Resident wants street repaired

Who is responsible for repairing the pavement in the 700 block of West Texas Ave.?

David Uhren told the city council Monday night he and others in that block didn't care who did the work, but he felt the city was responsible to correct a situation which has done damage to his car.

Uhren, who lives at 709, explained he purchased the first of several homes constructed in that block by the building trades class of Iowa Park High School. He said the school installed curb and guttering, but the pavement was never properly tied between the existing pavement and the curb.

The situation has deteriorated to the extent that his car's muffler was torn away while attempting to enter his driveway recently, Uhren stated.

Council members, referring to the city's policy of all paving, curb and guttering being the responsibility of the developer, which in this case

would be the school, generally agreed whatever work was needed should be done by the school.

Aldermen instructed Steve Morath, city administrator, to confer with school authorities to see if they would agree to do the work.

However, Tuesday night, school trustees generally agreed that the curb and guttering done by the school was all that was required by the city, at that time, and felt any responsibility now should be borne by the city.

Homes built by the students are sold on an "as-is" basis and any work needed after the sale is finalized should not reflect on the school, trustees pointed out.

proposal of purchasing a truck chassis and brush chipper for the city, however. Explanations given were that there was no manhour work savings, and the equipment would not be used often enough to justify the expense.

Lowest bids for the equipment were \$17,701.19, under the \$18,000 budgeted for both items for the sanitation department.

Aldermen did agree to a land exchange for additional property around the Texowa Street sewage pump station, and abandoning an alley through a block owned by Koonce Oil Co.

Approval was not forthcoming, however, on a proposal that the city cooperate in an impact study of increased coal train traffic. The Amarillo Chamber of Commerce is attempting to coordinate the study through all communities along the Fort Worth and Denver Railroad between Wichita Falls and Texline.

The city's cost in the project would have been \$2,500. The proposal was voted down, 3-1, with alderman Charlie Lee voting to participate.

During a formality of assigning ballots to precincts for the April 3 election, 25 were assigned for absentee voting, 750 for precinct 32 and 225 for precinct 33.

OTHER BUSINESS

In other business at the city meeting, aldermen agreed to transfer a 10-foot deed for a sewer line back to the property owner and receive an easement in its place.

Andy Arrington told the council he had deeded the strip of land to the city in 1970 for the line to be laid. He asked that the ownership be returned to him.

Aldermen approved a motion by Bill Gilmore to have the legal work done, at no cost to Arrington.

Gilmore trial set April 19

Billy Gilmore entered a plea of not guilty Friday afternoon in U.S. District Court in Wichita Falls.

The co-owner of Gilmore Welding Inc. was indicted Feb. 24 by a federal grand jury on 10 counts of mail fraud.

Dist. Judge Eldon Mahon set his trial to begin at 9 a.m. April 19.

Gilmore and three others who had been indicted in other cases, stood before Judge Mahon and his attorney, Hank Anderson. In the audience were his wife and four sons.

He had waived a federal attorney's reading of the indictments, which alleges defrauding Petro-Lewis Corp. of Denver by billing for work which had not been done.

The maximum penalty on the 10 indictments is \$10,000 in fines and 50 years in the penitentiary, Judge Mahon said.

Prior to asking the individual pleadings of the four persons indicted, Judge Mahon gave a 14-minute lecture to the group and their attorneys on the process of the trials. During the lecture, he said "You cannot plead guilty unless you are guilty."

Gilmore was the first of the four to be asked how he pled. After he had entered his plea, he was excused from the court and left the building with his family.

Burglars, vandals hit

A local business was hit by burglars Saturday morning and five trucks were vandalized sometime Friday night, according to reports filed at the Iowa Park Police Department.

Someone took from the safe at

Ken's Pizza sometime between 1:30 and 10:14 a.m. Saturday a bag containing \$1,167.13 in cash, coins and checks. More than \$900 was cash, according to the report.

Neil Wilson, a Burkburnett resident who leases his truck to Barbour Trucking, said his truck was vandalized sometime Friday night while it was parked at Barbour's yard on south Victoria.

Wilson said he discovered the grease plug in the truck's rear end had been loosened after he arrived on an oil lease at Velma, Okla. Damage was estimated at \$6,000.

A check of other trucks still in the truck yard determined the same had been done to four Barbour-owned trucks, John Mixon reported. The plugs in those trucks had either been loosened or removed.

Richard Logan told police someone took property valued at \$536 from a storage shed at 612 W. Washington, sometime between Feb. 21 and Tuesday. The items included a lawn mower, air conditioner, socket set and two pipe wrenches.

Finnell relieved district is settled

State Rep. Charles Finnell Tuesday expressed relief that the redistricting problems are finally settled and no more delay in the election process is anticipated.

