**DIDN'T READ STICKER** - Between the tail light and bumper, on which a sticker reads "Drive Friendly, The Wichita Falls Way," is a bullet hole made by a Department of Public Safety trooper. At least three shots were fired by officers to finally stop John Woods of Wichita Falls, after he had been chased from FM 369 through Holliday and finally stopped four miles west of Holliday shortly before midnight Saturday. He was charged with driving while intoxicated, fleeing from a peace officer, not having auto insurance, speeding, driving on the wrong side of the street and driving the wrong way on a one-way street. He allegedly rammed one patrol car and attempted to hit four others. A male companion was jailed in Archer City, described as "totally inebriated." Holliday residents, enjoying a street dance near the highway, were warned in advance of the approaching speeding vehicles, which passed through that city at speeds nearing 90 miles per hour. No one was injured.

# Fenley quits chief's post

Iowa Park Police Department is back to normal.

The definition of normal: the city council is advertising for applications for police chief, and Bob Dean is serving as "acting chief" while the search is in progress.

All this came about in quick order Friday afternoon, when Chief Tom Fenley submitted his resignation at 1:29 p.m., followed by a called meeting of the council at 5 p.m. to act.

In addition to Fenley, Sgt. J.W. Barker also resigned.

Fenley's letter of resignation stated:

"Please accept this letter as my official resignation as Chief of Police. I have made the difficult decision to leave my position and return to the Dallas area and re-open 'Fenley & Associates Polygraph'. I have asked Jerry Barker to return to Dallas with me, as an employee of Fenley & Associates. He has agreed, having also tendered his resignation this same date.

"I hereby give a 30 day notice, the effective date of my termination to be August 1, 1984. I request that my accrued benefits be accepted as my notice period, that those benefits be paid at the earliest convenience of the City, and that today be my last day in the office so that I may begin my relocation as soon as possible."

The council went immediately into executive session at its called meeting, emerging 18 minutes later to act on a three-point resolution. The points were to accept the resignations, appoint Dean acting chief and authorizing the city administrator to advertise for applications to fill the position.

Fenley, who took the post in February of 1983, said he wanted to return to the Dallas area, where he would make more money for about the same hours he was working here.

He added he would probably be moved before this issue of the Leader hit the newsstands.

former chief Billy Hamilton.

Administrator James Barrington confirmed Fenley's reasoning for returning to the Dallas area, but admitted there had been a request for more salary from Fenley for the

1984-85 year than the council was willing to pay.

Both Fenley and Barrington said, in separate interviews, that no pressure had been brought to get rid of Fenley.

However, at one meeting last month, Alderman Bud Mercer accused the department of operating "speed traps" in the city. More frequent discussions in coffee shops have centered recently on what was described as an unusual increase in number of traffic tickets and high fines.

Barrington told the council he and Fenley had inventoried equipment in the police station and everything had been accounted for.

Numerous changes took place in the police department during Fenley's tenure, including acquisition of a computer hookup with the DPS headquarters in Austin, changing of uniform and automobile marking colors, house-watch policies, development of the Neighborhood Watch Program, reports to property owners requesting house-watch, and numerous in-house reporting practices.

## EDUCATOR TURNS PASTOR

# Presbyterian Church has first female minister

Betty Louise Meadows is a teacher who switched from the classroom to the pulpit.

She is the new pastor of Iowa Park's First Presbyterian Church, becoming not only that church's first female minister, but she is believed to be the first of any denomination in Iowa Park.

She is to be ordained and installed at 11 a.m. services Sunday by Rev. Paul Young, executive director of the Palo Duro Presbytery at Lubbock, and five other ministers and elders from the Presbytery.

Miss Meadows taught 10 years, four in elementary and six in junior high school, prior to entering the seminary. Her classroom experience was in San Antonio and Midland.

Though she loved her profession, she says she did not feel fulfilled. She began working more and more at the church after hours, and finally decided the ministry was her calling.

