Any interested high school

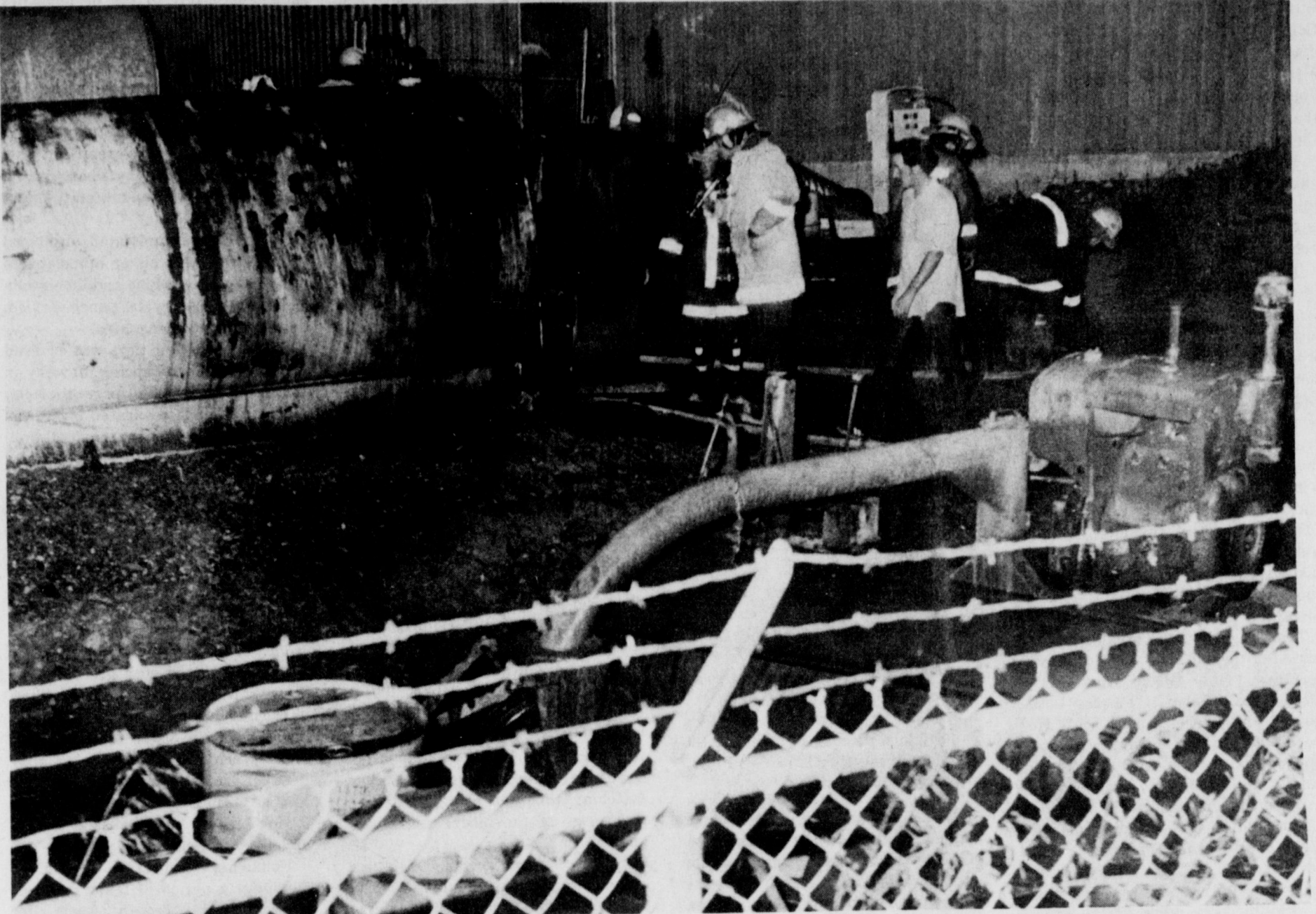
graduate may take the course, but enrollment is limited to the first 15 who register. Additional information can be obtained from the administration building.