Speaking before the Noon Lions Club, the Holliday resident reported on a three-judge panel's final decision to make his 80th district to include the counties of Montague, Hardeman, Ford, Wilbarger, Jack, Baylor, Clay and Wichita, outside the Wichita Falls school district. He will be

representing approximately 89,000 persons.

He explained the problems locally, when such a delay is involved, is that election officials must draw up maps, print ballots, name election workers and numerous other activities before the election process can get underway with absentee balloting.

The party primaries will be held in May.

The judges' decision took from Finnell's district Cooke County and

returned Wilbarger. At least one candidate to oppose Finnell had already visited in Wichita County last week. He was Scott Davis.

With tomorrow as the filing deadline, Finnell now has only one opponent running against him. He is democrat Bill Glassford of Henrietta. No Republican has yet announced.

Redistricting over the state could cause a considerable turnover of legislators in the next session, Finnell reported. He already knows one member of the house who will not be back, and his absence would leave the Holliday legislator the sixth ranking

member of the house, if re-elected.

"Seniority is important in Austin," Finnell said. "I intend to use it next session, as a member of the appropriations committee. My seniority represents your investment in me over the years."

"I think it important to have a part-time legislature," he commented, "so members of the legislature will go home between sessions. Some want to stay in Austin and make it their home. I feel it is important that members be home, with the rest of the citizens, earning their living."

Purchasing pickup poses school board problem

In a meeting which lasted slightly less than an hour Tuesday night, school trustees spent most of the time trying to make a decision on purchasing a pickup.

And the end result was, to wait until the next meeting.

Bids were received from the two local dealerships on 1982 model pickups. But one of the dealers had offered a savings of less than \$400 on a 1981 model which met the specifications, and that caused the lengthy discussion.

At issue was, the other dealer had not been given the opportunity to offer his year-old-model.

So the board finally voted to table the bids on the '82 models, seek a second bid on an '81 model, and make a decision at the next meeting, which was set for April 8.

Trustees jokingly agreed that they had experienced more of a controversy over the pickup issue than any other subject discussed at a meeting in the past several months.

Other business attended to by trustees included:

- * accepted recommendations made by the textbook committee for social studies books, primarily to be used in kindergarten, junior high and senior high;
- * heard a report that student participation in school cafeterias was

81 percent of enrollment during February, and that as many as 79 parents ate lunch in one day at Kidwell Elementary during last week's observance of Public Schools Week;

- * heard a report that all but four percent of the year's taxes have been collected, and those four percent are now considered delinquent;
- * gasoline prices are down somewhat, and some students have

been denied privilege of riding school buses as discipline was required, trustees were told during a report on the transportation department;

- * trustees agreed to extend the school's contract to participate in the West Wichita Coop for the 1982-83 school year;
- * and trustees agreed to allow the Rotary Club to sponsor a large circus one day, sometime in April, on the parking lot south of Hawk Stadium.

Seven seek alderman seats; absentee voting opens Monday

A seventh candidate, Herman Rains, filed for a place on the April 3 city election ballot just prior to filing deadline last Wednesday.

The order in which candidates for alderman will appear on the ballots, when absentee voting begins Monday morning at city hall, will be George Hammonds, Ken Thornton, Johnny Coker, Herman Rains, Walter M. Berbee, John Kight and Bud Thompson.

Two alderman seats will be voted on, and the two receiving the greatest number of votes will be declared

winners.

Actually, the third-place vote receiver could possibly be named to serve a year. That is because one alderman, Charlie Lee, is the only candidate on the ballot for mayor.

Although there is no prescribed method of selecting a person to serve an unexpired term (Lee still has one year remaining on his term), the council has at various times in the past taken the next highest vote receiver in the previous election.

Only Thompson is seeking re-election to the council. Mayor Johnny Crawford and alderman Lita

Watson did not file.

Three seats are open in the school trustee election, which will also be held April 3.

Incumbents Roy Boutwell, Ray Hicks and Martha Dudley are seeking re-election. They are being challenged by Virginia Klinkerman.

The order in which the candidates' names will appear on the ballot are: Klinkerman, Hicks, Boutwell and Dudley.

Absentee voting in the school election also begins Monday, at the school administration building.

How many times have you heard comments about college graduates having a hard time finding work? Or more especially, if the graduate is working, that his former classmate who dropped out of high school is making more money than he is.

It's a problem, real and dumbfounding. And it's common. It wasn't many years ago that I heard of engineering graduates from Texas Tech being hired as service station attendants because they couldn't find anything in their field, or anything else.

Maybe it is "un-American" to say it, but I'm not too sure we're not overeducated.

Now, wait a minute before you start boiling the tar and tearing open the pillows.

