

# Robinson wins runoff

Bill Robinson is the new Justice of the Peace for Precinct 3, defeating challenger Wendell Bean 449-311 in the Democratic party primary runoff Tuesday.

Robinson succeeds Virgil Hill, who retired after 18 years in office, but with three years remaining on his term of office.

Following a canvass of the votes Monday morning at the courthouse by the commissioners court, Robinson is expected to be sworn into office to serve the remainder of this year.

Because no Republican filed for the position, Robinson will be unopposed on the general election ballot in November, and will serve the other two years of Hills' term.

He said he will have his office in a small house at 210 E. Poe, next to his repair shop, as soon as it undergoes remodeling.

Robinson defeated Bean by almost the same margin as separated the two in last month's primary. Those figures were 495-398.

He won all three boxes: 276-202 in Pct. 32; 110-74 in Pct. 33, and 39-24 in Pct. 60.

Robinson, who was defeated in the 1970 runoff by Hill, commented Wednesday, "I think it's a pretty good turnout for a runoff. I've got some pretty good supporters, evidently, since I won. I appreciate their votes and will do my best to be a fair and impartial judge."

### HUDSON WINS

William L. Hudson, former superintendent of schools at Electra, easily won the local boxes in his runoff with Charles McDonald for Dist. 14 State Board of Education.

Hudson received 459 votes Tuesday to McDonald's 154. In the March

primary, his edge was only 343-314.

The only issues on the Democratic party primary ballot here were for JP and State Board.

### REPUBLICAN VOTING

In the four races on the Republican party ballot locally, Beau Boulter, Bob Price, Ed Emmett and Ronald Block were the winners.

Boulter, challenging Wes Gilbreath as the party's nominee for U.S. Senator, won 199-57.

Price defeated Larry Milner here in their contest to be the nominee for U.S. Representative, 157-98, but Milner reportedly won the district.

Emmett received more votes here than P.S. Ervin for Railroad Commissioner, 161-77.

And in the remaining race on the ballot, for Place 2, Justice, Supreme Court, Ronald Block drew 118 votes and Nathan Hect 105.

## Regional landfill site could be located here

A landfill to service the region may be the solution to problems Iowa Park and its neighboring com-

munities have been experiencing.

And Monday night, the city council passed a resolution asking the assistance of the Red River Authority to conduct a study to determine the feasibility of such a project.

Three officers of the Authority, Ron Glenn, general manager, Curtis Campbell and Bill Brooks met with the council to explain how the organization could be of assistance.

Glenn told aldermen, "There seems to be enough need and desire (for a regional landfill) if someone will take the lead...Our principal purpose is a vehicle for finance, after it is deemed feasible."

He emphasized such a venture would require two counties or more, in order for the Authority to be a participant.

As the leader, Iowa Park would need to make contact with leaders of the various entities in the region, and hold some meetings at which such a venture would be discussed.

Every community is experiencing problems complying with state and federal standards for landfills, and some clearly are not in compliance.

Expense is the major factor for cities, especially those with smaller populations, to dispose of their trash in a manner prescribed by state and federal regulations.

Iowa Park's current dumping pit, built to bury a year's desposits, cost

\$68,000, not including the price of the land and daily expense of the operation.

The council has had a study made to determine if disposal by burning the trash in an incinerator were feasible.

The study, which cost \$5,000, indicated that it was not feasible, if the intent were to produce steam for sale to Cryovac. The study included burning Iowa Park trash only, and two alternates: Iowa Park and one of the neighboring community's trash, and those two communities plus the trash created by Cryovac.

Aldermen called for one additional study to be made for incineration. That would be only to burn Iowa Park's trash, but not producing steam for sale.

Brooks, development manager for the Red River Authority, told the council he had discussed a regional landfill with "some other cities," and his reaction was that he thought "it has some merit."

Glenn said "We propose to do the reconnaissance, to determine the total tonnage (of trash that would be contributed by those participating in the regional landfill)."

The entire council, other than Alderman Bud Burch who was absent, approved a resolution asking the Authority to "...do a reconnaissance study of a regional landfill."