Local man dies in shooting mishap

A 24-year-old Iowa Parkan died early Sunday from wounds received in an apparent shooting accident.

Ruppert F. Beebe, an employee of Iowa Park Ready Mix, died in Wichita General Hospital when physicians were unable to repair damage inflicted by a .45 cal. black powder ball shot.

Iowa Park Police Department was notified by telephone at 7:02 p.m. Saturday of the mishap at a sand pit at Beebe's place of employment.

Beebe and a non-resident, described as a close friend, had gone to the area to do target practice with the

black powder pistol, one assembled from a commercial kit.

The friend, whose name is being withheld during investigations although no charges have been filed, had reportedly re-loaded the pistol. After replacing the firing cap, the hammer reportedly slipped, firing the weapon.

Beebe, standing approximately 22 feet from the gun, was struck in the right arm. The ball passed through his arm and into his right side.

He was rushed to Wichita General by ambulance.

Information from the investigation

has been, as a matter of routine in such matters, turned over to the district attorney for presentation to the county grand jury, according to Bob Dean, acting police chief.

Jury gives 30 years

Former Iowa Parkan Homer Lee Hodges has been sentenced to 30 years in prison for murder.

Hodges was charged with shooting to death Forester O'Daniel Robertson on Dec. 19, 1980 in a Wichita Falls apartment.

Formal action taken to fire administrator

Formal action was initiated Monday night to remove Steve Morath as city administrator, but the council was divided.

Mayor Charlie Lee explained to the audience the procedures required for such action, saying legal counsel had been obtained during a 43-minute executive session.

Removal of a city administrator requires a formal request from a council member, supported by a majority vote, Lee explained. A letter is sent to the administrator by registered mail, informing him of the action, along with supporting complaints which must be presented by council members. Then a hearing is held, either in open or closed session, at which time the administrator can answer the charges.

The final action required for removal of the administrator is a two-thirds vote, and as Lee explained, that would require four votes instead of the usual simple majority.

After the explanation, Alderman Bill Gilmore moved to "request consideration of the mayor to begin action for removal of the city administrator." The motion was seconded by Alderman Herman Mahler.

Gilmore, Mahler and Bud Thompson voted for the motion while Johnny Coker and George Hammonds voted against it.

Gilmore a month earlier had demanded such action be initiated, but the mayor had delayed any activity until legal counsel could be obtained, as happened earlier in Monday's meeting.

Lee gave council members one week from the meeting in which to present in writing their reasons for removing, and retaining, Morath.

Tempers flared after Lee explained about the two-thirds vote requirement when Mahler, apparently in jest, asked the mayor "Do you think it's worth writing those letters when you know you have four votes. I know what's going on."

He continued by implying Coker

and Hammonds would vote the way the mayor wanted, negating the vote of the other three aldermen.

Coker retorted he felt Mahler's comments were out of line and Hammonds said he would vote his own convictions, and that he took exception to Mahler's comments.

Being the last item on a full agenda, Lee quickly adjourned the meeting.

OTHER BUSINESS

In other business during the meeting, the council took the following actions:

* appointed Milburn Bates to the city electrical board;

* adopted an industrial annexation policy similar to one initiated by Wichita Falls which includes extension of city services to a firm outside the city limits for a period of time, but requiring the industry to apply for annexation after that approved period;

* approved appointment of Roger Lee, Wichita Falls attorney, as the

city's legal counsel;

* approved appointment of Tommy Ray Adams to the police department. The 39-year-old lives at 504 E. Pasadena and for the past two years has been an officer for the Brazoria County sheriff's department. Thompson, Coker and Hammonds voted for him, Gilmore against and Mahler abstained;

* instructed Morath to seek a compromise from Wichita Falls for a lower rate increase than the 38.1 percent hike the city is asking;

