

News Briefs Easter egg hunts set Saturday

Two Easter egg hunts will be held in Iowa Park, both starting at 1:30 p.m., and are open to the public.

The Evening Lions Club will have 4,000 eggs and eight prize eggs at the parking lot south of Hawk Stadium. Three different age groups will have separate hunt areas.

A second hunt will be held at the Tom Burnett Memorial Library. Children should take their own individually-wrapped candy eggs that will be hidden, and also have with them a basket or sack for the eggs they find.

Schools to dismiss early for Easter

Iowa Park schools will dismiss two hours earlier than usual Friday for the Easter weekend, according to Supt. Glen Mitchell.

The original school calendar called for no classes to be held Monday, but that no longer is the case. Supt. Mitchell said that holiday was used as a "bad weather" makeup day, so students will return to classes at the regular hour April 4.

Time changes Saturday night

The nation changes to Daylight Savings Time Saturday night, so residents should set their clocks ahead one hour before going to bed.

"Spring Forward" is the term used to remember how to set one's clock for the time change this time of the year. Those going to bed at 10 Saturday night will want to move the hands to 11.

of paying employee insurance

School trustees Thursday night approved a motion to pay the increase in employee health insurance premiums, and a proposal to purchase materials for a new swine barn to be built at the school's agriculture farm.

Contracts also were extended to the teaching staff for next year.

Employee health insurance rates through Blue Cross/Blue Shield have increased from \$42.87 to \$60.36 per month, trustees were told.

The school provides coverage for the 150 employees of the district, but employees pay for coverage of their family members.

Coverage of employees has remained \$79,738 for each of the past three years. But that will now rise to \$112,209.

Supt. Glen Mitchell, after explaining the policy was the lowest cost for similar coverage of all companies studied, suggested employees might pay \$10 of the \$17.49 monthly increase.

However, the cost-sharing suggestion was rejected by board members, who voted unanimously to pay the entire increase.

City negotiating deal to buy ballfield site

Cost of materials to construct a

40-pen swine barn is estimated at \$16,928, according to George Brandt, one of the Vocational Agriculture instructors.

To be built by volunteer labor of Wichita County Young Farmer and FFA Booster Club members, as well as teachers and students, a savings of 60 to 70 percent would be realized, board chairman Jimmy Howell pointed out.

The new unit would replace one constructed more than 20 years ago. The old unit is impossible to clean, which has contributed to disease of the animals kept there, Brandt said. A plan to build a similar struc-

ture for lambs and steers, at a cost of \$7,524, was put on hold possibly until next year.

Following an executive session that lasted an hour and 49 minutes, trustees accepted resignations of six teachers and aides, and then approved lists of teachers for each campus.

> Negotiations are underway to buy a tract of land in an area south of Sonic and Harvey's, and aldermen said they were encouraged with the prospects.

> Three separate ordinances were approved by the council, but all relate to the building code.

One requires a contractor to display a copy of the building permit issued by city hall at the site. Another increases the minimum fee for a permit to \$10, but will not go into effect until May 1.

The third change requires work being done on a house by a non-resident property owner be done by a licensed contractor.

Definition of a non-resident owner, it was explained, was a house not designated as the owner's residence.

Three resolutions also were approved by the council: two authorize the city administrator to submit applications for a special law enforcement grant and the other for a crime prevention grant.

The third resolution authorizes the administrator to enter into a lease agreement with the Texas Parks and Wildlife Dept. for a boat ramp at Lake Iowa Park. The ramp is to be built when the water level is lowered to permit construction.

As earlier planned, the city will advertise for bids to rebuild most of Third Street with a concrete surface.

After the project was estimated to cost \$230,000, the council decided to break the project into three parts, in order to do as much as available funds will permit.

The base bid will be to take the work from the south side of Magnolia to Cornelia, including curb and gutter where it does not now exist.

First alternate would be to extend the work all the way to the Access Road, and second alternate would rebuild Magnolia from Third to West Highway.

Bids will also be taken to build a new sewer lift station to replace the one on the south side of US 287 that was installed several years ago at the request of the highway department to serve the rest stops.

The new lift, estimated to cost as much as \$45,000, not including an estimated cost of \$25,000 to bore under the highway for a new sewer line that is intended to serve a portion of northwest part of the city as well as future development in the

area around Lake Iowa Park.

A lengthy list of surplus property proposed for sale at auction was approved by the council, though a date for the sale was not established.

Several of the items have been taken in by the police department, and will be returned to the proper owners if proof of purchase can be established.


Rev. Patrick Burke, pastor of Christ the King Catholic Church, discussed the possibility of the tennis court area of Pace Park being turned over, either for use or ownership, to build a pavillion on it.

Administrator James Barrington explained that repairs to the asphalt court surface would be more expensive than building new courts, and the city does not plan to do that.