She received the master of divinity degree in May from Austin Presbyterian Theological Seminary after having served as associate pastor of the Woodland Presbyterian Church in New Orleans during a year's internship in 1982-83.

Born at Monahans, she moved with her family when she was 16 to San Antonio, where she was graduated from Oliver Wendell Holmes High School. She then received a bachelor's

degree at Trinity Univ. and then earned a master's in education from the University of Texas.

Being in education was natural for her, but so is the ministry.

Miss Meadows' father taught and was in school administration 39 years before he retired. Her mother taught elementary 35 years. And her brother is a high school counselor in a high school in San Antonio.

Several of her mother's relatives are ministers. They are Baptists, however, and she is the first in the family to be a Presbyterian minister.

Credited to teach at all levels from kindergarten through the eighth grade, she received a reading education degree from Southwest Texas to teach reading through all 12 grades.

Time permitting, she intends to offer her services to local schools as a substitute teacher.

### WOMEN IN MINISTRY

More and more women are entering ministry, Miss Meadows says. At least 25 percent of the enrollment at the seminary she attended in Austin was female. And she listed three other Presbyterian seminaries in the nation where women make up one-third of the enrollment.

Most women entering the ministry are older than men. "Most of us enter the ministry after already having another job, while the majority of

Landfill-use permit fees all expire June 30 each year. But if a resident wants to obtain a permit the week before expiration date, it costs the same for that week as it would for the

City Administrator James Barrington said the council would consider a proposal to raise the annual fee from \$2 to \$8, but reducing it \$2 each quarter of the year.

The new structure would give more consideration to those who take out a permit the latter part of the fiscal year, as well as making the use fee more realistic with the cost of operation, he said.

When building permits are issued by city hall, the permit reports the estimated cost of constructing a structure. Barrington said the council is to consider changing the policy to a rate of per square foot cost, but a formula was not ready to be written for the council's consideration early this week.

Numerous items of surplus

property owned by the city have been offered for sale by bids, which are to be opened today. This is the second such sale in two months.

Aldermen will consider a recommendation by the Planning and Zoning Commission which approves a request by developer Bill Swan to replat the north side of the 700 block of West Louisa. Swan seeks to increase the number of lots on the block from eight to nine.

Council members Lita Watson, Don Decker and George Hammonds, along with Mayor Tim Hunter and Barrington, made a tour Monday afternoon of several city departments, and plan to set a date for a second tour of those areas missed. The tour is part of the council's practice when considering annual budgets.

### IRS Tax Tips

#### Social Security Coverage Extended To Employees of Tax-Exempt Groups

Salaried employees of tax-exempt organizations, including charitable, religious and educational groups, are now required to pay social security taxes, the Internal Revenue said. The Social Security Amendments of 1983 require all such employees to pay these taxes, beginning January 1, 1984. Previously there was no such requirement, the IRS said, unless the employer had specifically requested that its employees be covered by social security.

Employees of organizations that are tax exempt under Internal Revenue Code section 501(c) (3) who earn at least \$100 a year are subject to social security tax on earnings, the IRS said. Employees will have 6.7 percent of their salary withheld at the same time the federal income tax is withheld. This amount should be reflected, along with other deductions from the employees' paychecks, on the employees' regular payroll slips. The total withheld will be shown on the Forms W-2, Wage and Tax Statement, which should be furnished to all employees in January, following the end of the tax year.

The employer is required to contribute seven percent to the social security fund for each employee. The employer reports to the government quarterly the total of 13.7 percent of wages for each employee. These percentages are set by law and may vary from year to year, the IRS said.

Social security is separate from income tax and these payments go into a special fund that provides for a federal system of old age, survivors, disability, and hospital insurance. There is an annual income limitation or "cap" on social security withholding, the IRS said. Once compensation reaches \$37,800 (the "cap" for 1984), the withholding stops. Therefore, if an individual makes this much from one or from several combined employers, total withholding for social security should not exceed \$2,532.60 (6.7 percent of \$37,800).