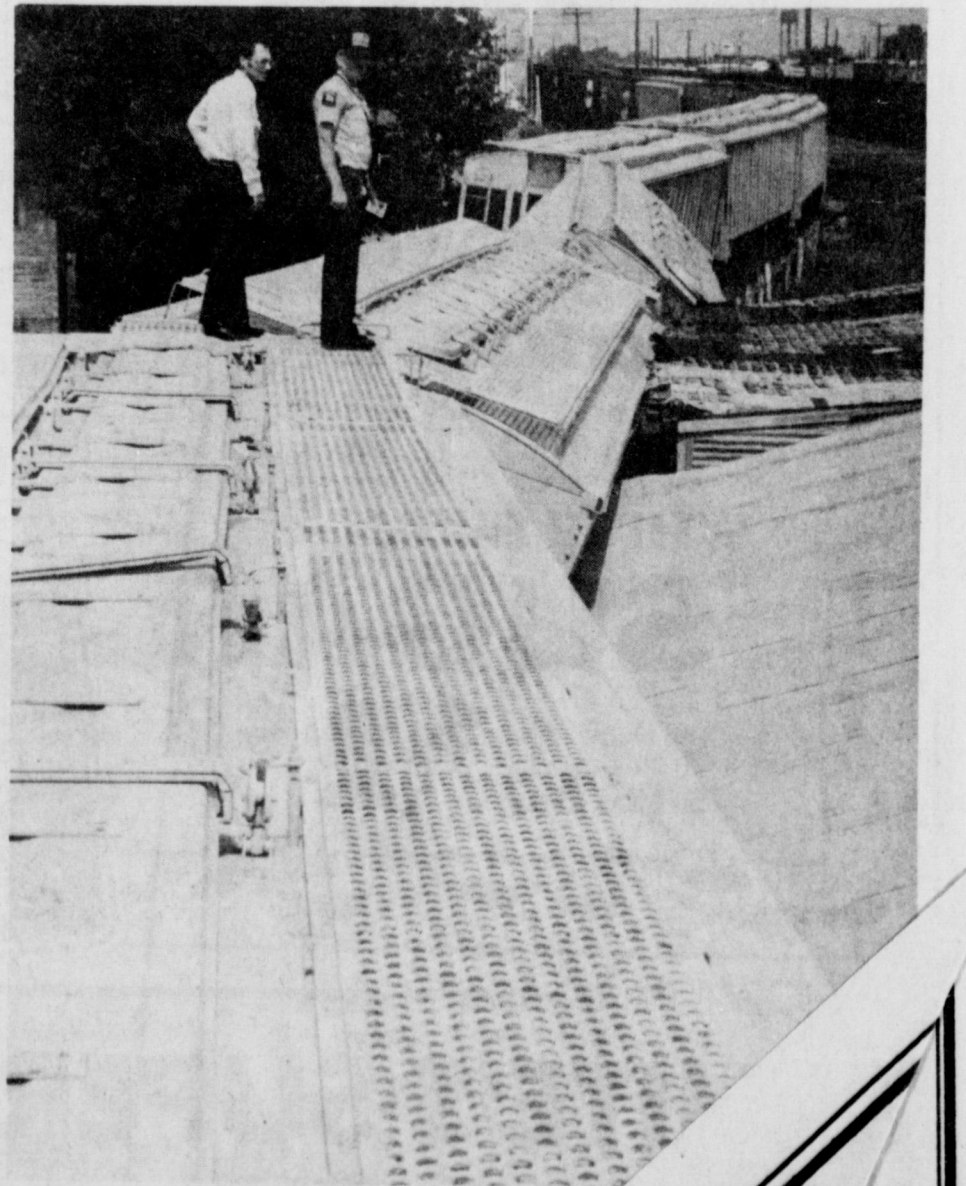
* instructed the administrator to get cost estimates for paving a block of West Coleman to determine if the city will undertake a proposal to do the paving itself with owners paying for curb, gutter and cost of paving materials over a five-year period at an eight-percent interest rate;

* and approved a 30-day waiver for a solicitation permit for Blum and Wikert Home Services to do house numbers painting on curbs throughout the city.

Hill, Meyer wedding held in Wichita Falls

Rev. William Jan Daehnert, associate director of the Division of Student work for the Baptist General Convention of Texas, officiated a double-ring wedding ceremony June 5 to unite Miss Debra Jane Hill and Jonathan Luke Meyer. The scene of the wedding was the First Baptist Church in Wichita Falls.

