Heavy rains drench area

Farmers are no longer the only ones casting a watchful eye toward the cloud-laden skies. Flooding has become a problem in many parts of Iowa Park, and residents of rural areas, as between two and seven inches of rainfall have been measured over the area during the past week. Wichita River has been swollen beyond its banks, as have smaller creeks which crisscross the countryside, because of heavy rains here and further north and west of Iowa Park. The heaviest rains appear to have fallen in and north of the city, according to reports. While the experiment station has

recorded 2.52 inches since Wednesday of last week, while Richard Hill, northwest of the city, has measured more than seven inches. Hill said he received three inches last week, more than three Monday night, and at least another inch Tuesday night. O.N. Newman said he measured 3.55 inches at his home just east of town Tuesday morning. The experiment station recorded .17 of an inch when the gage was checked Friday morning, .25 Monday, 1.52 Tuesday and .58 yesterday morning. Steve Morath, city administrator, said he had received only one telephone call this week concerning water reaching a home in the city. Randall Schram complained water reached his home on West Clara. Several residents have complained to Morath that water has overflowed the street curbing and crossed their yards, and some streets were left standing in water in the south part of the city. All three creeks between here and Wichita Falls overflowed their banks and stood deep on the old Wichita Falls Road Tuesday. All three of Iowa Park's lakes have risen. Buffalo Lake has reportedly caught more than five feet of water, while Lake Iowa Park lacks approximately 14 inches from overflowing. Gordon Lake could possibly overflow today if it catches another four inches. Area farmers are especially

watchful of the clouds, because most of them still have a bumper wheat crop in the fields waiting for the ground to dry enough for combines to move in. Some estimations have been ventured that the area has already lost 20 percent of its wheat yield, and wheat is beginning to lay down in the fields because of heavy moisture and high winds. Another problem facing area farmers is the availability of custom combine crews staying long enough to cut the crop. A few reports have been received that some crews have already moved to other areas of the country where wheat is about ready, but not as much rainfall has been received. The Weather Bureau's long range forecast indicates possible rainfall continuing on into next week. With the ground already saturated, almost all rain to fall in the near future could add to flooding problems.

Fund open for Lyles

A fund has been established at State National Bank to assist former Iowa Park school teacher Gary Lyles with medical expenses incurred following his injury in a fall from a horse. Lyles is recuperating in Wichita General Hospital. According to friends, he is conscious and recognizes family and close friends, but requires assistance in walking and other physical activities. The Gary Lyles Fund deposits are accepted at any of the teller windows at the bank. Money will be disbursed to the Lyles as they need it, according to Stanley Williamson, bank president. Lyles was working cattle with his father May 14, on the family ranch south of Holliday, when he was thrown from his horse. His head struck a rock, knocking him unconscious. He remained in the intensive care unit of the hospital some two weeks, and was moved into a regular room after awakening. Lyles was a member of the Valley View School District faculty when it was consolidated with Iowa Park in 1970. He then taught social studies at Iowa Park High, drove a school bus, and later was named instructor of the building trades vocational class. He resigned from the faculty at the end of the 1979-80 school year.

Gardeners having heyday

Iowa Park gardeners are having a heyday compared to the last growing season, when record-breaking heat and the lack of moisture ruined a good portion of every crop. So far this year, with over 15 inches of rainfall recorded compared to only 3.63 inches last year, a number of gardeners have yet to turn their hoses on. Subsequently, the available moisture and moderate temperatures have made this spring a prime growing season, with less work required in maintaining the garden, and more work in harvesting the

goods. Mrs. Dean Hodge, 301 W. Daisy, is a lifelong resident of Iowa Park, and has worked in her garden since moving to her current home in 1973. "It cuts down on food costs, and I can give some to my friends," Mrs. Hodge said, "but I never sell any of it." In what Mrs. Hodge considers an "ordinary garden," full of rows of okra, cantelopes, beans, tomatoes and onions, she is most proud of this season's squash. "I have almost picked a bushel of it," she remarked, motioning to a basket full of healthy bright yellow squash she had been collecting. "A place just isn't a home without a garden," claims Mrs. Harold Bartow, who lives beside her son's home on Kamay Highway just south of town. Before suffering a recent stroke, Mrs. Bartow worked regularly in the large plot located between her house and her son, Harold. "Harold watered the garden quite often last year," she said. "Then, after it rained during the first of the year, it got hot all of a sudden, and everything just wilted." Mrs. Bartow said although they didn't salvage much of the crop, they still got a good amount of canned goods for the cellar. But for this year, she chosen to remain reserved about the next few months. "When it dries up around here, it gets hot, but so far it has done fine this year," she said.