If withholding does exceed this amount because two or more employers have been deducting social security from an individual's pay, a credit for any excess over \$2,532.60 may be taken on the individual's income tax return for 1984, the IRS said. If any one employer has withheld too much, the employee should ask the employer to return the excess amount collected, the IRS added.

## As I See It....

Know what is similar between this new education bill the legislature apparently will pass and a real fine, fully-equipped pickup? I'll tell you.

When you're shopping for a pickup, the government tells you, in printing, how efficiently it will operate. It says what the mileage is supposed to be on a gallon of gasoline.

Then you can see all the prices of the extras on the sticker. Anyone with a calculator can easily figure out the cost, then factor in how many miles they expect to drive during the 48 months it is financed, and calculate what the monthly cost will be for that period.

BUT... the finance charge wasn't on the sticker. Neither was the insurance premium, nor the cost of servicing and replacing tires. And certainly, inflation wasn't considered.

In addition, you might have

changed from a standard shift and also added a camper shell, both of which make you slightly uncomfortable while driving because of the changes.

Well, that's just about what has happened on your education bill. That is, if the bill passed. This is being written Tuesday afternoon, and I have no idea if the funding portion will be passed before the special session ends. But I think it will.

The bottom line, the taxpayers are going to pay through the nose, and I don't think you're going to see much improvement in Johnny's reading as a result of it.

The only people who are going to come out on this deal are those who are beginning teachers, according to the salary structures listed in HB 72. A first-year teacher with a bachelor's degree is going to make exactly the

same salary as a teacher in his fifth year, \$1,520 monthly.

And you want a kicker, if a new teacher stayed in school and earned his master's, he is going to get exactly the same salary the first four years on the job as does one with a bachelor's.

And you remember that \$162,600 more in state funding the Iowa Park district is supposed to get. Sure you do! The papers have been full of it since the special session got underway!

Well's there's a kicker. Since Iowa Park's school tax was 41-cents per \$100 value in 1983, and the average tax over the state that year was 57.8-cents, Iowa Park must increase its tax next year to 57.8-cents. If the rate isn't increased, it won't get the \$162,600 in full, but the difference between the local and state figures will be subtracted. That, according to one interpretation of the new bill.

As of Tuesday afternoon, no one around here had a copy of the bill, only interpretations. So the final line won't be known until it is all printed and released.

The bill provides for an appointed state school board, with elected trustees to begin coming back into office after four years. That's after the governor's hatchet men and H. Ross Perot get their licks in on how education should be run.

And did you know the bill prohibits any district from holding a tax rollback? I thought that was in our constitution.

Maybe this education bill and the funding program is the best thing to happen to Texas. That's what my mother told me about clabber milk when I was a kid. But it didn't make it taste any better, and I still threw up every time I tried it!

## Worth Quoting

Andrews county could have elected a Democratic nominee for the United States Senate last Saturday.

It could have—but didn't.

Andrews county was one of eight counties in the South Plains that showed decreases in total votes for Kent Hance. Eight other counties in the area actually increased their number of voters in the runoff over the first primary.

In the first primary, when 53 percent of the voters went to the polls for both Democrats and Republicans, Hance polled 2,574 votes out of a possible 3,066.

In the runoff here Saturday, only 1,264 voters showed up and 1,204 gave their votes to Hance.

With Hance 467 votes shy of a majority over Lloyd Doggett statewide, the 1370 people who didn't show for the runoff election in Andrews, could have meant the difference between defeat and victory.

We have something like 15,400,000 people in the Lone Star State and 6,500,000 registered voters... and less than one in six bothered to go to the polls last Saturday.

Ever since Texas abandoned the poll tax method of registration in 1966, the number of registered voters has increased but the number of people who actually vote has decreased.

It's evident that the people not only in Texas but nationwide want the right to vote but not the responsibility.

