# Council to consider employees, purchases

With completion of the city's meeting agenda for Monday night not required until Friday, most of the items listed for discussion and action are follow-ups from the June 14 meeting.

Two topics not on the previous meeting agenda could develop, however.

The regular meeting is to begin at 7 p.m. in council chambers. Prior to the meeting, if approved by the mayor, an executive session might be held an hour earlier to interview applicants for the position of chief of police. Steve Morath, city administrator, said that decision was not made at press time.

Another possible agenda item could be to receive an application for a rate increase by Southwestern Bell Telephone. State-wide media reported the utility company had announced plans to file such applications. Nothing had been received by noon Tuesday from the telephone company, however.

Two cost figures will be reported to the council. One will be for funding an employee to serve as building inspector and code enforcement

officer, and another equipment operator employee.

The other cost study would be for a contractor to pave a block of West Coleman. Morath explained that a suggestion the county might pave the street was rejected by a county commissioner who said the county did not have the equipment to do such work.

Advertising to purchase a two-ton dump truck will be considered.

Three reports will also be presented to the council. One will be concerning a rate increase proposed for water purchases from Wichita Falls; one will be on regulations connected with operating vehicles on lake dams; and one will be by the city attorney on meeting agenda preparation.

Not on Monday's agenda as of Tuesday was anything concerning a movement to remove Morath from his administrative position. Morath explained that nothing had yet been provided him in writing which could

be considered at Monday's meeting. A called meeting a week later is possible, he said.

At the last city council meeting, provisions for removing the city administrator from office were outlined by Mayor Charlie Lee. He gave all members of the council one week from that night to produce reasons in writing why the administrator should be removed or retained in office.

Following receipt of the letters, the mayor is to notify Morath, by registered letter, of the allegations. The mayor is then to set a hearing date at which Morath would have an opportunity to respond to the complaint charges.

After the hearing, which can be held in public or closed session, whichever Morath chooses, the council will vote for or against his removal. A two-thirds majority, or four votes, is required for his removal, according to Lee.

# DOWSER

## Iowa Parkan practices age-old pipe-finding method

Everett Stephenson, 405 W. Louisa, has officers at Sheppard Air Force Base scratching their heads these days as they try to figure out his method of locating underground pipes.

The lifelong Iowa Parkan, now a plumber with the 2750th Civil Engineering Squadron, has interjected an age-old method of locating hidden pipes, rejecting the expensive electronic equipment which is readily available for him to use.

Stephenson dowses, or uses a divining rod, to locate most any pipe, and does it with astonishing accuracy. "I can find just about any type of line," he says. "I have located galvanized steel pipes, cast iron, steel, plastic and black pipes, and telephone cables as well."

Using a plumber's punch rod, a plain steel rod welded to a pipe handle, Stephenson places the bottom end of the handle in his palm, and, loosely holding the other hand around the top of the handle, he holds the rod

out in front of him with the tip pointing slightly downward, and begins walking.

As he nears the hidden pipe, the tip of the rod begins to pull to his right, and, when he is directly over the line, the rod has now turned directly across his body. If he walks past the line, the rod pulls even more to the right, then straightens itself.

All the time he is walking, Stephenson retains the same grip on the rod, and no part of him moves except for his legs.

As a boy, Stephenson remembers his treks to Jack County where his grandfather lived. "I remember looking for water with him using a peach tree fork or willow tree fork, and we found water with it pretty accurately," Stephenson added that, when holding the fork, you have to grip it with your palms turned down. The pull can be so intense that holding the fork with your palms facing upwards could result in broken wrists.

"It isn't something that can be explained by science, so most of the time no one will believe it actually works," Stephenson said. "I have shown the workers at the shop on base how to do it, but I can't teach it to a class."

As an oilfield worker, Stephenson dowsed for buried lines in the oil patch, which is even more difficult than dowsing for water lines on base on in a backyard. "In the oilfield, there are no blueprints, and you may be looking for a line buried 20 years before," Stephenson explained. "Also, you don't have a lot of fancy equipment. I learned to dowse with a punch rod, since that is something plumbers have with them all of the time."