The bride is the daughter of Mrs. Janie Hill of Iowa Park and the late Lt. Col. Arthur J. Hill, and the groom is the son of Mrs. Merle Carter and John H. Meyer, both of Houston.

The altar decorations and music for the wedding were conducive for an atmosphere of hushed reverence. The focal point of interest in the nuptial area was a large golden cross behind the minister. The cross was wrapped with green and blue satin cords and banked with large round rocks and green plants. Enhancing the sacred theme were a satin kneeling pillow trimmed with gold cords and tassels, and the brass unity candlestick. Other features of the altar setting were a pair of pyramid brass candelabra, a pair of spiral candelabra and two urns filled with blue silk roses and pastel spring flowers.

Tommy Brinkley, organist, presented a prelude of sacred music including "How Great Thou Art," "Jesus Shall Reign," "Fairest Lord Jesus," and "Jesus Loves Me." He accompanied Miss Tammy White, soprano soloist, who sang "One Little Candle" and "God, a Woman and a Man" during the time of the lighting of the candles. The organist played "When I survey the Wondrous Cross" and "Eternal Life" when mothers of the bride and groom were being escorted in, then Miss White sang "Time for Joy" and "Wherever He Leads I'll Go."

Mothers of the couple were escorted to the unity candlestick to light the two outer candles, and during the lighting, the soloist sang "A Candle in the Evening" arranged by the bride. The organist played "Ode to Joy" to signal the entrance of the minister and man, and "Joy of the Morning" for the entrance of other members of the wedding party, flower girl, ring bearer and Bible bearer.

He combined parts of "Ode to Joy", the traditional processional and "Jesus, Joy of Man's Desiring" for the

bride and her brother, David A. Hill, who presented her in marriage to walk to the altar. Music during the ceremony featured a tape recording of "That's the Way Its Got to Be" by the bridal couple, and "The Lord's Prayer," also a tape recording by the bride's mother. The recessional was a recording of "I Could Wish You Joy and Peace" by Scott Wesley Brown. The organist modulated "Surely, the Presence of the Lord Is in This Place" to conclude the service.

When presented in marriage by her brother, the bride was wearing a flattering white organza empire gown detailed with rich Chantilly lace at the high neckline, in the long sleeves cuffed with ruffles. Special skirt interest was noted in a nostalgic apron effect in front and the ruffled hemline that swooped into a chapel train. On her head, she wore a Juliet lace cap from which a bridal illusion veil accented with lace appliques drifted to waist length.

The bride carried a cascading bouquet of white, pink, red, blue, green roses accented with tiny peach and light blue stephanotis and morning glories. For "something old," she wore her late father's wedding band. Her "something new" was a pearl necklace, and "something borrowed" was one of her costume accessories, and she completed

traditions with the "something blue" garter.

The five bridal attendants wore identically-styled silesta gowns designed with shirred bodices, T-straps, princess style skirts and matching ankle length lace shawls. Two of the attendants wore light blue gowns and the other three wore lime green gowns. Each wore a matching Juliet ribbon cap and carried a basket filled with the flowers that were chosen for the bride's bouquet.

Miss Beth Dowdy and Mrs. David Hill took part in the wedding as maid of honor and matron of honor, respectively. Bridesmaids, all from Abilene, were Mrs. Randy Pond, Miss Julia Jones and Miss Britt Yates.

Angie Allen of Abilene, the flower girl, wore a lace-trimmed blue chiffon frock imprinted with blue, white, lavender and lime flowers over blue taffeta made with long sleeves and ruffled full length skirt. She carried a basket of flowers like the ones carried by the attendants.

James Watson of Abilene was ring bearer. He wore a lime green and dark green tuxedo and white ruffled shirt and carried gold rings on a white heart-shaped pillow. Donald Lassere, the Bible bearer, was clad in a black tuxedo and white shirt as he carried the groom's large blue Bible.