## Problems with trash major city concern

Besides the project with the Red River Authority, two other topics concerning sanitary landfill were on Monday's council meeting agenda.

Aldermen voted to reject all bids to have a chain link fence built at the site, and as a preliminary measure decided to purchase barbed wire to close off the east end of the recently-purchased property.

The fence will be built during the summer by temporary personnel and at a later date a screen fence to catch blowing paper will be erected.

Also concerning landfills, aldermen voted approval of funding a trip for members and personnel to Austin to attend a solid waste management seminar of the Texas Municipal League.

An ordinance was passed to regulate issuance of building permits on single-family residential structures by the owners who do not live there.

A recent article in the Leader was incorrect, stating non-resident owners were required to hire licensed contractors to do such work.

The new ordinance states: "(a) Persons eligible to apply for and receive approved building permits

for (1) new construction and (2) repairs or renovations valued in an amount more than 25% of the valuation of the property (not including land) are only those who qualify under one or more of the criteria listed in paragraph (b) of this section.

"(b) (1) A contractor licensed and bonded to do construction work as a 'contractor' within the City of Iowa Park, Texas.

"(2) The owner of the property who certifies that the structure to be built or the structure on which the repairs are to be performed is the single-family residential structure in which he lives.

"(c) Persons eligible to apply for and receive approved building permits for repairs or renovations valued in an amount less than or equal to 25% of the value of the property (not including land) are only those who qualify under one or more of the criteria listed in paragraph (d) of this section.

"(d) (1) A contractor licensed and bonded to do construction work as a 'contractor' within the City of Iowa Park, Texas.

## Trustees elevate teachers

Eleven teachers were placed on Career Ladder Level Two and 11 on Level Three, following a lengthy executive session of the Iowa Park school board Tuesday night.

Though the minutes will show that the motion passed by only a 3-2 margin, it was explained later that the two trustees, Martha Dudley and Gary Fielding, were expressing opposition to the mandates of HB 72, rather than the teachers being placed.

During the closed session, which lasted an hour and 40 minutes, all administrators were called into the room with the trustees.

Also discussed during the closed meeting were the auxiliary personnel who will be hired next year, as well as the salaries for bus drivers, cafeteria, maintenance and custodial personnel.

In other business, trustees approved the local policy for advanced placement examinations and received several reports from Supt. Glen Mitchell and department heads.

The advanced placement policy is mandated in HB 72, and criteria for qualifying to take the examinations are spelled out in the policy.

Supt. Mitchell said he had received interest from individuals in purchasing property on Clara owned by the school, and received permis-

sion to advertise the land for sale.

He also told trustees of the building progress at Bradford Elementary; that the school may have to take over the project of tearing down the old homemaking cottage which was put out on bid, but is progressing slowly, and said preliminary work is underway on building new swine pens at the school farm.

The available steps for advanced salaries have been reached by custodial and maintenance personnel, and trustees increased the numbers of steps, as well as increasing the per-hour raises by 15-cents annually.

Currently, the top pay for custodial people was \$6.75 per hour and \$8.45 for maintenance personnel.

Salaries for bus drivers were amended, depending on the length of the routes. Total cost of the increase approved was \$5,775.

No changes to increase the steps for pay increases for cafeteria employees and managers were made. The top salary available for managers is \$7.15 per hour; \$5.20 for full-time employees, and \$4.40 for part-time.

