Bradford gym contract is let

School trustees Tuesday night awarded a general contractor's contract for construction of a physical education building for the Bradford Elementary campus.

Miller and Holmes Construction Co. was low bidder for \$107,513. That bid, with the concrete construction bid accepted earlier, will bring the cost of the structure to \$152,000.

Trustees, for about the third or fourth time since the project was initiated, reconsidered building a steel building. But its cost was estimated at \$121,000. Protection against storms afforded by the concrete construction, as well as more lost time, helped the board to make its final decision.

Dirt work for construction is expected to begin in 45 to 60 days, with a safety fence to keep children away from the site.

Construction on the structure is to be completed in mid August.

In other business, the board awarded a bid for purchase of an automobile, but took into consideration for later action bids for purchase

of band instruments and insurance of school property.

Shaw Motor Company was the lowest of two bids for a four-door automobile. The school purchased a 1981 LTD for \$8,199.

Bids for the band instruments and property insurance were held for study. Awarding of the instruments bids is to take place in April. The property insurance bids will be studied more at a called meeting this evening.

Trustees approved two biology class trips to Dallas, one to the museum and one to the zoo. Both will be on Saturdays.

Supt. Harold Cowley told the board of his plans for recovering the floors of the cafeteria, speech auditorium and halls of that wing of the high school during this summer's maintenance program.

Though trustees took no action on a proposal by the city library board to turn the old home economics building now housing the city library over to the board, trustees indicated no reluctance to cooperate.

During a discussion on the issue, it was pointed out that the project should not result in any cost to the school district, and turning the land and structure over to the library would be done once the adjoining property required for the site was obtained.

Called Meeting

A called meeting has been slated for this evening, primarily to consider contracts for all professional and para-professional personnel, as well as considering salary adjustments.

Council meeting 'short, sweet'

Monday's meeting of the Iowa Park city council can only be described as "short and sweet."

The meeting, which included a 15-minute executive session, was ended in slightly less than an hour, but had an unexpected highlight at the end.

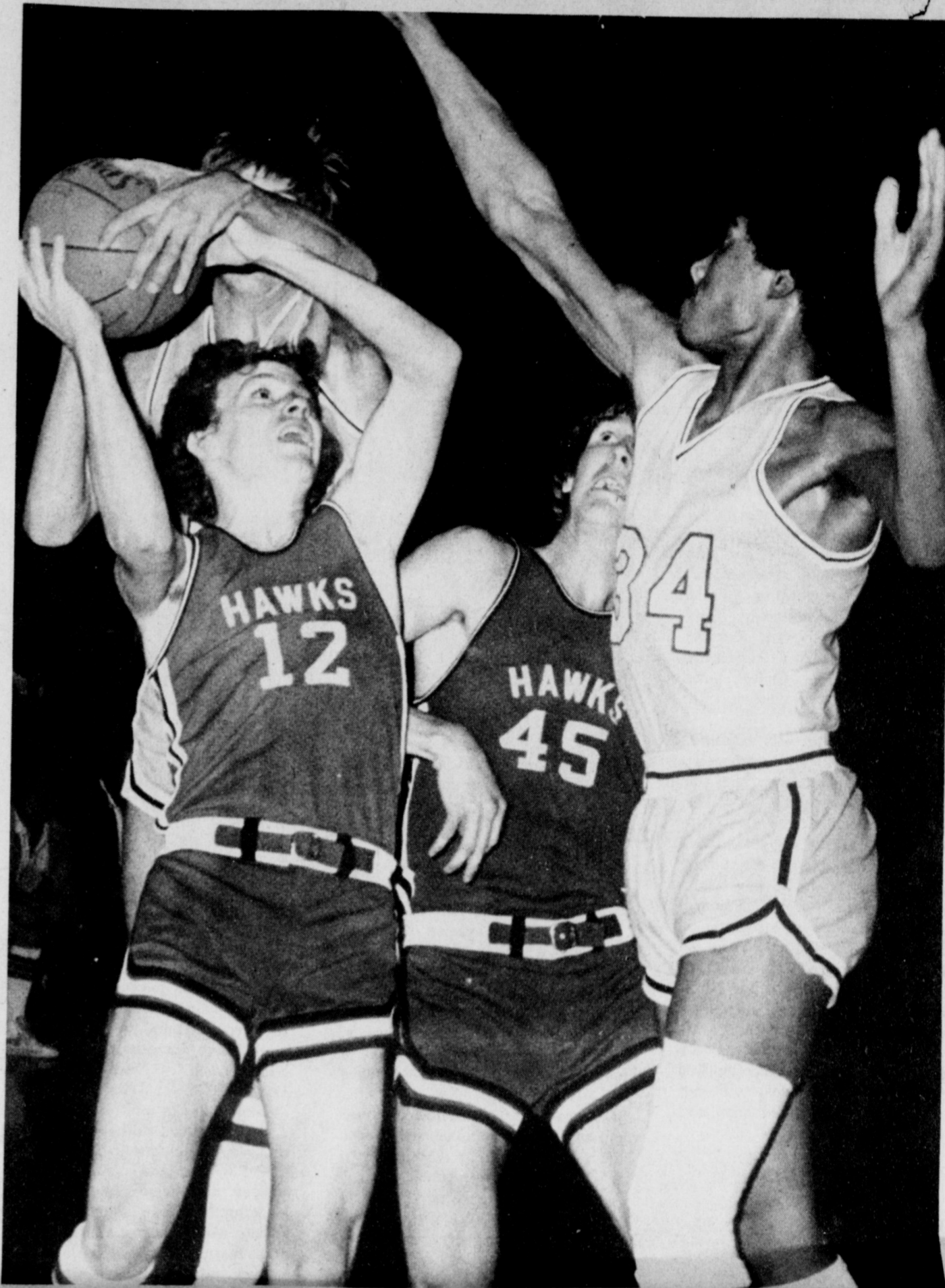
Following the regular session, and a session of the board of adjustments, Floyd "Bud" Adams was presented a plaque for his six years service on the council.

