heat until mixture thickens and bubbles. Brush two - 2 to 2 1/2 lb. broiler-fryers and split in half lengthwise with glaze. Place skin side down in greased shallow baking dish.
Bake at 425 degrees for 30 minutes. Brush with glaze every 10 minutes. Turn chicken skin side up. Bake 30 minutes, brushing occasionally with glaze. Drain 1 can crushed pineapple or pineapple spears and add during last 10 minutes of baking. Serves 4.

EASY CHICKEN ENCHILADAS

Boil under tender one whole chicken, cool and debone.
In frying pan, combine 1 chopped onion, 1 stick butter and saute. Add: 1 can cream of chicken soup
1 can chopped green chilies
1/4 cup chicken broth
Chicken, cut in small pieces
In large casserole, put layer of Doritos, grated cheese and mixture. Repeat, ending with layer of cheese. Bake at 350 degrees about 25 to 30 minutes. Serves 6.

Study Club hears teacher

"There are three great needs of a nation: common language, common worship and common history, and I am going to concentrate on the last one as I discuss 'What It Means To Be An American' this afternoon", stated Mrs. John Meux to introduce her address for the 23 Study Club meeting Thursday afternoon.

To prove that no Americans really know all there is to know about the nation's history, she gave a trivia test which revealed startling facts, such as: there were seven presidents in Congress before George Washington; four of the states, Kentucky, Massachusetts, Pennsylvania and Virginia, have more self-government than state; three states were named for famous women; David Rice Atchinson served as president for only one day, March 4, 1849; two states have no counties, Louisiana with parishes and Alaska with burroughs, etc. etc.

Mrs. Meux, teacher of social studies in Iowa Park High School, considers it a great honor to be an educator, wife of an educator and mother of an educator in America. She gave several definitions of Americanism, one of the most meaningful of these was "attachment or allegiance to the traditions, interests or ideals of the U.S. or of democracy as practiced in the U.S." She also emphasized that it was a socio-political principle or practice essential to American national culture, the Declaration of Independence or the U.S. Constitution.

During her stirring address, Mrs. Meux aroused her audience to an appreciation of the privileges they enjoy as American citizens and to their responsibilities to keep it "the land of the free and the home of the

brave." She closed with part of a statement by Henry Cabot Lodge "Americanism of the right sort we cannot have too much of..."

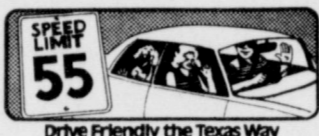

As I See It....

In just about every case I can think of, there's a right way and a wrong way to do something. There's an order of proper approach.

In the military, there's a term called "chain of command." That means, when you want something, you start at the beginning, or lowest form of authority, and you work your way to the top.

The same thing works in our judicial system. You start at courts on the local level, and can appeal right to the federal supreme court.

What this is all leading up to, is an instance which came to light last week. It, in a sense, was an embarrassment to our schools and community. And it was unnecessary.

Someone complained to a Wichita Falls television station that a teacher at the Iowa Park Junior High was not treating their children right. They made several allegations.

The tv people interviewed them on camera. Then a reporter, with camera, came to Iowa Park and interviewed Jimmy Alsup.

But it should never have been put on the air.

The problem was, according to all authorities I can find, the parents never complained locally. They never talked to Alsup, or Supt. Harold Cowley, or even a member of the school board.

All Alsup could tell the reporter was "I don't know anything about it. The parents have never approached me."

I'm not taking up for our schools. I know things have happened in the past, may be happening now, and surely will happen in the future, which need correcting. But, like I said, there's a right way and a wrong way to attack a problem.

If a parent has a complaint about a teacher, school conditions, or something like that, they should contact the principal. If he does not give a positive and acceptable response, go to the superintendent. That's the principal's immediate superior. And if that doesn't work, go to the school board. But do it in that order.

