Burnt building problem back on council agenda

A familiar item is back on Monday's city council meeting agenda: the burnt building in the 100 block of West Cash.

City aldermen moved their regular meeting dates in December up one week, and will meet at 7 p.m. in council chambers. The regular meeting date would have been Dec. 10, had it not been changed.

Administrator James Barrington said yesterday that a letter had been mailed to the burnt building's owners, Mr. and Mrs. Hugh Wilson, informing them the agreement they had signed Oct. 26 to clean the debris was in default.

According to the document, the Wilsons had agreed to have the former Jim's Market cleaned to the flooring, including all equipment inside and the walls cleaned, by Nov. 17. By Nov. 24, the wooden flooring

was to have been cleared away, and the site ready for new construction.

According to the agreement, should the Wilsons not meet required specifications for cleaning the lot, the city is to do the work and bill the owners for all expenses.

Barrington said Jay Cantrell, city attorney, will be in attendance to discuss the situation, possibly with the Wilsons there to answer questions.

An executive session is also on the agenda, "to consider pending litigation." Barrington would not confirm the Wilson agreement was the subject of that session which will be closed to the public.

Following the executive session on the agenda is another item, during which in public the council can take action on its closed meeting topic, if it chooses.

Saturday, the deadline for completing the clean-up operation, was the 44th week anniversary of the fire.

OTHER BUSINESS

Also on Monday's agenda is an appearance by Danny Christian, representing Burlington Northern Railroad, who is to ask the city to close the Wall Street rail crossing.

Barrington said the unofficial response to the request has been the council members were not in favor of granting the closing. However, he said aldermen agreed to listen to the representative.

One reason council members are opposed to such a request is that they have already scheduled a major widening and resurfacing project on Wall, south of the crossing. Additionally, they point out that Wall

is a major connection to the business district with the Garden Valley Addition.

A resolution will be considered by council members which would authorize Barrington to enter into an agreement with Harper-Perkins Architects for Phase Two of the city hall's renovation.

The second phase would re-do the original portion of city hall, and add a drive-through window where residents could pay utility bills without having to leave their cars.

Two lots, previously believed to be owned by Billy Henson on East Cash but found to be city property, have been advertised for bids. Council members will consider bids offered to sell the property.

Also on the agenda, aldermen will consider closing city hall Christmas Eve, a Monday, part or all of the day.

Men in football game for fun, good causes

More than 50 grown men will be participating in a football game here Saturday afternoon with two things in mind: having fun and raising money for their particular causes.

Most of them former Hawks, the participants will be decked out in full pads for the 1 p.m. kickoff. Their ages will range from young 20s to over 45.

The teams, to meet in Hawk Stadium, represent the Alumni Association and Hawk Booster Club.

Proceeds from ticket and concession stand sales will be divided. The Alumni Association portion will be used to establish the Bertha

McDonald Scholarship Fund, while the Booster Club's share will be used to finance its annual banquet for athletes and purchases of needed equipment.

Tickets at the gate will be \$4 for adults and \$1 for students.

Schools rated 'A-plus' by TEA study team

Iowa Park schools received an "A-plus" grade at the end of a two and a half day accreditation study by Texas Education Agency monitors.

To be accredited now means more than a student's grades being accepted by state colleges and universities. One result of HB 72 is that a school not accredited also does not qualify for state education funding.

A report was made by Dr. Claude Harcrow, who headed the study team, at a meeting of his staff Wednesday morning with school administrators and board members.

In his general statements, Dr. Harcrow commended the board for community support, stating "Start-up monies and emergency funds are substantial. This reflects good management practices. Should have two to three months operating funds. Iowa Park does this in a superior manner."

He also rated Supt. Harold Cowley as a "second to none executive officer. Accountability flow is very, very good. Can be seen from Superintendent down through teachers. Student learner outcomes have reflected this system the past few years. Overall instructional system among the very best. First school looked at this year with no violations."

All six categories of the administrative department were listed as "substantial compliance" which is the highest grade a monitor

issues. These include community, board minutes, board support, board policies, public information and public involvement.