The groom wore an all-white tuxedo with tails, bow tie and cummerbund. His attendants wore light blue and lime green tuxedos and matching shirts to correspond with the colors of the bridal attendants' gowns.

Three of the groom's brothers served as his attendants. Robert Meyer was best man, Randy Meyer and David Conkel were groomsmen. Other groomsmen were Doran Brown of Fort Worth and David Hill of Wichita Falls, brother of the bride.

Ushers and candelighters, dressed in light and dark blue tuxedos, were Joel Brown and Rick Niel.

The wedding reception was held in the Fellowship Hall of the church. The entrance was marked by a large white rose arbor, and placed in the room at vantage points were white lattice dividers entwined with blue satin roses, and tables holding miniature white trees decorated with colorful flowers and doves.

Mrs. Ruth Lassere of Iowa Park secured signatures of guests at a table covered with ivory satin

overlaid with matching lace. It held the wedding book, blue feather pen, a double-exposure of the bride in her wedding dress and the groom, baskets filled with the couple's scrolls and Bibles for the guests.

The bride's table draped with white lace over lime green satin was backgrounded by three white trees trimmed with peach, green and blue ribbons and doves. At its base were a large bird bath, angel statue and garden fence.

The table was appointed with royal blue candles in a silver candelabrum draped with light blue and lime green satin, the cake, crystal punch service, mints and bridal napkins.

The cake of four tiers was covered with cascades of spring flowers in shades of blue, white forget-me-nots. The top of each separated layer was covered with floral ornamentation. The unusual top piece was a "Prayer Changes Things" porcelain statue featuring a boy and girl with their hands separated by a bird on the handle of a shovel digging into a small mound of dirt. Mrs. Iva Ford of Houston served at the table.

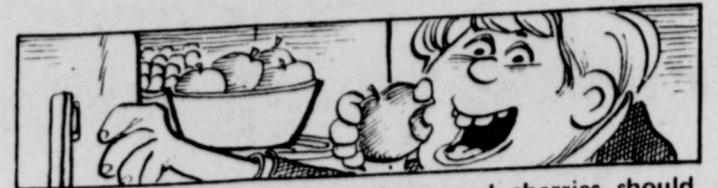

Following rehearsal for the wedding, a period of fellowship was held at the bride's home for out-of-town friends and members of the wedding party.

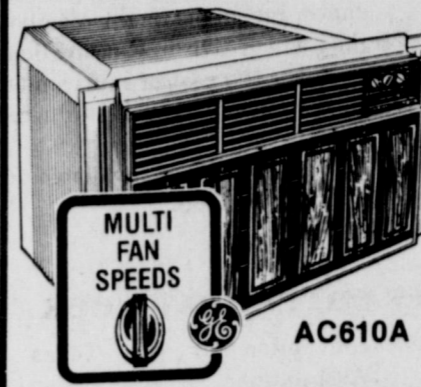

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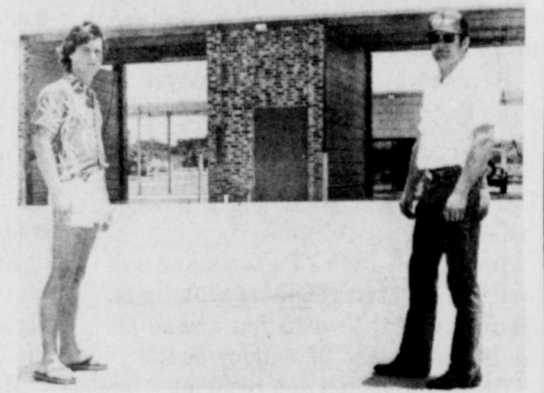

It's virtually impossible for anybody raised in the Texas Panhandle to complain about too much rain, but I'm about ready to hollar "calf rope!"

I must admit my reason is more for farmers of our area, than personal.

With a new roof on my house and living in a more elevated area of town, the only hardship caused by the rain is having to mow the lawn more often and interference with my golf games, I must admit.

But with a host of friends who still have their wheat in the fields, and no cotton planted, here in the latter part of June, I'm growing concerned.