But not all vegetables are doing as splendidly as the squash, onions, beans and okra, as the Goods and H.W. Holder of 307 Alameda have found. Both have reported problems with their potatoes, which, according to county extension agent Don Decker, may be the result of curly top infestation. Decker says the curly top infestation is a virus disease with no known control. It is transmitted among potatoes and tomatoes by leafhoppers. Larry Davis of Wichita Falls and Bobby Evans of Iowa Park have reported to Decker of foliage on their potatoes rolling upward, exposing the under surface of the leaves. The terminal leaves also have a purple color. To alleviate the problem, Decker says Davis and Evans are spraying both potatoes and tomatoes with Malathion at weekly intervals. Although the infested plants will produce rather poorly, Davis and Evans are aiming at controlling the

spread of disease to other healthier plants. Other than the likely infestation of his potato plants, Holder has harvested some good beans and onions. "If it will just keep coming like it has so far, we will be alright," he said, referring to this year's rain. In addition, Holder is contemplating replacing his potatoes with something else, most likely a fall crop. Holder has lived in his home on Alameda the past two years, after losing his home to the 1979 tornado in Wichita Falls. John Hopkins of 410 E. Ruby is a retired cotton farmer who takes pride in raising each year's yield, trying improved strains of beans, okra and corn and experimenting on his own to get the most out of each crop. When asked about the difference between the weather last year and this year, Hopkins candidly remarked "It burned 'em up last year, and it will probably flood them this year!" If it does flood before he harvests all his crop, Hopkins will still be able

to say this year was a success. He has canned 47 jars of beans, sold 60 pounds, and given away 15 to 20 pounds, all out of two rows planted in his rather large plot, measuring approximately 27 by 130 feet. "I have had some of the nicest beans this year," he said. Hopkins explained that before moving to Iowa Park two years ago, the garden plot was fully covered with bermuda grass. "I was used to driving a tractor at the farm, but when I started on the garden here, I had to use a rotatiller, so you can just imagine how much work was involved," he said. Of the two rows of beans, Hopkins planted one row with regular pinto and another with improved pinto. Of the two he is most satisfied with the bigger and improved pinto, explaining that the regular pintos have to be picked early to avoid strings, but the improved pinto is consistently larger.

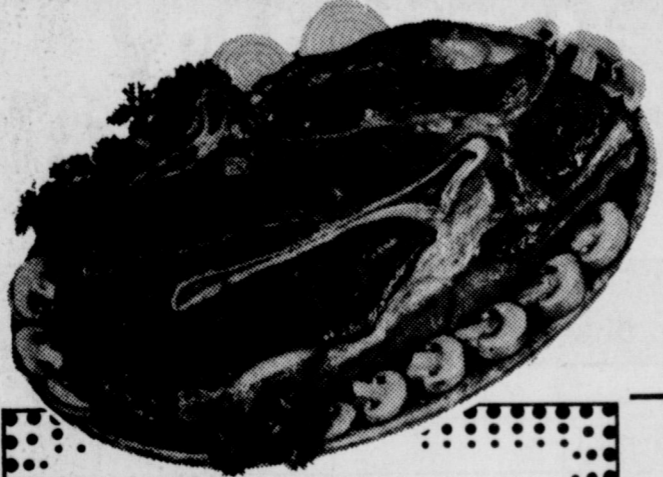
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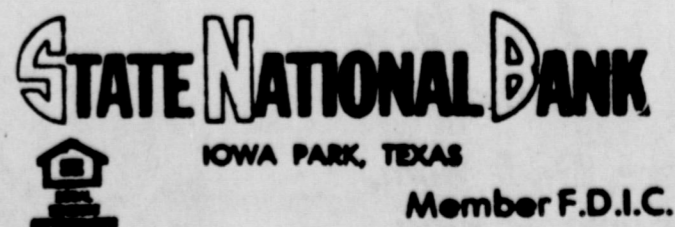

City, school meetings on tap next week

Both the city council and school board will hold regular meetings next week; the council at 7 p.m. Monday in council chambers, the board at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday in the administration building.

