# City, school election polls open Saturday

Voters Saturday will elect two school trustees and three city aldermen.

But, as indicated by the light absentee voting turnout, only a handful is expected to do the electing.

Five each absentee ballots were cast by the deadline Tuesday in the city and school elections.

Polls are to open at 7 a.m. Saturday and close at 7 p.m.

There will be two polls for those voting in the city election, and three for school district voters.

Two of the polls will be in Iowa Park. Residents of the city will vote either at Kidwell Elementary, for those living north of the railroad tracks, and at Bradford Elementary, for those living south of the tracks.

The Kidwell building will be the poll for all residents of voting precinct 32 who are voting in the school election. Bradford will be the poll for school voters residing in precincts 33, 42 and 60.

The third poll will be at the Valley View school campus, where residents of precincts 34, 35, 59 and Archer County precinct 9 will vote for school trustee candidates.

The order in which trustee candidate names will appear on the ballot is: Jerald Brown, Bob Goodknight, Rex Wells and Tom Venhaus.

Brown is the only incumbent seeking re-election, since Delbert Catlin, the dean of the board, has chosen not to run again. Brown is an independent oil producer.

Goodknight is a former vocational teacher, currently employed as a technical writer at Sheppard AFB. Wells is a farmer and rancher who is heavily involved in various agriculture organizations. Venhaus was previously on the Iowa Park school faculty but is now a guidance counselor for Region Nine Service Center, working with Bellevue, Byers and Midway schools.

On the city alderman ballot, the order in which candidate names appear is: Herman Mahler, Harold Phillips, Jim Voyles, Bill Gilmore, George Hammonds, Michael J. Sargent and Charlie L. Lee.

Hammonds and Gilmore are both incumbents. Bud Adams resigned last month and has moved from the city. Hammonds works in Civil Service

at Sheppard, and has completed his first full term on the council. Gilmore has served on the council several terms over the past years. He is principal owner of Gilmore Welding. Mahler, a paint contractor, served several years on the city council.

Phillips is employed by Gilmore, Inc. Voyles is a former county sheriff and Iowa Park Police chief. Sargent is part owner of E&S Exxon. Lee, a former president of the Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce, is manager of the Cryovac plant.

## Trustees express relief insurance bid okayed

Buying property insurance for the school doesn't usually pose a problem for the board of trustees, but it did this year.

Meeting in a called session Monday night, for the third time on the topic, trustees heaved a sigh of relief when they voted to accept the lowest of three bids.

In the board's first meeting when insurance was on the agenda, members decided to reject bids and call for new bids when problems were pointed out by agents concerning bid specifications.

Barbour Insurance was awarded the bid in the second go-around when trustees accepted a bid premium of \$77,718 for a three-year coverage policy.

However, the company represented by Barbour Insurance rejected the policy because the Valley View buildings were included. Charlene Barbour said the oversight of including Valley View in the renewal policy was the reason for the rejection.

A separate policy would be required for these buildings, because they are now vacant and boarded up.

A bid Monday by Boley-Featherston-Huffman and Deal Insurance Co. of Wichita Falls was accepted by the board. At \$70,101, it was the lowest of the three bids received for three years coverage, and included the Valley View structures.

Barbour's new bid, which included a separate policy for Valley View, was \$83,000. The third bid, by Henry D. Mason Insurance, was for \$71,469.

Besides having to meet for the third time in a month on the insurance subject, trustees were also relieved to have a policy covering the buildings, because the policy they had was to expire at midnight Tuesday.

### EXECUTIVE MEETING

Prior to taking up the subject of insurance, trustees closed their meeting to the public for an executive session to discuss personnel.

Staying in the closed meeting was George Taylor, former Bradford Elementary principal who was reassigned as a classroom teacher on the junior high campus this year.

No comment was made by Taylor or the board after the meeting was re-opened to the public, but it is known that Taylor's name was not on a list of personnel who received a contract for the 1981-82 school year.

Trustees Bill Spruiell and Rusty Rusk were absent at Monday's meeting.

## Public input sought Monday

Public input will be sought on two different subjects when the Planning and Zoning Commission meets at 7 p.m. Monday in city council chambers.