Stephenson also explained that dowsing works for some people, but most people cannot, adding to the mystique of the method and feeding the flames of doubt about its authenticity.

Monday afternoon, this reporter watched Stephenson demonstrate the technique in his own backyard. After seeing it work, Stephenson noted that most people remain doubtful until they try it themselves, and handed the rod to me. "For the ones it doesn't

work for, they doubt you even more.

After showing me the proper way to hold the rod, which truly leaves little chance of working the rod by oneself, I began walking forward, the search on for a sewer line in his backyard. A dozen steps later, the rod began turning to my right, and, when I was apparently over the line, the rod turned even more, until it was pointing directly across my body.

"Now you may still have some doubt, since you saw me locate the same line, so we will try something else," Stephenson said.

Taking me to the front yard, Stephenson again handed me the rod, saying, "there are two lines in this yard, one a water line, and the other a gas line. Now, since you have never been here before, I guess it's safe to assume you don't know where they are. Let's see if you can find them."

Walking across the yard, I located both lines with ease, first locating the water line. Stephenson stopped me just long enough to point out a water tap hidden behind a bush, and the water meter located near the street. The place I spotted was on a direct line between the meter and tap. "You just found my 3/4-inch water line," he said. Then, walking forward again, the rod suddenly pulled to the right. A few steps more and the rod was pulling even harder against my body, then easing back to a forward position. Backing up a few steps, the rod again pulled to the right directly across my body. "That is my gas line," he responded.

Asked why he chose the dowsing method, Stephenson said, "Basically, I am lazy, and I don't want to dig anymore than is necessary." "We have an electrical-type detector at the shop which can be used for finding metal pipes," he continued, "but it uses eight batteries, and, if one battery isn't working, the calibrations are off entirely, and you will either miss the line completely or not notice the changes in the tones." He added that on plastic pipes, a strand of wire is laid along it and grounded. "If it is properly grounded, the electronic device will most often locate the pipe, but if the wire is broken, or it is not properly grounded, it won't work."


Again, Stephenson offers no explanation as to how the dowsing method works, and cares less for the cynics who don't believe it works without the benefit of watching someone else do it. "You have to really bear down and think about what you are looking for in order for it to work," he added. "Anyone who hasn't done it for themselves won't

believe that it works."

So, if you are ever trying to locate your lines and your electronic detector is on the blink, grab a rod, or even a clothes hanger stretched out with one end curved, and try it for yourself. Either you've got it or you don't. There's only one way to find out for sure.

# Cook of the Week

Squash pie? Yes, and Doreen (Mrs. Steve) Taylor says that it is delicious. Now that the production of summer squash seems to be at its peak, this is a good time to use it generously in cooking, whether boiled and seasoned, in casseroles, salads or desserts.

In the book, "Foods by Waverley Root," the author says that pumpkins and squash are uniquely American and were completely unknown to the Old World before Columbus discovered America. Botanical records contain no reference to squash before the discovery of America, and it is possible that the squash was the first food to be cultivated by the American Indians.

However, it is somewhat confusing to read in the same article that squash was grown in the hanging gardens of Babylon; that Pliny mentioned it; Apicius gave recipes for it; Martial gave a dinner composed of different kinds of squash; that they were grown in Gaul; and that in the post-Roman cookbook there was a recipe for squash soup. Confusing, until one realizes that their word for squash really meant an edible gourd, which was and can still be eaten.

### SQUASH PIE

- 5 1/2 cups mashed squash, cooked
- 2 tps. salt
- 2 1/2 cups milk
- 4 large eggs
- 2 cups sugar
- 2 tps. cinnamon
- 1 tsp. nutmeg
- 1 tsp. ginger
- 2 T melted butter

Mix all ingredients together and beat with a rotary beater. Pour in unbaked pie shell and bake at 425 degrees for 45-55 minutes.

### MEAT BALLS & SPAGHETTI

- Sauce:
- 1 can tomato soup
  - 1 can tomatoes
  - 1 onion, chopped
  - 2 cloves of garlic
  - 1 T cooking oil
  - 1/4 cup sugar
  - 1 T Worcestershire sauce
  - 2 tps. salt
  - 1/2 tsp. pepper
- Brown onion and garlic in oil; add other ingredients. Simmer 3 hours, stirring occasionally. Add meat balls and simmer 1 hour.