Adams, who noted the meeting would be his last because he is moving to Kingsville in the near future, is the "senior citizen" of the council, having served six years.

Ballots for the Apr. 4 city election were designated by numbers for precinct polls. Numbers one through 25 were set aside for absentee voting; 26-775 for precinct 32; and 766-1,000 for precinct 33.

Absentee voting, it was pointed out, will begin Monday at the city hall. Voting will be permitted between 8:30 a.m. and 5 p.m. weekdays through Mar. 31.

While sitting as the board of adjustments, a variance was granted for the minimum lot size for lot 11B, Block nine, First Addition, at Clara and Jackson.

Cleburne tops Hawks for bi-district title

The basketball season came to an abrupt and frustrating halt for the Iowa Park Hawks Tuesday night at Stephenville, when Cleburne walked off the court with a 62-43 bi-district victory.

For the Hawks, it was a good season, despite finishing with a 17-12 record, because they had given Iowa Park High its first district basketball championship since 1964.

But it was also a frustrating finish for the Mean Green, because their patented second-half rally failed to

materialize. Instead, it was the Yellow Jackets who found the third and fourth quarters to their liking.

Cleburne, playing in its first bi-district game ever, held a slim 22-18 lead as the teams took the Tarleton State Univ. gym floor after the midway rest period. The Yellow Jackets bombed the nets four consecutive times from about 25 feet, and jumped to a 30-18 lead in less than three minutes.

Steve Page hit a couple of quick baskets to draw the Hawks within 10 points, 22-32, with 3:04 left in the third, and Steve Smith hit a layup with four seconds remaining, to account for Iowa Park's scoring in the period which ended with Cleburne leading 39-24.

The Yellow Jackets opened up their offense throughout the second half. Holding as much as a 19-point lead, they were able to control the tempo of the game and force the Hawks into playing catch-up.

Besides trying to steal the ball, the Hawks often had to foul to try to get the ball. And that was just what Cleburne wanted. The Yellow Jackets bombed the nets from the charity line, hitting 18 of 30 attempts, most of them coming in the second half.

And, as it has been all season, when the Hawks aren't hitting the free shots, they lose. And they were able to connect on only seven of 17 attempts.

The frustration really began to show during the last two minutes of the game.

Cleburne's tallest player, Steve Harper, stole a pass and drove the length of the court. As he went up for a layup, Smith caught him from behind, reached up with his arm and knocked the 6-3 center to the floor.

