And I suggest that Congress investigate both the Chinese profiteers and the huge China lobby in the USA."

All businesses offering retail services to the public must file a list of ceiling prices before June 45, Fort Worth district office of Price Stabilization reminded this week.

On the same date, lists of ceiling prices must be posted where customers can plainly see them. These equirements are called for by Ceilg Price Regulation 34. It applies to all service trades-

barbers, dry cleaners, laundries, washaterias, shoe repair shops, servce stations, beauty shops, parking

Operators of such businesses need only to write down a list of the highest prices charged for each service between Dec. 19, 1960 and Jan. 25, 1951. They mail one copy to the Fort Worth district OPS office and display another copy in the place of business.