### MEAT BALLS

- 1 lb. hamburger meat
  - 1/2 lb. ground pork
  - 2 heels of bread crumbs
  - 2 tps. salt
  - 1/4 tsp. pepper
  - 2 eggs
- Tear bread into little pieces; then combine all ingredients with bread. Shape into small meat balls and add to spaghetti sauce. Cook 1 hour. Pour over cooked spaghetti.

### CARROT CAKE

- 2 cups sugar
  - 1 1/2 cups salad oil
  - 4 eggs, well beaten
  - 2 tps. soda
  - 2 tps. baking powder
  - 2 cups flour
  - 2 tps. cinnamon
  - 1 tsp. salt
  - 1 cup pecans
  - 1 cup pineapple, drained
  - 2 cups shredded carrots
- Mix sugar and salad oil together, add eggs and mix well. Combine dry ingredients, stir in and mix until smooth. Add carrots, pineapple, and pecans. Bake in 3-9 inch pans at 325 degrees for 30 minutes.

### FROSTING

- 1-8 oz. pkg. cream cheese
  - 1 box powdered sugar
  - 1 cup pecans
  - 3 tps. vanilla
  - 1/2 stick butter
- Mix until smooth and spread on cake.

### OVEN SWISS STEAK

- 1 1/2 lbs. round steak
- 1/4 cup flour

- 1 tsp. salt
  - 1-16 oz. can stewed tomatoes
  - 1/2 cup chopped celery
  - 2 T chopped onion
  - 1/2 cup chopped carrots
  - 1/2 tsp. Worcestershire sauce
  - 1/4 cup grated cheese
- Cut meat into portions. Mix flour and salt and pound into meat. Brown meat in small amount of hot shortening, remove and place in shallow dish. Blend remaining flour with drippings in skillet, add remaining ingredients, except cheese. Cook stirring constantly until mixture boils. Pour over meat. Cover and bake at 250 degrees for 2 hours or until tender. Top with cheese and place in oven until cheese melts.

### EASY ENCHILADAS

- 3 T flour
  - 4 tps. chili powder
  - 3 T oil
  - 2 cups water
  - 1 lb. hamburger
  - 1/2 cup chopped onion
  - 1 tsp. salt
  - 1/4 tsp. pepper
  - 1/2 tsp. garlic salt
  - 1 lb. grated Cheddar cheese
  - 12 soft tortillas
- Brown flour and chili powder in oil. Gradually stir in water, simmer for 30 minutes. Brown hamburger and onions, season with salt, pepper and garlic salt. Dip tortillas in sauce until softened. Fill center of tortillas with meat and cheese; roll tortillas and place side by side in baking dish. Sprinkle remaining cheese over top. Pour sauce over the enchiladas. Bake at 350 degrees until cheese is melted.



# As I See It....

We get an awful lot of requests to help organizations with publicity on fund-raising activities that include the selling of tickets, a lottery.

And each time it happens, I sometimes feel we lose in public relations, because we simply cannot give any such publicity. It's against the law.

A representative from an organization will ask us to do a story, or just mention, that the members are selling tickets on a gun or a blanket or something like that. After all, they are a non-profit organization, and they see nothing wrong with it.

A great number of organizations, in fact just about every group in town, does it in order to generate money for activities. And most of those activities are well worth supporting.

But the newspaper is handicapped because of law, and if a paper gives such publicity, it is just as guilty in violating the lottery law as those who initiate the project.

True, you never hear of a legitimate lottery ever being hauled into court. But I'm just not willing to put my business on the line, and I don't think anyone else would be, either.

A lottery must contain three elements: consideration, prize and chance.

If a person is required to pay anything or buy anything in order to win a prize, then it's a lottery. That's why a store can't put your name on the back of a sales slip and drop it into a hopper for a drawing. Oh, it can, but the store must also allow anyone to walk off the street and sign a similar slip without making a purchase, in order to not be a lottery.