Let us have about three weeks without rainfall, and then come back with a few early morning showers to help the cotton and pasture grass along, and everything will be great.

There's no question that our community has suffered much less from flooding than neighboring

Wichita Falls. I'm told there's still a problem for residents on the north side of the 100 block of East Garden, when heavy rains send water rushing into their yards and threatening the homes. City workers made an attempt to cut a ditch to divert the water, but owners say more is needed.

And the rains have apparently been falling frequently and heavily enough to hold down the hatching cycle of the pesky mesquitos, because they haven't been the normal problem yet. But they'll come. You can bet on that.

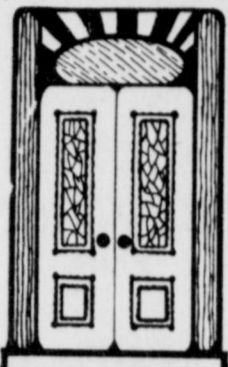
I mentioned how lucky we were not to have flood problems. Noticed in the Friona Star, from out in the Panhandle, that a big rain fell at neighboring Bovina last Thursday,

and between 500 and 1,000 head of cattle in a feed lot drowned.

And you will recall reports that this area caught as much as 14 inches of rainfall during May? Well, down at Refugio, on the Gulf coast, that community measured only 2.4 inches for the month.

It's always so easy to wave one's fist at the sky and shout "stop raining." But it sure beats watching your crops burning, with absolutely no opportunity to harvest anything. . . and all the time realizing you haven't any water in the lakes or tanks for you or your stock to drink.

I've known people who were hot and thirsty enough that they were ready to strike a bargain with the devil himself, that when they were to die, they wanted to drown.

Ayres caught in middle of PPG suit against Fina

Ayres Oil Co. and its owner, Jack Ayres, have been named as co-defendants in one of the largest civil suits filed in Wichita County's history, in state district court Tuesday.

The suit, filed by PPG Industries, also named American Petrofina, Inc., and American Petrofina Co. for alleged breach of contract.

PPG is claiming that contracts and agreements were made by the oil companies to purchase and store three million gallons of diesel fuel oil. The company is asking for a judgement of more than \$12-million, more than four times the actual damages it is claiming.

The petition claims the oil companies and parties involved "aided and abetted and/or acted in wrongful appropriation" and misuse

of the fuel.

The petition also stated that PPG demanded delivery of a portion of the fuel by written and verbal request, and that the suit was filed when all alternatives were exhausted.

Contacted Wednesday, Ayres said, "The way it stands right now, this is a friendly suit between myself and PPG," adding that PPG is seeking compensation from Petrofina for a contract made four years ago. The contract was for the purchase of \$3.09-million in diesel fuel at the 1978 prices.

According to Ayres, PPG had not asked for the fuel until recently, and that Petrofina was apparently unwilling to supply the fuel at the 1978 price. "The price of diesel is about 60-cents more now," said Ayres.

Cook of the Week

Friends of Norah (Mrs. Darrell) Gunderson think that she has a magic touch when it comes to making barbecue sauce just as some people have a green thumb with plants and flowers. Many have asked her for her recipe, so she is giving it to them and others today who are interested. Good sauce is very important to the method of barbecued cooking which is popular today.

Some contend that the word "barbecue" is French in origin, others say it is Spanish; but whatever the origin it is now an American tradition. Early settlers were taught the method by local Indians. They passed the art down from one generation to the next, and today many favorite dishes from all over the country are barbecued. From western grilled steaks to New England barbecue seafood, regional favorites boast their mouth-watering smoky flavor.

When William Harrison was a candidate for the presidency of the U.S. in the mid 1880s, he gave a barbecue in Ohio, and the bill of fare consisted of 18 tons of meat, venison, pies and cider. Henry Ford made the method of cooking even more popular by inventing the charcoal briquet.

Norah and Darrell Gunderson moved to this area in 1979 from Greenville, S.C. when he became associated with the Cryovac plant here after its expansion. Pepper to taste
1 8-oz. pkg. creamed cheese, softened
2 T lemon juice
Enough mayonnaise to make a good spread

Mix all ingredients together; put in refrigerator overnight. Serve on any kind of sandwich bread.