Virtually all 17 categories under curriculum and instruction also received "substantial compliance or "excellent" ratings.

Some concern was listed over class sizes in kindergarten through second grade and suggested planning for next year, to comply with student-teacher ratios set out by TEA; more work toward streamlining of lesson plans; no certified nurse on campus level; and possible use of full-time physical instructor at Kidwell Elementary.

Special comments of compliments included:

"Subjects and Time - 7-8 full compliance - over 95% complete - far ahead of schedule.

"Reading Improvement - Being done very well - Good emphasis on reading.

"Principals Instructional Leader - Well done. Excellent signs of instructional leadership.

"Library Resources - Very strong."

Local officers assist Texas Ranger in arrest

Iowa Park police turned over a young man Thursday to Texas Ranger Bill Gerth, because authorities wanted to know why he fled authorities and how he came into possession of a large sum of money.

The man, tentatively identified as William Lee Rumisek, address unknown, was taken into custody at 6:01 a.m. Thursday in the 100 block of West Garden, and later turned over to Ranger Gerth.

Though the initial charge was listed as criminal trespass, no formal complaint has yet been filed against the subject.

Officers first became interested in Rumisek the previous evening when his vehicle, an American sports car, crashed through a fence on Barnett Road near Wichita Falls.

As Game Warden Butch Shoop and another warden approached the stalled vehicle, one of two men inside fled and the other remained.

Also inside the vehicle was what was described as "a large amount of cash" still with a Dallas bank's wrappers on it.

Shoop and his fellow officer never caught the fleeing subject, but knew he would be muddy and wet wherever he arrived.

Later that evening, a man matching that description was reported at a convenience store in the south part of town. He reportedly spent the night in a home on West Garden.

The name of the subject was provided by his companion who had remained in the stalled vehicle.

Police and Emergency Medical Technicians were summoned to 124 James at 8:23 p.m. Wednesday, where a 16-year-old male was reportedly injured in an assault.

Chief Bob Dean said the case is still under investigation. The juvenile was transported with cuts and bruises by ambulance to a Wichita Falls hospital.

At 12:03 a.m. last Wednesday, officers responded to a tip that three white males were taking objects from a pickup at 707 Park Plaza.

One of the trio, Jerry Bob Smith, was arrested and charged with "theft under \$20."

Iowa Park police arrested a Lawton man, David Patrick Russell, 20, at 12:30 a.m. Sunday for driving while intoxicated. The arrest was made at the intersection of U.S. 287 and Johnson Road.

As I See It....

Two major bottlenecks for highway travelers in this area apparently are to be corrected in the next few years, thanks to that new levy of taxes put on Texans during the special session last summer.

Travelers will, in the future, be able to drive through Wichita Falls and Vernon without having to stop. And it's about time.

I say that, because I blame politics for all us other communities being bypassed by the highway system, yet Wichita Falls and Vernon have enjoyed the traffic slowdown. People end to stop for gas and food in a city where their regular speed of travel is interrupted.

According to the Highway

Department, the traffic lights between 8th and 18th Streets will not hamper travelers when an overhead ramp is constructed. The project is in the new "five-year development schedule" released this week.

If you want to believe the Highway Department figured the present situation would handle all traffic and didn't have alternate plans, I've got a couple of bridges I'd like to sell you.

If you've never driven on overhead lanes, you might want to visit Austin. Highway 35 there has done an excellent job of relieving a terrible situation, and does it adequately.

Those of you who remember the old highway and traffic lights at Waco, and have passed through that city

now that the new highway has been built, can appreciate the change.

Several years ago, I commented on the Vernon Highway situation. Sure, the right of way and overpass work is here, but there's no way, other than politics, that the Highway Department would have built that access road with concrete if it had planned to complete the road in any short period of time.

Funds from the fuel tax and registration fee increases are the monies referred to in press releases which will be used in projects announced. I'm still trying to find out where that five-cent gas tax established by the federal government is going.