## Local man back in jail

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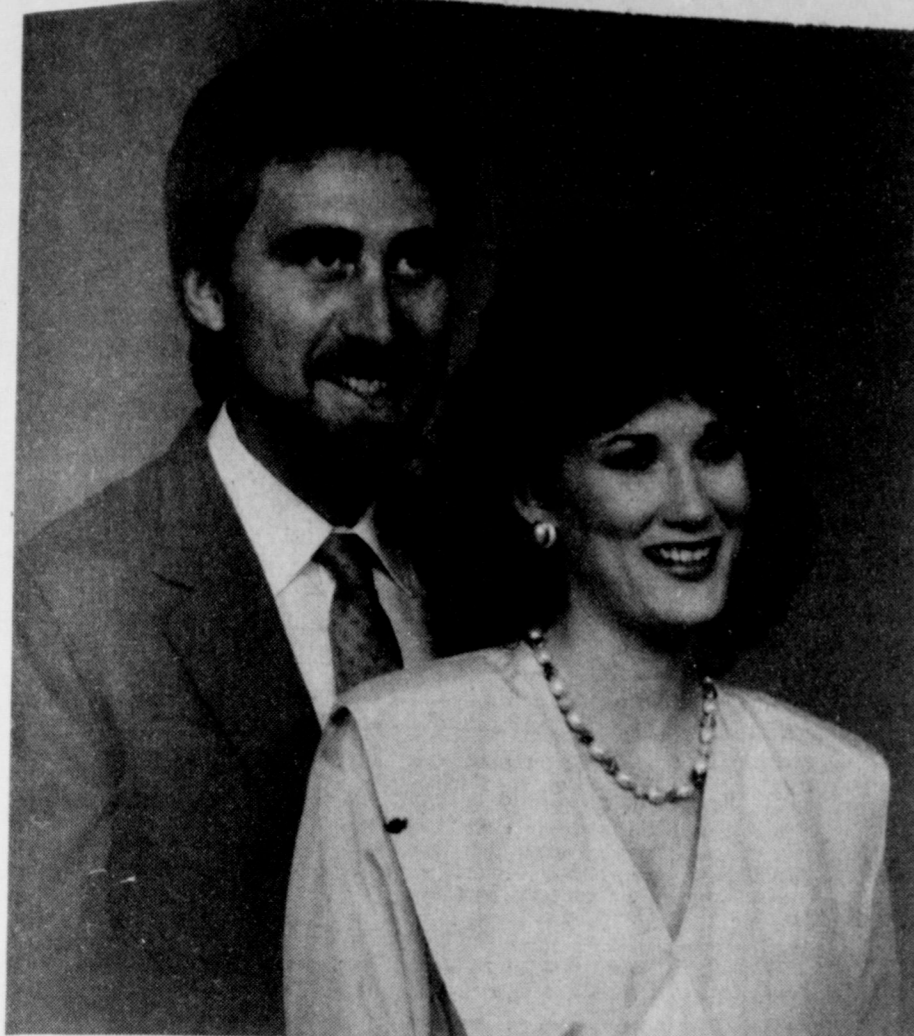

## Herbs topic of program for Garden Club

A program on "Herbs" was presented by Mrs. Dorwin Wooten and Mrs. Billy C. Gilmore Friday morning for members of the Iowa Park Garden Club. Hostesses for the meeting, held at Tom Burnett Memorial Library, were Mrs. Dave Davis and Mrs. Norma Fortner.

A video was shown, demonstrating how to raise herbs as seedlings in the spring and get a head start on the

growing season. It also showed how to transplant the seedlings from the indoor flower pots to the garden; how to plant herb seeds directly outdoors in the spring after the danger of frost is past, and how to harvest the herbs.

Mrs. Wooten explained that in order to dry the herbs, they should be washed, put in cheese cloth and dried in the oven, then stored in an airtight container. She also said another way is to tie the herbs in a bunch and hang them upside down in a cool dry place.

They displayed several books on herbs, along with spearmint, catnip, chives, sweet basil, peppermint, dill, and parsley plants, which they grew especially for the program. Each member was given a hand-out entitled "Using Your Herbs," and a sheet of recipes using herbs.

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As I See It...

Pre-kindergarten registration set here May 9-10

The annual screening and registration program for Iowa Park kindergarten-age children will be May 9-10 at Kidwell Elementary, according to Ron Woods, principal.

All children who will be five years of age by Sept. 1 will be screened. Parents can request an appointment time by contacting the school at 592-4322.

A full year of special education is available for children three and four years of age with a physical or learning deficiency, as determined by sight, hearing, speech, mental maturity or a physician's diagnosis.