Aldermen will face an agenda which will include the final plat for development of the Wal-Mart store at the old fair grounds. Because the land was never platted, it will be known as lot one, block one, Wal-Mart Addition.

Two resolutions are on the agenda. One would authorize the city to join the Texas Municipal League workers compensation joint insurance fund. The other would authorize execution of a contract for the sanitary landfill equipment operator's services, or hiring of a new tractor operator.

Larry Ware has requested time for a public appearance. He is expected to ask the city to make park improvements on the east side of Oscar Park, where soccer fields have been cut into the hillside.

Council members will also be asked to approve purchase of a new copying

machine for the city's office.

Also, three members of the electrical board, H.M. Nipper, Vern Mikkelson and Jack Pierce, will be reappointed to new terms, and Eldon Dowell will be named to replace Wayne House.

Following the regular agenda, the council will sit as the city's board of adjustments to hear three appeals for variances from the city's minimum front setback requirements. They will affect the following residences: 1111 Cornelia, 906 W. Highway and 1602 Karen.

Though the school board agenda will be short, the meeting could be lengthy, according to Harold Cowley, superintendent.

Scores from the Texas Assessment of Basic Skills tests will be reviewed. This is the second year for the TABS testing, and an assessment of how

local students did on a state-wide standard of basic curriculum is evaluated.

Cowley said some board policies will be reviewed and possibly amended; a report from the curriculum committee will be made and some recommendations for changes offered; and the textbook committee named.

Some new teachers are also expected to be hired, he said.

May's building permits may possibly reflect a trend of the future.

Max Henderson secured a permit to erect a wind-powered electrical generator at his 1020 W. Louisa home. Henderson expects to sell the generators in the future.

As I See It....

Seldom have I ever dwelled two consecutive weeks on the same topic, but I feel I must respond to an unsigned letter concerning last week's subject of a starting salary for postal workers.

You may recall that I took exception to the federal government, the postal service to be exact, starting employees out at a salary of \$9.38 per hour.

Well, my writer, and I will not print it in its entirety because it was unsigned and we have a policy about that, let me know that was not the salary the writer started at, nor was receiving four years later.

I never said that was the starting salary, nor the current salary, four years ago. I was just quoting the head of the Fort Worth sectional center what the new starting salary would be.

The writer pointed out the hours of extreme heat and cold, plus heavy weight to carry, while delivering the mails. And also mentioned the dogs and obstructions in the yards.

Well, the article I quoted said the salary was for starting carriers, and clerks who work indoors.

But the item that caught my attention the most was the "... high paced work as mail must be moved on a per minute basis." The writer said some people could not stand up to the nerve racking jobs, even for \$9.38 per hour.

Remember now, the starting salary for a postal worker at some point

during the next two years will be \$9.38 per hour. That works out, on a 40-hour, 52-week basis of \$19,510.40 per year.

The starting salary for a beginning nurse at Bethania Hospital, not including shift bonuses or anything like that, is \$14,484.

For a nurse to reach the \$20,000 annual salary basis, she would have to reach an assistant head nurse position, I was told.

My point I made was that the federal government is screwing everything up in an area like this by paying such salaries.

Here we are, offering a salary to a possible high school dropout who is

willing to face the weather, the dogs and the pressures, but doesn't know where the bathroom is, a salary which takes years for a life-saving and serving nurse to reach.

I think my point is made and enough has been said on the subject.

Museum features print collection

The Collection of American Prints at the Wichita Falls Museum and Art Center contains a wide variety of contemporary and historical works, many of which are significant in what they document and the print technique used. An exhibition of a number of these prints, "Selections From the Permanent Collection," opens Saturday at the Museum and continues until June 24.