Though he had only four fouls at that time, the official ejected him from the game.

Page collected his fifth foul with 47 seconds remaining. He was on the court with four junior varsity players Coach Earnie Reusch had inserted with 1:39 remaining, as the Hawks trailed 39-56.

Page and Smith led Hawk scoring with 14 points each. Page had six field goals and was two of five from the foul line. Smith hit seven field goals, but failed to connect on either of his two free shots.

Ken Thomason finished with seven points. Two points each were recorded by Bobby Bates, Steve Harris, Kevin Biddy and Russ Hayley.

Iowa Park hit only 18 field goals, and committed 32 personal fouls. Cleburne hit 22 field goals and was charged with only 22 fouls.

The Yellow Jackets, who start only one senior and four juniors, earned the bi-district berth Thursday night by defeating Everman 44-43.

They will meet Canyon, a two-point victor over Snyder Tuesday, this weekend for the regional final and a berth in the state tournament. Canyon will be trying to match the accomplishment of that school's girls' team, which won the state title Saturday night.

Tuesday's game, played before a partisan Cleburne crowd which outnumbered Iowa Parkans about 8-1, was the last for four Hawk seniors: Thomason, Mark Kirkham, Dan Muckensturm and Robert Hastings.

BETTER BUSINESS BUREAU TIPS

Mail-order plants, trees

As spring approaches, many homeowners turn their attention to making their yards beautiful and green. Buying plants and trees by mail is one popular and established way, with many reliable suppliers and satisfied customers. But the Better Business Bureau warns consumers to be on guard against fraudulent mail-order companies who are interested in another type of greenery--their customers' money.

Beware of the company that makes grossly exaggerated claims about its products. If, for example, the promotional material promises trees that "grow 20 feet in one year" or "supply bushels of fruit from summer to fall," watch out. If it claims that its plants "will grow and survive anywhere in the United States," "are resistant to insects, disease and damage from wind or ice," or "need no care," beware.

Another technique of unscrupulous sellers is the creation of exotic names for plants. In many cases, these are common plants with fanciful descriptions and inflated prices. For example, a tree described as "The Silver Acer" may be sold in a local nursery under its actual name, the

silver maple. The Federal Trade Commission requires that a nursery product has a generally recognized and well-established common name, that name must be used in all advertisements.

As with any purchase, and especially with mail-order items that one can't fully examine first, if a claim sounds too good to be true, it often isn't.

Understand any Guarantees

The matter of guarantees is also an important point with mail-order plants. Before making a purchase, learn exactly what is guaranteed and for how long, and what special conditions are involved. Some mail-order firms use a "satisfaction on arrival" guarantee. The Federal Trade Commission warns, though, that much nursery stock is shipped while dormant and the average purchaser can't determine the health of dormant plants.

It is inevitable that some plants or trees will be damaged in the shipping process. Reliable companies understand this and have a systematic, responsive procedure for replacement. But with all too many

fly-by-night nurseries, getting in touch or obtaining a refund can be difficult, if not impossible.

The "Work-at-Home" Scheme

Another costly scheme of deceptive mail-order plant companies is the work-at-home "opportunity." The typical offer promises quick profits for growing plants at home and selling them back to the company. The investment can be between \$3,000 and \$6,000 for the greenhouse, equipment, starter plants, soil and fertilizer, but the profits are usually non-existent.

This scheme has preyed upon the retired and elderly, who could use the promised income and can ill-afford the loss. While the promoter may sign a contract agreeing to buy back the plants, the transaction is usually subject to the promoter's approval of the grown plants. It is easy for the unscrupulous company to reject them and keep the total investment.

These deceptive mail-order firms generally rely on their sales income for the money to buy back plants. BBB records show that more than one such company has gone bankrupt after selling the supplies around the country, leaving the investors in the

lurch.

Whether buying plants or investing in an at-home business, consider the facts carefully before going ahead. Contact the Better Business Bureau to obtain a reliability report on a company. If there are questions or problems later, it's important that the company still be around and willing to stand behind its product. The cautious plant or tree buyer who investigates before investing won't "see red" instead of green.