Four articles in the postal manual cover lottery, and because most of our newspapers are sent out through the mails, we must adhere to the articles. They state:

"421 - Any scheme or promotion,

whether or not lawful under the laws of any state, which, upon payment of consideration, offers a prize dependent in whole or in part upon lot or chance, is a lottery.

"422 - The following matter is unlawful mail matter: a) Any letter, package, postal card or circular which advertises, invites or otherwise permits or facilitates participation in a lottery. b) Any lottery ticket or part thereof or substitute. c) Any form of payment for a lottery ticket or share. d) Any newspaper, circular, pamphlet or publication of any kind containing any advertising of a lottery or similar enterprise, or any list of prizes awarded in such an enterprise.

"423 - This section does not apply to any fishing contest not conducted for profit, wherein prizes are

awarded for the species, since, weight or quality of fish caught by contestants in any bona fide fishing or recreation event (18 U.S.C. 1305).

"424 - This section does not apply to an advertisement, list of prizes or information concerning a lottery conducted by a state acting under the authority of its law contained in a newspaper published in that state or in an adjacent state which conducts such a lottery, or to the mailing to addresses within a state of tickets or other material concerning a lottery conducted by that state under the authority of its law (18 U.S.C. 1307)."

Hopefully, with this explanation, we'll be able to keep your good will the next time we have to explain that we can't help you in publicizing certain fund-raising projects.

# Worth Quoting

They had a seminar in Amarillo the other day for elected public officials about open meetings law regulations. On hand were regents of West Texas State University, county commissioners, city councilmen and representatives of a variety of other public governing bodies. And the press, of course, was there covering the discussion like a blanket.

It had to be an interesting session. Some points made by the Randall County District Attorney and others after researching every court case and every attorney general's opinion on the open meetings law now in effect in Texas:

-Reported violations of the open meetings laws by board members likely were unintentional, but will require better attention of governmental authorities to what is permissible and what isn't.

-Fact-finding or exchange of information between individual public board members is permissible, but a private meeting of two or more members of a public body in an attempt to arrive at a secret decision on public business is a violation of the law.

-A good test is to ask if the subject under consideration will appear on the agenda for a later public meeting. If so, two or more board members shouldn't discuss it privately beforehand.

-Members of public bodies should not discuss non-agenda items during public meetings nor discuss business outside of public meetings.

-Public bodies are required to post the agenda for their meetings in a public place 72 hours before the meeting convenes, and agenda items must be specific, not general.

-Examples given of adequate agenda notices for an executive session: (1) Closed executive session for discussion with counsel of proposed litigation - ad valorem taxes, as authorized by VATCS Art 6252-17, Section 2, Paragraph E, (2) Consider and act upon directing county attorney to file lawsuit against Joe Blow.

-Miscellaneous or catch-all items should be avoided. "Miscellaneous will get you in trouble. It's better not to have it."

-Public bodies can easily run astray of the open meetings law during executive session. They can discuss individual employees in executive session, but the discussion of a group of employees or employee policies in executive session is not permissible under the law. An executive session to hire an employee to do "a, b and c" is permissible, but if he is also assigned to do "e" "You've expanded

the duties of that individual. You've gotten outside the specific secrecy needed for the discussion of the one individual. . . "

-Board members who find their discussions broadening beyond the narrow limits of a legal executive session should say, "Let's divide this. If we start talking about other areas before we take any action at all, let's go back as a group and do it in open meeting."

-An independent contractor such as an architect, lawyer, engineer or consulting firm hired to do a specific piece of work for an agency is not an employee of a public body, so discussion of such contractors must take place in open meeting.

-Closed door sessions may include board members, the board's attorney, indispensable witnesses and persons actually affected by the matter being discussed. The exclusion of the press only should be avoided.

-Joint meetings of different public bodies "99 percent of the time will be

"subject to the law even if it's for informational purposes only."

-Emergency meetings, for which only two-hour public notice is required, should be used rarely and with caution.

-Officials should refuse to attend emergency meetings that are "out of line," and leave executive sessions where discussion gets out of line.