This whole problem started after World War II. That was when our nation's leaders said we needed to lift the education level of our population. And it needed lifting, with an average

education of the seventh grade, going into the war.

Part of this education push was the GI bill, which financed military veterans in college. The bill has continued through the Korean and Viet Nam conflicts, and more and more veterans have been educated.

Because of the draft, we're talking about an awful lot of people getting college educations. It was also because of the draft that a lot of men went to college, because they were deferred until graduation.

So, through the years since World War II, the numbers continued to increase who were attending colleges and universities. The people encouraging young persons to attend the higher institutions of learning readily pointed out: "If you're going to get ahead in this world, you've got to have an education. The competition for jobs is so great you've got to have a degree to make it."

Well, it was true, most of the time. But while all this was going on,

someone back there forgot that there were rows of cotton to hoe, floors to sweep, dishes to wash, cows to milk and feed and thousands of "lower" levels of work that someone has to do. Not yet is everything mechanical and automated.

Now we're having to teach our young people that "work is honorable" and there's not all that room at the top there used to be. And it's hard for them to understand.

This is why truck drivers today earn more than driving and safety instructors; plumbers' salaries will double the takehome pay of a math teacher; roughnecks are paid more than newspaper editors. This is why you can't find someone to drive your tractor in the field, but you can find a dozen engineers who can design the tractor you bought.

There's no telling how or when this thing will level out, but it's for certain a lot more heads will be scratched and more aspirin taken before job priorities are back in place.



UMW meets

Mrs. Chauncey Weiler presented the second study in "Must Walls Divide?" by Dr. James Will Tuesday morning for the meeting of United Methodist Women.

She gave the author's version of the relationship between conflicts of European history and the churches, stating that all of the bitter conflicts of history have left their imprint upon the churches which adds to the difficulty of ecumenical cooperation among churches. She remarked that the challenges which eastern churches have had to meet have contributed to their strength rather than to their weakness.

Mrs. Weiler stated that communism has been a determining factor in some countries, but the fact is that all of the churches in communist countries are much stronger worshipping countries because the repression under which they are struggling has caused them to ban together in an even stronger determination to keep alive the religious traditions which are so dear to them.

She reviewed the historical background of most European churches and concluded with "Just to mention all of these various churches and their devoted members reveals the rich variety and the continuing vitality of European church life." Mrs. Weiler, who is Global Concerns chairman of the United Methodist Women, will present the third study in a series of five at next week's meeting.

Texas heritage is club's program

"Walking Exchange Avenue" was the theme of the 23 Study Club's Texas Heritage program Thursday afternoon presented by Mrs. Travis Smith and Mrs. Joe Singer, who were dressed in western clothes. The meeting was held in the home of Mrs. Sam Hunter and Mrs. L.E. Brooks was co-hostess.

Mrs. James A. Sewell served as program leader. Mrs. Sam Hill read

two poems by James J. Metcalf, "I Love My Texas" and "The Lord Beside Us," prefacing the reading with a biographical sketch of the poet, and concluded with an article, "I Believe in God," for the devotion.

Mrs. Keith Auld led the group in singing "Texas Our Texas" and "The Eyes of Texas" and gave a musical reading "Texas in the Spring" for the art numbers. Mrs. Bill Bates was piano accompanist.

To introduce her topic "Niles City - a Present from the Past," Mrs. Smith explained that Niles City is not even on the map today but the ruins and restorations of the little town that played an important part in the development of Fort Worth can be seen today in the heart of Northside Fort Worth.

She said that in Feb. 1911, 30 men sauntered into "Dad" Carson's saloon and voted to incorporate the town which was named for L.V. Niles who was responsible for bringing the big packing plants to the area and for running the Fort Worth Stockyard Co. The life of Niles City was brief, from 1911 to 1923, but during that time it achieved fame as "the richest city in the world", with a greater per capita value than any city at that time.

The town was one half mile square in size. It was bounded on the north by 29th St., on the south by Marine Creek, on the west by North Main St., and one block east of Decatur Ave. on a straight line from 29th St. to Trinity River on the east.

Mrs. Smith remarked that Niles City had a city hall, police and fire departments, artesian wells for water, electric lights, telephone and gas service, five school buildings, four for the whites and one for Negroes, two grain elevators, three grocery stores and a drug store. It had the distinction of having one of the first woman mayors in the nation and what is believed to be the first cemetery in Tarrant County.

When the first big packing plants moved to Fort Worth establishing it as one of the nation's leading cattle centers, they really settled in what would become Niles City. The first indoor rodeo was staged there in 1918 and the great singer Caruso sang there in 1920.

According to Mrs. Smith's reference materials, in 1922, after a series of complicated legal maneuverings, Fort Worth residents voted to annex Niles City without the little town having a vote. Niles City sued and legal complications dragged on until Aug. 1, 1923 when Niles City agreed to drop its fight against annexation.