According to Jean Joubert, who organized the exhibition, it has provided the opportunity to show works in the museum's collection which are rarely hung. "The exhibit is a combination of prints which are difficult to install, prints which didn't travel with the current Western Association of Art Museums tour, prints that are fragile, and series which are so large that they are not shown frequently," Joubert said. The result of all of these factors is an exhibit showing some of the more unusual pieces in the collection.

"The Boston Massacre" by Paul Revere is in many ways one of the most significant historical prints in the museum's collection. It is the first example of a journalistic print based upon a contemporary episode. It established a precedent for recording the passing scene in a popular pictorial style and it helped to flame the American Revolutionary cause.

"Double French Money" by Larry Rivers is a lithograph on plexiglass. In addition to plexiglass as an unusual surface for a print, Rivers has etched

into the plexiglass and created high relief areas on the print. "Cube I" by Ronald Wendell Davis is a photo-offset laminated to plastic and a series titled "Rivigis" by Juergen Strunck is a rolled relief print. Robert Rauschenberg created "Mule," a transfer and collage on muslin, silk and satin.

Two new acquisitions to the permanent collection are included in the exhibit. An untitled silkscreen by Jackson Pollock is one of a few prints created by the artist. Joubert said, "Pollock created a small number of prints and over half of those were destroyed in a fire." The black and white print is representative of the artist's "drip" paintings. Wayne Kimball's series "Cobbler's Chair" is a collection of 29 progressive proofs documenting each step in the lithographic process. The series includes the registration and color proofs and was purchased during Kimball's 1971 exhibition at Midwestern State Univ.

Film slides shown

This is a perfect time of year to pay tribute to the vegetables which can be prepared in many inspirational ways. If the family is fed up on good old stand-bys, why not try Mrs. Eddie Worthy's Vegetable Scramble in which she uses two kinds of beans, Brussels Sprouts and broccoli.

Beans and broccoli have been around for a long time. The Indians of the New World grew beans long before the Pilgrims landed. Even earlier, John Verrazano referred to them in 1524. Broccoli, sometimes called Italian asparagus, was known to the Romans before Pompeii. Brussels Sprouts named for Brussels, Belgium, which was the center of a sprout-growing region, is a vegetable of fairly recent origin since it was little known outside Belgium and France until the mid-nineteenth century.

City proposes to annex property on north side

Holiday city fathers Monday night instructed city attorney Gary Southard to draft a petition for annexation of land north of Holliday, to Old State Road.

There appeared to be some confusion among council members as to the proper procedures for enlarging the city's territory. The confusion was the difference between procedures of a general laws charter city and home rule charter city.

Southard explained that the two charters give basically the same outline for annexation, but under general law, additional steps must be taken.

For annexation under a general laws charter, which applies to Holliday, property desiring to be annexed must be petitioned by the owners or qualified voters residing in the area.

Once the petition is received by the city, a public hearing must be held for public input on the proposal.

"The main hurdle is petitioning the majority of voters or land owners who wish to be annexed into the city," Southard explained.

Council members decided to draw an outline of the proposed annexation, which includes land on both sides of FM 368, to Old State Road, within Archer County. Southard is to formalize the petition and have city administrator Jim Hamill circulate the petition to the respective parties.

In other business, councilmen voted to purchase a mosquito fogger and chemicals, passed an amendment to the Lone Star Gas Co. franchise ordinance, hired an additional city employee, and agreed to send Hamill to a municipalities budget course in Houston this month.

Rick Cooper, registered chemist for Century Laboratories, Inc., spoke to councilmen of the upcoming mosquito problem and explained in detail the use and effect of the chemical malifion as mosquito spray.

According to Cooper, his company is a manufacturer-wholesaler, and can sell only to municipalities, universities, and other political entities, but also sells to other companies for marketing.

Cooper described three different foggers available through his company, focusing on a 10-hp ULV (Ultra Low Viscosity) fogger, which uses a mixture of 57-percent malifion and diesel. The cost of the machine is \$1,700, according to Cooper.

Council voted to purchase the fogging machine at \$1,700, a gallon of premium grade chemical cleaner thiosphere at \$27.95, and a 55-gallon drum of malathion at \$27.95 per gallon.

