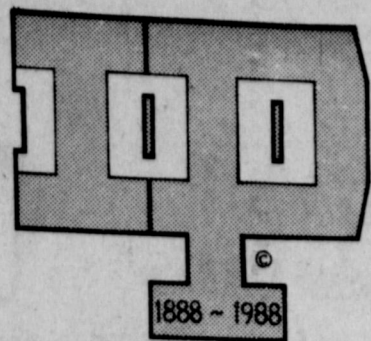

Party primary runoffs Tuesday

Republican and Democratic party members will return to the polls Tuesday to decide runoff races.

Republican party voters who reside in voting precincts 32, 33 and 60 will vote at the First Christian Church in Iowa Park, and precinct 34 voting will be at the Electra Public Library.

Democratic party members who reside in voting precinct 32 will cast their votes at the county agricultural building; precinct 33 at Faith Baptist Church; precinct 60 at Chaparral Baptist Camp, and precinct 34 at the Electra Junior High School.

All polls will open at 7 a.m. and close at 7 p.m.

Only two runoff races are on the Democratic party ticket, but one of them is a local issue.

Wendell L. Bean and Bill G. Robinson are facing off in their bids for the Precinct 3 Justice of the Peace office. In the first election, Robinson received 495 votes and Bean 398 to emerge from a field of five candidates.

The other runoff on the Democratic party ticket is for District 14 member of the state board of education, which is sought by former Electra superintendent William L. (Bill) Hudson and Charles E. McDonald of Bangs.

Hudson received 343 votes from the four area boxes in the first election and McDonald 314.

Four runoff positions will be decided on the Republican party ballot,

but none are local.

Republicans will decide which will be their candidates in the November general election for U.S. Senator, between Beau Boulter and Wes Gilbreath; U.S. Representative, Bob Price and Larry S. Milner; Railroad

Commissioner, Ed Emmett and P.S. (Sam) Ervin; and Place 2 Justice of the State Supreme Court, Nathan Hecht and Ronald S. Block.

Registered voters who did not cast a ballot in the primary last month are still eligible to vote in the runoff.

However, if a voter cast his ballot in one party's primary, he cannot

vote in another party's runoff.

In other words, if a voter cast his ballot in the Republican party's box last month, he cannot vote in the JP race Tuesday, because it is only on the Democratic party's ballot.

The voter's registration card is stamped, identifying which party he voted in.

Allan Shewmake, who has been the absentee election judge, said there is considerable interest in the runoff races.

He said 12 ballots had been cast the first two days, Monday and Tuesday, of absentee voting, and only 14 absentee ballots were cast in the primary last month.

Trustees, aldermen to meet next week

School trustees will consider contracts for auxiliary employees and city aldermen will consider regulating building permits for non-resident property owners, at their meetings next week.

The city meeting will begin at 7 p.m. Monday in council chambers and trustees will meet at 7:30 p.m. in the administration building.

Contracts for auxiliary employees for the 1988-89 school year will be acted on. All other contracts for the school year have been approved.

Trustees will consider placement of teachers on the second and third levels of the career ladder, and act to adopt additions on a policy for advanced placement examinations.

The non-resident building permit topic was misreported in last week's issue of the Leader.

Council members voted to reject the ordinance as presented and consider changes at Monday's meeting.

Proposed was a requirement for property owners who did not live in a house to utilize licensed contractors to do repairs on rental property.

Council members will hear a representative of the Red River Authority concerning a possible regional solid waste disposal system.

Aldermen will be asked to authorize the city administrator to purchase a fence for the landfill property and to give permission to advertise for bids for repairs to hail damaged roofs of city facilities.

Administrator James Barrington said most of an estimated \$19,000 worth of damage from the Mar. 1 storm was sustained by the Tom Burnett Memorial Library.

Two topics on the city's agenda are carried over from the last meeting: consideration of acquiring land for a Little League ballfield, and a request from Christ the King Catholic Church to use the Pace Park tennis court area.

Also on the agenda, authorization for travel expenses to attend a solid waste management seminar May 18-20 in Austin will be requested, a proclamation setting April 18-23 as "Fix Up and Clean Up Week" will be read, and appointments will be made to the board of adjustments.

Homestead exemption can ease tax burden

Wichita County homeowners can reduce their property tax bills in 1988 by taking advantage of partial exemptions for residence homesteads.

Texas law allows homeowners to make a single, one-time only application for residence homestead exemptions.