Perhaps we should apply a few baseball rules to voting. Since only one out of every six Americans make the effort to vote, perhaps instead of a "designated hitter" we could have a "designated voter" to go to the polls for the rest of us.

Or even better, we could pass a rule that if you miss voting in three elections, you lose your right to vote.

Or perhaps we could do a better job of teaching citizens just what the right to vote costs...

We lost 25,324 soldiers in the Revolutionary War. We lost 498,332 in the Civil War. A total of 116,708 fell in World War I.

There's 407,316 crosses on the graves of those who died fighting in World War II, another 54,246 who lie beneath crosses from the Korean War and 58,655 from the Vietnam War.

All in all, we have 1,160,581 men and women who lie beneath military crosses Normandy, in the Punch Bowl in Hawaii, in Arlington, in military cemeteries around the world. Most of them never had the opportunity to vote.

On this anniversary of the invasion of Europe, we can't help but wonder if those who fell on the beaches of Normandy, think it was worth the effort—an effort so that only one out of every six eligible Americans bothers to participate in democracy.

It doesn't seem like a fair swap to us.

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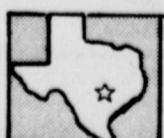

## IRS Tax Tips

### Lost or Stolen Tax Refunds Can Be Traced

Sometimes circumstances occur which indicate that a taxpayer's Federal tax refund check may be lost or stolen. If this occurs, a taxpayer may contact the Internal Revenue Service to take the necessary steps to retrieve the check or to have a replacement check issued.

When a refund check is overdue, usually after ten weeks have passed since the tax return was filed, a taxpayer should contact the IRS to inquire about the refund. The taxpayer will be asked several questions regarding the return by the IRS representative and should be prepared to verify the information.

While there are several reasons that might explain why a check hasn't been delivered to the taxpayer, common ones include returns that are incomplete or that have a signature missing. These returns are held up in processing pending notification of the taxpayer for more complete or accurate information. Taxpayers should double check the return and be sure that it is signed, by both spouses if it is a joint return, before mailing it. Other tax returns never reach the Service Center for processing. Either the address is incorrect or proper postage hasn't been added to the envelope. Also, if a taxpayer does not use the specially designed peel-off label and the identification and address information is illegible, a refund check may be delayed or listed as undeliverable.

However, if a taxpayer contacts IRS and finds that a check was in fact issued but it hasn't been received, the taxpayer will be instructed to complete a Form 3911, Taxpayer's Statement Regarding Refund, and to submit the form to the IRS.



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# Cook of the Week

This week's cook, Mrs. Joe Rains, is currently preparing herself for motherhood, as the former Miss Shawnee Henderson and her husband are expecting their first child in October.

Mrs. Rains, a 1983 graduate of Iowa Park High School, was born and grew up in this community, as was her husband, who works for Reed's Supply in Wichita Falls. The couple are members of the First Christian Church.

She says her mother, Mrs. Sam Henderson, is the greatest source of inspiration for her as far as cooking goes, adding that the family gatherings were always a joy for everyone because of her cooking.

Mrs. Rains lists her hobbies as working in the garden, reading and cooking.

In her Vegetable Dip recipe, she uses dill weed in addition to other spices, which guarantees a smile on every face when tasted.

Dill is a fennel-like annual or biennial herb of the parsley family or its dried, ripe fruit, or seeds, and leafy tops used to season foods, particularly in eastern Europe and Scandinavia. Native to Mediterranean countries and southern U.S.S.R., dill is widely cultivated in Europe, India and North America. The entire plant is aromatic and the small stems and immature umbels are used for flavoring soups, salads, sauces, fish, sandwich fillings, and particularly pickles.

Dill has a warm, slightly sharp flavor faintly reminiscent of caraway, and in some instances has been effectively used as a medicinal herb, particularly for treating flatulent colic.

# Nutrition important to growing children

Should a child who refuses to eat his breakfast cereal be given a peanut butter sandwich?

Children's nutrition experts at Baylor College of Medicine say why not: it's not important what a child eats for breakfast, as long as it's something nutritious, like a peanut butter sandwich.