By the way, a stretch of highway west of town is slated for an asphaltic concrete overlay, called a protective coating. It's to extend from half a mile west of Buffalo Creek to half a mile west of Johnson Road, a stretch of 3.6 miles.

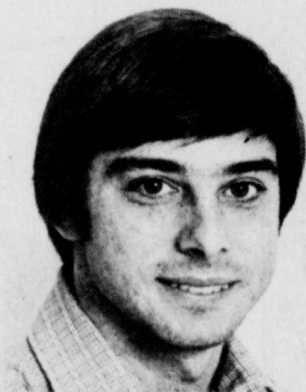
James Cowley, son of Mr. and Mrs. Harold Cowley, has been selected to be a member of the Golden Leos at East Texas State Univ.

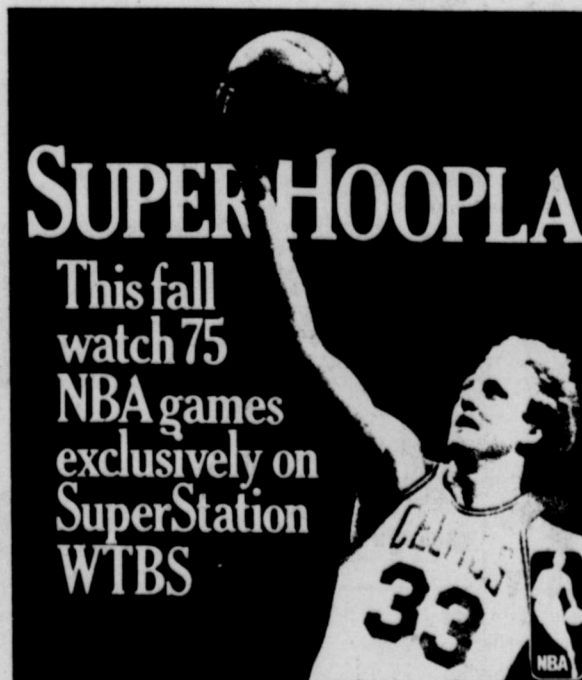

EASY EGG SAUSAGE CASSEROLE

- 6 eggs
- 6 pieces white bread (no crust)
- 2 cups milk
- 1 lb. pork sausage (browned & drained)
- 1 lb. Cheddar cheese, grated
- 1/2 t. salt
- Dash of pepper
- 1/8 t. dry mustard

X-RAYS ... AGAIN?

X-ray examinations are essential to help the dentist make a diagnosis and treat the patient who has a condition that can threaten their oral or general health. While x-rays don't tell the whole story, they can detect such problems as bone loss from untreated periodontal or gum disease, impacted teeth, missing teeth, abscesses, tumors, and decay between the teeth or below the gum line.

How often should x-rays be taken? The answer depends on the history of the patient, what the dentist expects to have happened since the last examination, and the condition being treated. For some conditions it is necessary to have films before, during, and after treatment.

The films show what the condition is at that moment only - and are reasonably reliable for up to 6 months.

Those patients that have to have restorations done nearly every 6 months... it is reasonable to take Bite-wing x-rays each check-up, but for those that have a history of little or no decay and good home hygiene, it is reasonable to not take films more than once a year.

The x-ray head itself is shielded, and with the use of the patient lead lined apron, plus the use of high speed film makes the use of dental x-rays highly beneficial with very little risk.