Once a homeowner claims the exemption, it stays with the house as long as the person owns it, and if sold, until the first of the next year. In that case, the new owners would have to reapply.

The Iowa Park Consolidated Independent School District is the only entity here that gives homestead exemptions. The City of Iowa Park and Wichita County each give exemptions only for those over age 65 and/or those who are disabled.

Application forms are available

locally at the Iowa Park City and School tax office and must be signed, completed and returned to the tax office by May 2, according to Allen Shewmake, tax collector. Shewmake also said that those wishing to apply need only apply at one place for city, school and county exemptions.

Taxpayers who have never received residence homestead exemptions on the home in which they were living on Jan. 1, and those who became age 65 or disabled during 1987, must apply this year to receive exemptions for 1988.

In order to qualify for the residence homestead exemption, the property must meet four requirements. They include the person or persons claiming the exemption must own it on Jan. 1; it must be designed or adapted for human residence; it must be actually used as a residence; and it must be the principal residence of an owner who qualifies for the exemption.

Shewmake stressed that only one homestead exemption can be claimed even if a property owner has property elsewhere in Texas.

A mobile home, even on leased or rented land, can qualify for a residence homestead exemption if it meets the four requirements. Mobile home owners are required to present

the title to the mobile home when making applications for exemption.

Although all taxing entities affecting Iowa Park allow exemptions for disabled veterans on a scale of the percentage of disability, not all allow homestead exemptions.

The city gives a \$6,660 exemption for those over 65 and \$3,000 for disabled persons who have filed.

Wichita County, though not mandated by state law, grants an \$18,000 exemption to those over 65.

Texas law provides several types of partial homestead exemptions for homeowners, including two for school districts. They offer a \$5,000 general homestead exemption to all homeowners and an additional \$10,000 exemption to those 65 or older or disabled. The Iowa Park school district, however, opted to

give the latter group an additional \$5,000, bringing the maximum exemption on school taxes to \$20,000.

Applying only to school taxes, the over-65 exemption provides a special property tax "ceiling" for taxes. While the market value of an elderly person's homestead may fluctuate with the market, the taxes due to the school district cannot increase over the amount due the first year of qualification.

However, the ceiling is raised if the owner adds an improvement other than normal maintenance or repair. When that happens, the new improvement is taxed at its current market value and the school's current tax rate, and the taxes due are added to the previous tax ceiling to create a new ceiling.

The elderly homeowner must apply for the exemption before May 2. To qualify, the homeowner must be 65 or older on Jan. 1, 1988 and when applying, must present proof of date of birth, such as a birth certificate or a driver's license.

New legislation provides an additional tax benefit for certain homeowners. If the surviving spouse of an over-65 homeowner is at least 55 at the time of the older spouse's death, he or she can retain the school tax ceiling, but must reapply with

proof of age. Before, the younger surviving spouse would have lost the tax ceiling.

Those interested in their rights as taxpayers may request a pamphlet, "Taxpayers' Rights, Remedies, Responsibilities," from the Wichita County Appraisal District.

Child abuse prevention major topic of workers

As Mayor Tim Hunter was signing a proclamation declaring this week "Child Abuse Prevention Week" in Iowa Park, Parents Anonymous of Wichita Falls Inc. was wrapping up another day of presenting child abuse prevention programs at Iowa Park High School.

April is National Child Abuse Prevention Month.

Parents Anonymous is a non-profit organization with a specific goal to identify, treat and prevent child abuse through the use of the WHO (We Help Ourselves) Program, developed by the Dallas County Mental Health Association.

For the presentation, volunteers present a 25 to 45 minutes program using video tapes and leading class