-Executive sessions must be held in the context of a public meeting. Proper notice should be posted and the meeting should convene in public and be adjourned in public. Any action taken as a result of the executive session must be made in public and secret ballots are prohibited.

-Decisions made or votes taken by telephoning individual board members without a gathering for a posted meeting is clearly illegal.

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# Ranchers' rodeo slated Aug. 19-20

Ranch hands from 12 of Texas' largest spreads will tussle once again over braggin' rights as "the best ranch in Texas" during the second Texas Ranch Roundup to be held at the rodeo grounds on FM 369 Aug. 19-21.

Plans for the peaceable competition were announced at a press conference at the North Texas Rehabilitation Center, which is co-sponsoring the event with Budweiser.

The Lewis Ranches, headquartered in Clarendon, will return to defend the title their ranch hands won last year, but the cowboys will face stiff competition from the other participating ranches, which include the R.A. Brown Ranch, the Cowan & Son Circle Bar Ranch, Pitchfork Land & Cattle Company, Scharbauer Cattle Co., Renderbrook-Spade Ranch, Swenson Ranches, Tongue River Ranch, U Lazy S Ranch, UU Hereford Ranch and W.T. Waggoner Estate.

In combination, these ranches sprawl over nearly two-million acres of cattle country, nearly triple the area of Rhode Island.

Tom Moorhouse of the Moorhouse

Ranch is expected to try to hold his best All-Round Hand title for a second year.

Texas grit and gumption will be the mainstay of the rodeo-style competition which spotlights working ranch skills in such events as wild cow milking and team branding.

However, the "best ranch in Texas" battle isn't fought in the rodeo arena alone. A ranch queen contest, a talent contest, and this year, a ranch cookoff, all mean additional points for ranches winning these events and additional colorful Texana for spectators.

In addition, the best hitch in the horse world, the Anheuser-Busch Clydesdales, will make special appearances during the grand entry preceding each evening's roundup performance.

Dances both evenings cap off the Texas Ranch Roundup.

Festivities begin Thursday, Aug. 19, with an invitation-only auction of work by more than 20 outstanding western artists.

The roundup opens the following evening with the first rodeo

performance at 7:30. Teams of cowboys from each ranch will compete in team roping, saddle bronc riding, team penning, team branding and wild cow milking. A wild horse race will be a bonus event. The dance at 9 features Mountain Smoke.

On Saturday morning, the ranches will compete in an 8 o'clock jackpot roping event and a women's barrel racing event at noon. A ranch food cookoff, the talent contest where anything goes, and the ranch queen contest are featured Saturday afternoon before the final rodeo events that evening at 7:30. The Mountain Smoke band will perform at the dance that evening at 9.

Points will be awarded to ranch teams and individual cowboys in each event to determine the best ranch and the top all-around cowboy. The winning ranch will take home a traveling trophy, a bronze sculpture by Lex Graham, and the winning cowboy will receive a hand-tooled saddle. First through third-place winners of the ranch food cookoff will receive prizes.

Budweiser Rodeo Six Pack members Jack Ward, T.J. Walter, Bobby Brown and Monty Henson will judge the rodeo events.

Rodeo tickets are: reserved seats \$5, general admission, \$3. Tickets to the dances are \$5 per person each evening, and tickets to the Saturday afternoon contest are \$1 general admission. 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# Area oil, gas report

At a location three miles southeast of Burkburnett, Clymer-Schaaf Properties of Wichita Falls has finalized a new oil producer in the Wichita County Regular Field.

The well is designated as the No. 10 North Bear, pumping oil at the rate of 16 barrels per day.

Location is in an 80-acre lease in the BBB&CRR Survey. Bottomed at 301 feet, the well will produce from perforations 230 to 238 feet into the hole.

Tom Swanson of Electra has filed first production figures on a new oil well in the Wichita County Regular Field. The No. 7 Lalk Brothers showed potential to make 15 barrels of oil per day.

The operator has 320-acres leased, with drillsite in Wichita County's Waggoner Colony Survey, five miles northeast of Electra.

The well will produce from an interval 2,103 to 2,108 feet into the wellbore. Total drilling depth was 2,108 feet.

Drillsite is two miles south of Electra.