Lone Star Gas Co. representative Buford Wright was on hand for the third reading of the proposed franchise ordinance amendment, but councilmen waved the reading and passed the amendment.

The amendment gives the utility the right to maintain gas lines up to the property owner's meter. Some opposition has been reported across the state, mainly from plumbers who feel their livelihood would be affected by the action.

Southard told councilmen of a conversation with Texas Railroad Commission member Jeffrey Hill, director of gas utilities, in which Hill said the RRC, though not ordering Lone Star Gas to work on yard lines up to the meters, did express concern for the past safety record in the state during maintenance of the lines.

Hamill will attend a "Municipalities Budget Preparation Course" June 29-26 in Houston at a cost of \$67.50. Mayor James Cook read excerpts from the brochure explaining the course, and stated that the city definitely needs improvement in preparing its budget, and that it would be to the city's advantage to send Hamill.

Councilmen also hired Allen Monroe as a laborer to replace Roy Prader, who quit in early May. Council set Monroe's salary at \$3.50

per hour. In addition, Jack Monroe was extended a meritorious raise of 25-cents to \$4 per hour.

Proposed school textbooks available for public view

Copies of every textbook submitted to the Texas Education Agency for possible adoption in the 1981 cycle are available to citizens for review at the 20 regional education service centers.

Sample books are on file in the professional library at Region 9

Education Service Center during regular business hours, 8:30 to 5:30 Monday through Friday, 301 Loop 11, Wichita Falls, according to Kitty Thompson, media and materials consultant.

The kindergarten packages which include audio/visual and manipulative

materials will be on display at Region 9 June 1 through 26.

All proposed textbooks and kindergarten systems will be studied in detail by members of the state textbook committee and their school district advisors throughout the summer.

The committee, which will be appointed by the State Board of Education at its meeting Saturday in Austin, will include 15 active public school teachers and administrators. Each committee member may then select local advisors, usually teachers who are specialists in the particular curriculum areas under adoption. These advisors may total 400 or more teachers throughout the state. The 1981 textbook proclamation

approved March 14 by the Board will carry a price tag of approximately \$36-million.

Elementary subjects scheduled for the new materials include: kindergarten, both English and Spanish; social studies grades 4-6; art teacher's materials for grades 1-3 and 4-6.

High school subjects included in the proclamation are: speech-grade 8, oral interpretation, public speaking, debate, radio and television; English-dictionaries; Spanish-levels I, II, III, and advanced; mathematics-analytic geometry, calculus, elementary analysis, independent study, probability and statistics; physical science; theatre arts I and II; geology; economics; industrial arts-electrical systems, power systems.