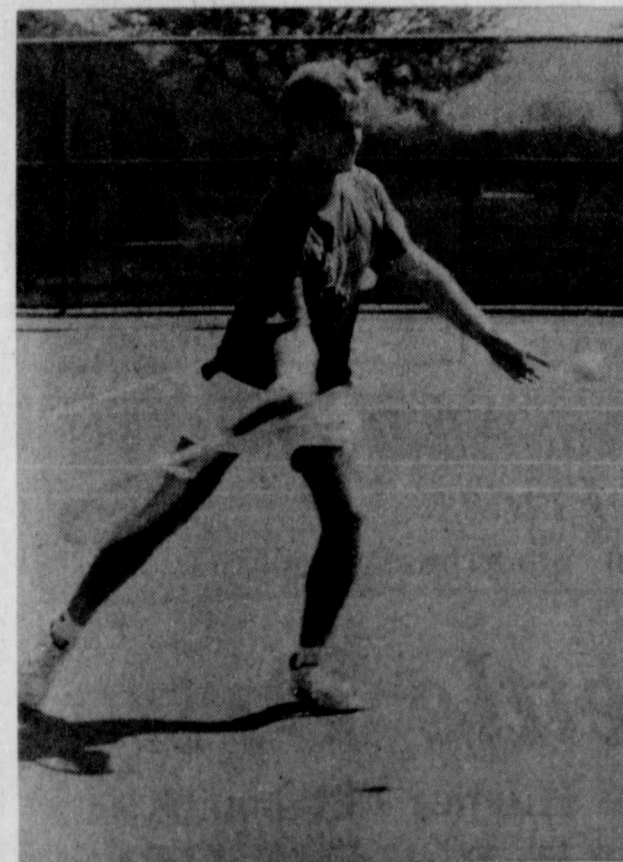

discussions.

Primary prevention techniques are used, with the intent to teach children what a victim is and how to avoid becoming a victim of physical and emotional abuse, sexual assault, peer pressure, harassment and domestic violence. During the session, children are taught what to say, what to do and where to go if confronted with a potentially dangerous situation.

The antivictimization programs are funded by Southwestern Bell Telephone Foundation and the Children's Trust Fund of Texas and presented by volunteer social work and education students from Midwestern

Iowa Park is the Dist. 6-AAA tennis champion again, completely dominating the first places in both the boys' and girls' doubles and singles.

In fact, the boys were so dominating, they played each other in the finals.

The district tournament was held Monday and Tuesday at Hamilton Park in Wichita Falls.

The varsity boys earned 50 points, while Bowie and Bridgeport finished in a second-place tie with five each.

Iowa Park is coached by Dick Wineinger.

Varsity girls compiled 35 points to earn their title. Decatur and Breckenridge had 10 points each and

Jacksboro wound up in fourth place with five.

Iowa Park's boys' junior varsity also is district champion, but Breckenridge proved to be the only spoiler by winning the girls' JV title.

First and second place finishers on the varsity will compete April 28-29 in the Region One tournament at Odessa for the right to advance to the state University Interscholastic League tourney in Austin.

Bill Chandler and Marc Johnson defeated teammates Jeff Bartow and Chris Blalack 6-3, 6-2 for the boys' doubles title.

The champs smothered Bridgeport's Robert Mote and Drew Herndon 6-1, 6-3 in the semifinals, while Bartow and Blalack upset Will

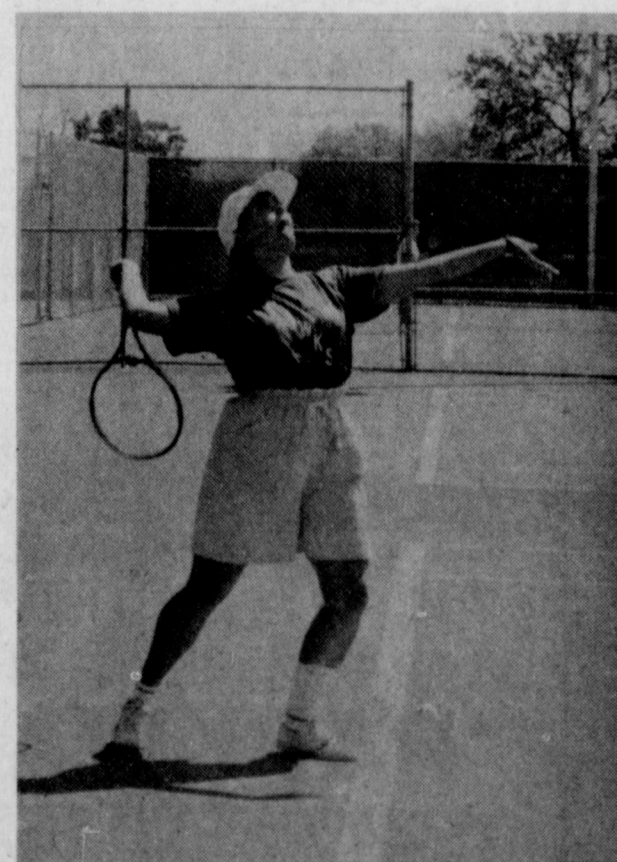
Thompson and Jim McDonald of Breckenridge, who had not lost a match this season, 6-1, 7-6.