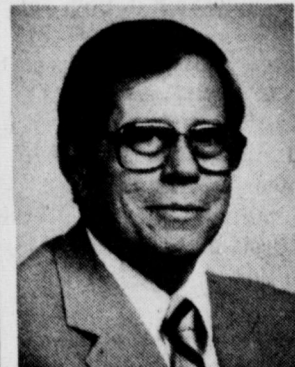

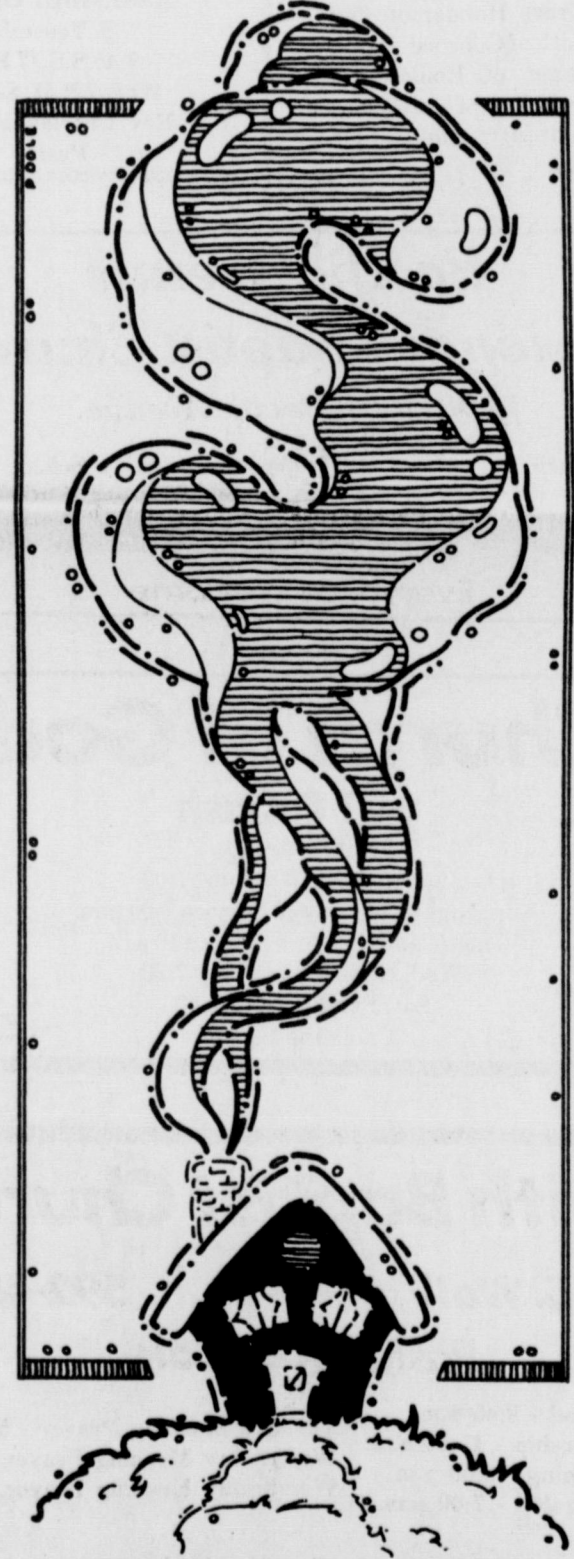

MODERN EQUIPMENT FOR ALL CAMPUSES

The Iowa Park school system is making advances toward equipping the school campuses with modern technological equipment. The junior high and high schools now have modern computer labs, and courses available to train students in using computer hardware and software. Use of computers for office use is being projected, and computers are already in use in the administrative offices. Although there are no computers yet in the two elementary schools, a VCR and TV monitor are being purchased for each elementary campus this year. Cable TV of Iowa Park has installed cable service in the Kidwell library already, and the Bradford library will soon have cable service available, which will enable the showing and recording of numerous educational programs at each campus. Various educational video tapes are available, not only for students but also for teacher training and in-service. Plans are to purchase educational tapes to build a local media library.

A video camera will eventually be purchased for use in the elementary fine arts program, as well as in other academic areas. Over the next few years it is projected that enough equipment will be purchased so that each elementary grade level will have full use of VCR tapes and equipment. Much of this type of equipment is already in use at the secondary level in Iowa Park.

