City election set for April

April 2 was set to elect three city aldermen, during Monday night's regular meeting of the council.

What makes this spring's election unique is that all three terms which will expire are now being held by aldermen serving unexpired terms.

Mayor Charlie Lee had just completed his first year as alderman when he ran uncontested for his present office. Johnny Coker was appointed to complete his year as alderman.

Then two aldermen, Bill Gilmore and Herman Mahler, resigned, forcing a special election. Lita Watson, who had not sought a fourth term in the spring election, and Tim Hunter, were winners of the special election, and their terms expire in April.

Applications for places on the ballot are now being accepted at city hall. Absentee voting will begin in March, 20 days before election date.

Calling of the election was but one of numerous items on Monday's agenda.

The council approved an ordinance rezoning five lots which front on the access road, between Third and Fourth Streets, from convenience commercial to medium density residential, which includes apartments. It was approved by a 3-2 vote, with aldermen Coker and Hunter opposing.

Two resolutions were approved. One authorizes a contract with the Recreational Activity Center for another year. The other approves a contract with Iowa Park Soccer Association to use a six-acre tract of city-owned land on the south side of town for playing fields.

Following a 26-minute executive session, which was closed to the public, the mayor explained a personnel problem in the police department had been subject of the discussion. Outcome of the discussion was the need of a grievance procedure policy which would not

would be for the sewer and water department, two full-size pickups for the parks department and sanitation department, and the truck, on which a dump bed would be installed, for the street department.

Council members authorized purchase and installation of a sewer lift pump, with a maximum expenditure of \$2,000, which would serve the Recreational Activities Center and a proposed restroom for Burnett Baseball Field.

The RAC has always been served by a septic tank, which has been a problem in the past and is not adequate to handle the additional load from a public restroom, the council was told.

While the mayor explained the council had no choice but to pay the city's share of the Wichita County Tax Appraisal District's bill for this year, he said it should be pointed out the cost to the city was \$14,690.77.

Authorization was also given for advertising for bids to rebuild the east lane of Park Ave. between Yosemite and Colorado.

Bids will have alternates for turnkey work or supplying materials for city crews to do the work. Additionally, bids will be sought for asphalt and concrete.

Alderman Bud Thompson said he had received numerous complaints about the nuisance of bees and pigeons in the city. He said both were being kept in the city.

After Thompson said he was allergic to insect bites, alderman Hunter admitted he kept a hive of bees in town, but also said bees travel up to two miles, so in-town or out-of-town bees being kept were not the solution to Thompson's problem.

During his report to the council, James Barrington, city administrator, said night lights for the Burnett Library grounds would be installed within a week, and that drawings for city hall remodeling would soon be ready to advertise for bids.



January is the "sweetest" month of the year because it is National Candy Month. Many cooks, instead of succumbing to a postholiday slump, sweeten the cold, wintry days with candy, cakes or pies. Theresa (Mrs. Paul) Arrington is probably choosing the cake route because two of her recipes today are for cakes, one strawberry, the other chocolate.

The strawberry, the juicy edible red fruit of a plant of the rose family, goes back to prehistoric times. The seeds were the scarcest finds at Mesolithic sites in Denmark, Neolithic sites in Switzerland and Iron Age sites. It was said of one, "God could have made a better berry, but doubtless God never did."

In the U.S. cultivated strawberries were first grown in home gardens for family consumption. They were rare in markets because of the perishability problem. In the early 1800s, the Philadelphia suburbs raised the berries close to a concentrated market. It was fashionable to frequent the city's many "strawberry gardens" to eat the delectable berry. In 1840, Martin Van Buren was attacked during his presidential campaign on the ground that he had used public money to raise strawberries for his own table.

In 1847, the Erie Railroad began to operate, facilitating the delivery of perishable products. In June of that year, the train brought 80,000 baskets of strawberries to New York. Now with speedy and refrigerated transportation, they are within everybody's reach.





Goetzes, Graves on honor rolls





I couldn't help but express my frustration during Monday night's city council meeting, when the subject got around to Lone Star Gas rates.

Attending the meeting were Wayne Bolling and former city administrator Steve Morath. They were there to explain the utility company's request for a rate increase and dispute alternative rates obtained from the city's consultant. Bolling did all the talking, Morath mainly sat and listened.

It was the first time I'd heard a representative from the company admit the line which serves Iowa Park carries gas from both Texas and Oklahoma.

Iowa Park challenged Lone Star a few years ago in Austin, that the price for gas sold at the city gate should be at interstate rate rather than intrastate. Interstate rates are lower because they are set by the federal government.

The city didn't get anywhere in Austin. But, like I said, this was the first time to my knowledge that interstate gas was acknowledged to be in the line.