CHILI CHEESE SQUARES

Grate one pound Monterey Jack cheese and one pound Cheddar cheese into a 9X12 glass pan sprayed with Pam. Add 1/2 cup chopped green chilies.

Mix 1 cup flour, 2 eggs and one 13 ounce can of evaporated milk. Pour over cheese.

Bake 40 minutes at 350. Let set and cut into squares.

LAYERED LETTUCE SALAD

1 head lettuce, cut in bite size pieces
1 cup diced celery
4 sliced boiled eggs
10 oz. frozen green peas (thawed)

1/2 cup diced green pepper
1 med. sweet onion, diced
8 slices bacon, fried and crumbled
2 cups mayonnaise or Miracle Whip
4 oz. grated Cheddar cheese
In a 9X12 pan, layer in order given. Spread dressing on top and sprinkle with cheese. Refrigerate before serving.

CHICKEN CASSEROLE

2 1/2 c. chopped chicken
1 or 2 cans mushroom soup
8 oz. Mexican cornbread mix
1/4 c. butter
1 c. water
1 1/2 c. milk
1/2 c. chopped onion
1/2 c. chopped celery
1/2 c. mayonnaise
3/4 t. salt
2 eggs
Mix cornbread mix, butter and water. Place half of mixture in 9X13 baking dish. Mix chicken, onion, celery, salt and mayonnaise. Pour in baking dish. Beat eggs and add milk. Pour over chicken. Spread remaining corn bread mixture over top. Spread soup over this and bake at 350 degrees 40 minutes or until brown.

VINNI'S RICE PIE

2 cups rice - cooked
3-4 eggs, beaten
6 oz. grated Cheddar or Velveeta cheese, melted
6 oz. grated Mozzarella cheese
1/2 lb. diced, cooked bacon
1/2 lb. German sausage, diced
2-3 Tbsp. grated Parmesan cheese
Salt and pepper
In a big bowl, add rice, eggs, cheese, bacon, sausage, and bacon grease from cooked bacon. Mix well, add parmesan, salt and pepper and mix. Press into a Pyrex or glass pan. Cook at 350 degrees one hour.

MEXICAN ROAST

1-3 lb. roast
2 c. dry pinto beans
1 can chopped green chilies
1 can RoTel tomatoes
1 can mushrooms
1 onion, chopped
1 can tomato sauce
1/4 c. sugar
Salt and pepper
Cover with water. Bake covered 12 hours at 250.

CARAMEL CANDY

3 c. sugar
1 c. oleo
2 c. whipping cream
1 3/4 c. white Karo syrup
1 t. vanilla
Cover buttered pan with pecans. Mix together sugar, oleo, whipping cream and Karo in saucepan and cook to 243 degrees. Remove from heat. Add vanilla and pour over pecans. Cool, cut in small pieces and roll in wax paper.

Storm causes building permits to zoom

The rush to have roofs repaired that were damaged in the March 1 hailstorm is showing up at city hall, where some 225 building permits were issued for that purpose.

If the majority of the permits issued for "repair" is for roofing, permits issued for that purpose during the past month amounted to \$293,756.

In all, 242 permits were issued during March by city hall, amounting to \$417,798, which brings the three-month sum to \$687,415. All permits issued in 1987 amounted to only \$1,241,496, or less than twice that of this year's first quarter.

Also unique about the permits issued during March were two for new home construction, something that hasn't happened here in some time.

The other permits included six for alterations, seven additions, and one each for siding and mobile home.

The largest permit issued for repairs last month was to Woodbriar Apartments, \$21,735.

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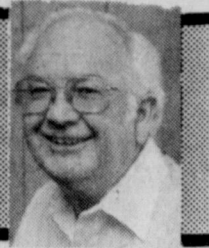



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As I See It...

Worth Quoting

Now that Super Tuesday is super past, the next big deadline on the horizon is the one pertaining to income tax on April 15th.

Those presidential candidates running on a platform of balancing the budget by soaking the rich, evidently haven't seen the Internal Revenue Service's latest report on the kind of returns submitted by Americans.

You simply cannot get there from here.

A working wife or mate is important in getting to that first \$100,000 income, but after that the individual has to wing it alone to get to the big time.

For those Americans earning less than \$5,000, 56.8 percent of the returns contained only one W2 form. For those earning from \$5,000 to \$10,000 adjusted gross income, 57.3 percent contained one W2.