Good nutrition is vital during the growing years, but parents are often exasperated because children have special tastes which usually don't include vegetables or fish.

A new pamphlet from Baylor College of Medicine helps parents choose the right foods and teach them about nutrition.

A child's nutritional requirements change as he grows, the experts said.

An infant needs plenty of calories and nutrients from breastmilk or commercially prepared solutions because more physical and mental development occurs during the first year than at any other time.

A toddler sometimes doesn't want or need three full meals a day because he has a slower growth rate.

A school age child needs three nutritional meals a day because he is very active. But he is also choosing his own foods, so he needs to understand good nutrition. What he learns will carry over into adulthood, and bad nutrition can lead to heart disease, obesity, high blood pressure and dental problems.

Other suggestions the Baylor experts had were:

-- Don't make a child clean his plate. Serve small portions, and then let the child ask for more.

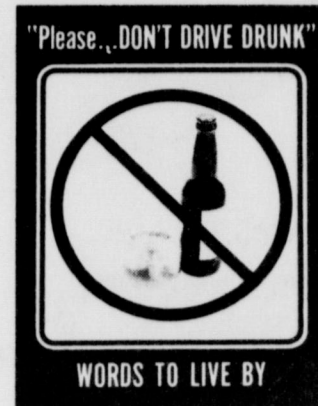
-- Don't serve small children spicy foods that are too hot or too cold.

They prefer mild-flavored foods served at room temperature.

-- Don't buy expensive health foods. They are no more nutritious than foods from the four basic food groups -- meats, fruits and vegetables, milk products and breads.

-- Avoid putting a child on fad diets or high doses of vitamins. Neither will improve one's health and any vitamin is potentially dangerous if taken in high enough doses.

# IRS Tax Tips

## TAXPAYERS SHOULD MAKE SURE TO ATTACH ALL DOCUMENTS

When you file your federal tax return, be sure to attach all supporting documents and schedules before mailing it, the IRS says.

Documents such as earning statements, schedules, statements verifying deductions, or other pertinent information should be securely attached to the 1040, 1040A, or 1040EZ. Taxpayers must include W-2 forms from all employers if they worked at more than one job, the IRS points out, regardless of the amount of earnings.

Missing documents cause processing errors and refund delays and can create confusion and inconvenience for the taxpayer, the IRS explained. In most instances when a required form or schedule is missing from the tax return, the IRS must contact the taxpayer to request the missing item.

## SPECIAL DEPENDENCY RULES

Separated and divorced parents should look closely at the special requirements for claiming children as dependents on federal tax returns, the Internal Revenue Service says.