Parents who have a child believed to be eligible for the special education program are asked to contact the school for an appointment time for screening.

Dolores and I had the pleasure of attending the annual meeting of the North and East Texas Press Association last weekend in Tyler.

I say pleasure, because that's what it is for us to visit with our newspaper friends, whom we've made lasting friends to the point of knowing most of their children and having watched them progress in their professions.

I may have been involved, one way or another, in the newspaper business 50 years, 32 of them full time, but I never fail to learn something at one of these meetings. Hopefully what I learn helps put out a better newspaper, and certainly things that help keep us afloat financially, so we can continue producing a newspaper.

Here are a few of my observations from the trip:

More and more of the newspapers in the state are being gobbled up by corporate chains. I'm not so sure I approve of all this because it appears the people are more interested in the newspaper and what it can do for them, rather than what their newspaper can do for their communities.

Tourism has become the number two industry in Texas, right behind oil and related fields. Tyler is working as hard or harder than any city its size to attract tourists, too. I was told that some 100,000 had visited the city during the past three weeks, to see the town's famous "Azalea Trail." I was also told the Chamber figures meetings, like our's, that attracts 250 people over a weekend generate as much money in the community as a month's salary for an industry employing nine people.

The Tyler area has some of the best and more interesting golf courses in the state. I played two of them, Hollytree and Willow Brook. At Hollytree, one doesn't measure how well he did by his score, but rather how few balls he lost!

Tyler may have more small specialty shops for its size than any city in the state. As one drives around the loop, he sees shopping center after shopping center, mostly composed of small shops. It's amazing.

Driving on US 20 is nice at this time of the year, because the wild flowers are just beginning to appear. But the stretch of highway 50 miles east of Dallas is worse than some of our oil patch roads, yet the speed limit is 65 miles per hour.

"(2) The owner of the property." Administrator James Barrington told the council he had researched the deed of land known as Pace Park, where the Christ the King Catholic Church has proposed to build an open-air structure to replace the two tennis courts.

The church's proposal is for the structure to be used both by the public as well as its members.

Barrington explained the asphalt surface of the tennis courts was in such bad condition it would not be feasible to repair them for intended use, and a pavillion would enhance the park area.

Aldermen agreed, but said plans for any structure to be built there must first be approved by the council.

Other actions by the council at the meeting included:

- \* approved appointment of Ken Via, David Padgett, Marc Newman, Jan Clapp, Keith Fisher and Linda Merrick to the Board of Adjustments;
\* approved a resolution calling for final payment for construction at the police department, but holding out \$1,000 for a period of time;
\* approved a resolution setting the week of April 18-23 as "Fix Up and Clean Up Week," and also agreed to volunteer their effort to clean up city hall park Saturday afternoon;
\* and approved a proposal to advertise for bids to repair city-owned structure roofs that were damaged in the Mar. 1 hail storm.

Ramona is a homemaker who hopes to keep children in her home. She and her husband have two children, Corky, five years old, and B.J., three years old.

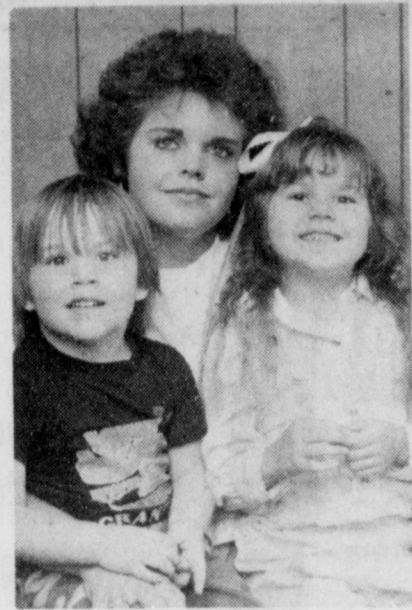
The former Ramona Price grew up in Iowa Park and graduated Iowa Park High School.

### CABBAGE BISCUITS

1 lb. ground beef  
Small onion, diced  
Small head cabbage, cut in small pieces  
2 cans biscuits