From \$15,000 to \$20,000, 21.1 percent contained two W2s. From \$20,000 to \$30,000, 36.8 percent featured two W2s. And from \$30,000

to \$50,000, a whopping 57.2 percent of the returns contained two W2 forms.

And from \$50,000 to \$100,000, 61.3 of the returns included two W2 forms. But above \$100,000, only 39.4 percent had two W2s. We interpret that to mean, that once the wage earner hits the \$100,000 and up bracket, the helpmate no longer works.

For your information, 1.2 million people filed returns featuring income of \$75,000 to \$100,000. The total dropped to 913,698 for those filing returns of income from \$100,000 to \$200,000.

And the number dropped drastically for those reporting income between \$200,000 and \$500,000 was only 249,512.

Only 39,497 reported income from \$500,000 to \$1-million and only 19,106 returns or 0.02 percent of the total, reported income above \$1-million.

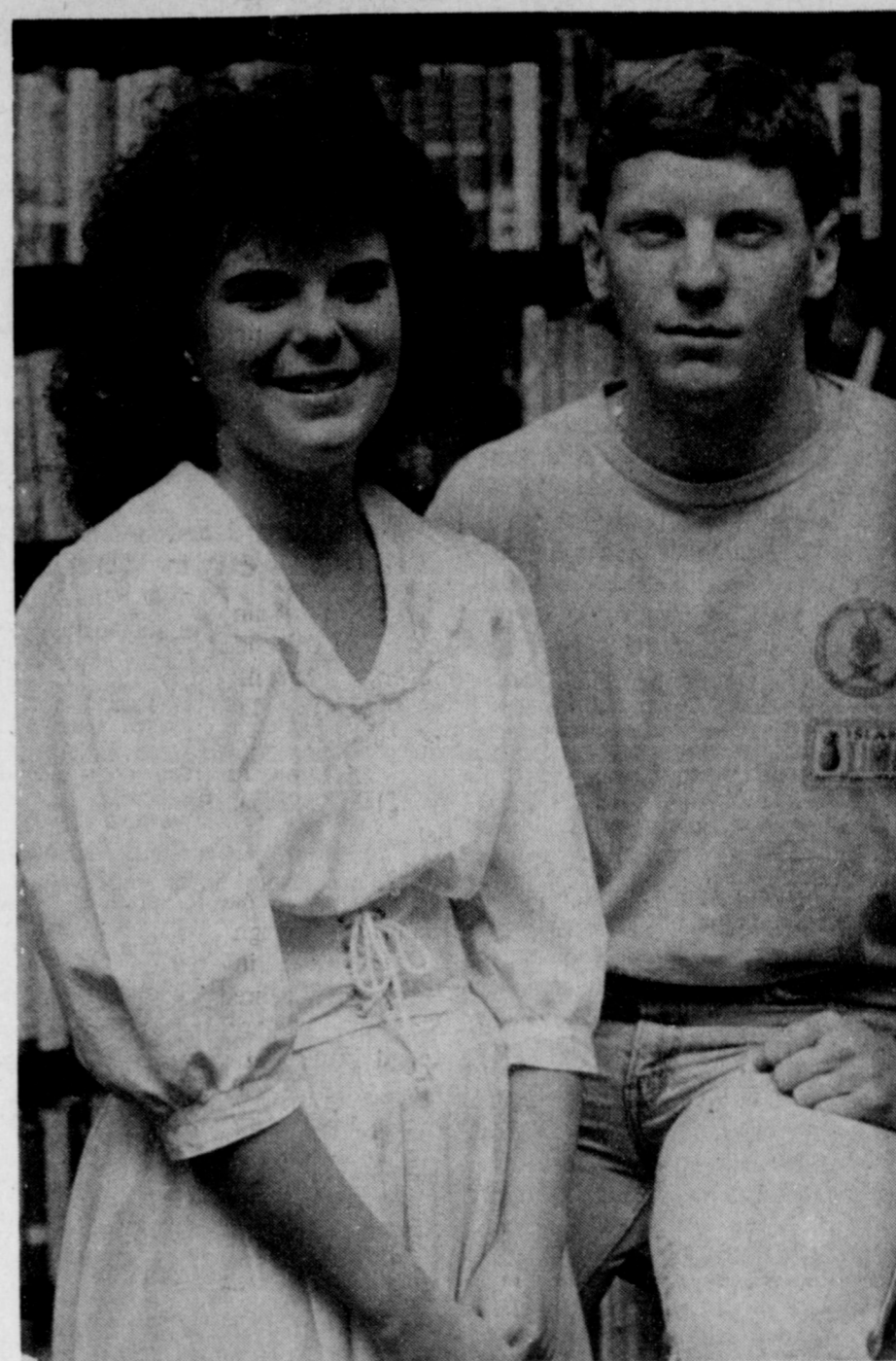

Ross and the former Julie Lenore Davis were married July 17, 1982. He was a railroad conductor with Burlington Northern. He was a member of Faith Baptist Church.