Public hearings will be held for comments on proposed open carpports and daycare centers in residential

areas. The commission will make recommendations following the hearings for council consideration at the Apr. 13 meeting.

In addition, Commission members will consider a preliminary plat for construction of a major commercial building at the old fair grounds by Wallmart.

Following the luncheon, a short business meeting will be held under the direction of Mrs. Bertha McDonald of Iowa Park, president.

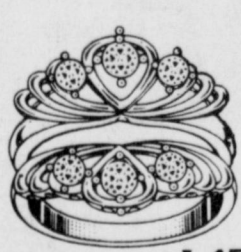

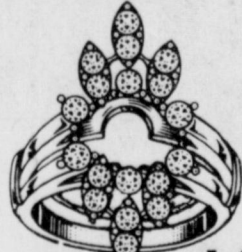

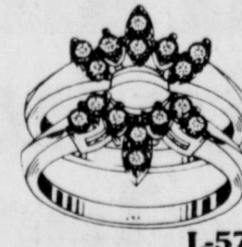

# Letters to the Editor

Dear Mr. Hamilton,  
I feel it necessary to correct one statement in your report of teacher salary increases, (Mar. 19, 1981). You said that the state was considering proposals to increase salaries between 15 and 33 percent. At one time this might have been true, however, the Texas House Public Education Committee has recommended to the House Appropriations Committee only a 6.8 percent per year increase, plus increments. By contrast with this meager salary recommendation, the Education panel proposed increased funds for maintenance and operation in local districts by some 60 percent.

By way of information, let me also give additional light on the issue of teacher salaries.

First, teachers are not considered state employees, and therefore reap none of the benefits accorded state employees, such as a proposed 14.3 percent salary increase, social security, and health insurance.

Secondly, Texas now ranks 33rd or maybe 35th, by now, in average teacher salary, with \$14,000. The U.S. Department of Labor reports that the average United States teacher salary of \$16,000 amounts to only 78 percent of the \$20,517 that was required in the fall of 1979 for a family of four to live in a middle class, but not affluent fashion.

Thirdly, our illustrious governor, Mt. Clements, is the second highest paid governor in the United States, receiving, \$71,000 a year, falling just behind New York who pays their governor \$85,000, and whose teachers have the 3rd highest average salary in the nation.

The Texas legislature is presently considering a teacher pay raise, and I would ask that the public would let their legislators know that they are in favor of the 10 percent raise.

# As I See It....

The smoke from John Hinckley's .22 caliber pistol was still in the air Monday afternoon, when television personalities started suggesting that maybe now a gun-control law would be enacted by the congress.

And in the following reports concerning the shooting of Pres. Reagan and the other three men on the sidewalk in Washington D.D., while pointing out all the past presidents who had been either assassinated or attempts made on their lives, the personalities brought out other big names who had been shot in recent years. They were so thorough in their reports, they even mentioned Malcom X in the same breath.

No one, in their right mind, could condone the shooting of the president, or anyone else. But there is no call for all this bad-mouthing of the National Rifle Association, which has been the leader in lobbying against a

gun control law.

To assume a national law against owning a handgun would have prevented Monday's assassination attempt on Reagan is foolish. The shooting occurred in the nation's capitol, which has the strictest law of any state concerning guns. But it didn't help.

It's obvious that anyone who attempts to shoot a person like the president didn't do it just because he happened to possess a handgun. The point is, a law against guns wouldn't stop someone from breaking the law by shooting at a president.

Equally obvious, drugs are against the law, and they are being hauled into the United States by the tons.

No, a gun-control law is not the answer. The real answer to such shootings, whether it be the president or his gardener who is the victim, is swift, sure and extreme punishment.

For instance, who would be against a law which called for the death penalty for anyone attempting to assassinate a president?

Probably those same people who want gun control.

One side point which keeps bugging me concerning Monday's incident: the frequency with which Texas keeps popping up.

We're still smarting from the assassination of John Kennedy in Dallas.

Now, Hinckley is a former resident of Texas; he bought his gun in Dallas; one of his victims, Press Secretary James Brady, formerly lived in Texas and ironically moved his family to Colorado, where the Hinckley family now lives; and Vice Pres. George Bush, a Texan, was in the state at the time of the shooting.