It was drilled to 1,097-ft. total depth and will produce from an interval 872 to 982 feet into the wellbore.

The location is in a 240-acre lease in Wichita County's H.T.&B RR survey.

An Electra-based operator has staked locations for the Nos. 27 and 28 Burnett, developmental wells to be located five miles southeast of Electra. F.T. Johnson Jr. has filed first production figures on another new oil well in the Wichita County Regular Field. The No. 3 Dickey McGann "A" showed potential to make 5 barrels of oil per day.

The operator has 326 acres leased, with drillsite in Wichita County's T.E.&L. Survey, seven miles west of Burkburnett.

The well will produce from an interval 1,835 to 1,846 feet into the wellbore. Total drilling depth was 1,926 feet.

The operator has 160-acres leased, with drillsite in Wichita County's Waggoner Colony Survey and has designated the venture as the No. 6 E.F. Graf. Drillsite is five miles northeast of Electra.

Plug-and-abandon orders have been issued for the No. 1 Smyers, a developmental well of F.T. Johnson Jr. in the Wichita County Regular Field. Spudded 4-2-82, the well had reached 1,995 feet total depth. Drillsite was two miles east of Electra.

given a "dry hole" label by Mobil Producing, Texas & New Mexico of Houston. Located four miles southwest of Burkburnett, the well had been spudded 2-1-71. It was located in the Red River Valley Survey, Wichita County, and had reached 800 feet total depth.

Three developmental wells are planned by Swanner Properties of Wichita Falls in the Wichita County Regular Field, four miles north of Holliday townsite. All carry permit for total drilling depths of 1,900 feet. Location is in a 100-acre lease in the J. McCool Survey. The wells will be designated as the Nos. 35, 36 and 37 B. Parker.

At a location one mile south of Iowa Park, J.N.V. Morton Oil Co. of Iowa Park is scheduled to spud the No. 4 Birk, a 1,400-ft. developmental probe in the Wichita County Regular Field. Location is in a 20-acre lease in the Cowherd Brothers Survey.

A Wichita County wildcat venture has been labeled as a dry hole by the operator, Luke Grace Oil Co. of Wichita Falls. Designated as the No. 1 Schultz, the explorer well was spudded last March 17 and bottomed dry at 7,210 feet. Location was in the Waggoner Colony Subdivision Survey, six miles northeast of the old townsite.

Two new oilers have been brought on line in the Wichita County Regular Field by James Oil Co. of Wichita Falls. The wells are designated as the No. 6 and the No. 28-A Pierce-Fordyce, both located four miles east of Electra.

Each of the wells indicated daily potential for 16 barrels of oil, pumping open choke.

Koonce Oil Co. of Iowa Park has staked drillsite for the No. 1-A V.T. Conklin in the Wichita County Regular Field, six miles southwest of Iowa Park. Location is in a 38-acre lease in the J. Johnson Survey. Projected total drilling depth is 1,800 feet.

Location has been staked for a 5,000-ft. developmental try in the

KMA Field by Tom Swanson, independent operator from Electra. The well will be known as the No. 1-B Ancell-Barnes. It is situated in an 80-acre lease in the H&TCRR Survey, 10 miles southwest of Electra.

Camino International Inc., operating out of Wichita Falls, has issued plug and abandon orders for two developmental ventures in the Wichita County Regular Field one mile northeast of Holliday. The wells are designated as the No. 2 and No. 5 B.F. Dutton. They were spudded early in April of this year and bottomed dry at 1,850-ft. total depth in the Denton County School Land Survey.

A marginally successful oiler has been brought on line in the Wichita Regular Field by Paul DeClava, independent operator from Wichita Falls, at a location five miles south of Burkburnett. The well is designated as the No. 33 J.J. Weinner.

It was drilled to total depth of 629 feet. It indicated potential to produce slightly over two barrels of crude per day from perforations 551 to 568 feet into the hole.

Drillsite was in a 243-acre lease in Wichita County's BBB&CRR Survey.