Author's impressions of state are reviewed

A review of "Texas" by Howard La Fay, taken from National Geographic magazine, highlighted by the author's impression of the state as he criss-crossed it, was given by Mrs. W.G. Steele during the meeting of the 23 Study Club Thursday afternoon.

Her performance attested to thorough preparation, mastery of her subject and the Texas dialect emphasized by the writer, such as: "How yew" (how are you?), and the obligatory response, "ah'm fahn, how yew?". "mah wahf don lak" (my wife don't like), etc.

Mrs. Steele began the writers crisscross of Texas with his words, "Anywhere in Texas the best time is dawn. The sun flares above oil fields, remote ranches, the dew-kissed produce of early markets, and searches out gaudy cities."

The trip started at dawn on the Brazos River and ended at the

200-square mile 0-6 Ranch near Alpine, and when the author left Texas he had "a mosaic of memories of rodeos, round-ups and technology beyond comprehension." He had learned that the state was mammoth in every way including comedy, tragedy and spirit.

Had the author heard Mrs. Steele's review of his article which abounded in striking expression, description and animation, he would no doubt have said, "Well ah'm jus fahn" (I'm just fine), and so is the State of Texas and her book review artists."

Some of the most important places of the Lone Star State, with more than 13 million people ranking the third most populous of the fifty states, emphasized by Mrs. Steele included Houston, America's fastest growing city, where many major oil companies and medical centers are located; San Antonio, the tenth

largest metropolis in the U.S., which possesses the grace of history through the Alamo and missions.

Others were Dallas and Ft. Worth which stand at the east-west extremes of a vast urban parallelogram called Metroplex, the first city known for the Dallas Cowboys and Neiman-Marcus, and the latter leading the way in production of helicopters also has four leading museums. The trek led through Lubbock in its bucolic setting which specializes in advanced technology, then to Austin, the state capital with a general prominence that charms the visitors, also famous for its university, boot and hat making, and many other larger and small towns and ranches.

The home of Mrs. Charlie Lee was the scene of the meeting highlighted by the Texas Heritage Day program. Mrs. Erwin F. Soell was co-hostess.

Mrs. L.E. Brooks was program leader. Mrs. D.O. James read "Texas Pledge" by Lady Bird Johnson during the devotional period.

Mrs. O.E. Lochridge gave an interesting talk on early day pioneers of the area naming some of their children and grandchildren who still live in the community. She gave a brief history of Iowa Park and said

that Tom Corridon, who still lives here, was the first white child born in the town. The pioneer families mentioned whose descendants live here were Goetze, Lowrance, Birk, Denny, Ferguson, Pace, Hodges, W.F. and Jim George, White, Butcher, Burnett, Akers, Harbour and Overbey.

For the Texas Day art feature, Mrs. Joe Singer discussed "A Texan's Imagery in Wood," bringing into focus the wood sculpture of James Surles, a world renown sculptor. She showed how he has transformed mental images into verbal images through narration and pictures of a woman, bloom, eggs, dancing man, tornado and many other pieces. Mrs. Singer showed natural wood sculpture of a bird and mushroom found in this area, and called attention to some of Charlie Lee's sculpture pieces in the room.

Mrs. James, vice-president, presided during an executive meeting preceding the program and during the regular meeting. Mrs. Soell assigned duties for the Santa Rosa District Convention which will be held at Trade Winds March 20-21.