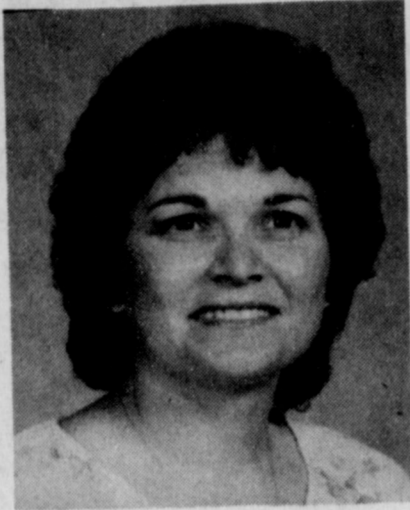
He moved here in 1971 with his family from Lubbock, and during his high school career became one of the most outstanding football players in the history of Iowa Park High School before graduating in 1975.

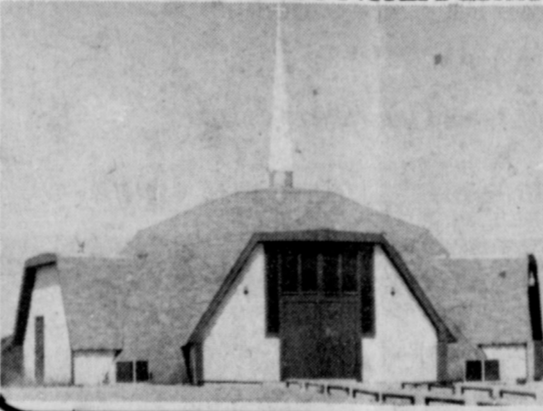

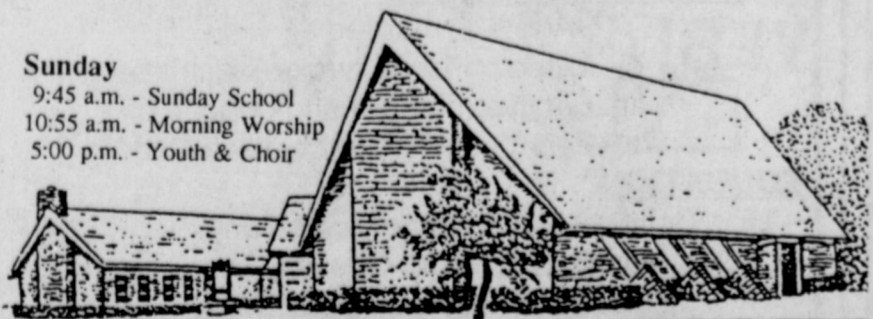

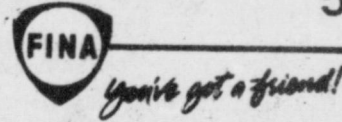

FmHA election rules change

Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) accepting nominations for election of county committee members under new rules that make it easier for farmers to qualify as candidates and to vote, according to Joe Gilbreath, county supervisor.

FmHA county committees per-

form a variety of duties for the U.S. Department of Agriculture's credit agency, including deciding whether an applicant is eligible for a farm loan.

"One important change broadens the definition of a farmer to anyone who has an interest in a farm in the county as owner, tenant or share-cropper," Gilbreath said. "The new definition also includes the spouse of an eligible farmer. An old requirement that more than half of the candidate's income must come from the farm operation has been dropped."

"The nominating period has been extended to 45 days from the previous 25 days, thus allowing more opportunity for people to run for the committee," he said. "At least three eligible farmer voters, including the nominee, must sign the petition."

The election is scheduled June 30 and term of office is for a three-year period.

"Another important change this year is that one member of the committee can be an active FmHA farm borrower, or be eligible for an FmHA farm loan. Previously, this was not allowed," Gilbreath said.

Anyone interested in running for the committee can obtain a petition and other information from the FmHA county office at 309 Federal Building, Wichita Falls.

Sheriff's Report

Wichita County Sheriff's Department received reports of a terroristic threat and criminal mischief, stemming from one incident.