Operating out of Wichita Falls, Madison Oil Co. has staked drillsite for two developmental wells in Wilbarger County's Trifina Field. The wells will be designated as the No. 1 Bill Bond, located five miles west of Vernon and the No. 1 Streit Unit I,

three miles west of Vernon.

The Bond well is in a 40-acre unit in the H&TCRR Survey and is earmarked for 7,500-ft. total depth. The Streit is in an 80-acre unit in the H&TCRR Survey, with projected total depth of 6,500 feet.

The wells are aimed at commercial pay in the Des Moines Formation.

After 40 years of production, the No. 5 Potts "D" is being plugged and abandoned in Wilbarger County's K-M-A Field, 13 miles northwest of Kamay. The well was spudded May 17, 1942, in Wilbarger County's HT:CCR Survey. The K-M-A Field was discovered in Wichita County in 1931 and expanded to include production in Wilbarger County. It has produced a total of 177-million barrels of oil from nine different producing zones.

A developmental try in the Wilbarger County Regular Field has proven unsuccessful five miles south of Harrold in the H&TCRR Survey. F.T. Johnson Jr. of Wichita Falls is the operator. The well was designated as the No. P-19 Waggoner. It reportedly bottomed dry at 1,118 feet.

A 6,000-ft. developmental well is planned in Hardeman County's sector of the Quannah Field by Scarth Oil and Gas Co. of Amarillo. It will be known as the No. 1 McGowan. Location is in a 577-acre lease block in the W&NRR Survey, 3.5 miles northeast of Quannah.

## FFA News

Billy Johnson, Iowa Park High School vocational agriculture teacher, recently participated in a training leadership teams short course at Sam Houston State Univ. in Huntsville.

The workshop was jointly sponsored by SHSU and the Texas Education Agency. In-service programs are held annually at Sam Houston to assist vocational agriculture teachers in improving both professional and technical skills.

Dr. David G. Moorman, chairman of the agriculture department, indicated that Sam Houston State Univ. has a responsibility to assist teachers of vocational agriculture in their program of professional growth. Teachers from throughout the state are encouraged to participate in order to become more proficient educators.

## Wind erosion damage down

Wind damaged 1.6-million acres of land in Texas during the December to May blow season, the U.S. Department of Agriculture Soil Conservation Service reported this week.

George C. Marks, state conservationist for SCS in Temple, said this was a decrease from 1.9-million acres damaged during the last two years.

Counties reporting the most wind erosion were Cochran County with 95,400 acres; Gaines County, 95,000 acres; Wilbarger County, 85,750 acres; and Dickens County with 75,300 acres.

Marks said erosion would have been much higher this year had it not been for conservation tillage farming systems carried out by many farmers.

SCS defines damaged land as that where soil removal or deposition by wind erosion has been enough to subject it to further erosion.

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# Herbicide being tried on cotton

A different cotton preemerg herbicide is being tried on cotton in a demonstration by Rex Wells, just south of Iowa Park. Wells applied 1 1/2 pints of Dual in four gallons of water per acre. This treatment was applied by air right behind the cotton planter.

The site received a preplant incorporated treatment of Prowl at the rate of 1 1/2 pints per acre. Wells is expecting heavy weed pressure in this field which is the reason for a follow-up application of Dual. The yellow preplant herbicides tend to be strong on grass control and less effective on weeds. Wells wanted to use another herbicide which is stronger on weeds in order to handle the expected weed pressure.

The aerial application was made by Johnny Mitchell of Ed's Aerial Spray Service. Mitchell indicated he increased the volume of spray up to 4 gallons per acre in order to get better coverage on the ground.

This demonstration will determine the effectiveness of using two different types of herbicides in order to control fields with heavy weed and grass pressure.

There is increasing interest in guar production in the area. For this reason, a guar variety demonstration is being established by the county field crops committee. The trial is being established by Terry McLister near Punkin Center.

Varieties in the test include: SEAH-90, TX 79-2741 (new basal branching line), Kinman, Esser, Brooks, and TX 71-3292 (hall type breeding line). The current recommended varieties are Kinman and Esser. The Brooks is an older variety which was developed by Lester Brooks at the Iowa Park Experiment Station. Brooks is retired and lives on his small farm located south of Iowa Park.