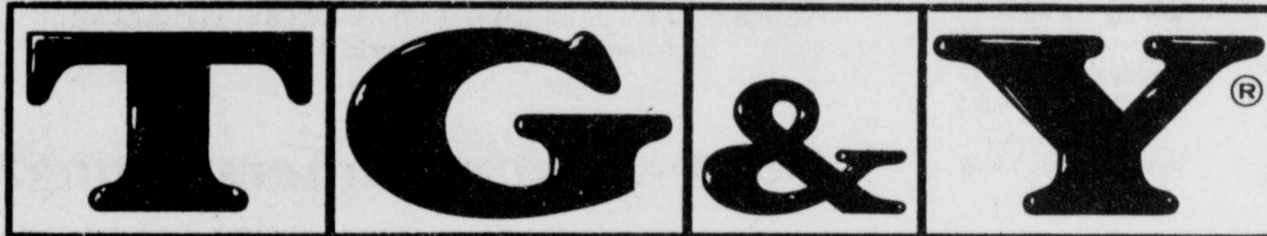

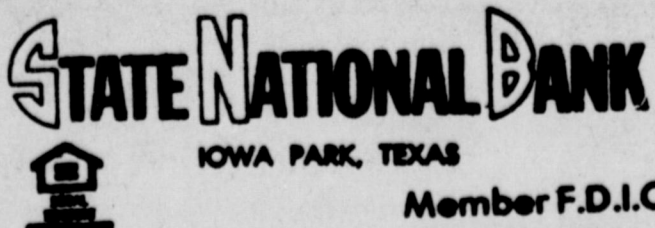

The first Thursday last September, someone took a couple of shots at a busload of Breckenridge junior varsity football players as it was leaving Iowa Park.

If that was, or sounded like, a lot of fun and something you might want to do at a later date...beware. It can be expensive and time-consuming.

About a month after the local incident, a similar shooting took place near Copperas Cove. A Lampasas school bus was the victim, loaded with a girls' drill team.

Well, they caught the two guys. And last Thursday they had them in court.

The 20-year-old driver, who didn't shoot the gun, received a five-year probated sentence and a \$5,000 fine.

The 18-year-old who did the shooting received a sentence of six years in the Texas Department of Corrections for attempted murder.

Monday night when Adams pointed out he was moving and that would be his final meeting of the city council he would attend.

Adams is a rare individual and he will be sorely missed.

I've never known, in all my 25 years of covering city councils, school boards and other governmental bodies, an individual who studied his job like Adams. I've been amazed several times at his knowledge of municipal law, accounting, contract procedures, and the list goes on and on.

In all, Bud has served the city seven and a half years: six on the council and 18 months on the water district board. We are all the better for it, and he will leave some mighty large shoes to fill.

He's been a good'un.