Bolling said an attorney would be needed to say whether or not Lone Star wasn't making more money on gas sold on this line than on lines serviced by an intrastate line.

When I asked the representative why businesses are charged a higher minimum than residences, the answer really blew my thinking.

Commercial rates are charged because commercial businesses in the big cities are harder to serve and it costs the company more, he said, in effect.

But we're not in a larger city. It's not harder to serve a business in Iowa Park than it is a home. Yet we pay a higher minimum rate because of situations in cities like Dallas and Fort Worth.

The new rate being requested by Lone Star is a minimum of \$5 monthly for residences and \$8 for commercial users.

I can't speak for all businesses in Iowa Park, but most of us are small in size and this office is probably typical of the majority of some 150 "commercial" users.

We use gas only for winter heating. Thus, our meter dial doesn't turn a lick some five months of the year, and very little all but a couple or three months.

During those non-use months, we must pay the minimum, which for the past two years has been \$5.25. And that's for absolutely nothing except receiving a bill saying we didn't use any gas and what we owe.

I'm hoping the city council will approve in its new rate contract. . . they're going to give Lone Star an increase of some kind, or the state will do it for them. . . the new rates will set commercial users at the same minimum as residential. It could spell


out that if commercial users require a larger metering system than small users, a charge could be levied for that, of course.

But there is no sense in a small business owner paying a higher minimum rate than the owner pays for his home, especially when he uses more gas at home than he does at his business.

Local staff not included because they don't set the company's policies, Lone Star has been ripping off Iowa Park.

Koonce Oil Co. of Iowa Park has filed for permit to drill the No. 12 McCarthy, a 1,000-foot developmental well in the Wichita County Regular Field, 4.5 miles southwest of Iowa Park. The operation will be in an 80-acre lease in Wichita County's BS&F Survey.

Crawford Oil Co. of Iowa Park has revealed plans to drill a 1,200-foot developmental well in the Wichita Regular Field. The operator has 97-acres leased, with drillsite in Wichita County's Denton County School Land Survey and has designated the venture as the No. 1 E. Sherrod. Drillsite is 4.5 miles east of Holliday.

Location has been staked by Joe McDonald of Burkburnett for a 1,400-foot developmental probe in Wichita County's H. Balch Survey, four miles southwest of Iowa Park. The well is designated as the No. 11 Hodges "B" Lease. Drillsite will be in a 155-acre lease in the Wichita County Regular Field.

The No. 5 G.A. Hoge is slated to be drilled in the Wichita Regular Field by R.W. Sargent, operator from Electra. With projected total depth of 1,100 feet, it will be spudded in a 50-acre lease of the Kemp WVFL Survey, two miles east of Kamay, in Wichita County.

A new oil producer in the Wichita Regular Field has been finaled by W.T. Crawford Jr. of Wichita Falls. Designated as the No. 14 Kempner "B", the well indicated capacity to produce 1 barrel of oil per day on an open choke.

The location is five miles southeast



of Kamay, in a 58-acre lease in the KWVFL Survey, Wichita County.

Bottomed at 917 feet, the well will produce from an interval of perforations 802 to 811 feet into the hole. The pay formation was first encountered at 802 feet.

The No. 11 W.T. Waggoner Estate "SS" Lease, a developmental well in Wilbarger County's H&TC Survey, is scheduled to be drilled 10 miles southeast of Harrold. S&H Oil Co. of Vernon is listed as the operator. Location is in a 183-acre lease in the Wilbarger County Regular Field. Projected total depth of 2,000 feet.



IRS Tax Tips

IRS TAX HELP AVAILABLE

"Although there is a new number to dial - 1-800-424-1040 - the service will be the same as in prior years," said Bob Fonck, Director's Representative for the Internal Revenue Service Wichita Falls office in announcing the taxpayer assistance program for the 1983 filing period. "Taxpayers will be able to get answers to their tax questions, order forms and publications, get information regarding their accounts, and find out about the Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) site nearest their home from 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. each Monday through Friday."

Fonck noted that, while the Wichita Falls office will not provide walk-in tax assistance, IRS will be working with community agencies this filing period to conduct a series of group self-help sessions. He also mentioned that IRS has produced two films - one on the short forms, Form 1040A and Form 1040EZ, and one on Form 1040 and Schedule A & B . which are available to schools and civic groups beginning in February.

The Wichita Falls office will maintain a limited selection of forms and publications but Fonck encourages taxpayers to use the order form contained within the tax package received in the mail. Certain post offices and banks will stock individual returns and local libraries will have a file of reproducible forms as well.