Guar has about the same cultural practices as cotton. McLister inoculated the seed since the plant is a legume. His planting rate is four to six pounds of seed per acre in 30 inch rows. His goal is to get three to four plants per foot of row. The seeding depth is 1 1/2 inches with a fertilizer rate of 30-30-0 per acre. This demonstration will be one of the stops on the annual cotton tour.

This is last call to cotton growers for entering the cotton insect scouting program. The cost is \$1.50 per acre on dryland cotton and \$2 per acre for irrigated. Taxpayers can register for cotton scouting at Texoma Agricultural Products in Iowa Park. Ralph Harvey has a map for growers to mark fields to be scouted. Checks are made payable to the Wichita County Cotton Scouting Program.

If there are any funds left at the end of the year, the money is refunded to the growers on a pro rata basis. The 1981 scouting ended up costing \$1.05 per acre.

Excessive moisture has caused tomatoes to develop blossom end rot. This condition is evident when the blossom end or the bottom of the tomato rots as it nears maturity. Both Les Wachsmann and Doug James of Wichita Falls are finding this condition in their tomatoes.

This physiological disease is caused by uneven water supply. The control involves leveling out the water supply. Doug James is accomplishing this by mulching his tomatoes with grass clippings or straw.

Gardeners have had no control over the excessive moisture from rains. The tomato plants have developed shallow roots as a result of the high

soil moisture. Between showers the soil has tended to crust. A lot of the tomato roots are located in this dry crust. The feeder roots embedded in the crust caused the plant to react as if the soil was dry. The rains followed by soil crusting has resulted in the tomato plants experiencing uneven moisture supply. James' idea of mulching with grass clippings or straw is the best way to level out the moisture supply and to eliminate the soil moisture loss which causes crusting.

The walnut caterpillars are here, according to Wymore Downing. He found at least a dozen colonies of walnut caterpillars congregated on the bark of his trees, east of Wichita Falls.

The walnut caterpillar is a heavy feeder which can consume the foliage on pecan trees in a matter of days. Both yard tree and commercial growers are alerted to the possibility of a walnut caterpillar infestation. They can be controlled with a single application of malathion or sevin.

Downing indicated the caterpillars were still small. They have already begun to congregate in the forks of the tree to shed their skins. After they get rid of the skins, they return to the foliage for feeding. There are several of these instar developments during their life cycle. A good time for control is to destroy the caterpillars while they are in colonies.

Spider mites are usually considered a hot, dry weather pest, but they are causing damage to tomatoes and beans in many home gardens in the area. Robert Lewis reports spider mites on tomatoes while Paul Steadman has found damaging spider mite populations on his beans.

The symptoms of spider mites is a rusty color which develops on the leaves. A close examination finds a light webbing on the bottom side of the leaves. Magnification is usually required to see spider mites because they are so tiny.

Lewis and Steadman eliminated the spider mite problem by spraying with Kelthane. They directed the spray so it would hit the underside of the

leaves where the spider mites are feeding. One application usually gives

complete control. Reinfestation can occur at a later date.

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## IRS Tax Tips

**TAX RELIEF FOR TWO-PAYCHECK FAMILIES**  
If you and your spouse both bring home a paycheck, you may be able to deduct up to \$1,500 on next year's tax return. Differing rate schedules for single and married taxpayers gave rise to the so-called "marriage tax penalty" when two wage earners of relatively equal income are married.

The Economic Tax Recovery Tax Act of 1981 will bring some relief to working couples who have been subject to the marriage tax penalty. The deduction from gross income is five percent of the qualified earned income of the spouse with the lower qualified earned income, or \$1,500, whichever is less.

For example, if you earn \$20,000 and your spouse earns \$8,000, you would be taxed on \$27,600 (\$8,000 x 5% subtracted from \$28,000) rather than the \$28,000 combined income.

Although this new provision should provide some relief for many two-earner families, you should continue to keep track of your withholding to avoid owing additional taxes at tax time.

If you choose, instead, to give your employer a revised Form W-4, you can claim fewer or no allowances.



### 4-H'ERS HEADING FOR STATE ROUNDUP