Mrs. Smith said that efforts are being expended now to get the site of the non-existent town a historical marker.

Mrs. Singer took club members on an arm chair walking tour of Exchange Ave. where they stepped through history to see the remains of a once great kingdom and to view some of the things offered to visitors

today. The tour started at what once were the main entrance steps of the great packing plants at the east end of the avenue. Sights of special interest included the old Swift & Co. office building now preserved as an Old Spaghetti Warehouse; the remains of the original Armour & Swift operations; the Spanish-style Livestock Bldg., now completely renovated and rented to various businesses, such as Mule Alley Art Center, Stockyard Gallery, Cattle Car Cafe, a cattle arena where auctions are held Monday through Thursday.

Mrs. Singer led members on a side trip to Marine Creek for them to go to Fincher's White Front Store, the corner part being the original Stockyards National Bank, later North Fort Worth State Bank. Here they saw the original bank vaults, marble walls nearly hidden by boxes and could imagine the spot on one ceiling made by a would-be nitroglycerin-welding bank robber in the 1930s who literally blew his head off and onto the ceiling.

Two especially noteworthy places for feelings of another time and place on the Exchange Ave. trek were Stockyards Drug Store and General Store & Trading Post. A few others were Leddy Boots & Saddle, Coker's Western Hatters, A-1 Tattoo Parlour, Western Bar and White Elephant.

During the business, Mrs. D.O. James was elected delegate to the Santa Rosa District Convention at Vernon March 26-27. Twenty-one members were present.

While interviewing this week's cook for biographical information, it soon became apparent there was not one, but three capable cooks in the Jim Loving household. That is, if you judge the book by its cover.

Mrs. Jim Loving, 900 N. 4th St., at first insisted her husband should be submitting recipes. Half Sicilian, he has a fondness for edibles such as the red clam sauce and stuffed artichokes - Sicilian style which are listed below.

Their son, David, 22, won the Betty Crocker Award his senior year at Iowa Park High School, which would seem to be an indication he could serve up a meal with the best of them. However, David asserts, "Winning had nothing to do with cooking."

The couple's other child, Angie, chooses to take a backseat in the cooking action, but admits a fondness for the ham ball recipe, also listed below. She is a fifth grader at Bradford.

The Lovings have lived in Iowa Park for five years, moving from Arkansas City, Kansas. She is a quality control technician for Certaineed, while he works at Ralph Morgan Dodge in Wichita Falls.

"The recipe for stuffed artichokes comes from Jim's grandmother, who was full-blooded Sicilian," said Mrs. Loving. She further added that her own mother and grandmother are sources of inspiration as cooking goes.

"When they didn't have recipes, then they had to go with what they had, making their own recipes as they went along," she said. "My mother used to cook like that."

Mrs. Loving's hobbies include needlepoint, crochet and working in the yard.

fine, 1/4 cup chopped onion in 1/2 stick of butter and 1/4 cup olive oil.

Add 3 cans tomato paste and 2 cans tomato sauce and one cup water.

Add 1/4 t. oregano, 1/4 t. sweet basil, and 1/2 t. parsley flakes.

Simmer for 20 minutes. Add 2 flat cans of clams with juice and let stand for about 10 minutes.

Serve over spaghetti.

STUFFED ARTICHOKE SICILIAN STYLE

[Serves four]

Wash four artichokes, trim bottom stem so it will sit flat in pan.

Immerse in cold water, then add 1 t. salt and soak for 20 minutes.

Mix the following ingredients: 1 1/2 cup fine dry bread crumbs; 1/2 cup grated Romano cheese; 1 can anchovies chopped; and 1 clove garlic minced. Salt and pepper to taste.

Remove artichokes and stuff between leaves with above mixture.

Place in pan with tight fitting lid. Add approximately two inches of water. Sprinkle with 1 t. oil for each artichoke. Cover and place in 350-degree oven for approximately 1 1/2 hours or until leaves pull away easily. Baste three or four times during cooking.

HAM BALL

8 oz. Philadelphia cream cheese

1/4 cup mayonnaise

2 cups ground ham

2 t dry parsley

1 t minced onion

1/4 t Tobasco sauce

Mix well and roll in chopped nuts or parsley. Serve with assorted crackers.

CHEESE CAKE

Line bottom and sides of an 11x16 pan with graham crackers.

Mix two 8 oz. packages Philadelphia cream cheese with 1/2 cup powdered sugar and enough milk to mix well. Add 2/3 cup chopped pecans

Spread in pan over graham crackers. Prepare two envelopes Dream Whip and spread over first mixture. Chill well. Top with one can blueberry pie filling (or you can substitute with another favorite).