Jimmy Banks, who resides at FM 1814 and FM 367, reported to deputies that a man he identified as Millard Barnes had threatened to kill him over the phone.

Swanner Properties of Wichita Falls has filed for permits to drill two developmental wells seven miles south of Iowa Park. The No. 38 Chilson L. "Shallow" is located 150 feet from the south line and 557 feet from the west line and has a permit for 1,950 feet of hole. The No. 39 Chilson L. "Shallow" is 150 feet from the south line and 857 feet from the west line with a permit for 1,950 feet maximum drilling depth. The wells are located in a 498-acre lease in the Margaret Ramsey A-471 Survey in the Wichita County Regular Field.

At a location four miles south-east of Harrold, Mobil Producing TX & NM has finalized a new developmental oil producer in Wilbarger County's Regular Field.

The well is designated as the No. 69 Frances Sumner, and is pumping oil at the rate of 14 barrels per day plus 146 barrels of water.

Location is in a 1,099-acre lease in the H&TC A-346 Survey. Bottomed at 1,800 feet and plugged back to 1,762 feet, the well will produce from perforations in the Cisco Sand Formation 594 feet to 1,102 feet into the wellbore.

S.M. Ferguson, Jr., Inc., of Wichita Falls has revealed plans to drill an 8,500-ft. deeper pool wildcat. The operator has a 40-acre lease, with

drillsite in Wilbarger County's H&TC A-1773 Survey and has designated the venture as the No. 2 Ferguson Unit. Drillsite is 2.5 miles northwest of Tolbert 850 feet from the north line and 2,490 feet from the east line.

Drillsite has been staked for the No. 3 Bobbie Gerald, an 8,600-ft. wildcat in Hardeman County. The operation will be located five miles north of Chillicothe in a 320-acre lease in the EL&RR Survey 1,130 feet from the north line and 1,214 feet from the west line. The operator is Perry L. Larson Operating of Dallas.

The No. 1 Hyson Wells, a 8,900-ft. deeper pool wildcat is scheduled to be drilled in Hardeman County. Trio Operating of Wichita Falls is the operator. The well will be spudded in a 285-acre lease five miles northeast of Quanah in the W&NW A-1699 Survey 2,257 feet from the south line and 2,576 feet from the west line.

A 6,200 foot wildcat is planned by Burnett Oil of Fort Worth at a drillsite 15 miles west northwest of Crowell, Foard County. The location is in a 2,560-acre lease in the T&NO A-945 Survey 132 feet from the north line and 1,927 feet from the west line. Well's designation is the No. 3 A.B. Windfohr.

The No. 1 Floyd Bunch Unit has been spudded by Ashtola Exploration of Amarillo at a wildcat location in Wilbarger County five miles south of Odell. The venture carries authority for 7,200 foot maximum drilling depth. The well is in a 40-acre lease in the H&TC A-403 Survey.

Plug-and-abandon orders were issued for the No. 4 George, a developmental venture of CNC Inc., of Wichita Falls in the Wichita County Regular Field. Spudded Nov. 25, the well had reached 702 feet total depth. Drillsite was four miles southwest of Burkburnett in the L.B. Taliferro A-541 Survey.

Winfrey Oil has given up on its efforts to make a producer out of the No. 1 Red River Oil Co. It was a developmental try in the Wichita County's Regular Field. The location was three miles east of Electra. Spudded Nov. 9, the well had reached a total depth of 2,014 feet.

Baker & Taylor Drilling of Amarillo has bottomed its No. 1-81 Taylor Ranch at a depth of 8,300 feet at a wildcat location in Wilbarger County and has called for completion tests. The well is located three miles south of Farmers Valley.

Both are to compete this week at Electra.

Sean Rowe led the Hawks in points, winning the 200-meter and 100-meter dashes, while placing fourth in the long jump and running a leg on the all-sophomore sprint relay team that placed fourth.

The Texas State Educator Association is now offering Advanced Placement Tests in all grades.

Upon satisfactory completion of the test or tests students may advance to the next level of course study.

To qualify for advanced placement students must meet several criteria. First, students in grades 6-11 must score within the 95% on the CTBS test. They must also have a classroom grade of 85 for the semester or for the first semester of the current school year in the subject for which they are applying for advanced placement.

Students must complete a district application and return the form to the principal by April 15. This application must be signed by the student and parent and advanced placement must be approved by the principal.