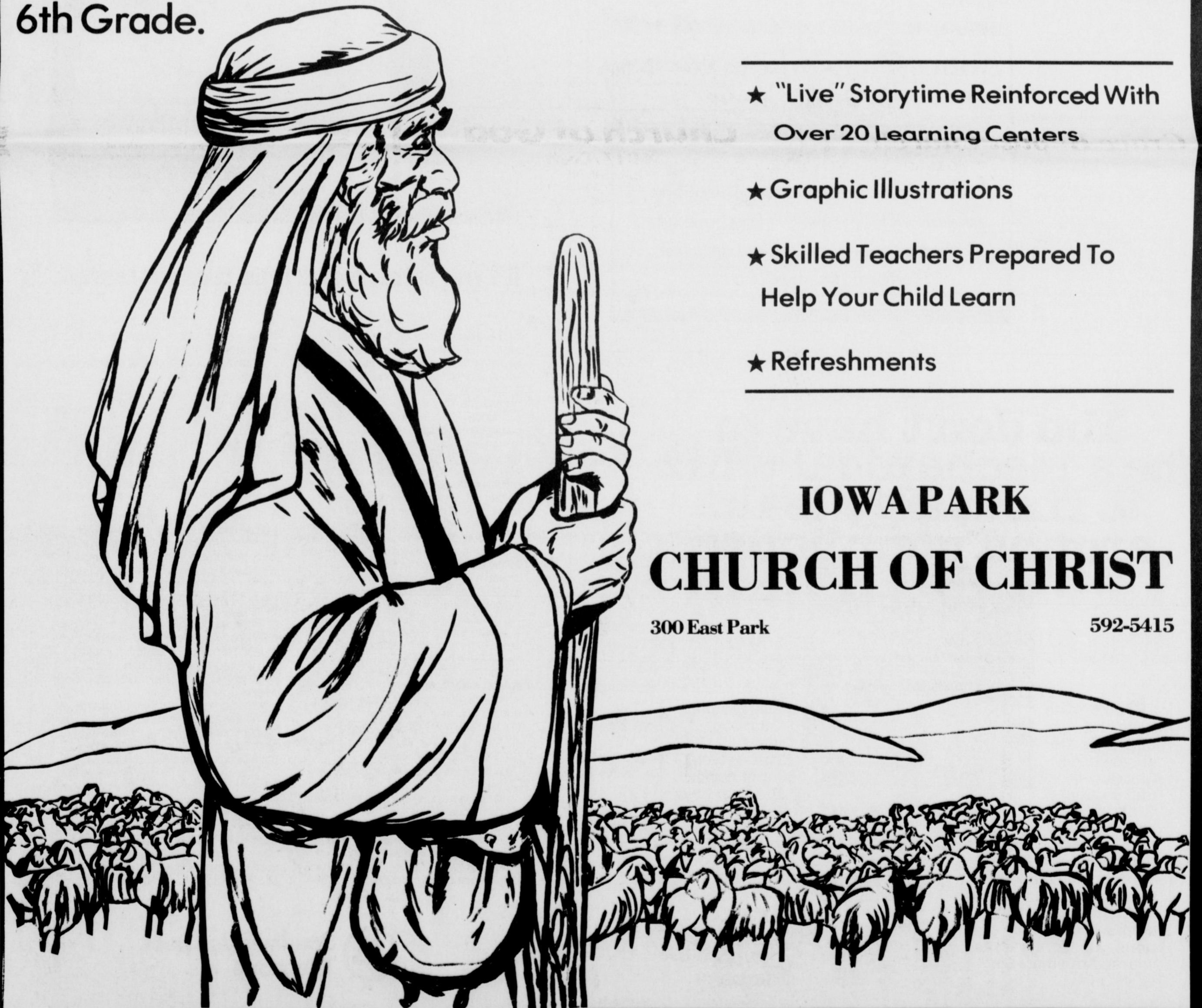

## SUPERINTENDENT SAYS:

# Education bill a 'sham'

The Holliday Independent School District will receive a total of \$176,200 in state funding under the \$2.8-billion education reform bill passed by the Texas Legislature last weekend, but superintendent Dan Owen says the figures are deceiving and "a sham."

"It is a sham for teachers, and taxpayers alike," Owen said Tuesday. The administrator, now in his third year as head of Holliday's schools, said the amount earmarked for Holliday ISD won't even come close to handling the school's budget, and additional reforms in the bill signal a gradual but hefty increase in school taxes.

"I called representative Finnell and Farabee last week voicing my opinion against the reform bill," Owen said. "Not as an administrator, but as a concerned citizen aware of the consequences to the taxpayers of this school district."

In last week's voting, Rep. Finnell stood adamantly opposed to the bill, while Farabee voted for the bill in Senate action. The Senate passed the compromise plan by a 22-9 vote, while the House did the same by a 92-55

margin. Areas of the bill which concern Owen most are the teacher pay scale, the teacher/student ratio, and change from funding formulation using A.D.A. (Average Daily Attendance); and P.U.s (Personnel Units) to A.D.A. and tax rate only.