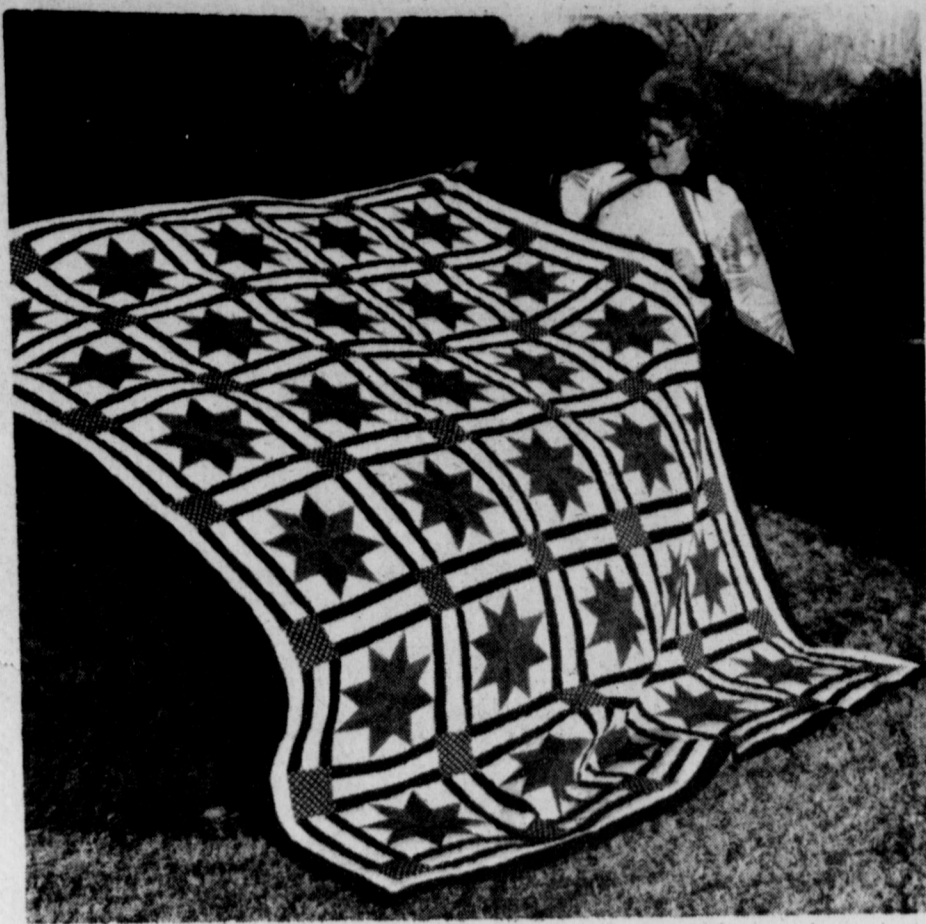

Cook of the Week

Cucumber, the oblong hard-rinded fruit of a creeping plant of the gourd family cultivated as a vegetable, is a main ingredient in two of Mrs. Harry Weaver's recipes for the week. Its history is very interesting.

The cucumber originated in India in the region where the Ganges flows beneath the Bay of Bengal and the Himalayas. It is more than 3000 years old, and can be traced from China to the West. Charlemagne grew cucumbers on his ninth-century estate, and Columbus introduced them to Haiti on one of his early voyages. The vine vegetable was introduced gradually throughout the New World, and by the time explorers reached the Virginia area in 1584, they found the Indians growing the vines. Colonists grew the "cucumbers" in their Massachusetts gardens.

This is the second time that Irene Weaver has been featured in the Iowa Park Leader. The first time was in a special story about her participation in the continuing education courses at Midwestern State University where she has already taken 12 courses and is planning to enroll in another one in the near future.

1/2 cup frozen limeade concentrate, thawed
(Lemon jello can be used; it is not as tart)
1/3 cup salad dressing or mayonnaise
2 cups whipped topping or whipped cream
2 medium bananas, sliced
1/4 cup chopped pecans, if desired

CUCUMBER SALAD

1 - 3 oz. pkg. lime jello
1 1/4 cups boiling water
1 T vinegar
1/2 tsp salt
1/8 tsp. white pepper
1/3 cup Crisco salad oil
1 T minced onion
1 cup finely chopped cucumber, drained

Drain pineapple, reserving syrup. Add water to syrup to make 1 cup. Bring to boil; add jello and stir to dissolve. Add frozen limeade concentrate and salad dressing (use wire whip); stir until well blended. Chill until slightly thickened but not set, about 45 minutes. Fold in pineapple and remaining ingredients. Pour into oiled 1 1/2 qt. ring mold. Chill until firm and serve.

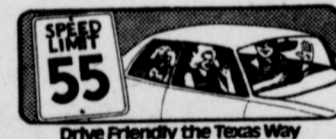

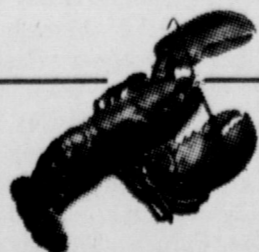
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Track season delayed a week

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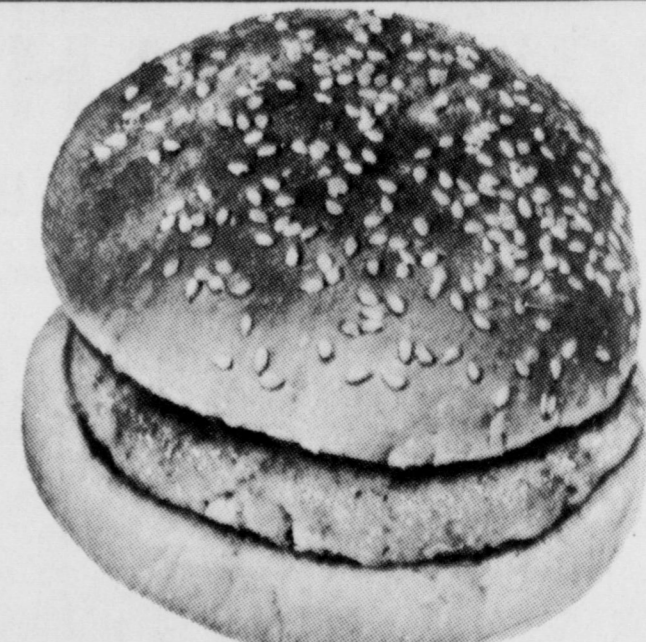
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