The advanced placement tests will be administered between April 15 and the last day of classes on a date determined by the superintendent or designee.

Students in grades 9-11 may advance a maximum of five courses on the advanced plan and a maximum of four classes on the regular plan of graduation.

The students may take the test only once each school year and there is a fee of \$30 per subject in grades 1-8. For students in grade 9-12, \$30 will be charged for each semester. The fee must be paid at the time of application and is non-refundable. Students identified as economically disadvantaged will have their fee assumed by the school district.

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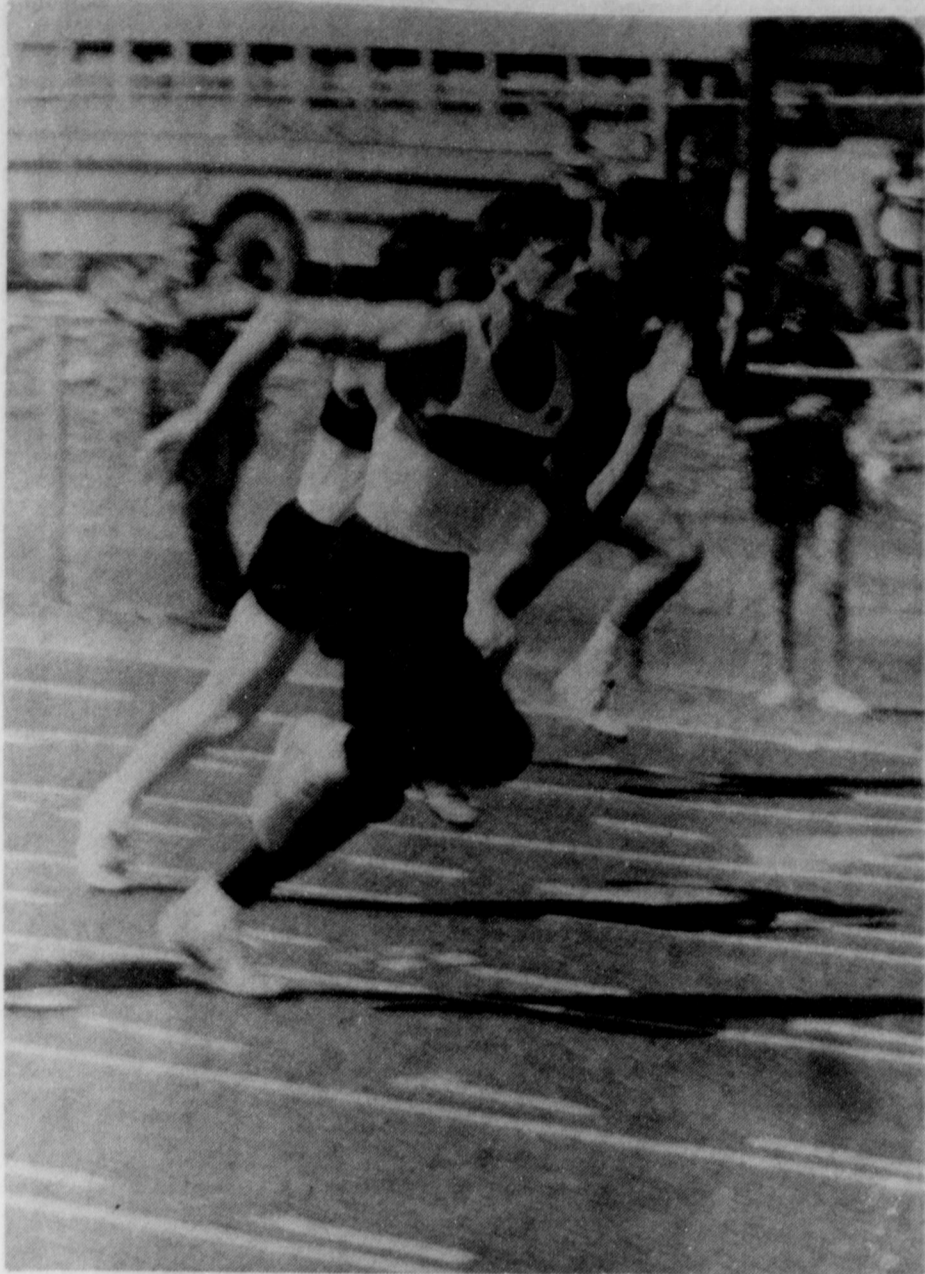
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SEAN ROWE IN 100-METER DASH