Then, if all else fails and you still believe wrong is being done and that you have a real case, take it to the public.

Surely, there's no reason to bring to the attention of someone down at Graham a problem you feel exists in our local school, if you haven't even approached the school's principal about it first!

Have you ever noticed how quickly Wichita Falls television stations jump on anything that is, or might be, sensational of nature here in Iowa Park?

I'd like to pay my respects to Mr. Rhea Howard, publisher of the Wichita Falls Times and Record News, who died Monday.

Though our paths crossed only a few times, I learned to respect Mr. Howard. He has left a lasting and good impression on this part of the world.

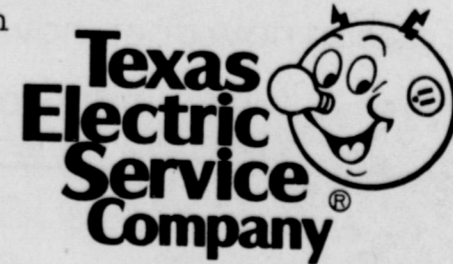
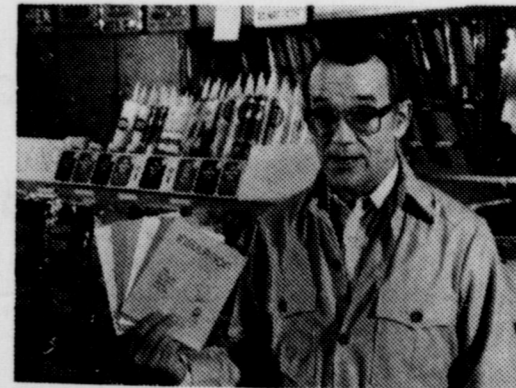

Trustees call election, extend four contracts

Holliday school trustees renewed contracts for four administrators and set the date for the upcoming school elections in a marathon meeting Monday night.

After meeting in executive session lasting more than three hours, trustees unanimously approved the contract extensions of principals Bill Lee and Dan Owen, and athletic director Don Lucy.

Trustees added a stipulation to Lee's contract calling for him to continue taking college courses toward his administrative degree.

Band director Tom Woody was awarded a year's extension on his contract by surviving a split vote. Gene Harmon, Durhl Causey and Terry Parnell voted against the extension, while Jack Ayres, Jake Cottrell and Larry Finnell voted for. Board president Tommy Mankins' yea vote was the deciding factor for the second time in two meetings. Superintendent Ray Coe's contract was also renewed in the January meeting on a split vote.

The extensions for all four are effective through the 1982-83 school year.

Trustees officially set the voting date for April 4. Two positions will be included on the ballot, with the terms of Causey and Harmon expiring.

Trustees moved the absentee box to the school's tax office, located in the elementary building. Jana Goforth was named election judge, and Mrs. Sherry Roland election clerk.

Voting boxes for the election will be located in Holliday, Dundee, Bowman and Lakeside.

So far, only one candidate has surfaced for the two vacancies. Former school board member Bob Martin announced his candidacy this week. Martin dropped out of last year's trustee election, choosing instead to run for Archer County commissioner.

In other business, board members met with Don Talley concerning the Archer County tax appraisal board, added discussion of this year's senior trip to the agenda, set guidelines for bus maintenance and agreed to sell approximately 150 used school desks.

Talley informed board members of the appraisal board's attempts to set up an office in the Archer County courthouse, and the need to pay salaries to three appraisers and one secretary.

Out of a \$93,000 budget, \$20,457 has been appropriated to employee's salaries. Out of that, trustees agreed to pay \$6,819, retroactive from January. Holliday tax appraiser Louis Hodge was named assistant appraiser for the county board along with Charlie McDaniel of Archer City. Both will receive \$500 per month plus benefits for work done "above and beyond" their regular duties.

\$53,000 of the budget will go to Pritchard and Abbott under a contract with the appraisal board.