It is unusual to find someone who not only enjoys preparing meals and desserts, but also preparing that which goes into the recipes.

This week's Cook of the Week, Shirley (Mrs. Sterling) Browning, is one who just plain enjoys cooking.

Raised on a dairy farm, Mrs. Browning's duties while growing up included mostly outside farm work, leaving no time to learn to cook. So, she didn't learn to cook until she was first married.

That "late bloomer" in the kitchen has since learned to can vegetables and fruits and rarely uses handy mixes for any of her baking, saying her famly prefers cakes and such made from scratch.

Shirley said her brother-in-law grows the vegetables she uses in her canning, and she cans them for herself and her husband as well as many members of their family.

"I rarely buy canned food at the grocery store," she said.

Christmas time also keeps Mrs. Browning busy with baking. "All my family requests homemade goodies for Christmas, so about Thanksgiving each year I start my baking, jelly and relish making. Last Christmas, I made seventeen German chocolate cakes as gifts. We do not like the pre-mixed cakes, so all mine are made from scratch," she said.

All this baking prompted her husband to buy a deep freeze strictly for freezing cakes. And yes, she started baking cakes for Easter last Sunday.

Cook of the Week

Mrs. Sterling Browning

CHOCOLATE SOUR CREAM

CAKE 2 cups flour

- 2 cups sugar 1 1/4 tsp. baking soda
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1/2 tsp. baking powder
- 1 cup water
- 3/4 cup dairy sour cream 1/4 cup shortening
- 1 tsp. vanilla
- 2 eggs

4 oz. (3 squares) unsweetened chocolate, melted and cooled.

Heat oven to 350 degrees. Grease and flour 2-8 or 9 inch cake pans and line bottom with waxed paper. Lightly spoon flour into measuring cup, level off. In medium bowl, combine flour sugar, baking soda, salt and baking powder. Blend well and set aside.

In large bowl, combine remaining cake ingredients. Add dry ingredients. Blend at low speed until moistened; then beat three minutes at highest speed. Pour batter into prepared pans and bake 30 to 40 minutes at 350 or until toothpick come out clean. Cool 10 minutes; remove from pans and cool

FROSTING 3 cups powdered sugar

1/4 cup dairy sour cream
1/4 cup butter or margarine, softened
3 Tbsp. milk
1 tsp. vanilla
3 oz. (3 squares) unsweetened chocolate, melted and cooled.

In small bowl, combine all frosting ingredients at low speed until moistened; beat at highest speed until smooth and creamy. Place one cake layer top side down on serving plate; spread evenly with about 1/4 of frosting. Top remaining cake layer top side up. Spread side and top of cake with remaining frosting.

BUTTERMILK CHESS PIE 1 1/2 cups sugar

1 Tbsp. flour

3 eggs

1/2 stick oleo or butter 1 1/2 tsp. lemon extract 1/2 cup buttermilk

Beat eggs. Add flour, sugar and buttermilk; mix well. Add melted oleo and extract. Pour into unbaked pie shell. Bake at 325 degrees until firm.

CHICKEN CASSEROLE 1 chicken (save broth) 1/2 cup diced celery 1 sm. bell pepper, diced 1/2 lb. grated cheese 5 oz. egg noodles

2 cans cream of mushroom soup

Cook chicken until tender, remove bones, skin and gristle. Test broth for saltiness and if needed add small amount of salt. Add celery, pepper and noodles to broth and cook until tender. Mix chicken, noodle mix and cheese, add soup and mix well. Pour into casserole dish and cover with cubed, butter bread. Bake at 350 degrees until brown. This and green salad make a good meal. (This recipe can be halved and frozen.)

CABBAGE WITH A FLAIR Fry 3 pieces of bacon and one small onion and one bell pepper. Add one can stewed tomatoes and one small head of chopped cabbage. Cook until cabbage is tender. Add crumbled bacon. Cook in dutch oven or large iron skillet.

FRUIT SALAD WITH

PUDDING 2 small cans pineapple chunks, drained 1 can fruit cocktail with juice 1 can Mandarin oranges, drained 1 small jar Marichino cherries, chopped and drained 2 bananas, sliced 2-3 oz. packages vanilla or banana cream instant pudding mix.

Put all fruit in bowl, sprinkle with pudding mix and mix well. Chill before serving about an hour.

BROCCOLI SALAD

2 lbs. brocoli, broken into small pieces

1 cup slivered almonds 1 med. red onion, thinly sliced 6 hard boiled eggs, sliced 2 cups mayonnaise (do not use Miracle Whip) 1 cup plain yogurt 1/4 cup lemon juice



She says she enjoys cooking, canning and reading.



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

The hostesses for the meeting were Mmes. Thurlo, Hunter and Homer Blalock.







Lewis is a graduate of Waurika High School in Oklahoma.




When the scramble was over, the official ruled no runs, two outs, and tempers flared.