Junior girls sweep Zundy

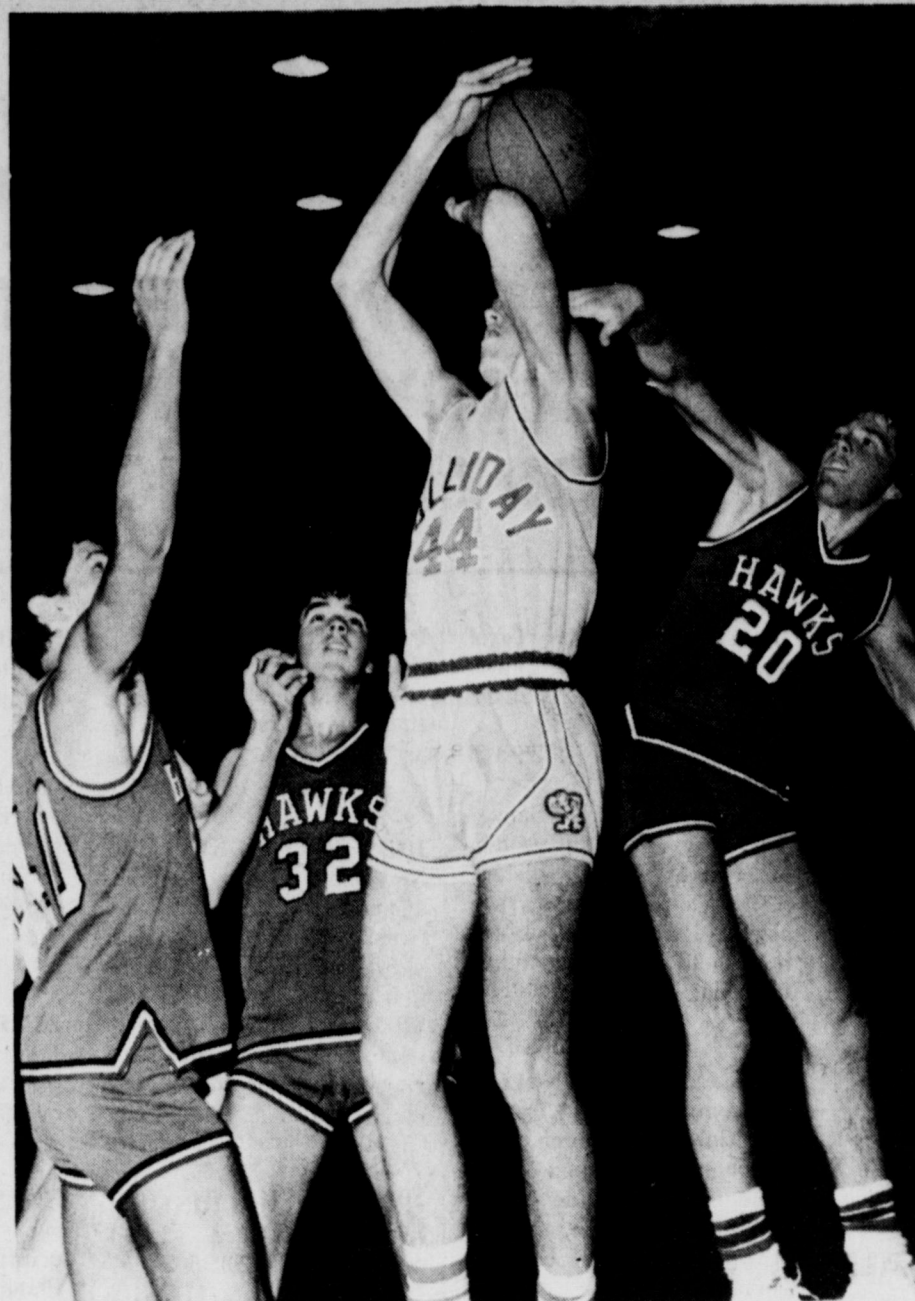
The junior high girls made it a two-game sweep Monday with Zundy, in a big way.

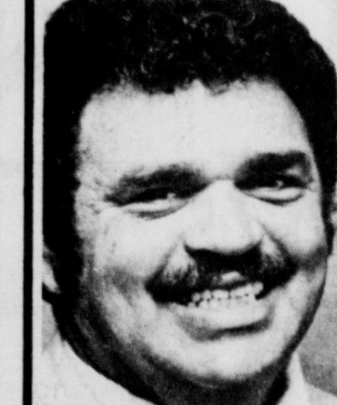
