## City negotiating

$\qquad$ to purchase an alternate site for the
Senior Little League ballfield, after it became apparent the neighbors of the land being considered were opposed to proposal.

At their meeting Monday, aldermen were told a mail survey of the
neighborhood had responded against ne proposed location by a $7-1$ margin, and also received a petition asking that an alternate site be found. The site under consideration was the land, a block and a half, purchased by the city between Third and Fourth Streets as a potential site for mmunity center.
Discussions at the previous two council meetings, about problems of maintaining and scheculing of the
Burnett Field, led to consideration of the new site for the youth program. As some neighbors of the pro doing something for the youth, but just didn't want the noise that goe with a field during summer evenings. Negotiations are underway to buy a tract of land in an area south of Sonic and Harvey's, and aldermen
said they were encouraged with the prospects.

Tree separate ordinances were approved by the council, but all relate to the building code.

and desserts, but also preparing that which goes into the recipes.
This week's Cook of the Week, Shirley (Mrs. Sterling) Browning, is one who just plain enjoys cooking. Raised on a dairy farm, Mrs. Browning's duties while growing up included mostly outside farm work, leaving no time to learn to cook. So,
she didn't learn to cook until she was she didn't learn to cook until she was
first married. That "late bloomer" in the kitchen has since learned to can vegetables and fruits and rarely uses handy mixes for any of her baking, saying her famly prefers cakes and such made from scratch.
Shirley said her brother-in-law grows the vegetables she uses in her
canning, and she cans them for canning, and she cans them for
herself and her husband as well as many members of their family. "I rarely buy canned food at the grocery store," she said.
Christmas time also keeps Mrs. Browning busy with baking. "All my family requests homemade Thanks iving each year I start my baking, jelly and relish making. Last Christmas, I made seventeen German chocolate cakes as gifts. We do not like the pre-mixed cakes, so all mine are made from scratch," she said. All this baking prompted her husband to buy a deep freeze strictly or freezing akes. She retired last Friday.
Olive's work has touched the lives of thousands of Iowa Parkans over the years. Reflecting, one could easily compare her contacts with peo ple with those of the late Doctor Her and Gordon Clark,
Her work allowed her to become almost as intimately acquainted with
the people as did the Clarks, and others who have similar vocations.

We've shared a close association with "Mrs. B" over these many years, and well miss her.

Ill remind you of a column I did about three weeks ago, when I made one more cold snap within 10 days of Easter.
Well, yesterday morning, five days before Easter, the low was 30 degrees.