CHEDDAR MUFFINS

1 1/2 cups all-purpose flour, unsifted
1/2 cups yellow corn meal
1 T baking powder
1 cup (4 ozs.) Cheddar cheese, shredded
4 sliced bacon cooked and crumbled
1 cup milk
1/2 cup honey
1/2 cup melted Crisco
2 eggs
Preheat oven to 400 degrees. Combine flour with cornmeal, baking powder, cheese and bacon. Combine remaining ingredients in separate bowl, beat well. Add liquid ingredients to dry ingredients, stir until flour is moistened. Spoon into

greased muffin cups filling about 3/4 full. Bake at 400 degrees for 15 to 20 minutes. Let stand a minute or two before removing from pan.

BROWN RICE HOT DISH

1 cup brown rice or 1 small box, cook according to directions on box
1 1/2 lbs. ground meat, brown with little water
1 cup diced celery
1 medium onion, chopped
1 medium green pepper, chopped
1 small jar pimentos
1 can mushroom soup
1 can tomato soup
1 T Worcestershire sauce

Mix all together and put in large dish. Cook 40 minutes at 350 degrees.

COCONUT FINGERS

1 cup butter or margarine, softened
1/4 cup sifted powdered sugar
2 tsps. vanilla extract
1 T water
2 cups all-purpose flour
1 cup chopped pecans
1 8-oz. pkg. finely shredded coconut
Cream butter and sugar in large bowl of electric mixer. Blend in vanilla and water, then flour. Mix well and stir in nuts. Form into fingers and bake on ungreased baking sheet at 300 degrees for 20 minutes or until delicately browned. Cool thoroughly before taking from pan. Dip in frosting below, then roll in coconut.

FROSTING

4 cups sifted powdered sugar
1/2 cup milk or cream
1/2 tsp. vanilla or almond extract
Dash of salt
To sifted powdered sugar gradually add 1/2 cup milk or cream blending until smooth. Add extract and a dash of salt. This can be prepared ahead of time and put in the freezer.

BREAD AND BUTTER PICKLES

25 to 30 cucumbers
8 large white onions
2 large sweet peppers
1/2 cup salt
5 cups cider vinegar
5 cups sugar
2 T mustard seeds
1 tsp. turmeric
1/2 tsp. cloves
Wash cucumbers and slice as thin as possible. Chop onions and peppers and combine with salt. Cover with

ice; let stand 3 hours and then drain. Combine sugar and spices in large preserving kettle or pan. Bring to a boil, add sliced cucumbers. Heat thoroughly but do not boil. Pack while hot in sterilized jars and seal at once.

BROWN STONE CAKE

1 cup butter or margarine
2 cups sugar
1 square Baker's chocolate
1 cup butter milk
3 eggs
3 cups plain flour
2 tsps. soda
1 cup hot water
1 T vanilla

Cream butter and sugar; add eggs, then add chocolate. Add flour, a small amount at a time with buttermilk. Dissolve soda in very hot water and add last. Bake at 375 degrees for 25 to 30 minutes.

FILLING

1 box brown sugar
1/2 cup butter
3/4 cup evaporated milk
Cook to soft ball forms in cold water. Cook and beat until creamy. Add nuts if desired.

Board meeting attracts 150

Approximately 150 Holliday school district taxpayers, angered by recent action by the school board, called for the reinstatement of Ray Coe as superintendent and for the removal of trustee Durhl Caussey as board president, during the board's regular meeting Monday night.

Due to the size of the gathering, Caussey moved the meeting to the Erma Barton Auditorium, which was soon half-filled. In addition, trustees moved item three on the agenda, "Meet with Citizens Committee," to the top of the list in order to hear their complaints first.

Former trustee Jack Ayres, acting as spokesman for the group, read a prepared statement to trustees. The statement read in part, "It is the grave concern to the citizens committee that the majority of the board feels that an additional superintendent or interim person

must be hired for the 1982-83 school year. We question the advisability of the added expense for the position."