This will surely give the Yankees something to talk about besides oil deregulation.

# Cook of the Week

The words of Norman Vincent Peale, "What you are now is according to the picture you have had of yourself up to this time," can certainly apply to Patricia (Mrs. James) Hannah, Iowa Park's new policewoman.

## COUNTRY TIME

### APPLE TURNOVERS

- 1 can "Big Country" biscuits
- 1 - 20 oz. can instant apple fruit filling
- 3 to 4 T cinnamon-sugar spice
- 1 stick butter or margarine

Preheat oven to 350 degrees  
Roll each biscuit into a flat shape, using flour to stop sticking. Place 1 T of apple mix on rolled biscuit, sprinkle with cinnamon-sugar spice. Put one side of dough over mixture, close ends and roll. Have cookie sheet ready with part of melted butter. Sprinkle turnovers with remaining cinnamon-sugar spice and bake until done.

### BEEF AND RICE

- 2 cups uncooked rice
- 1 lb. lean ground chuck
- 3 medium tomatoes
- 1 medium onion
- 2 medium green peppers
- 1/2 tsp. red pepper
- 1/2 tsp. lemon juice
- Salt, pepper and garlic powder to taste

Dice tomatoes, chop onions and green peppers. Using very light cooking oil brown tomatoes, onions and peppers or cook until tender. Cook rice until half done, drain water from rice and rinse with cold water in strainer.

In an electric skillet (350 degrees), put in cooked vegetables, rice; add lemon juice, salt, pepper, garlic powder and red pepper. In extra skillet brown lean beef and add to rice mixture. Let cook for 10 minutes while stirring; then cover and set temperature at 200-250 for another 10 minutes.

### COLD CRABMEAT SALAD

- 1 can grade A crabmeat, chilled
- Whites of two hard-boiled eggs, grated
- Yolks of two hard-boiled eggs, grated
- 1 cup mayonnaise
- 1/2 cup tomato catsup
- 1/2 tsp. Worcestershire sauce
- Cracker crumbs

Mix mayonnaise, catsup, Worcestershire sauce and tabasco. Add

chopped egg whites to this sauce. Bone the crabmeat and place on lettuce leaf. Cover entirely with sauce. Garnish the top of each salad with grated egg yolks and spread with paprika. Yield: 2 servings.

### HOT SEAFOOD SALAD

- 1 large green pepper, chopped fine
- 1 large onion, chopped fine
- 1 cup celery, chopped fine
- 1 cup cooked shrimp
- 1 cup cooked crabmeat
- 1 cup mayonnaise
- 1 t salt
- 1 t pepper
- 1 t Worcestershire sauce
- Cracker crumbs

Cook until tender in a small amount of water the chopped pepper, onion and celery; drain. Add shrimp, crabmeat, mayonnaise, salt, pepper and Worcestershire sauce. Mix thoroughly and place in baking dish or individual shells. Top with cracker crumbs and bake in moderate oven at 300 for 20 to 30 minutes.

Besides fish, hot dogs will be available for children, Aulds said.

