

City's senior employee retiring after 17 years

After having served under nine chiefs of police and six mayors, Delores Vestal is ending her tenure Friday as Communications Supervisor with the Iowa Park Police Department after some 17 years of service.

Delores, who has the greatest tenure of any current city employee, has seen the department grow from three or four officers and four dispatchers in 1971 to nine officers and five dispatchers today.

Her title isn't limited, however, to Communications Supervisor. She is also a certified police officer and the Municipal Court Clerk.

When Delores joined the police department in 1971 her duty was to train dispatchers.

Just one year after she began her job, with some persistent prodding from the late Dr. Gordon Clark she became a certified police officer, an event that she says is one of her proudest moments while with the police department.

Although she isn't seen on regular patrol, her training has come in handy with rape victims, female prisoners and in working with juveniles that are brought in.

"Women (who have been assaulted) and children usually have an easier time talking to a woman (about the incident) than to a male officer," she said.

She must keep her certification current and reports to the firing range like any other officer.

While she was attending police academy, she kept a family, worked and also became certified to administer first aid.

Anyone who has gone to court for a traffic ticket in Iowa Park during the past eight years would probably recognize Delores as the

STUDY RESULTS SAME: Burning trash too expensive

economically feasible, according to a study made by a consultant and presented Monday night to the city

Terry Winn, who had earlier told the council his study on incineration accompanied by production of steam to be sold as energy was not feasible, reported on an extended study he made, which was for burning only.

While the costs of construction and operation were considerably less for burning only, Winn said, "In my opinion, it's not an economically feasible facility."

He tempered his recommendation, however, by saying it would be more feasible is more non-commercial trash, accepted from other sources on a commission basis, was taken to offset operating costs.

His comment was made after he told the council the cost of burning only Iowa Park's trash would be \$206,000 annually, and \$154,000 if Electra's trash were included (for a

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
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

Texans who have been having a hard time paying their increasing tax bills during the economic slump over the state are taking a slap in the face by spokespersons of the Texas State Teachers Association.

The slap comes in the form of a speech made Friday in Dallas by the president of the organization, Charles Beard, and another talk last week in East Texas by Olivia Besterio, TSTA vice president.

An Associated Press story carried by papers over the state stated: "Texas teachers will ask the Legislature for a pay raise next year to combat erosion of advances the sweeping education reform put in place four years ago," and attributed the statement to Beard.

If I'm not correct, I understand that teachers over Texas have received an annual salary increase of \$1,140 since the passage of House Bill 72.

With that kind of raise each year, I don't understand how Beard says the state has fallen from 21st ranking in the nation for teacher salaries to 27th. I wish the story had quoted him on which states have been increasing salaries faster than Texas.

I'll bet my watch that none of those passing Texas in salaries, if it did occur, were oil-producing states.

To make his call for higher wages sound with more fury, he quoted from a survey made by a Sam Hous-

ton State Univ. professor's survey that pointed out 29 percent of the teachers surveyed hold summer jobs.

What's new? Most folks want something to do after a couple of months vacation.

The same survey also said one in five teachers hold second jobs to make ends meet. Could it be that most of those were in their early years of their profession? Many of us held second jobs in similar circumstances. Not just teachers.

Besteiro, speaking at a banquet in Atlanta (Tex.), said both the funding and philosophy behind public education will face critical junctures when legislators reconvene.

"And in the end, it will affect every Texan's pocketbook," she is quoted saying.

As if it already hadn't?

She is also quoted as saying in a presentation about tax equity: "We do not propose that money be taken from the rich districts. We propose funds be raised to give to the poor districts."

From outside Texas? Every inch of this state is in one school district or another. From where would she propose the extra money come?

Beard pointed out that the average Texas teacher salary is \$25,655, and it was \$2,400 below the national average. That Texas average, by the way, amounts to almost \$140 pay per day of teaching.

There's a bunch of couples who filed joint tax returns who made less than \$20,000 last year. A big bunch. Now isn't a very appealing time for someone with that kind of income, who has a built-in annual increase, to gripe about pay!

Beard, in the AP story, also said school districts have been stingy in dealing with teachers, pointing out 745 districts froze their "local" share of salaries, while 111 districts cut pay.

Those freezes and cuts in local contributions to teacher salaries were mostly caused by all the increases in cost of public education mandated by House Bill 72. And the TSTA was a mighty big supporter of that bill, as I recall.

School districts over the state are being strapped to finance construction of additional space to meet the 22-1 pupil-teacher ratio in elementary grades.

Districts learned that the bill that built in teacher salary increases did not fund any increases for administration and other support personnel.

Very few, if any, districts in this part of the country realized any increase in state funding. In fact, money from Austin is shorter than it was before all the additional costs were put into effect.

Where state funding was about 70 percent of Iowa Park's needs a few short years ago, it's down to 50 percent now, and predicted to be even lower in the coming years.

Many school districts have been forced to increase their local tax rate greater than eight percent in one year, and have been turned back by a roll-back vote of the public.

In other words, it's not always the school trustees that freeze or cut local contribution to teacher salaries. The voters of the districts have the final say, and often do.

No, I would suggest comments by Texas State Teacher Association (which is affiliated with the union called National Education Association) spokespersons might temper their comments....at least for a few more years.

In a state where unemployment is riding at about eight percent, the economy is still in a rocky stage, and the unemployment tax took something like a 100-percent increase, now is not the time to gripe about salaries.

As for her secret, she did say some of her recipes are a little different than others, but on most of them she just isn't satisfied until she's adds her own special touch - an extra ingredient here and there.

Her recipes will speak for themselves, each using a variety of ingredients insuring a good dish.