According to Talley, the alternative would be to set up an office with

the state appraisal board, in the process paying almost \$20,000 more for salaries. "We just wanted to set up an office without spending \$300,000," Talley said. Talley also mentioned that Hodges worked last year in the same capacity without a salary. "We feel if they (the appraisers) are going to keep working, they should be rewarded," he added.

The subject of senior trips was placed on the agenda, with Lee acting as spokesman. Lee said the senior class of 1981 chose four different locations for its upcoming trip.

According to Lee, the board was to approve which trip it felt was feasible. The proposed trips include San Antonio - Galveston - Houston, Arkansas, New Orleans, or San Antonio - Padre Island - Port Aransas.

Trustees decided to eliminate New Orleans from the list, leaving the remaining choices for the seniors to determine for themselves.

It was also decided the chartered buses would leave at 7 a.m. the day of the trip.

Board members approved a maintenance work form in order to properly maintain the school buses. Bus drivers will be given a form to fill out in case maintenance is needed, and Coe will be given a duplicate copy when the work is requested and completed.

Trustees agreed to sell approximately 150 used school desks at \$5 apiece, after Coe informed the board of a surplus. In addition the board agreed to advertise the sale.



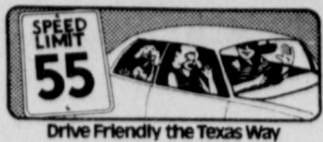

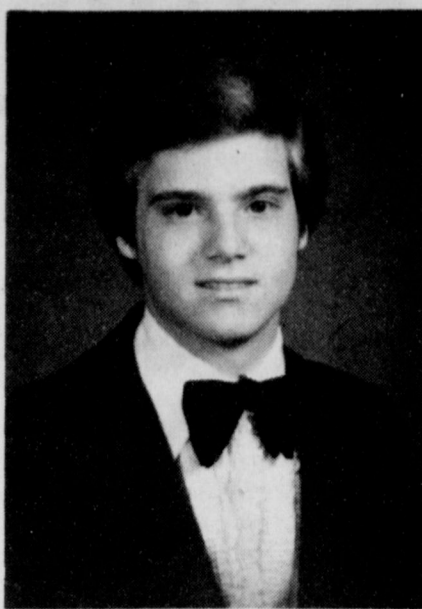

OF TEXAS, 748 Vella Road, Palm Springs, California 92264, holder of License No. 81-2 of the State of Texas, intends to engage in an operation to change or attempt to change by artificial methods the natural development of appropriate atmospheric cloud forms or precipitation forms which occur in the troposphere, for and on behalf of COTTON COUNTY SERVICES, INC., Route #1, Randlett, Oklahoma 73562. An application will be filed with the Texas Department of Water Resources to conduct a program of weather modification to increase useful precipitation by means of a ground-based silver iodide dispenser network.
1. The area in which the dispenser network will be operated includes the Texas Counties of Archer, Baylor, Clay, Foard, Hardeman, Knox, Wichita, and Wilbarger.
2. The target area includes all of Cotton County, Oklahoma and the adjacent portion of Tillman County, Oklahoma, east of Highway 54 (extended south to the Texas border).
3. The area adjacent to the target area which may be subject to the effects of the operation are within the State of Oklahoma and in general within 15 to 20 miles of the target area. The maximum intentional effect is in the target, but some downwind effect may occur in Oklahoma mostly to the immediate northeast of the target. There would be no significant intentional effect in Texas from the operation of these dispensers.
4. The materials and methods to be used in conducting the operation are silver iodide electric arc ground-based dispensers that have an output in the range of 1/2 to 2 grams per hour per dispenser.
5. The person who will be in charge of the operation is Mr. Martin Derus.
6. The period of the operation is expected to begin when the state permit is granted and to continue for four years thereafter.
7. A Texas Weather Modification License was issued to Irving P. Krick, Inc. of Texas on April 20, 1972, and has been renewed each year through 1981.