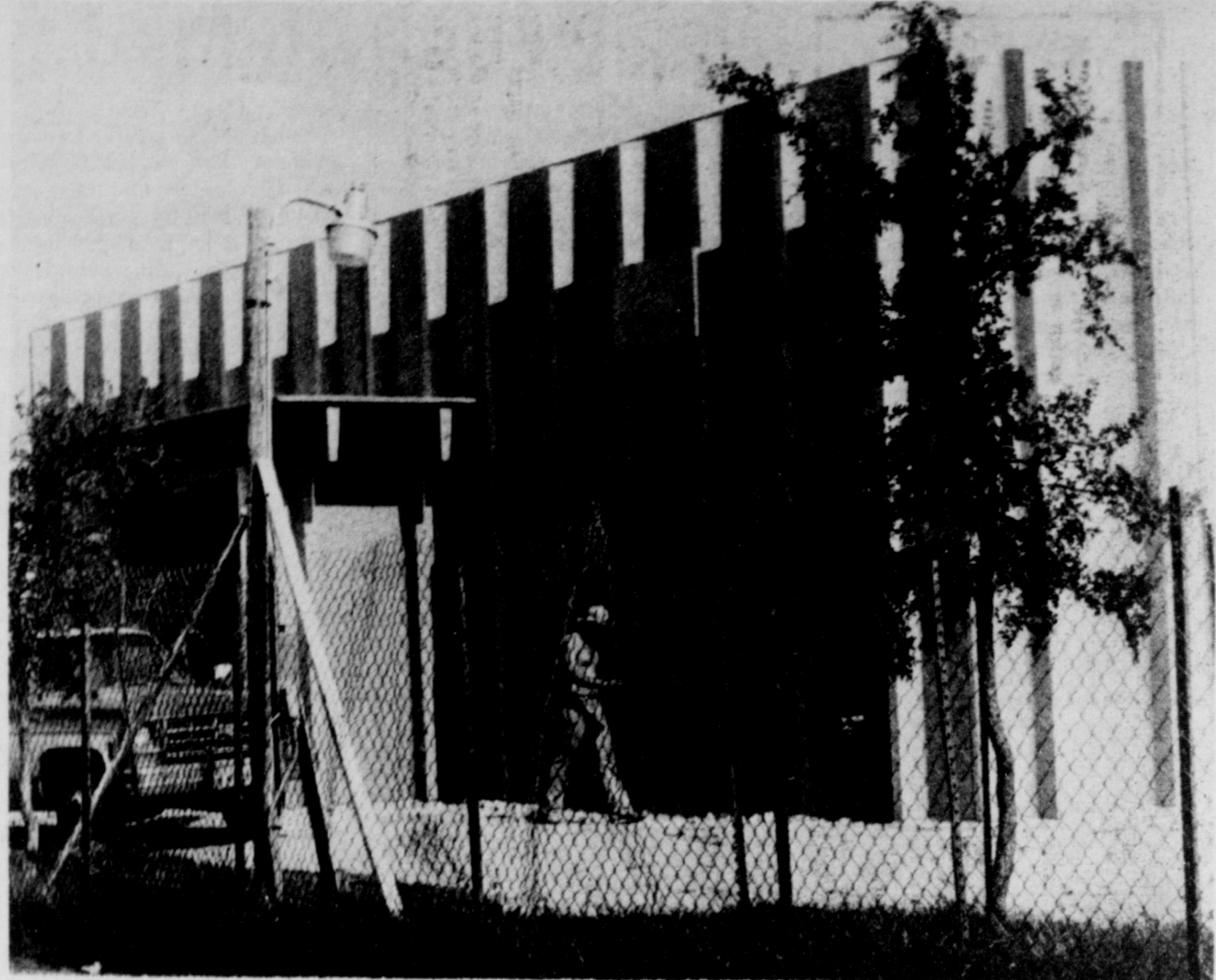

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New herbicide demonstrated

A new family of herbicide is being tried in wheat demonstrations by Jesse Flick and Freddie Daume of Iowa Park. The herbicide, Glean by Dupont, may offer an opportunity for better weed control in wheat and may contribute toward lower energy requirement in seed bed preparation. Glean is labeled for experimental and demonstration use only. It is not

cleared for agricultural use yet and is not for sale. These demonstrations will enable the county crops committee to have prior experience with the herbicide before it becomes available to wheat growers. A small strip was treated last fall by Jesse Flick near Charlie. This single application in October gave season long control of wild mustard as well as henbit and other winter

weeds. Freddy Daume treated eight acres of wheat which was heavily infested with wild mustard and other annual weeds on April 15. Application was made by Johnny Mitchell of Ed's Aerial Service. Glean was applied at a rate of 1/4 ounce of active ingredient per acre. Daume reports a good control of all weeds without damage to the wheat. This site was selected because the wheat was planted on cotton land. The stand was a little thin, which contributed to a heavy weed infestation. This herbicide works through leaf contact as well as through the soil. A possibility for this herbicide is to help wheat growers reduce the number of plowings between harvest and planting. After the wheat is harvested, the field can be plowed and sprayed with Glean. This is expected to control summer weeds all season.

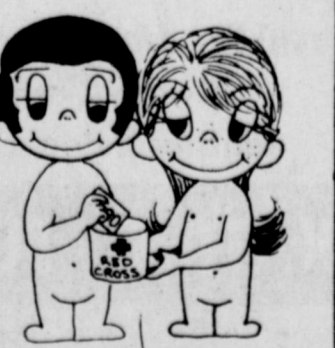