Trustees met in an "emergency" meeting June 3 and voted 4-3 to reassign Coe to an advisory position for the remaining year on his contract, and to seek applications for a new superintendent.

The meeting was held without notice to the press, which had previously been requested.

At the meeting Monday, Caussey told the crowd, "A letter was filed by the Iowa Park paper four years ago requesting a notice, but I wasn't on the board four years ago."

Another excerpt from the committee's statement read, "We feel that the personnel committee was appointed by the President of the Board from the sector of the board in agreement with his line of thinking, and that this created further dissension on the board and in the

community; while giving the president of the board too much influence in selecting the next school superintendent."

Members of the personnel committee include Caussey and trustees Larry Finnell and Larry Lilley.

Asked what his reasons were for calling an "emergency" meeting 11 days before a regular meeting, Caussey responded that a special meeting had tentatively been set for Saturday, June 5, but that Coe had informed him he would be out of town that weekend. "So we needed an emergency session in order to start seeking applicants for a new superintendent," Caussey said.

Another question brought forth by the committee dealt with the failure of trustees to set the salaries for teachers and auxiliary personnel. "You don't set salaries and then set a budget," Caussey responded. "You set a budget first."

After approximately 45-minutes of question and answer discussions, trustee Tommy Mankins motioned to rescind the board's action taken during the "emergency" session, and was seconded by trustee Gene Harmon. The vote ended 4-3 to turn down the motion, with trustee Alice Carver siding with Mankins and Harmon, while Caussey, Finnell, Lilley and Terry Parnell voted against the motion.

Another motion to remove Caussey as president of the board failed with the same vote.

The group then slowly filed out of the auditorium when trustees turned to other items on the agenda. Many of

them stayed outside for several minutes, speaking to one another in small groups.

In other action, trustees approved the vocational agriculture budget for the next school year, agreed to establish a new computer lab, and hired an elementary teacher.

The vo-ag budget, totaling \$18,279.15, was submitted by instructor Cal Gauden. Major expenditures include \$5,079.15 in total capital outlay, \$2,500 in repairs, \$5,000 in expendible supplies, \$2,000 for student travel, and \$3,700 in teacher travel.

Trustees agreed to instigate a new computer lab, with 15 new computers costing \$34,000 to be housed in the school's bookkeeping room. Teachers Mary Ann White, Don Ward and Jesse McDonald met with the board to answer questions about the new program. According to White, the computers can be used for school business as well as student instruction. The school now has two computers on hand, which will be upgraded to use with the new units.

After a lengthy executive session, trustees re-opened the meeting to accept a one-year's leave of absence for Diane Collins, and to hire Susan Byers as fifth and sixth grade English teacher. Trustees also accepted the resignation of Linda Johnson.

In addition, counselor Walter Lemons reported that the TAB test results indicated that the third, fifth and ninth graders at Holliday scored above average, with no distinct areas of weaknesses.

"This indicates that our teachers are doing a good job," Coe said.

Trustees nix budget request

Holliday school trustees Monday night voted down the 1983 budget request by the Archer County Appraisal District Board, in action taken during their regular meeting.

According to Holliday tax assessor/collector Louis Hodge, the school had a right under the Property Tax Code as amended by the 1981 state legislature, to approve or deny the budget request.

The resolution submitted by Hodge stated, "this school district has paid \$43,918.28 to the appraisal district in 1981 and 1982 and received nothing of value in return and the creation of the appraisal district has increased rather than reduced the workload and expense of the school district's tax office."

The proposed budget for 1983 received the approval of the district's board of directors. It calls for

Holliday schools to pay \$33,643.07, an increase of \$8,928.19 over the previous year. According to Hodge, this would signal a tax increase.

The resolution was not accepted without dissension, though, as trustee Durhl Caussey questioned whether or not to act on a budget he had not seen. "I would like to hear the other side of the story before acting on this," Caussey said. Hodge responded by inviting Caussey to attend the next meeting of the appraisal board with him.