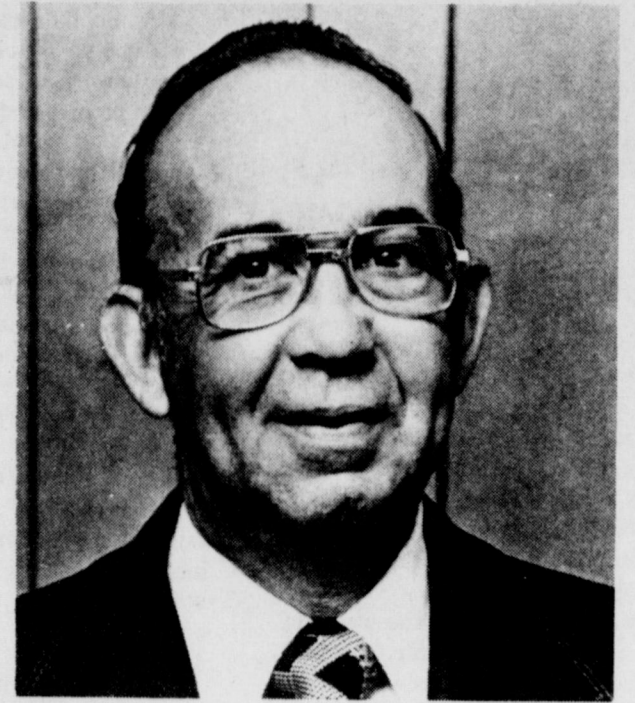

### IRS Tax Tips

**Special Dependency Rules Apply to Divorced Parents**

Separated and divorced parents should be aware of special dependency requirements when claiming children as dependents on federal tax returns. A dependency exemption for a child may be claimed only on the tax return of one of the parents. Generally, the parent having custody of the child for the greater part of the year is allowed the dependency deduction, according to the IRS.

Frequently, however, the terms of the divorce or custody decree or other written agreement define which parent may claim the dependent child. Also, if the parent without custody of the child contributes most of the child's support, that parent may generally claim the deduction.

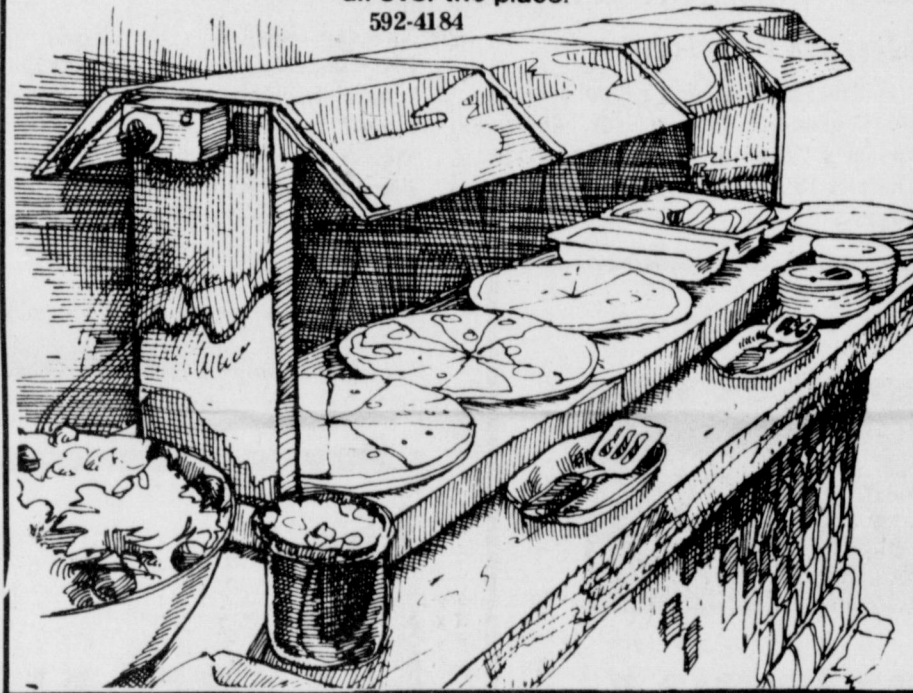

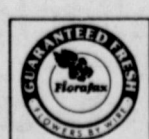

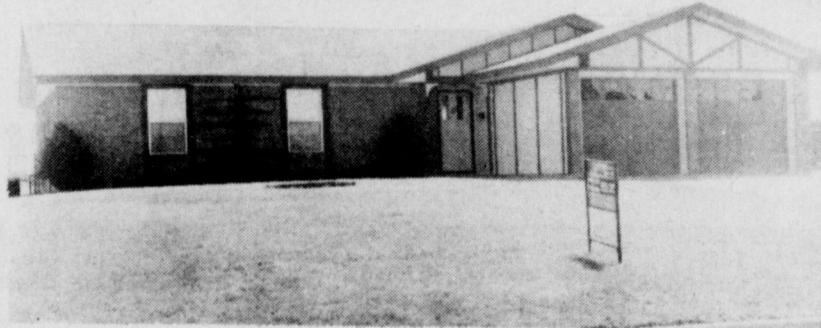