Under the teacher pay scale, teachers just beginning the profession will start at Scale 1 with a pay base of just over \$15,000. The teacher must meet prerequisites including advanced education in order to be elevated to a higher pay scale, in addition to taking a competency exam. Owen said a teacher at a higher pay scale will have a tough time relocating to another school if faced with a host of challengers with less experience but lower pay scale. "A school board faced with an extremely tight budget will probably go with the less experienced teacher."

Owen said no teacher organization other than the AFT (American Federation of Teachers) has supported the reform bill. "Farabee sent a letter to administrators claiming to have the support of the Texas administrators and superintendent's

organization," remarked Owen. "But after phoning the head of the organization, I found that we had not supported the bill."

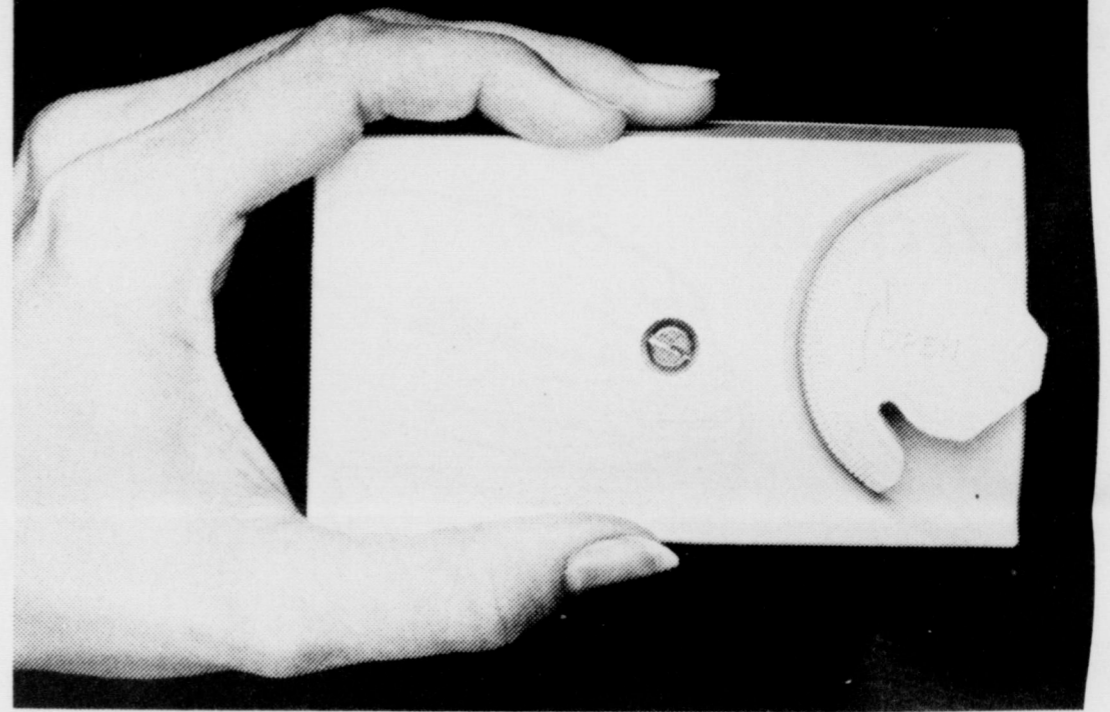
Another problem for the local school district will be in the teacher/student ratio plan, which will begin the next school year for kindergarten through second grade and mandate a teacher for every 22 students rule, and in the next school year, include third and fourth grade and decrease to a teacher per 20 student ratio. "This means additional personnel in the next few years, with funding to come from local taxpayers," Owen said.

The superintendent added that the teacher retirement plan will receive no further state funding, and a portion of it will be paid for locally.

"In my opinion, this bill will hurt education in Texas instead of reform it as it was supposed to do," Owen added. "There are a lot of loopholes that are going to burden local taxpayers by increases in taxes."

"One person everyone should take their hats off to for holding his ground and opposing the bill is our own representative, Charles Finnell."

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# AREA OIL & GAS NEWS