"Our VITA volunteers are attending training sessions right now and will be ready to do basic return preparation for low-income, handicapped, elderly and otherwise disadvantaged taxpayers by mid-January," said Fonck. Taxpayers may pick up a list of VITA sites and their schedules at the Wichita Falls office or may order a schedule through the toll free service.

Supervising the trip were Buddy Henderson and Bob Bentley, district director of Boy Scout Explorers.



Explanation of PIK set

A detailed explanation of the payment in kind (PIK) program for crop producers, with special emphasis upon its implications for the Rolling Plains, will be held in Vernon Feb. 4.

The program will be held at the Texas A&M Univ. Agricultural Research and Extension Center from 9:30 a.m. until 3 p.m. It is being sponsored by the Rolling Plains

Economic Program and will be conducted by specialists with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

PIK is a U.S. Department of Agriculture program designed to reduce production, reduce surplus stock holdings and avoid increased budget outlays that would otherwise be necessary under price support programs.

Detailed provisions of the program will be explained by Dr. Ron Knutson, Extension economist in marketing and policy, from College Station. During the afternoon, the effect of PIK on cover crops, insects and management practices will be discussed by U.U. Alexander, Extension agronomist, and Emory P. Boring III, Extension entomologist.

A clear understanding of the PIK provisions is vital to area crop producers and the Feb. 4 meeting will answer many questions of Rolling Plains farmers, said Ed Garnett, district Extension director.

IRS Tax Tips

Based on which form they filed last year, taxpayers will receive either the Form 1040 or Form 1040EZ and 1040A package. This year, the 1040EZ, containing only 11 lines to complete, has been added to the Form 1040A package. "The 1040EZ is designed for single taxpayers who have no dependents, whose taxable income is less than \$50,000, earned from wages, salaries and tips and no more than \$400 in interest," Cagle said.

Generally, as in previous years, the Form 1040 is for those taxpayers who itemize deductions or claim such tax credits as child care, energy, political contributions and investment credit.

Since filing their tax forms last year, some taxpayers may have had a change in their tax status and need a different form than that received in the mail. Federal tax forms and scheduled are available at most post offices, many banks and some libraries. The most convenient way to obtain additional forms is by using the handy order blank in the tax

forms package.

Guar good PIK cover crop

The large supply of guar this year makes it the number one candidate for a legume cover crop on directed acres in the government programs. The previously announced 20 percent diversion and now the additional 30 percent Payment In Kind (PIK) Program means some producers could have as much as 50 percent of their crop land out of cotton and wheat. The diverted acres, regardless of the percentage, provides an opportunity to use a legume cover crop to aid in soil improvement.

The two common cover crops for this area are guar and southern peas, according to Dr. Al Alexander, Extension area agronomist. He goes on to say both of these legumes have equal ability in fixing nitrogen from the air and in the production of organic material.

There is a big cost advantage in favor of guar. The cost of establishing guar as a cover crop should be minimal. In addition to cheaper seed cost, little land preparation is required for drilling guar seed.

Growers using guar as a cover crop would want to inoculate the seed with group e (cowpea), inoculant. Guar seeding is done when soil temperatures reach 70 degrees or higher. Soil temerpature records over the past three years in Wichita County indicate soil temperatures reached 70 degrees on the average of May 12.

The seeding rate on guar is four to six pounds per acre in rows or 10 to 15 pounds per acre drilled. Drilling is the recommended practice when planting as a cover crop.

Alexander reminds growers to turn guar under before the lower pods turn brown. This will give maximum tonnage of organic material and will prevent possible problems of voluntary plants in the next crop.

The top producing guar variety in the demonstration by Terry and Harrison McAlister of Punkin Center was Brooks with 653 pounds per acre. I'm sure Lester Brooks, who developed this variety at the Iowa Park Experiment Station almost 20 years ago, is glad to see that it still competes with the newer improved ones. Brooks is retired and now lives south of Iowa Park.

The other varieties in the test and their yield in pounds per acre included: Kinman with 568 pounds, Tx 71-3292 made 554 pounds, Essar vielded 460 pounds, Seah 90 with 414 pounds, and Tx 79-2741 giving 374 pounds per acre.

Yields were taken with a combine. Plot sizes were 50 feet by 150 feet. An economic analysis was made figuring the value of the guar at 20 cents per pound. The top yielding variety grosses \$130.60 per acre while the lowest yielder made \$74.80 per acre.







benefits to which they are entitled.

documents are essential in proving expenses. Tax records should be kept at least three years after the return is due or filed, or two years after the tax was paid, whichever is later.

An exception to the three-year retention rule is a property transaction, such as the purchase of real estate. These records should be kept for as long as they are helpful in determining the basis of original or replacement property.
